Farewell to Men Joining National Army

Impressive Sight When Members, Without Equipment, Left to Fight For Freedom and Democracy.

Large Crowd at Depot to Bid Godspeed Wayne County Sons Who Answered War Call as They did Since 1861.

Eighty-two young men of the Fourth District left over the Pere Marquette at 7:52 o'clock last Friday morning for Camp Custer, where they are to be trained for places in the new national army.

Thursday afternoon each one of the men was presented with a Gillett military safety razor set, the gift of each township in the district.

An interesting event took place last Saturday evening at the home of Dr. and Mrs. S. E. Campbell, when their only daughter, Grace M., was united in marriage to Howard W. Brown of this place.

At five o'clock, Miss Edna Fisher took her place at the piano, and to the strains of the wedding march, the bridal couple, accompanied by E. Fletcher Campbell and Miss Olive Brown, proceeded to the front parlor, which was beautifully decorated for the occasion in pink and white.

At the command of "fall in," given by Scott D. Cortright, who with George Simmons of Northville, were designated by the local board to have charge of the men until their arrival at Camp Custer, the men formed in line for the march to the depot.

The procession to the station was headed by F. D. Schradef carrying the flag. He was followed by the band, the members of the local board and the selected men, while a large contingent of citizens brought up the rear.

At the station there were several hundred people gathered, friends and relatives of the soldiers—for soldiers they were—who had come to say farewell and bid them Godspeed.

The departure of these young men last Friday, meant for many of them the leaving of home for the first time in their lives. They were being separated from parents and friends from whom they had never been gone longer than a few days at most.

And so last Friday morning when the full realization dawned on them and their parents that the coming separation was to be longer and that they were to be drawn farther apart than ever before, it was not strange that the parting demonstration took a deeper tone.

The few minutes that intervened between the arrival of the men at the station and their departure was spent in making farewells to relatives. In the main the men appeared to be in good spirits. The band played sev-

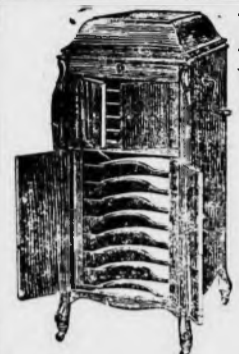

DASTARDLY WORK OF GERMAN SPIES DISCLOSED BY SEIZED DOCUMENTS

That Emissaries of the Kaiser Struck Many Foul Blows Proved by Papers Made Public by the Government.

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Bomb Story From Legation.

The latest story is told in a report to the state department from William Whiting Andrews, secretary of the legation at Bucharest, and a letter from Foreign Minister Porombaru of Roumania.

Here, in the form of letters, telegrams, notations, checks, receipts, ledgers, cashbooks, cipher codes, lists of spies and other memoranda and records were found indications—in some instances of the vaguest nature...

PROVES GERMAN INTRIGUES.

An amazing report of German intrigue and propaganda against the interests of the United States is presented herewith. These disclosures are made by the committee of public information, an official bureau of the government.

Koenig-Von Popen Commerce Bureau.

Perhaps the most illuminating single document in the collection is a letter of July 20, 1915, reproduced as it appeared upon a stationery of the 'Bureau of Investigation'.

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WORK OF GERMAN PLOTTERS

At the fall of 1914, shortly after the outbreak of the war, the German embassy established a publicity department at 85 West street, under the direction of Wolf von Igel.

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He is an international journalist of great repute, for years at the head of a newspaper organization in England. He has a personal reason to be very bitter against England because years ago (this letter appears to have been written about June 1, 1915, which is the date the article referred to in the early summer of 1915) a certain attack was made against him over commercial matters in Great Britain...

They should have endeavored to shoulder upon the American government the responsibility for the arrest of Casement. The Gaelic-American, Devoy's paper, and the syndicalist, George Sylvester Viereck, charged this government with having, on the strength of information obtained from the world's press, advised the British government of the revolutionary plot and Casement's part therein.

After Ammunition Plants.

In this letter the ambassador stated: "It is my impression that we can disorganize and hold up for meagre, if not entirely prevent, the manufacture of munitions in Bethlehem and the middle West, which, in the opinion of the German military attaché, is of importance and amply outweighs the comparatively small expenditure of money involved."

Count von Bernstorff.

Not so innocent and harmless as it first seems, this message really means this: "Irish agree to proposition. The necessary steps have been taken."
