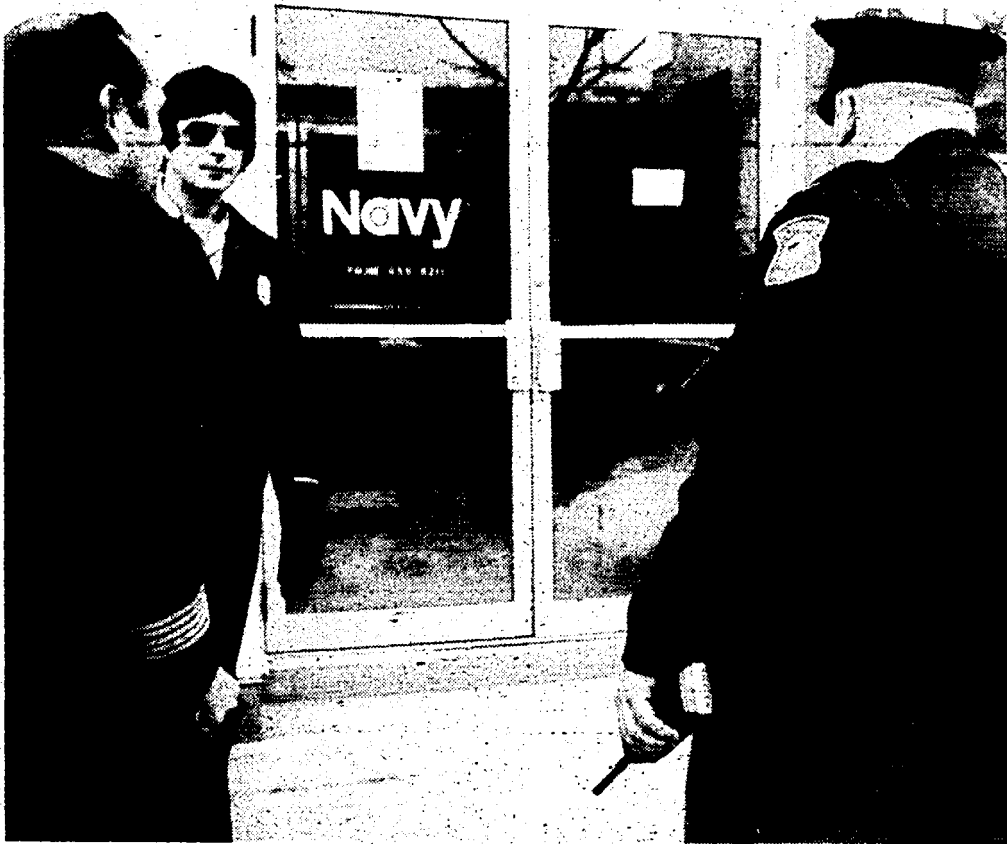

A Canton woman ignited a homemade bomb in the foyer of the Naval Recruiting Station in downtown Plymouth Monday morning.

No one was hurt when the homemade device, contained in a glass jar, exploded at 9:15 a.m. at the Navy office, 819 Penniman Ave.

Arrested and charged with setting an explosion with intent to destroy was Eileen Anita Roths, 50, of 39743 Hillary, Canton. She was arraigned on the felony charge yesterday in 35th District Court.

A recruiter at the Navy office, Petty Officer Patrick Lambert, said he was waiting in the foyer of the station when the suspect approached with "a glass quart jar."

"She opened the first door (of the foyer) and said, 'Please stand aside, I have a present for my son,'" said Lambert. "She then placed the jar down, lit the fuse, and left. She seemed quite calm."

Lambert and another recruiter then left the foyer and immediately the bomb went

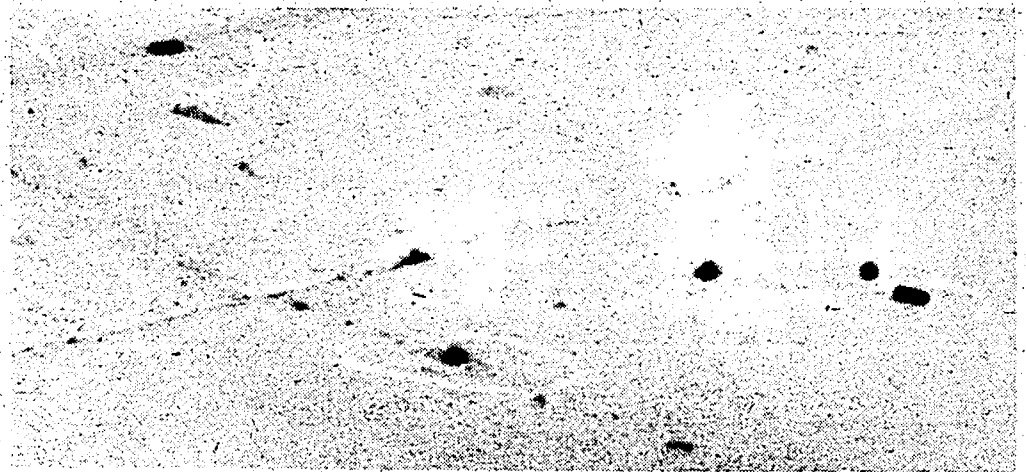
off, he said. Black powder "probably" served as the explosive for the bomb, which was filled with rifle cartridges and other objects, said Plymouth Police Chief Timothy Ford.

Because a glass jar was used to hold the charge, it did not build up much explosive force, added Ford. A glass pane in the foyer was cracked, but this was the only damage, he said.

Lambert said he tried to detain the suspect after the bomb exploded, but she had entered her car and locked the doors. "I got the license plate number, though, and called the police," he said.

Using this information, Canton police arrested Roths in the township shortly afterward around 10 a.m.

Roths' son, whose name was not released by the head of the recruiting office, had contacted the Navy about a year ago requesting information. Since then, said Mike Richardson, chief of the Plymouth Navy recruiting office, he had been contacted twice, but both times he said he was not interested in enlisting.

Culbert outspends rival in losing re-election bid

Former Canton Supervisor Noel Culbert outspent his victorious opponent more than 2-1 in the recent general election.

Campaign financial records filed last week show Culbert received \$4,260 from various sources, while winner James Poole listed contributions of \$1,963, all from one source, himself.

Culbert also outspent everyone in the races for treasurer, clerk, and trustee. Robert Padgett, top vote-getter in the trustee campaign, received \$1,935, highest of the eight trustee candidates. Steve Larson, also elected, listed contributions of \$1,246.18.

Loren Bennett, another trustee winner, received contributions of \$1,242. Gary Roberts, defeated in the eight-person contest, had contributions of \$1,199. And incumbent Carol Bodenmiller, a winner, listed campaign receipts of \$325 for the general election. Larry Bowerman, a loser, received \$974. Mary Dingeldey also filed a statement, but did not list a figure of total contributions.

The rest of the candidates, including the two seeking the treasurer position, Maria Falkiewicz and James Kearney, declared they spent under \$500, and therefore were not required by state law to file a detailed campaign financial statement.

About 30 per cent -- \$1,300 --- of Culbert's war chest, the candidate contributed himself. This does not include a loan of \$748.15 that Culbert made to his campaign, according to the statement, on file at the Wayne County Clerk's office.

The financial statement, due Dec. 4, covered the period starting 11 days before the Nov. 4 election.

Other contributors to the Culbert campaign include a number of persons who do business with the township. Robert Wade and Donald Trim, for example, each gave \$100. They head Wade, Trim & Associates, the township's planning consulting firm.

Also, C. Gerald Hemming and Chris Polaczyk, two township attorneys, contributed \$100 apiece.

Twp. campaign funds revealed

Candidates for office in Plymouth Township couldn't be accused of being big spenders, compared to their counterparts in Canton Township.

According to campaign financial statements filed last week, Supervisor Maurice Breen received a total of \$340 and spent \$1,316.94 during the recent election campaign.

The statements, filed with the Wayne County Clerk, covered the period from 11 days before the Nov. 4 election through Dec. 4.

Breen listed one contributor, Leo Calhoun, of Plymouth, who donated \$300. Breen earlier had loaned his campaign \$3,000, the statement said.

The supervisor's opponent, Democrat Carol Levitte, spent or received less than \$500 on her campaign, and therefore was not required to file a detailed financial statement.

No other township candidate spent or received more than \$500 during the filing period either.

An organization called the Canton Democratic Committee contributed \$150. Its address is the same as Culbert's home address, 1706 Woodbridge Ct.

State Sen. William Faust, of Westland, gave \$50 to the Culbert campaign. Others contributing include: James Haverstick, of Westland, \$150; Joseph McClain, of Detroit, \$100; Jim Folger, of Canton, \$50. Kenneth Morris, of Livonia, is listed as loaning the campaign \$1,100.

Padgett received campaign funds from the following persons: Ken Dividock, Canton, \$25; Stanley Gill, \$25; Frank McMurray, Canton, \$20; and Howard Stien, Jr., Wayne, \$25. Padgett loaned his campaign \$1,000, the statement said.

Larson listed three contributors: C. Gerald Hemming, \$75; Sanford Pearlman, of Southfield, \$50; Abe Green, of Farmington, \$50. Larson loaned his campaign \$70.

Roberts had a number of contributors. They are: Claude Howard, of Westland, \$94.80; Prehlad Vacher, M.D., of Canton, \$94.80; Tim Murphy, of Canton, \$50; Sam Zeer, of Southfield, \$100; Sanford Pearlman, of Southfield, \$50; Milton Rotenberg, of Birmingham, \$50; James Haverstick, of Westland, \$100; Al Rosen, of Dearborn,

State nixes Twp.'s bid for cityhood

It looks like the City of Plymouth Place will never be established.

Thursday, the state Boundary Commission rejected petitions, filed by Plymouth Township residents in 1977, seeking incorporation into a home-rule city. They were a political maneuver to block annexation attempts by the City of Plymouth.

The petitions were rejected because they contained errors in their legal descriptions, said Jim Hyde, executive secretary of the state Boundary Commission.

"If the petitioners are still interested (in becoming a city), then they must be refiled with correct legal descriptions," he said. The property outlined in the original petitions matches the township's current borders.

Thursday's ruling marks the end of the six-year old struggle between the city and township over annexation.

In 1974, the city filed three petitions to annex the Hillside Inn property, Burroughs parking lot, and all of Plymouth Township. In January, a circuit court judge ruled that the Burroughs lot would remain part of Plymouth Township. Following that decision, the city dropped its annexation drive and the

petition for the Hillside Inn property was ruled inactive.

These actions paved the way for the Boundary Commission to rule on the petitions favoring home-rule city, to be called Plymouth Place.

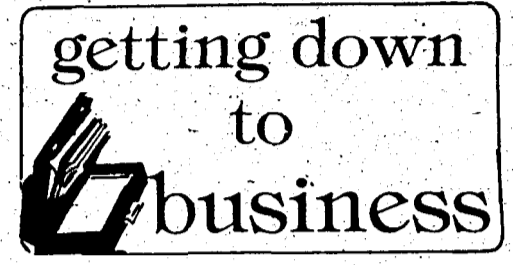
Burroughs announces layoffs

Effective Dec. 12, 222 employees of the Burroughs plant in Plymouth were laid off due to the results of a competitive market, company-wide consolidation and the natural evolution of the electronics industry. The plant is one of two world-wide that handles final assembly of the company's B-90 computer.

Company spokesmen said the layoffs "are in the indefinite category, which means it is unclear how long it will be." Employees will be compensated for the holiday period, however. The spokesman explained the layoffs were plant-wide and reductions were made in every department.

"The company is in the process of several major moves, including consolidation of plants, closing of small overseas market operations and an attempt to get the cost of our product down to a competitive level," the spokesman said. "A very important factor to consider is because of the competitive market, we have to look for ways to make the product better and less expensive. The nature of the industry is that new models have less parts and are less labor-involved."

He explained that an older Burroughs accounting machine, for example, had more than 20,000 parts, while a newer machine has less than 3,500.



The layoffs are part of a company-wide reduction of about 1,400 workers, about six per cent of the total Burroughs work force, said a spokesman. Plymouth's plant employed about 1,600 workers before the layoffs, he said.

Dock Duncan, a spokesman for United Auto Workers Local 1313, which represents Burroughs workers in Plymouth, disagreed with the size of the company's local employee reduction. "What we were told by the company was that approximately 350 people would be laid off," he said. "We're not happy, but there's nothing we can do about it."

Duncan said the laid off workers would be paid for eight days over the holidays, and then be eligible for unemployment and sub pay. "It sure came at a bad time," he added.

ESY calender has not disrupted our family life

EDITOR:

On the front page of your paper on Dec. 10, there appeared an article titled "Bird, Farrand parents sign Anti-ESY petitions." As a parent of three sons who know little other than ESY, this article caused me much mental upheaval and anguish.

I do not believe that ESY has greatly disrupted our family life nor has it destroyed our family integrity.

The disruptions come, for the most part, from others in the community not aware or not accepting the fact that there are young people in the community on an Extended School Year (ESY) and not providing for these students. (My sons have had to accept inferior, overcrowded lessons in tennis and swimming to name just two areas).

Also, I would like to know why Meredith Padden

and the homeowners in Farrand and Bird school areas, did not speak out before, when other schools were forced to accept this method of schooling that is so objectionable to them now.

Mrs. Padden's statements say to me that her family and neighbors are somehow more important than all those families now on ESY; that the value of properties in the Bird and Farrand areas is more important than the value of those in Canton township, and that her being free to "work or go to school" is more important than the education of our young people. Maybe it is time for the rest of the community to "jive" with our school system during its stressful times.

Furthermore, I do not feel that ESY is "an infringement of our rights."

It is the responsibility of every citizen of Plymouth-

Canton to provide an education for our young people. If that means some problems to be worked out by parents then so-be-it.

The problems of ESY are not insurmountable.

An ESY or mixed schedule is not easy. There are problems for all families. Many or most who are now effected by ESY do not like it and did not choose it, but ESY could be a little less terrible if we all work together toward the same goals for all our students and not toward the convenience of some of the parents.

Let's start looking at the pluses not the minuses.

Three weeks vacation during the fall or spring can really be a learning, sharing family experience even if four and one half weeks after Christmas is somewhat less appealing.

With Malice Toward None



The most pathetic display of foolishness comes from those who are convinced that they're superior to others and ought to be treated accordingly.

Unfortunately for those deluded souls, whatever standard they're using (which subdivision they live in, how many cars they have, how much they make, etc.) rarely stands up under close examination.

And even when it does, what right does it give them?

The Plymouth-Canton School Board has fostered these delusions of superiority in subtle ways over the years and is once again embroiled in a controversy of its own creation as a result.

The real and imagined differences parents find between schools and school programs can be traced far into history:

- From the start of the Centennial Education Park, naming high schools after various communities was an error. Better to have honored former school superintendents or educators.

- When the school board handed the oldest traditions all to Salem, it ignored the need for other CEP high schools to find their identity and nurtured imagined superiority.

- When the school board woke to the disparity in school attendance areas (which even used railroad tracks as dividing lines), it created a citizens' committee that gave recommendations later changed because superior-feeling parents pressured the board. (Elitist Bird School parents in one area, for instance, argued successfully against being moved to another "inferior" school despite the rising Bird School population.) Rather than face a citizen committee's suggestions, the board now uses a computer system to draw up school attendance areas.

- When the school board built new elementary schools -- all in Canton -- and staffed

them with newly-promoted administrators instead of seasoned veterans, it created a real disparity.

- When the school board implemented 45-15 in some schools and not others, it created real problems for families on mixed schedules and gave added fuel to those who imagined that they were better (or worse) than the others.

Had the school board put all Plymouth-Canton elementary and middle schools on the same year-round schedule, we might have had smaller class levels, less need for new schools, more successful bond and operating millage tries, and -- most importantly -- more equitable educational opportunities for all students in the district, regardless of socio-economic status.

Since democracy relies on the type of participation now being seen from Bird and Farrand School parents, they cannot be faulted for making their voices heard. They can, however, be warned of the folly in claiming they're any better than anyone else and thereby entitled to something different.

And the school board must once again be aware that allowing the dreamers' misbeliefs to continue only puts the problem off for another day. If the board members give in to the concerns raised by the Bird and Farrand parents (fathers should be particularly incensed by the ridiculous sexist claim that ESY is a "women's issue.") how they can look a Canton parent straight in the eye?

The ESY program is different, yes. But it is not a bad approach towards burgeoning growth in schools.

It may take some adjustment to get used to the year-round and 45-15 aspects, but those adjustments can be made by everyone, no matter which side of the tracks they're from.

a major portion of those wonderful summers when toad-hunting season is in full swing and days seem meant for virtually living in their bathing suits.

ESY just doesn't seem natural. It doesn't feel right. I'm against it!

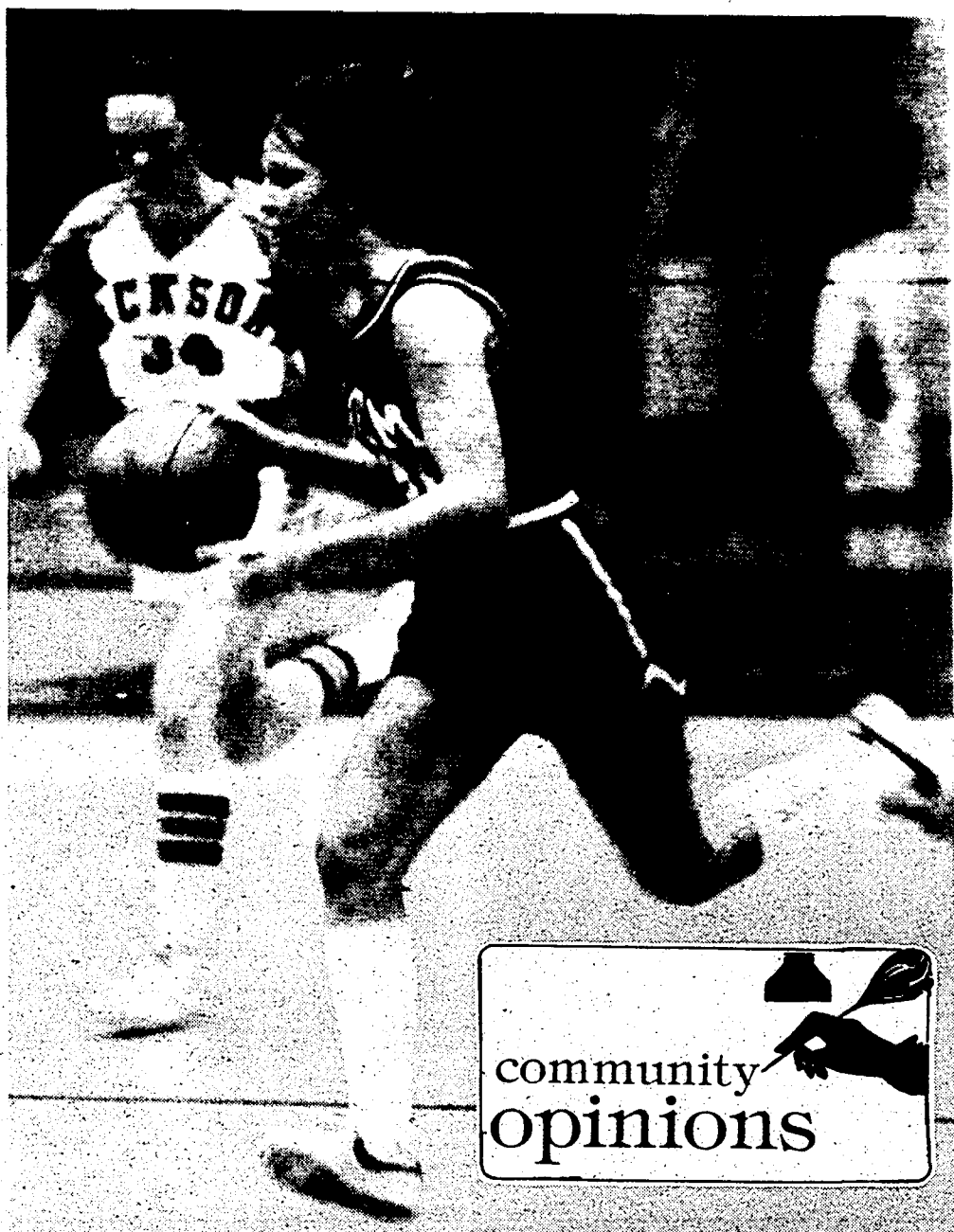

election, to be held either in March or June.

Funds would be used to: equip schools for year-round classes next fall; purchase furniture and books for Lowell Junior High School, which the district will rent from Livonia next fall; and, buy portable classrooms as needed throughout the district.

Last year, voters defeated two bond proposals at the polls. In March, a \$21.9 million bond issue was shot down and in June an \$11 million issue met defeat.

School officials, pressed for money to finance grade realignment, should begin now to tell voters why more money is needed, if the school board decides to put a bond proposal on the ballot.

Voter education is a tough task. But, unless taxpayers understand school financing, the outcome of a third attempt at a bond proposal can almost be forecasted.

VPOs help the community as well as the courts

Probation officer. The words bring to mind a person who watches every move of the probationer, criticizing, evaluating, passing judgment.

But the image doesn't fit the reality. Most probation officers, especially the volunteers, seek only to help and never to judge or criticize.

In fact, most of the probation officers in the 35th District Court are volunteers, people who give their time to try to do something for someone else. Recently, these volunteer probation officers (VPOs) were recognized for their work at a dinner hosted by the court, a tribute to the service they perform that is not available in every court in the state. George Wiland, court administrator, summed up his feelings by saying, "I have come to realize how great you all are after spending time with other administrators. I offer my appreciation for the job you have all done."

The job VPOs do is not easy. More than 1,200 probation cases are spread between 14 assistant chief probation officers and 65 VPOs. The nature of the job requires individual attention to each probationer, and that requires a lot of time.

Scheduling is accomplished between the probationer, VPO and assistant chief. The VPO can ask for any number of cases, as long as her or she can handle the caseload. Most VPOs take on between one and five cases at a time, according to Wiland, but the number fluctuates because of the term of probation and what the conditions are.

"Some probationers complete a three-week alcohol awareness program and are released," says Wiland, "and some are required to meet with the VPO once a month for a year. It all depends on the judge."

Most of the cases assigned by Judge Dunbar Davis to Bob Olsen, a Plymouth resident, are those dealing with dope, traffic, alcohol and theft.

Olsen says the alcoholics are the toughest to rehabilitate. "With alcoholics, you're probably sunk from the beginning, but if you can get them involved in an Alcoholics Anonymous type of program, you might have a chance." Lee Nuttall, another VPO, agrees. "With the alcoholics, it's really frustrating -- you just can't get them to recognize they have a problem."

Probationers aren't the only ones with problems, however. Olsen says although most of his cases are first-time violators, the amount of paperwork to be done for each

case is sometimes overwhelming.

"VPOs are responsible for collecting court costs, and there's paperwork in that," he says. "There are also reports on each individual, and notices to the judge if the parole is violated."

The work is not without its rewards. "I feel like I'm doing something, not just complaining," explains Nuttall. "It's a very satisfying thing," adds Olsen. His wife Phyllis, who shares many of the triumphs as well as the pitfalls of her husband's volunteer service, commented, "I guess if you can get to one out of 10 or even one out of 20, it's worth it."

Olsen "gets to" his cases with a unique method. "Every probation officer has a pattern," he explains. "Mine is to listen for two meetings -- just listen, and let the probationer do all the talking. Even if they don't want to say anything, that's all right, I listen anyway. On the third meeting, I talk."

Olsen, as well as other VPOs, develop their own techniques after a year-long training

program. During the initial year, VPOs keep in close contact with probation chiefs and assistant chiefs, but are free to handle their own cases.

Currently, the 35th District Court's probation department is understaffed. Wiland says Livonia's court, which handles nearly the same amount of probation cases, has a staff of 100 VPOs. "That number seems to work well, and that's what we're shooting for," he said.

Wiland adds that persons who want to volunteer their time as VPOs should contact him at the 35th District Court, which will soon undergo some changes in all departments.

Once the consolidated court facility is built, although the number of cases will probably not decline, the working conditions will improve greatly, Wiland says.

"We'll have four report rooms in the building, and an alcohol awareness classroom in the basement," said Wiland. "I fought hard for that basement when we were planning the building."

Until the new facility is built, VPOs will continue to work out of offices in three court locations -- in Canton, Plymouth and Northville, as well as wherever is mutually agreed between the VPO and probationer.

"It's a growing and changing department," observes Ron Phelps, chief probation officer. "The VPOs have been, and always will be, the backbone of it."

Judge James Garber agrees. "The court is people, and that's why ours is one of the best in Michigan, and always will be the best."

harmony for boys and girls," she wrote Santa.

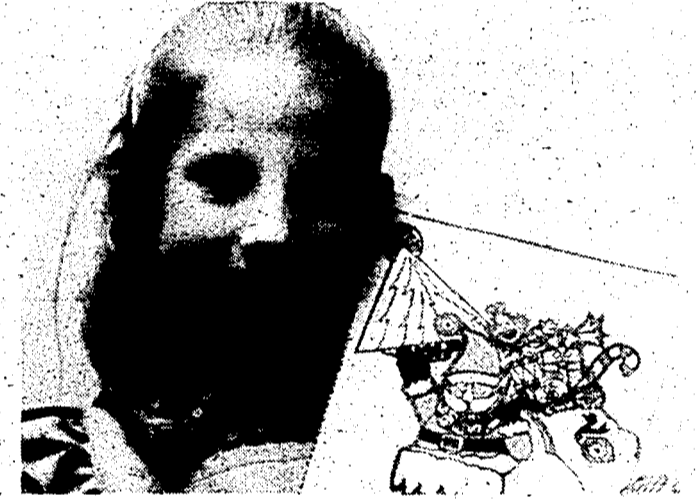

The Canton Chiefs grappled to a seventh-place finish in the Westland John Glenn Invitational Saturday, their best finish at Glenn ever.

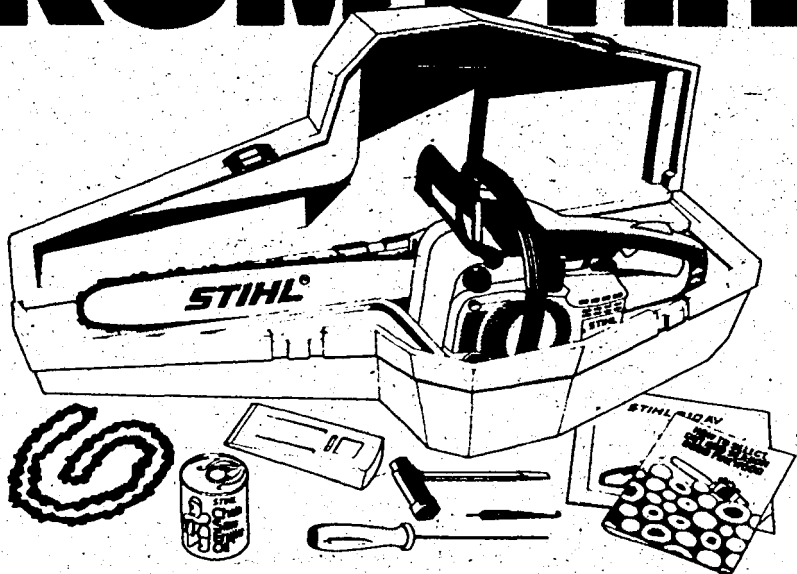

"Our guys who came in off the bench did a nice job," said Bell. "I was pleased with the way they played. I was able to play everyone, and we didn't lose any momentum."

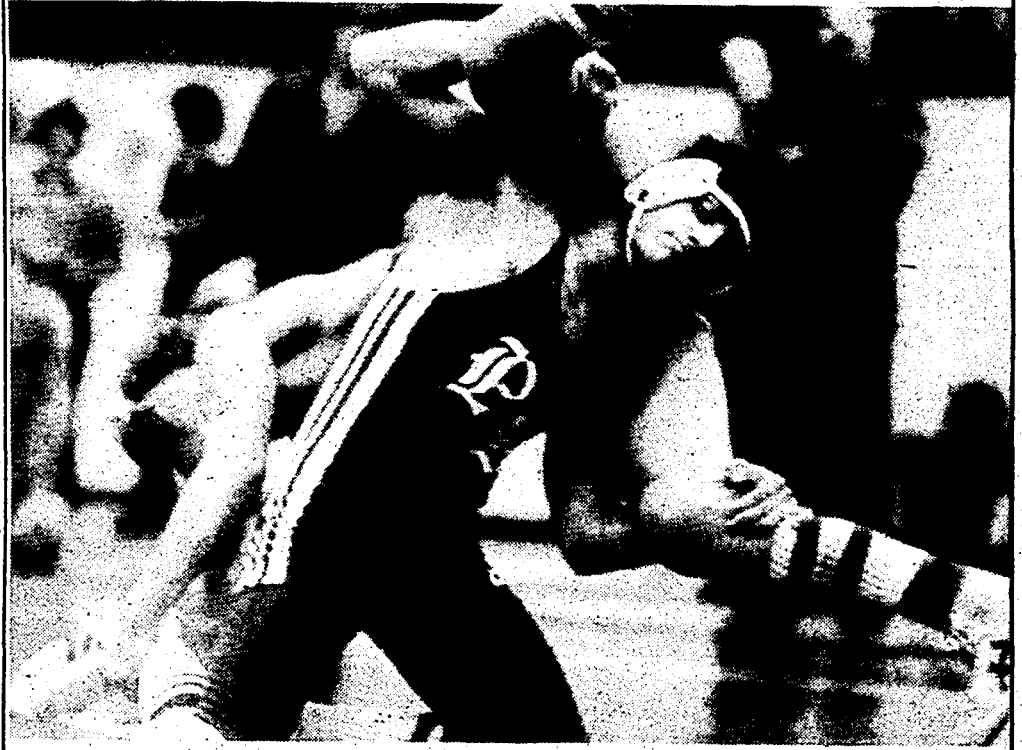
Conrad was high scorer for Churchill with 19 points, and Ron Reed contributed 12.

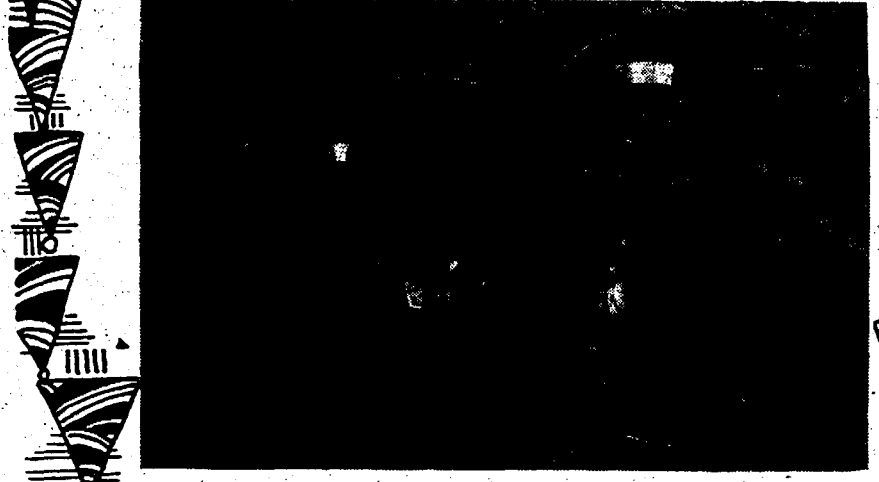

Ross continued Salem's scoring with three points. Merrifield added a bucket along with Bonnie Sutherland.

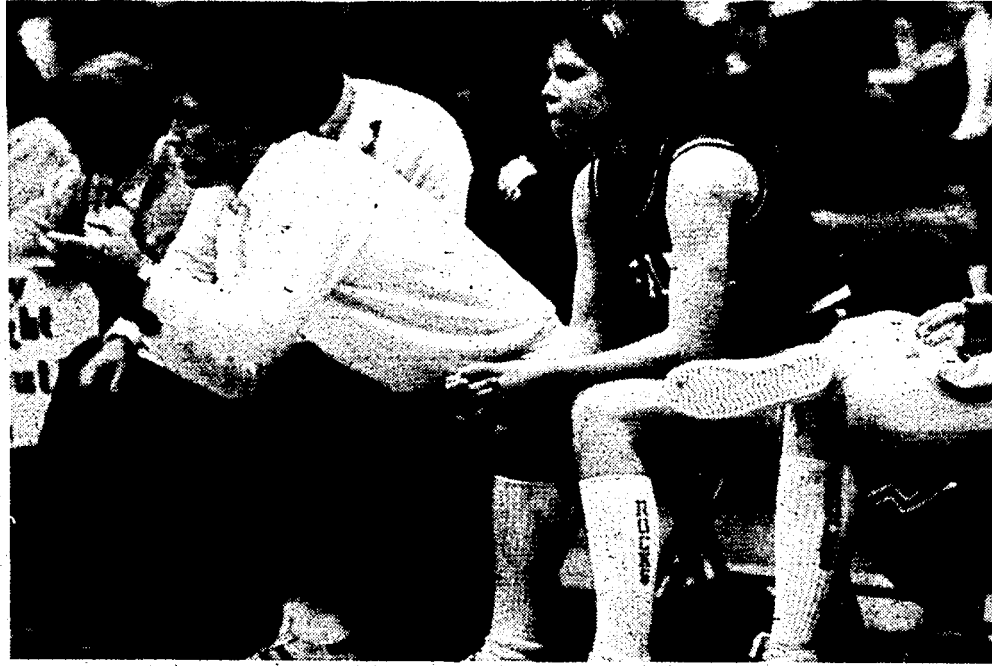
Sutherland's bucket came with 1:25 left and Jackson far in front, 47-30. Jeanine
