Mettetal debate presages votes

2-12-90

BY JIM WHITE The debate over the future of Mettetal airport moved north of Joy Road Monday night.

A public information meeting, moderated by Plymouth City Manager Gordon Jaeger and held at the Plymouth Cultural Center, drew all seven Plymouth Township trustees, two Canton trustees, and six of the seven Plymouth City Commissioners among an estimated 275-300 people on hand.

"I thought it was very interesting that I got to hear a variety of people,' said Jerry Vorva, city commissioner.

The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees was expected to vote on forming an authority with the city last night. The Plymouth City Commission will discuss the plan at its Monday (Dec. 17) commission meeting.

Airport supporters were allowed to make a 15 minute presentation to begin the meeting.

John Vergona, of Canton, and a major backer of public ownership, said that Mettetal is a reliever airport. It can handle small aircraft, leaving the skies over Detroit Metropolitan Airport less congested.

Vergona also said that Mettetal makes a net profit of \$228,039 a year in hangar and tie down fees.

Carol Herrick, of Canton, said that a petition drive made in Canton had collected 2,820 signatures of people in favor of Mettetal. "95 per cent of those we talked to had no objection to the airport," she said.

Herrick added that residents said they would like to see Mettetal used more in community events, such as the Canton Challenge Fest or the Plymouth Fall Festival.

"The Osh Kosh Air Show (held each August in Osh Kosh, WI) draws more people than any other national event," she said.

The Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education Monday took the first in a series of steps to improve student crowding conditions at various elementary schools.

The following housing moves were unanimously approved by the board.

• Effective yesterday (Dec. 11), all "new" students residing in Sunflower VIII normally assigned to Hulsing Elementary will be instead be assigned to Gallimore Elementary.

• Effective for the 1991-92 school year, present Sunflower VIII students at Hulsing will be given the option of remaining at Hulsing or continuing at Callimore.

County sets dates to fill Mack post

BY JIM WHITE Tentative dates for primary and general elections needed to fill Milt Mack's 11th District Wayne County Commission seat have been set, said county officials this week.

According to Ed Carey, director of elections for the county, Feb. 19 and April 16 were recently recommended to the commission by the Wayne County Clerk's office, "but the commission has the final say." Please see pg. 28 • Effective for the 1992-93 school year the entire elementary student population residing in Sunflower VIII will be assigned to Gallimore.

"This only deals with one element of the housing at this point," district Superintendent John M. Hoben told the board Monday. "There are others we are still looking at." Hoben added, "I don't want this to

Hoben added, "I don't want this to be seen as a singular item -- it's not going to cure all of our problems."

Currently Hulsing bouses 39 students from Sunflower VIII, and it is estimated that another 29 students will be enrolling. Hulsing, with a current population of 604 students, cannot house the new students, Hoben said.

The board moves come three weeks after school district administrators said five of the district's 12 elementary schools were, or would be, nearing a student population crisis.

At the time the administration offered a series of recommendations to try and ease the housing dilemma. Other housing moves to address the issue are expected soon.

Plymouth-Canton elementary schools with potential "space problems" next year besides Hulsing, according to the district, include Bird, Farrand, Fiegel, and Hoben.

Dean Swartzwelter, president of the school board, said Hoben Elementary was expected to see the largest growth in student population next year.


The school is estimated to increase by some 50 students, according to statistics released by the district. As for the other schools, Fiegel may gain 48 students, Isbister, 44, and Bird, 43. Isbister is not currently listed as a school facing housing problems.

Field Elementary, with a population of 703 students, is the largest in the district.

The board also approved the purchase of two renovated classroom portables Monday to help meet space needs at Hoben Elementary. The portables cost \$49,470.

Ray Hoedel, the district's associate superintendent for business, said the district will now have 14 portable classrooms at its elementary schools.

Combined the portables add up to about two-thirds the size of one entire elementary school facility, said Hoben,



Plans are being considered by the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools administration for temporarily moving its operations out of the Harvey Street office to speed up the renovation and construction of an addition to the current facility.


During Monday's regular meeting of the Plymouth-Canton Schools Board of Education, district Superintendent John M. Hoben said the administration was looking at various alternatives to move staff out of the current facility while the construction work continues.

"If we can vacate the total building the builders said they can move up the completion date two months (to May, 1991)," Hoben told the board.

Hoben added that district officials are looking at Central Middle School, the old Tanger elementary, and even the possible use of portables to shift administrative functions out of the current building for "three or four months."

Work on the addition to the administration building -- also site of board meetings -- should be completed by April, said Ray Hoedel, the district's associate superintendent for business.

He added that full renovation of the current facility will begin in February.

City tries coordinating business waste pickup

By Jan. 7, about 214 businesses in the City of Plymouth will no longer be able to rely on the city for solid waste pickup.

Administration officials, however, are hoping to ease their transition to the private sector.

The city commission voted 6-1 on Nov. 19 to discontinue pickup of the 229 commercial dumpsters in the city.

"It just isn't working," said Finance Director William Graham, noting that the city takes in about \$10,000 a month for commercial refuse disposal and spends about \$26,000 in the same period.

City Manager Gordon Jaeger said he thinks private waste contractors can do the job more cheaply than the city.

"I believe the private sector is best suited to taking care of this problem," he said. "I think the competition is what's going to lessen the cost."

Merchants, however, have been vocal from the beginning that the city can best coordinate solid waste pickup.

"I am concerned that we try to handle this in the most efficient, best way." said Fran Toney, executive director of the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce. "I think it's really important the city help us find and coordinate (pickup)."

To that end, on Friday the city unsealed five bids from waste haulers on two proposals. One proposal was for a compactor to be located on Fleet Street, the other for an alternative to replace the soon to be discontinued city service.

Officials hope they can negotiate a contract and price with a "primary vendor" to offer to commercial units in the city. It will be the businesses' decision to decide if they wish to contract with the firm or try to get a better price from someone else. "One company can come in and provide almost all the same services that we have provided," said Assistant City Manager Paul Sincock.

One advantage the private sector has over the city is an established billing apparatus. Graham said if the city wanted to be competitive in the commercial solid waste pickup, it would have to make a "substantial" investment in equipment and people.

"We don't know how much each business generates in trash, we don't know what to bill them." he said, noting that many of the dumpsters in the city have more than one user. "It is a nightmare."

Private waste houlers, Graham said, are better equ. ed to handle the

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Encouraged recycling is past due

Community opinions

The scene at the City of Plymouth's recycling center Saturday reminded me of an area shopping mall three days before Christmas.

Like those crazy last minute shoppers we all see every year, city residents converged on the center to turn in their recycling materials before the kick-off of the city's new bag-tag program for solid waste collection.

Everybody had big loads of newspapers, glass jars, tin cans, household batteries and various, plastics containers. They were all in a hurry to get rid of the stuff before Monday's start of the new program.

While the program has caused consternation among some residents concerned about what it will cost them in the long run, it looks like those bags/tags are here to stay.

Some residents have spoken out against the program as a hidden tax increase, others say the program just isn't fair. The more garbage put at the curb the more it will cost the homeowner who, say, has three young children and two pets.

It's about time this community made some kind of concerted effort to reduce its garbage output. The recycling center has worked smoothly, but it alone will not help the city forge a new outlook on our solid waste troubles.

That's why it's time for this program which demands that residents buy special city waste bags or tags -- and time for residents to put up or shut up when it comes to the environment.



Shortly after moving to the city earlier this year my wife and I began using the new recycling center. Besides the ever-present stack of newspapers from around the state and world, we found it was easy to reduce out garbage load by also recycling every tin can, plastic bottle, glass jar, we purchased.

Our days of putting two, maybe three, bags of garbage out by the curb for pick-up are no more. Since early this summer our weekly trash output has been reduced to one 45-pound garbage bag.

Now understand that I am not saying a family of six will be able to use just one bag a week, but instead of crying about the new program, give it a

If you're not now recycling, start doing so immediately. That alone will reduce your rubbish load. It does work.

Also, start being a careful consumer. Look at each product you buy in the grocery store. They call it precycling. Ask yourself is this product overpackaged? Can any of it be recycled? And buy in bulk or large quantities. At the same time save and reuse the

Papers should be community-tuned

Don't argue with someone who buys ink by the barrel, some folks have said when I suggested they write a letter to the editor.


If I haven't believed that for others and I don't -- then I shouldn't be scared off either.

The newspapers in The Plymouth-Canton Community act politely towards each other as they scramble to scoop the news, opinions and ads from the competition. And that normally means refraining from throwing ink at each other as well as sharing lunch at the Plymouth Press Club's weekly meeting.

But such normal polite competition couldn't control my computer screen after I saw a "reporter responds" item in another local edition of a regional newspaper.

A Canton woman, Kathy Kenney, had written a letter to that newspaper complaining about its story on developmental approach to education as discussed at a recent Plymouth-Canton School Board meeting, Particularly stinging was the letter's revelation that the reporter had not been-at-the-meeting-but-covered-it-by phoning selected sources.

"I almost didn't write that (letter)," Kenney said. "I'm just a mom."



We're all just moms, dads. daughters, sons, sisters, brothers and neighbors on this planet.

Every newspaper reporter worth a salt has been berated in a letter to the editor -- often with good cause. (This is why I encourage complainers to write in. I've seen many times where a reader's perspective licks that of the writer who "buys ink by the barrel.") The Crier's policy is to let such letters have a good ride -- without adding rebuttals.

But the reporter, Mary Beth Dillon, felt the need to respond and her editor, Jeff Counts, didn't have the sense to dissuade the response which only made things worse for three reasons:

1. Kenney is a newspaper reader and concerned citizen who deserves a fair shot at her opinion. Pure and simple.

2. The letter writer's major premise that the newspaper down the street has believed for some months that they need not attend meetings to cover what's going on -- has surfaced before (with the same reporter, by happenstance).

paper or plastic bags they give out at the stores.

Eventually the city hopes to implement a curbside recycling effort to make it easier for those folks who cannot trudge up to the recycling center. Talk currently is of starting it in the summer next year, but residents of the city should not wait for that day to begin recycling.

If paying for garbage bags means the city can reduce some of its landfill costs, then so be it. If paying for bagy (or tags) changes the attitude of those stubbornly clinging to outmoded ideas about trash dumping, then so be it.

If the new bag-tag program means long lines at the recycling center, so be it. At least those long lines mean one thing: lots of recycled stuff.

Of further note ...

Apparently the new program is hitting home.

City officials said that by Monday, when the program officially kicked off, nearly 90 per cent of the residents were compiling through purchases of both bass and tass.

To think about ...

If the city really wants to expand as recycling program with a curbside effort, it might also want to consider moving its recycling center.

Not only is it too small -- even now -but the location is almost unsafe. There's too much traffic along Church Street where it runs by the fire station and not enough room for people unloading their recyclables.

3. One comment in Dillon's response deflated all the claims made by all the editorial staffers and advertising sales representatives of that newspaper chain. "The Observer doesn't ... have any stake in things turning out in a particular way," she wrote. A true newspaper -- from the New York Times to The Community Crier -- has a vary large stake indeed in how issues are resolved in the respective communities they serve. (That's why we aggressively cover the news and passionately express our opinions. We like our community and hope, in some small way, that we can contribute a bit of light on issues to help improve things here.)

The last time the coverage-inabstentia philosophy of the other newspaper surfaced, that paper opined that the Plymouth-Canton Schools weren't cooperating with "the media."

But, according to the schools, the only newspaper to file under the Michigan Freedom of Information Act against the schools during the past six months was The Community Crier (on the hazardous materials spill at CEP). Yet, this newspaper has not felt a lack of cooperation.

Of course, our reporters attend the meetings

It was a good meeting. The entire Plymouth Township Board of Trustees was there, six Plymouth city commissioners, two Canton board members and about 250 private citizens, many of whom came to speak.

There were also chamber of commerce representatives, planning commision members, and FAA and state aeronautics officials.

On the eve of Plymouth Township's vote on whether or not to form an authority with the city and run the airport, there was a "town meeting" to discuss it. John Vergona, a long-time sup-

porter of Mettetal, got a chance to say that the airport has a \$3,5 million impact on the local community. Dan Calabrese; assistant to Canton

Supervisor Tom Yack, disagreed, saying public money should not be used to support an airport not tied to economie development.

Residents noted how helpful an aviation school -- which has been proposed at Metteral -- would be for their children. Others said they were tired of hearing the buzz of aircraft engines drown out music and conversation in their backyard.

Business owners from as far away as Charlevoix explained how Metteral had a positive economic impact in the area. Another resident lamented how close a couple planes had gone down near his home.

There was a good balance to all comments, with applause and sometimes laughter. To the credit of the audience, speakers and moderator Gordon Jaeger, there was order in the proceedines.

However one feels about Mettetal Airport -- and there are strong feelings on both sides -- a public forum on the issue was a good idea and helpful to the elected officials who must vote on an authority.



Then Dan Calabrese, administrative assistant to Canton Supervisor Tom Yack, took time to explain why the Canton board decided not to buy the 50-year-old airport, which lies on the south side of Joy, in Canton.

Though an airport study committee had voted 6-4 to recommend that Canton buy Mettetal, the trustees voted 5-2 against an airport purchase last August. "Plain and simple, Canton Township is opposed to public ownership of the airport," Calabrese said.

"If public money is going to bu used, then it ought to be used for airports clearly tied to economic development," lie said. "We surveyed 37 businesses in Canton, and none of them said that they used the airport."

Calabrese also told the audience that Canton did not want any authority formed by other municipalities to run an airport within its boundaries.

"It is not appropriate for one or more governments to come into

Many of the same points that had been raised at Canton board meetings were reiterated.

Tom Kennedy, chairperson of a committee investigating the educational opportunities of Mettetal, said that the tuition at the public aviation college he has proposed would be about \$5,000. Tuition at the Detroit Institute of Aeronautics, a private school at Willow Run Airport that is currently under expansion, is closer to \$14.000, he said.

Several people who live close to the airport voiced concerns about safety and noise.

Bob Ziatta, a Plymouth Township resident, said that he lives about a quarter mile from the airport. "In 18 years, two planes have gone down near my home. Expansion scares me," he said.

Kay Wood, another Plymouth Township resident, said she lives in the approach at the north end of the runway, and the noise is very bothersome, "You can't talk in your own backyard!"

Officials from the Federal Aviation Authority and the Michigan Aeronautics Commission were also present.

John Wagner, a state inspector, clarified the length of the actual runway, which ends about 15 feet from Joy Road.

"However, there is a displaced threshold that extends 455 feet south of Joy," he said. Planes fanding from the north may not touch down until they cross the threshold. Wagner said this insures that planes keep the proper

The airport could be sold, he added.

present in favor of preserving Mettetal.

Company, said, "We use the airport on a regular basis, both for fixed wine and helicopter traffic. We encourage Plymouth to keep Mettetal."

DeMattia himself added, "I've been marketing our community all over the world. I always mention our fine business airport.

"Businesses flying between small towns in the Great Lakes region do not use Lear jets, we use small twin engine aircraft. Plymouth would do well to keep this fine business asset.

Jerry Leonard, of CPI Engineering, located just south of the airport, said that his company chose their site because of the proximity to Mettetal: "If Mettetal closes, we have no reason to stay where we are," he said.

In other airport developments, Klochko Contractors, who own Mettetal, removed three underground jet fuel tanks from the helicopter pad Thursday. The Canton Fire Marshall and EPA officials were on hand. according to Tom Klochko.

The removal went smoothly, said Klochko, though there was some worry of fuel residue leaking.

"A minimal amount of dirt around the edges of the hole was sent to Industrial Assessment Treatment Technologies in Toledo for testing," Klochko said.

And park configuration **Canton mulls site** for community center

BY JIM WHITE

The Canton Board of Trustees cleared the way for the development of park behind the Canton Administration Building by agreeing at a recent study session on a site for a proposed community center.

The final configuration of the park, Phases III and IV of the Canton Recreation Complex, was dependent upon where a community center might be built in the future, Mike Gouin, superintendent of the township's parks and recreation, told the board during the Nov. 20 workshop session.

Although no formal action was taken at the meeting, the board agreed that the best site for the proposed center would be in the southwest corner of the township-owned land behind the administration building and the Canton Public Library along Canton Center Road.

Pollack Design Associates will develop Phases III and IV of the park with that site in mind.

Other sites considered included west of the library, and southwest of the library. But alternate site C. in the southwest corner of the township's property, was considered best for both aesthetic and functional reasons.

"C develops more of a campus atmosphere, rather than clustering all the buildings together." Gouin said. In a letter to the parks and recreation department, Community Planner David Nicholson wrote that site A. just behind the library, leaves the park too concested.

It would be like "urban development in a suburban setting," he wrote.

Peter Pollack said plan C was the best choice for the rest of the park. We want to be able to put as much green space together as we can," he said. "The park itself is the central theme or focus" of the project."

Treasurer Gerald Brown also said it was better to have any community center separated from the administration building, to eliminate possible interference in the workings of the township government. "I don't want a rec center to

jeopardize the fact that we are in business here from 8:30 to 5," he said.

Trustee Elaine Kirchgatter asked whether there would be any available parking closer than the administration building in the event of overflow parking at the center.

"With C, overflow parking would be able to use the lot near the outdoor amphitheater." which would be located next to the proposed center,

Proctor Road could disappear with development

Any change in the status of Proctor Road between Canton Center and Beck is dependent on whether Canton can follow through on plans to build a combined golf course and residential development.

According to Canton Supervisor Tom Yack, the closing of the road, which came up during a discussion on expansion plans for the park complex behind township hall, would not take

place until after much further preparation work is completed.

But that's only if a two-year-old proposal to build a golf course/residential complex behind township hall is approved and completed.

Wayne County would also have to approve any change in the road's status,

"I'd say in a best case scenario, we'd be looking at the spring of 1992 for a start on construction," said Yack, about the proposed development. "But there is a lot of acreage that is not within the township's control. If someone decided not to sell, it could be a dead issue."

The Canton Board of Trustees will discuss the project in February, said Yack.

A legal description of the layout of the holes must be drawn up so that property owners considering selling land to the township for the project may see exactly what they are involved in.

And, plans for the utilities have to be worked out, Yack said.

As part of the park, said Gouin, a roadway will be laid that will go south from the library parking lot, then west along the southern edge of the township land.

For now, it will end in the amphitheater parking lot, though it may eventually go around the western side of the community center and north until it joins an existing entrance to the park from Proctor Road.

This route ensures an unbroken green space, as well as affording an opportunity to add a second entrance off Canton Center Road south of the

library, he said.

Supervisor Tom Yack said this would not make the community center dependent on the existence of Proctor Road, which may be in doubt, pending future developments.

Trustee John Preniczky asked what would happen if the center was never built.

"In lots of ways, you have a lot of options," said Pollack. "Soccer fields, a picnic area. If you choose A and don't build, it's a smaller piece of land and you have fewer options."

Gouin said that the board hoped to award bids for construction on the park by March, 1991.

Becoming pastor at Our Lady of Counsel Catholic Church Good (OLGC) in the City of Plymouth is a sort of homecoming for Father Jim Wysocki.

"We would visit Plymouth when we were students at the seminary," said Wysocki, who studied at the nowclosed St. John Provincial Seminary in Plymouth Township.

"I spent four years there. It's particularly painful for those of us who studied there that it's closed. We grew up there, really. I hope they put the grounds to good use for the community.

Wysocki, who came to Our Lady of Good Counsel in August, returns to Plymouth after years of work in parishes around the Detroit metropolitan area.

after 1 started there. I love working when the kids, so it's not hard, it's just a new challenge."

Another challenge faces the new pastor. He comes to Plymouth just as Our Lady of Good Counsel has formed an evangelization committee in an attempt to reunite the parish family.

A new sign in front of the church that says "Come Home for Christ-mas" is part of this attempt, said

"It's part of our general effort to reach out to families who should be a part of us, baptised Catholics who do not practice their faith," he said. "They might feel that we would not be receptive, or that we might be critical of them. We want to put that to rest. We will welcome them with open arms."

The sign is the church's invitation to come back home. Personal invitations will also be given to parishioners, that they might send them to friends or. relatives who might need that push to come back, Wysocki said.

But 1 don't think Christ intended it that way. And often, the church concentrates on saving the saved. But we need to go outside that group, not to turn others to our way of thinking, but to the truth."

SC study notes habits

A Schoolcraft College research study of 2,269 first year students in fall 1990 by the college's Learning Assistance Center (LAC) showed a relationshipe between ASSET scores and student habits.

The study, conducted by the LAC under Director Sirkka Gudan, showed a "definite relationship" between scores received on ASSET placement tests and the amount of television students watch, the number of books they read and the amount of homework done in high school.


The scores, according to the LAC, showed that the more time students



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Carey added that the county will foot the entire bill for the election.

Mack, a Democrat re-elected in the 11th District -- that includes Canton -on Nov. 6 was recently appointed to the Wayne County Probate bench by Gövernor Jim Blanchard, He was sworn in as judge on Monday.

The commission may appoint someone to fill the vacant seat until an election. is held, said 10th District Commissioner Susan Heintz (R-Plymouth), but it is not mandatory. "I have no idea what will happen."

she said Monday.

Anyone appointed as an interim commissioner must also be from the Democratic party. Frontrunners as of now, said Heintz, appear to be Bryan Amman, Wayne County noise ezar, and Shirley Poling, of Canton, a community action program coordinator for the UAW.

Others who have expressed interest include: Robert Beeny, a Wayne city council member, and Cynthia Burgess, of Canton, co-founder of the Canton Community Foundation.

In her cover letter to the commission, Burgess said she would accept the interim appointment but would not run for election. "The benefit to accepting this plan is that the candidates running for the position would be free to discuss the issues facing Wayne County without backroom partisan polities clouding the issues," she said.

Heintz said that it is possible that Mack's administrative assistant, Jerry Higgs, may be appointed to the seat. "He knows the issues, and he is well liked," she said. Higgs would not run in the election; she added.

Heintz said that she would probably be asked to abstain from any appointment, as she is a Republican who supported Vic Gustafson, Mack's 11th District opponent in the Nov. 6 general election.

In Mack's farewell comments to the commission, made Thursday, he said his conscience was clear. "I feel I have kept faith with the people of Wayne County, to work for county reform, to keep the spirit of the new charter alive," he said.

Mack left a proposal with the commission for changing the system in which committee chairs are awarded. He advocated a system in which chair appointments are permanent, instead of lasting only two years, as happens now.





"Why should we go out and buy someting the private sector already has, and has had for some time?" he said.

Now, businesses or landlords are billed a flat rate to lease a dumpster or contract with a private hauler. A sixyard dumpster costs \$20 a month; an eight-yard dumpster \$21.67. If a dumpster is shared, the cost is divided, usually without regard to who uses it more.

Russ Webster, owner of the Penniman Deli, now pays about S6 a month to lease a dumpster, sharing a dumpster with two other businesses. Webster said he knows he's getting a bargain from the city.

"Absolutely it's been a deal," he said. "I have no problem with paying more,"

When the price goes up, however, he said, businesses who share a dumpster are going to want to make sure they are not paying for someone else's garbage, "That's going to be the issue," Webster said, "Who pays how much?"

Along those lines, Rex Tubbs, owner of the Engraving Connection, told the eity commission he is worried about residents throwing their refuse into commercial dumpsters, costing businesses more.

"The security of the dumpsters is my primary concern," he said.

Sincock admitted that there will be some confusion in the early part of the transition to private pickup. But he said the private sector will do the service more cheaply than if the city were to continue it and pass all of the cost onto businesses.

"As the market is showing, there are people out there who can do this for less than we do it," Sincock said.

Sincock, who is reviewing the bid proposals, said he will have a recommendation at Monday's commission meeting.

Canton board looks at curbside recycling

Canton's Board of Trustees was expected to okay funding for two additional months of a pilot program in curbside recyclables collection last night.

The pilot program will begin in mid-January, 1991, according to Loren Bennett, township clerk and a member of Canton's Solid Waste Committee. Recycled materials will be collected in Franklin-Palmer, Greenbrook, and Holiday Park subdivisions.

Originally, it the program was planned to last for one month, but the board was expected to authorize \$2,086 for two extra months of pilot pick-up.

Once the pilot program is complete, residents of the three subdivisions will be asked to complete a survey on the service. Bennett said. Input from residents will be considered and improvements made before the program is implemented township-wide in April.

The board was also expected to authorize a \$10 fee for replacement recycling bins. Reports of lost or stolen bins would be handled by the township's Public Safety Department.

New dealership busy Saturn in demand

With her new dealership all but completed, Karen Tibus is ready to keep selling Saturn cars.

Demand is outstripping supply at this point, however, said Tibus, president of The Plymouth-Canton Community's only Saturn dealership.

"We've sold everything we've received so far," said Tibus, who has been in the new dealership on Massey Drive in Plymouth Township for about two weeks. "The showroom has customers in all day long."

Rigid quality control at Saturn's Spring Hill, TN, plant, however, have left dealers nationwide waiting for more cars.

Tibus said when she first opened her showroom the only car in it was a loaner - and not for sale. Now, she says, people are test driving cars off the truck, before they have been prepped.

The Plymouth Saturn dealership has sold 14 cars so far, she said, and has orders for 45 more.

"We're getting them to the people as fast as we can," Tibus said. "Customers have been very understanding."

People have come in from as far away as Brighton and Romeo to pick up a Saturn, she said. Her dealership is one of four in the state, with a fifth scheduled to open the first of the year.

Tibus is also one of two women nationwide operating a Saturn dealership, though she said she is somewhat surprised there aren't more.

"I think women do very well in the business," she said. The long hours of the job may deter

adding that it doesn't interfere with her married life.

"We just make sure our free time is each other's," she said of her husband "It's working out real well."

Final construction on the dealership should be completed this week with some last minute work in the service department, Tibus said. Ground was broken on the site about three and a half months ago. The site on Ann Arbor Road was a second choice for a Saturn dealership. Tibus and her partner Donald Massey had originally hoped to build on Ann Arbor, next to Bill Knapp's.

The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees voted the necessary rezoning down, however, saying it went against the nature of the township's future land use plan.

But Tibus said the Massey Drive site has so far been a good second choice, noting the full showroom without the benefit of advertising.

Meanwhile, Tibus is waiting for the supply of Saturns to pick up so she can get a dealership car for her own use.

"I'll happily turn in my Cadillac," she said.

election to the board, "It's a crucial time of year for us what with the budget and everything." said Breen.

The Plymouth firm of Law, Essad, Hemming and Polaczyk was retained by the board in October after a lengthy search, replacing the college's Detroit firm of 15 years, Miller Canfield Paddock and Stone.

Breen said Kirksey wanted to retain




