1903 SCHOOL FIELD DAY.

The weather favored the contestants in the field day meet of the tri-county high school association last Friday and Saturday, but there was some complaint that Plymouth people failed to appreciate the situation and that the outside attendance was larger than by people at home. The teams represented by Wayne and Chelsea were rather more than a match for the Plymouth boys, the first named winning with a total score of 86½ points, Chelsea 40½ and Plymouth 37. Silver medals were offered for firsts in the track and field sports, Wayne getting eleven of the fourteen offered, Chelsea three.

As a preliminary to the field sports, a ball game was played Friday afternoon between Chelsea and Plymouth high school teams, the latter winning by a score of 13 to 10. The game was a hard fought one until the fifth inning when Plymouth made some good hits and aided by errors of their opponents, the game was theirs.
