## In the Legislature

The time is getting near at hand for the state legislature to do plenty of figuring with the old lead pencil. There's a lot of adding and subtracting to be done—and right soon. No one can tell you anything about state finances this week, and maybe not next week.

The mayors were in Lansing last week and they couldn't tell much about it, although last fall they made the voters believe that they knew everything about it. Then they said there would be no need of new taxes if the voters took most of the sales tax income away from the state. Now they frankly admit that new tax laws will be necessary if the constitutional tax diversion amendment

is permitted to stand. It does seem a shame to levy new taxes when the state has plenty of income, but must turn a large share of the cash over to various units of government that do not need a cent of state aid. Every one is hopeful that schools and cities that do need aid will get it and that other units of government that do not need state aid will not get it—but it's a tough job to figure out a way to do it under the amendment put over last fall. Governor Sigler is making an effort to do it the right way.

Did you ever see a hive of bees just after it had swarmed and lodged on some tree? If so, you know about how the legislature looked the other day when C.I.O. organizers of Detroit thought there was going to be a discussion on an anti-strike bill that had come to the floor of the legislature from committee. Before and after the session they buzzed around the house in exactly the same way that a swarm of bees act after having left the hive. It seems that they have a fear that the bill, if enacted into law, might in some way curtail the "take-home pay" of the organizers. When you hit at the pocket-book of a big-shot labor leader, you might as well figure that you have a mess on your hands that isn't going to be easy to wash off.

Brazenly and with an attitude of "to h. with you", a number of Communists the other night appeared before a senate committee to advocate the enactment by the legislature of a so-called law against discrimination in the employment of people because of race, color, creed or what-have-you.

Under the measure which has come before the legislature by petition, the only people not protected under its proposed provis-

ions are members of the so-called white race. The proposed measure sets up an entirely new state department, with an enforcing agency possessing rights to send a person to jail or soak you with a heavy money fine, or both if in the judgment of this commission you hired some other person to work for you than some other person who claims he should have the job under this proposed bill.

The findings of the commission "shall be conclusive," reads the act. In other words if you are an employer and if you should use your own judgment about who you employ you would face immediate prospects of going to jail by doing so.

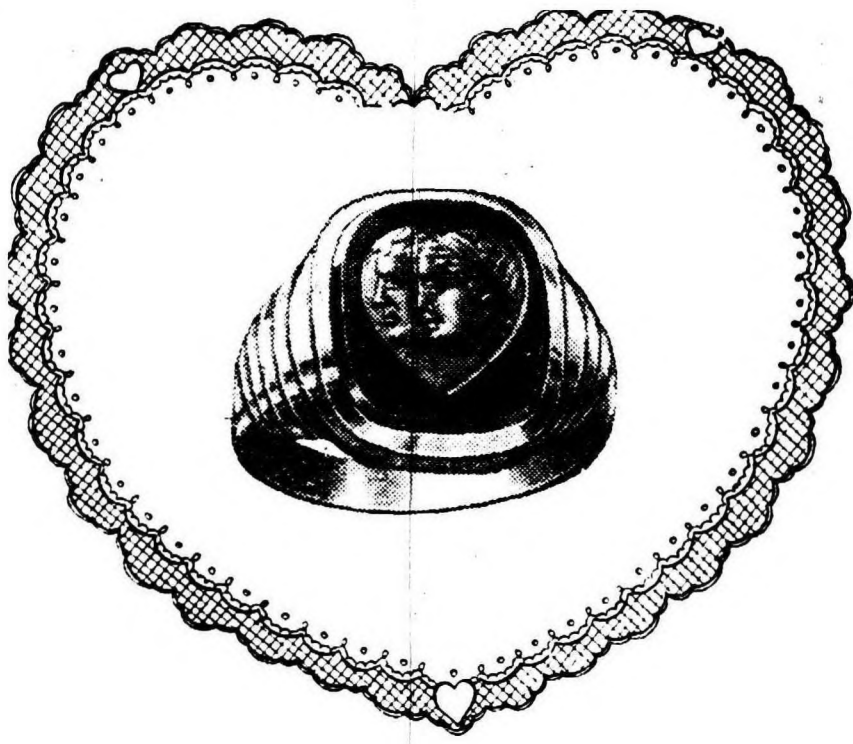
Down in New York they had enough votes to get such a law enacted. A Spaniard who operated a drinking place advertised in one of the New York papers for a Spanish-American bartender. It seems that the drinking place was operated in a section of the city made up almost entirely of Spanish people, and naturally the owner of the drinking place wanted a bartender who spoke the native language. The fellow by doing so violated the so-called Unfair Employment act.

Well, kind reader, just keep on passing laws of this nature and you'll have a dictator who will have you killed if you don't like the way the Dictator wears his tie. The Communists want to name the Dictator, kill or make a slave of you and take your hard-earned dollars away from you—that's why they are for schemes of this kind.

Good will is not created by passing mandatory laws, or making rules and regulations that compel you to do something whether you want to or not if it does not involve the well-being of all the people. It is possibly true that there has been an employer here or there who has not been entirely fair in the hiring of help, but it is of rare occasions.

No, the general feeling is that such a law is not needed in Michigan where good will has been the general rule until a lot of Communist polecats have been busy trying to create a lot of ill-will.

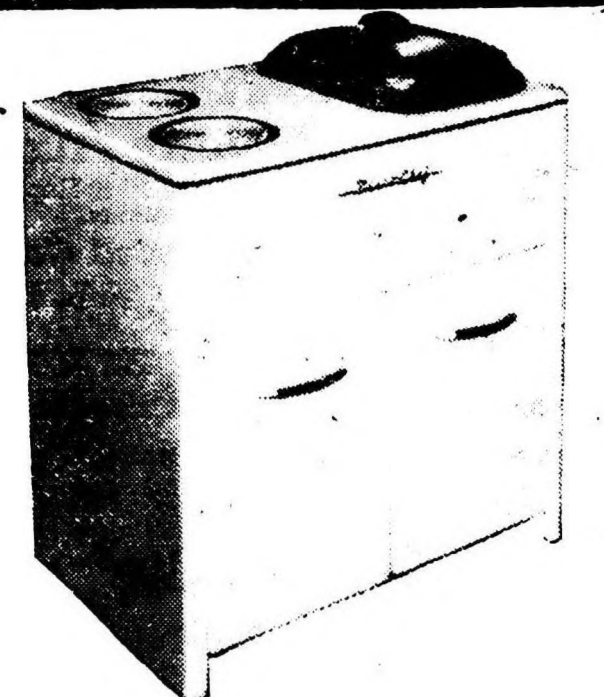

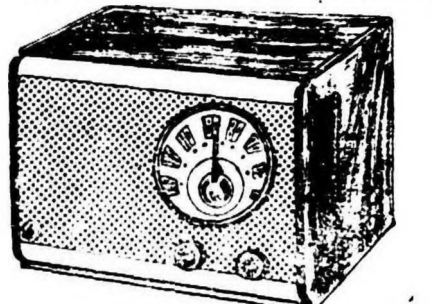

# Babson

**Babson Discusses Stock Market**  
Babson Park, Fla., Feb. 7.—I advance the following ten reasons as to why this is no time to sell stocks which are paid for and held for income.

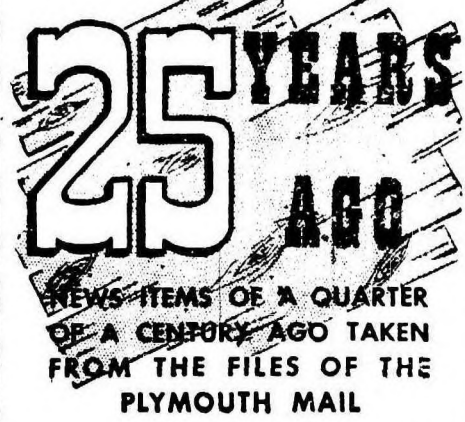
1. The huge amount of available money in circulation. This has increased from 7 billions in 1940 to 28 billions in 1947. It seems as if more of this would be coming into the stock market.
2. Only small amounts of listed stocks are outstanding, no more than in 1940. Hence, any concerted buying would send up prices.
3. Comparatively little speculation is now going on in stocks. In 1929 the stock transactions on the N.Y. Stock Exchange equalled the total National Income; but in 1946 these transactions were less than 20% of the total National Income.
4. Purchases now are possible only for 75% cash. This keeps weak people out of the market and theoretically should prevent too severe market breaks.
5. Banks now pay no interest on checking accounts and only 1% to 1 1/2% on savings accounts; while Governments average less than 2%. Hence, to get from 3% to 4% one must buy stocks. This should tend to stabilize safe income-paying stocks.
6. The monthly purchases by Investment Companies amounting to \$50,000,000 should be a market stabilizer. This, however, is only about 3% of the total monthly N.Y. Stock Exchange transactions.
7. Corporations whose securities are listed on the N.Y. Stock Exchange have the greatest cash reserves in their history—huge sums. Many have also large backlogs of unfilled consumer orders.
8. Wage increases will give the masses more spending money. This especially should help merchandizing companies.
9. President Truman can balance the Federal Budget in 1947, if he so desires and could also reduce taxes. This should stabilize the markets and restore much confidence. The only uncertainty would be a severe draught or a very bad foreign situation.
10. The improved political outlook. The new Congress is determined to reduce expenses, cut income taxes, and amend the labor laws to treat fairly all interests. There may never be a real solution to the labor problem; but Congress can very much improve the present unfair situation.

**Conclusions:** Considering these ten reasons for higher stock prices, why does the market continue to drift around? Why are people now timid to buy for permanent investment and income? Millions would be content with a fair rate of interest with safety, irrespective of whether the market goes up or down, were it not for some hidden reason which I now will explain.

**Strikes — Communism — Morals**  
We have witnessed the use of old-fashioned brute force in the settlement of political and labor

disputes. It is this revived use of force, now apparent all over the world, which is frightening investors. Even Communism—as an economic philosophy—might not be feared if the Communists were willing to leave the question to the free vote of the people. But they use force. In fact, Communism is merely enforced Socialism, the same as Fascism is enforced Capitalism. Russians blame me for talking about the possibilities of the success of the United Nations; but if labor, management and politicians cannot get along in this country peacefully, and leave decisions to the courts, how can we expect over fifty different races to unite and do so?

"Juvenile Delinquency" which really should be known as Parental Delinquency is undermining confidence. Parents are responsible for the filthy picture shows, with their jungle dances, and low stuff that was not even allowed in saloons a decade ago. We parents are responsible for the bad radio programs from which our children learn of the underworld doings of gangsters, cowboys and petty burglars. Even our magazines, in their stories and illustrations, appear to be lowering their standards by featuring drinking, carousing and the like. Modern "art" does not bother me, but with "sensible" people buying such crazy pictures it is not surprising that too many conservative investors are bearish on everything!

## Teachers Hear Facts About School System

Teachers in Plymouth's public schools were given an informative talk on the subject "Know Your School" by Helmar Nelson, Superintendent of Plymouth Public Schools at the January meeting of their club. Mr. Nelson brought out much data and pertinent facts about the system. Many of the items are of interest generally to residents of the city and township. A summary of the talk given to the teachers by their superintendent is listed below:

The school district is over twenty square miles. It consists of four tax units; the city of Plymouth, Plymouth township, a fractional part of Northville township and a fractional part of Canton township.

The high school building is now paid for, but there still remains a debt on the two grade school buildings.

The new heating system in the Central School takes fewer men to operate, and, therefore, is saving the school money on maintenance.

There are 36 members of the faculty, and 15 other employees.

The school now owns two of its own buses and utilizes the facilities of the Plymouth Coach Co. to supplement its service to outlying districts. Three more school-owned

ed buses are needed to adequately care for all of the system's own transportation schedules. Eleven routes now carry 451 children from their homes to school and return.

The expense of bus operation is entirely borne by the state for all pupils within the consolidated school district. The school is also reimbursed by the state for the cost of the buses. Amortization of this cost is over a period of seven years, to be paid in seven equal installments.

Mr. Nelson's presentation of this information gave club members a deeper interest in the school's many business activities, and an appreciation of the complex duties of the superintendent and school board. Plymouth residents, too, will always appreciate such information, that they may better understand the functioning of their large school system.

## City Assessor at Conference

City Assessor Arno B. Thompson attended the course for municipal assessing officers at Ann Arbor on Jan. 29, 30 and 31. The educational program was sponsored by The Institute of Public Administration and the Extension Service of the University of Michigan. Headquarters for the meeting was at the Horace H. Rackham School of Graduate Studies.

Leading administrative officers of various municipalities spoke, also several of the university faculty. Mr. Thompson states that the program was refreshing, and of great value in his task at the city hall. Methods of evaluating and assessing were brought out in detail, and discussion periods were held for those with special problems.

Mr. Thompson has found a ready source of text and reference material on assessing to be available at the Bureau of Government Library and at the library of the Michigan Municipal League.

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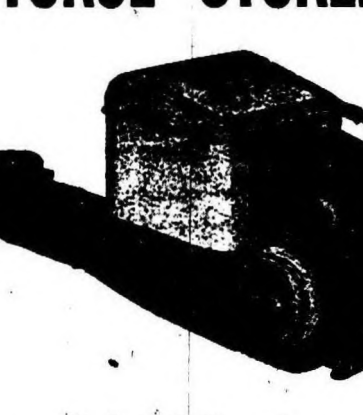

The speaker was Circuit Judge Moynihan, who was introduced by Charles Bennett, one of the past presidents who had charge of the program.

Judge Moynihan, long a favorite of Plymouth citizens, asserted that he had been assigned no subject upon which to talk but he hit upon one of the nation's problems for his discussion that provided of exceptional interest.

He reviewed briefly the situation in Europe which led to both world wars and of the hopeless situation in which the European continent had been left as a result of the conflicts, pointing out in contrast the opportunities, the freedoms and the blessings of American citizenship.

There was a one hundred percent attendance at the meeting.

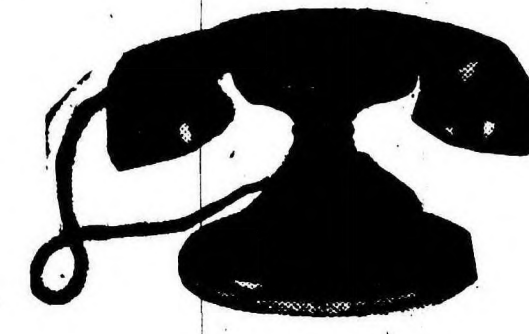

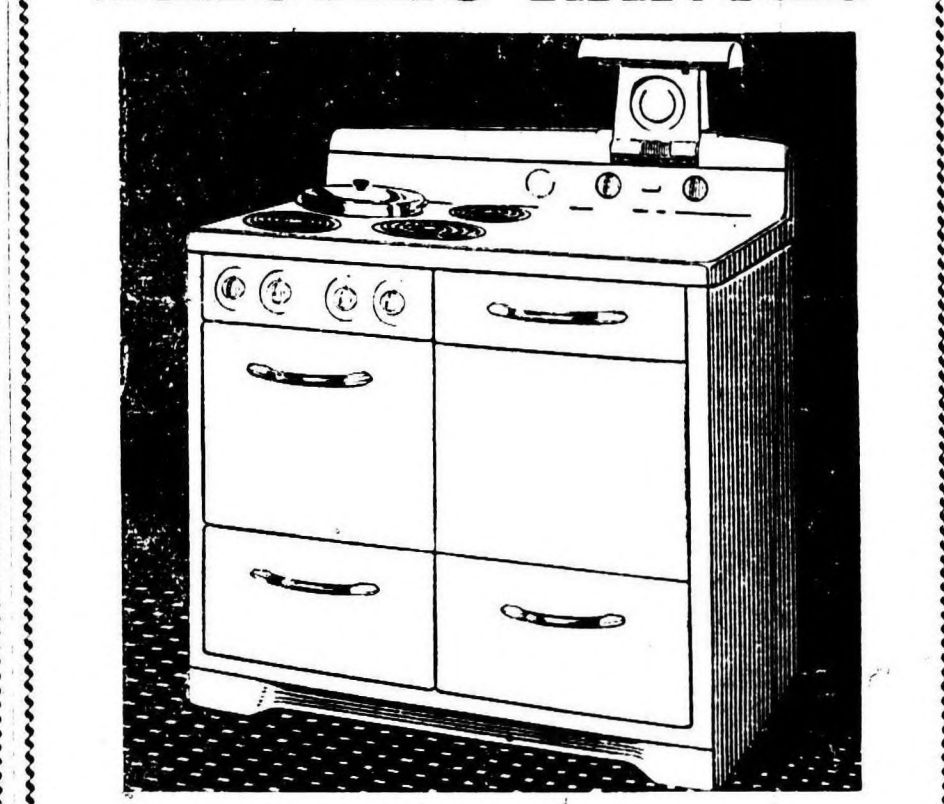
