Former Postmaster dead at 65

John A. Mulligan, who guided the Plymouth Post Office through a period of incredible turmoil and change in the 1970s, died Dec. 4 at the age of 65.

Mulligan worked as Plymouth Postmaster for nearly 25 years and helped the post office through the transition from a department in the Federal government to

the quasigovernment entity it is today.

According to current Plymouth Postmaster Joe Groff, Mulligan was a dedicated post office employee. "I would say this post

office was very well run considering the changes that happened when John was Postmaster," he said.

In addition to the mammoth change when the post office became somewhat independent in the 1970s, Mulligan also oversaw the switch to automation.

He was appointed Postmaster by President Lyndon Johnson.

Groff said employees are planning a memorial service — possibly the planting of a memorial tree — but final details are not set

Mulligan moved to the Plymouth community in 1956 from Long Island, NY, where he became very involved in the community he served.

He was a member of Our Lady of Good Counsel Church in Plymouth, a member of the Morning Kiwanis Club and the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce.

Mulligan served in the U.S. Navy during the Korean War and also served in the U.S. Coast Guard Reserve.

Mulligan is survived by his wife, Catherine V. Mulligan; son, Pat Mulligan of Plymouth; mother, Mary Mulligan of Plymouth; and uncle, Jerome V. Jerome of North Carolina.

Services were held at Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church in Plymouth with Fr. John Sullivan officiating. Burial was at Riverside Cemetery in Plymouth.



Elementary, high school in \$80 million bond forecast

Based on three community forums, the Bond Steering Committee was scheduled to recommend last night to the Plymouth-Canton School Board the construction of a third high school and a new elementary school as part of an estimated \$86 million project, according to Superintendent Charles Little.

Recommendations were also scheduled to include complete electrical and

computer updates and structural repairs to the district's 21 school buildings, Little A March vote to approve approxi-

mately \$80 million in bonds is anticipated. The money would be bonded over 25

The proposed high school would be located at Beck and Joy roads, on the 175 available acres at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park site, but west of Canton and Salem high schools. Despite no plans to include swimming pool or auditorium, Little said the high school wouldn't be within walking distance of Canton and

Said P-C School Board President Mark Horvath about the location: "The corner of Beck and Joy, I don't know if we can get anymore specific then that."

The precise elementary school location is unknown, though the Bond Steering Committee was expected to recommend it be built in Canton. Currently, the school district owns four plots of land in Canton, excluding the PCEP property.

The Bond Steering Committee's presentation was also set to include a list of five-year projections by John Birchler, the district's director of business and operations.

total is about \$86 million bonded over 25 years with a millage increase, an approximate debt millage increase of 1.7 mills that would give the district a total debt millage of approximately 3.93 mills,"

According to Birchler, it will cost more than \$1 million to open the two schools, and approximately \$1.8 million annually for operation expenses.

He said the school district is attempting to avoid what happened in 1993, when there wasn't enough money to open Tonda and Bentley elementary schools following the 1991 bond approval. "As for what happened last time, the school district had made projections to open the schools, but the state had made a lot of revenue changes that year (fiscal year 1993-94) right before that happened," he said... "Hopefully, they won't change the



Despite drop in cases, drunken driving still enormous problem in P-C-N

Drunken driving cases in the 35th District Court have dropped by nearly 100 cases in the past year, but it's still a problem of epidemic proportions in The Plymouth-Canton Community.

Despite the drop, approximately 740 drunken driving cases have gone through

the court this year, according to 35th District Court Director of Probation Sue Ewing.

Even though drunken driving cases make up only a fraction of the 38,000 cases that go through the court each year, 35th District Court Administrator Marion Belding said the cost is still staggering.

"They (drunken driving cases) take up a tremendous amount of time on the docket." she said.

35th District Court Chief Judge John MacDonald said drunken driving cases have decreased as the proportion of enforcement has increased. "Another reason is stiffer fines and more probation programs," he said.

Stiff fines indeed. MacDonald said a first-time convicted drunken driver faces: a \$500 fine; \$250 in court costs; one year of probation, which includes a \$360 administration cost; \$75 for alcohol screening; an alcohol education program, which the offender must pay for; and most likely, an increase in automobile insurance. Repeat offenders face increased fines — and possibly some jail time.

According to Ewing, her goal is to prevent the convicted drunken driver from repeating.


"I'd like to think that we are reaching people who need to be treated," Ewing said of the court's alcohol screening and probation program, which is accredited by the State of Michigan. "We do have an accurate screening and assessment program, which means we can come up with a good match for a treatment program."

Probation is almost always given to convicted drunken drivers. Ewing said the 35th District Court takes a conservative stance on probation. "The offender will be given an order not to drink or go to any bars," she said. "There is a number of people who report to probation smelling of alcohol. If we find they've been drinking, chances are they'll be spending a week in jail. It adds teeth to an order."

MacDonald said avoiding fines and jail time is simple: Don't drive after drinking. "Sure, it's frustrating to see people come in on their second or third offense," he said. "They may end up going to jail or to an in-patient program.

"People need to remember not to drink and drive. If they do decide to drink, they should have a designated driver."




Although she's 97 years old and can't do all the cooking or decorating herself, the family still looks forward to the annual celebration

"Back then, the trains ran to Detroit," she said. "A streetcar used to run from Northville to Plymouth and then go on to Wayne, where you'd have to change cars. One train would go on to Detroit, the other went to Ann Arbor."

Although Alexander said shopping in Detroit was a treat, most of the holiday buying was done right here in Plymouth.

"Christmas was very special in town." she said, "and boy, did they ever decorate. There was always something going on.'

Alexander said she remembers stores like Shingleton's, a men's clothing store, and Heide's Flower Shop, which used to be located on the corner of Liberty and Mill streets, decorated brightly for the holiday season.

She too would decorate her house for the holidays. Although she's not able to string the garland or Christmas lights anymore, her holiday spirit remains unchanged.

She and her family will gather again at Alexander's house on Mill Street on Dec. 22.

She hasn't cooked her special "Chicken and Rice" dish for three years now, but other family members have stepped in to provide the meal. There will be the traditional honey-baked ham, scalloped potatoes and green bean salad.

There will also be memories of Christmas past. The family will remember their loved ones who have died. They will celebrate the new additions to the family.

Most importantly, they will spend Christmas together in Plymouth for the 70th year, celebrating what's most important in life — family.

Parents call for reinstatement of West Middle science camp

The West Middle School sixth grade science camp is one experiment that has worked.

But a lack of teacher involvement at the Plymouth-Canton school has left the science camp in timbo, students disappointed and parents angry over its apparent cancellation.

The Plymouth-Canton School Board heard pleas from residents at its Nov. 26 meeting to continue the three-day, overnight camp.

Superintendent Charles Little said he was working to reinstate the camp. "Everybody's trying to pull this together." he said.

West Middle School Principal Judith Stone could not be reached for comment.

Little said he was talking with teachers, who apparently refused to volunteer for the camp this fall after years of doing so. "I'd like to get the teachers involved. They've done such a great job in the past, and it's been such a success with the students," the superintendent said.

At the board meeting, parents suggested the teachers' decision to not supervise the camp was linked to the lingering affects of a three-month contract squabble between the Plymouth-Canton Education Association and the school district. Out of the six teachers needed, only two agreed to go, parents said.

"The rumors are it is in response to contract negotiations," said City resident Del Templeton.

He said he was upset three out of the five middle schools in the district are going to science camp, and so did previous years' sixth graders at West. "It's not fair when someone gets to do this, and others don't," said Templeton.

Schools create 2 administration positions

Despite an hour of questioning led by Vice President Michael Maloney, the Plymouth-Canton School Board approved the creation of two administrative positions at the Nov. 26 meeting.

In lieu of increasing technology needs and a new contract that includes three health care coverages as opposed to one, the schools will hire a telecommunications clerk and a fringe benefits clerk.

Maloney was the lone opposition in the 6-1 votes.

He asked for the positions' priorities and objectives to defined, and more work to be done on the budget. "I'm concerned we're too eager to throw people at the problem," Maloney said.

He asked for the S.M.A.R.T. objectives for the telecommunication position. Assistant Superintendent for Employee Relations and Personnel Errol Goldman provided three of five requirements, but he couldn't gaurentee "Achievable" and "Time-bound."

Goldman said Donna Aveck, the director of computer services and instructional technology, is overworked and not performing tasks equal with her experience.

Board Trustee Liz Givens agreed. "We're wasting Donna," she said.

Said Treasurer Sue Davis: "Donna should be blending technology with curriculum. Right now, she's putting wires together."


Goldman said Aveck, who has worked for the Plymouth-Canton Schools since 1991 and was not present at the meeting, is overburdened creating mail boxes and voice mail for the district's 1,600 lines.

"The communication clerk will get her back to doing a manageable job," said Goldman.

Assistant Superintendent for Instruction K-12 Patrick O'Donnell said the communication clerk would allow Aveck to help him integrate uniform technology throughout the district.

Salaries and benefits for each position weren't discussed.

AFO boss: overzealous assistant misplaced information during sting

American Financial Options of Plymouth, charged last month with violating Michigan's Consumer Protection Act for operating a "pyramid scheme", is disputing the accusations and considering legal action against the state Attorney General's Office, AFO Chief Executive Officer David Schuhardt said.

"There is going to be some type of legal procedures. I mean, this is terrible," said Schuhardt, a Plymouth resident.

Schuhardt, a licensed builder, said clients have backed out of deals following the disclosure of the charges. He blames an overzealous assistant attorney general for misplacing important information and not completely reviewing paperwork in the investigation, part of a national sting operation called "Operation Missed

Fortune."

And he has a Michigan State Police Officer on his side to prove it, Schuhardt said.

But the Attorney General's Office is still pursuing its Notice of Intended Action (NIA), which could result in \$25,000 in fines said Spokesperson Chris DeWitt.

It all started a year ago when Schuhardt and AFO President Darren Neely were independent sales representatives for National Credit Repair, a company regulated by the Federal Trade Commission that helps people with credit problems to consolidate debts and attain lower mortgage rates.

It's a "very reputable" business, Schuhardt says, citing a flawless record with the Better Business Bureau since 1988.

Then, late last year, a fellow worker

told them about Creative Financial Options, an Indiana-based direct telecommunication sales company. The two men thought phone service would be a good match in their dealing with struggling new homeowners, Schuhardt gold

It offered good rates and a travel plan sales incentive, Schuhardt said.

Intrigued, Schuhardt began what he calls "our due diligence process" earlier this year. He contacted the BBB in Indiana, the Direct Selling Association, and the Internal Revenue Service. He found CFO to be a "well established, reputable firm" that uses a method of distribution similar to Amway and Mary Kay Cosmetics.

In early November of this year, Schuhardt said he handed information pertaining to CFO over to a friend, who is also a Michigan State Police Detective that has experience investigation "pyramid schemes."

The police officer then turned the information in to the Attorney General's Office approval of CFO and AFO. And that's where the problem occurred, Schuhardt said, because an early November voice mail message left by a newspaper reporter soon informed Schuhardt and Neely of the NIA and cease and desist order against CFO and AFO. "We said, 'What?' How can you cease and desist when you haven't even begun yet? AFO had not signed up with CFO because our do diligence was not yet complete," said Schuhardt.

Days later, on Nov. 20, Schuhardt traveled to Lansing to meet with Marilyn McEwen, the franchise administrator for the Consumer Protection Division. "The information that had been given to (the Attorney General's Office) was mysteriously missing, Marilyn McEwen didn't have it," Schuhardt said.

Schuhardt said an assistant attorney general flubbed the investigation. "He did not investigate at all, as far as we know," said Schuhardt. "He did not follow guidelines set out by the Attorney General's Office for investigating 'pyramid schemes,' or whatever you call them."

DeWitt is aware of AFO's claims. "They're not too happy, but the fact is, they're involved in this," he said.

The Attorney General's Office, CFO and AFO are having ongoing discussions, and DeWitt said the status of the charges could change. As for AFO's threat of legal action, DeWitt said: "They are certainly welcome to try, that."

Canton, Northville Township Home Depot stores charged with deceptive advertising

Home Depot stores in Canton and Northville Township have been accused of deceptive advertising and violating item pricing laws by the Michigan Attorney General's Office.

According to the Attorney General's Office, Home Depot, Inc. had 10 days to respond to a Notice of Intended Action (NIA) filed Dec. 2 or face a lawsuit to halt the alleged violations of Michigan's Consumer Protection, and Item Pricing and Deceptive Advertising acts.

The Home Depot Public Relations Department said the Atlanta-based hardware superstore is "vigorously working to comply with the State of Michigan's item pricing requirements" and is meeting with the Attorney General's Office to ensure compliance.

The maximum penalty for knowing and persistent violations of the Consumer Protections Act is \$25,000.

The NIA said that in 1995 investigators from the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division found that Home Depot stores in Canton, Northville, Pontiac and Utica were failing to item price almost all consumer goods as required by the law. According to the Attorney General's Office, when Home Depot was informed of the failures to comply with the law, they gave verbal assurances that the stores would be brought into compliance.

In October and November of this year, investigators returned to the Home Depot stores in Canton, Northville and Saginaw and found that the stores had failed to come into compliance with the item pricing law. Also, it was discovered that those items that were properly priced did not reflect the correct price when scanned at the cash register.

Home Depot is located at the corner of Seven Mile and Haggerty roads in Northville, and in Canton at 39825 Ford Rd.

"Home Depot's record on compliance with Michigan's item pricing law is abysmal. Store managers have had more than enough time to properly price items in their stores," said Attorney General Frank J. Kelley.

Home Depot's Public Relations Department noted that Massachusetts and Michigan are the only states where Home Depot does business using unit pricing. Further, the company said that all of its stores have merchandise clearly and conspicuously marked by shelving pricing and UPC bar codes.

"The Home Depot abides by the Michigan law and will quickly put in place the additional pricing information," said the Public Relations Department.

A total of 29 teams competed. Salem's junior varsity team, competing for the first time at the regional level, won the first place overall championship, competiting against five teams.



It was a valiant effort by the Whalers, who battled from a 3-0 second period deficit by outshooting Ottawa, 21-12, in the final 40 minutes.

Julian Smith had a goal and two assists for the Whalers. Teammate Jesse Boulerice had a goal and assist, and forward Harold Druken scored perhaps his biggest goal of the year — a late second period goal that pulled Detroit within one.

Ottawa forward Joel Trottier scored the game winner, and assisted on a power play score in the second period.

Coach Peter DeBoer said his team's uninspired first period was probably because of inexperience. "When you've got 10 rookies in the line up you have a tendency to stand back," he said. "But I thought we played good enough to deserve a point."

That may have happened had Dumonski scored, but DeBoer wouldn't second guess the call by Referee Todd Anderson. "The referee had a good vantage point, and he said the puck partially crossed the line, but not completely," DeBoer said. "He came over to the bench, and he said he was positive it didn't go in. And that's what he's paid to do."

The Whalers were scrambling in the first period, falling behind 2-0 while being outshot 15-9. The big, strong and quick 67's had Detroit missing checks and relying on the spectacular goaltending of Robert Esche.

Early in the second period, the Whalers began to mount their comeback. At 5:52 Boulerice batted in the loose puck in the midst of heavy traffic in front of the 67's net following a pass from the right corner by Mark Cadotte.

With less than two minutes left in the period and the two sides skating four on four, Druken took a pass near center ice from Julian Smith, skated in over the blue line and used an Ottawa defender as a screen to blast a slap shot by Keyes. Ottawa led, 3-2.

Trottier's goal 3:55 into last period appeared to put the game away. But Julian Smith's goal at 9:36 with assists from Bryan McKinney and Boulerice, and Dumonski's phantom goal, put a scare into the 67's.

Sunday night added a new twist to Detroit's domination. The Whalers' powerless power play, ranked 14th in the OHL, scored on its first three chances with the man advantage to open up a 5-2 first period lead. Detroit added a goal in each of the remaining periods before the game turned into a brawl with six fights and four misconduct penalties in the last 13 minutes.

Detroit's Steve Dumonski, never one to shy away from the rough stuff, was named the game's number one star with a goal, two assists and 12 penalty minutes. Several other Whalers had big nights. Defenseman Bryan McKinney had three assists, assistant captain Andrew Taylor and defenseman Jan Vodrazka both had a goal and an assist, and Jesse Boulerice had two points.

"When I found out we were playing them eight times this year I was little a disappointed because they were supposed to be pretty good," Whalers Coach Peter DeBoer said of Erie, who moved from Niagara Falls during the offseason... "They are a pretty good team, we just seem to have some luck against them. I think they're a better team then they've shown us."

Erie did jump out to a 1-0 lead on a power play goal at 1:34 by Chester Gallant. And the Otters tied the game at 2-2 later in the period after power play goals by Detroit's Julian Smith and Taylor.

But after goals 1:13 apart by Randy Fitzgerald and Vondrazka, goalie Ryan Penney was pulled in favor of Pat Dovigi after allowing four goals on 10 shots.

Vodrazka's goal was a textbook two on one rush, with Dumonski flying down the right side as a decoy and Vodrazka ripping a shot off the crossbar and in. "Everyone on the bench knew he was going to shoot it," said DeBoer. "He's got the hardest shot on the team."

The loss was Erie's 12th in a row on the road.



Local officials should take job seriously

Truth is Tough

Dissolve the Plymouth-Canton School Board. That's what should happen if we all listened to Jack Farrow's comment

at Nov. 26 board meeting.

Farrow, a trustee with the second longest tenure of any current board member, didn't just approve the creation of two new administration positions, as five other board members did, he effectively wrote Superintendent Charles Little a blank check.

Just prior to a vote on the creation of the fringe benefits clerk and telecommunications clerk, Farrow spouted off with a comment that should make residents shudder with fear of wasteful spending, and it solidified my belief that a majority of actions by The Plymouth-Canton Community's boards are spineless.

"We hold Chuck Little responsible for the administration and operation of the school district. My bottom line is really simple: If Dr. Little says he needs another person, that's good enough for me," Farrow said.

Attention all 1997 school board candidates: Keep that in your notes for your campaign literature.

Farrow isn't up for re-election then, David Artley is — and he'll be hard to beat if he decides to run again — but an effort by a concerned and informed individual who is willing to, at times, face the administration and/or make "unpopular" decisions would be a tremendous addition to the school board during one of the most important times in its history (dealing with a bond campaign, student population and budget problems and future school buildings.)

Not everyone is at fault here, although everyone has been guilty in the past. Vice President Michael Maloney voted against both measures. He asked for each position's responsibilities and objectives, and expressed concern about the budget.

An excellent thought considering the school district's administration was streamlining itself just six months ago

That kind of inquisitive insight, line item work done by Maloney is something every board member could learn from.

And if they don't, we might as well save ourselves some money and time and let the supervisors, mayor and superintendent make all the calls, since they're doing that most of the time anyway.
