

# The 1950's — Some Strife, Growth and Change

Unlike many of its neighbors east of here, Plymouth failed to really "boom" during the bustling 1950's but there's no telling what's ahead in this new decade that opens its doors Friday.

It is difficult for the Plymouthite who has lived here 10 or more years to note exactly what change has taken place during the past decade. But someone who hasn't visited Plymouth since 1950 would tell us that there have been many changes.

For instance, Forest Ave. was just another muddy street 10 years ago. The school system had but two elementary buildings, Starkweather and Central, at the opening of the decade. And the Central Parking Lot was just a field of weeds.

When the federal census was taken in 1950, the city of Plymouth had 6,637 people, Plymouth Township had 4,945 and Canton Township listed 3.761.

the population at 8,900 in the city, 7,400 for Plymouth Township and 5,200 for Canton Township. Another federal census in 1960 will bring the figures out of the realm of guesswork.

At the start of the decade, Plymouth Township was just building its township hall after using the homes of its elected officials to conduct business. Now, at the end of the 1950's, a second fire station is being completed.

Back in 1950 when Plymouth appliance stores were advertising "big 12 inch picture tube TV sets" for \$299. the nation was plunged into the Korean "police action". One of the early victims was 17-year-old Morris Beasley of Plymouth.

But Plymouth, like most communities, didn't seem to get stirred up about the new war. Things went on almost as usual.

In May 1950, the Plymouth city commission called for emergency rationing when a coal strike resulted in

This summer, planners estimated an acute shortage. Many furnaces burned wood for the first time as coal yards carefully doled out its coal supply.

The 1950's will be known for their progress for the important sewer and water systems started. Plymouth city started a \$600,000 sewer for the south end in January 1956. Plymouth Township started its sanitary sewer this year and both Plymouth and Canton Townships began their first water systems during the past two years.

Probably the most talked about item during the decade was the strife between Plymouth city and township. A ballot proposal on Nov. 1, 1955 asking for annexation of the township to the city was overwhelmingly rejected by the township voters. City voters, however, okayed taking over a piece of township property upon which the big Western Electric Distribution House was built. It opened early this year.

Following the 1955 election came a series of petitions for annexations

the city of Plymouth. One of the petitions finally was declared valid and the issue of incorporation went on the ballot last February.

Plymouth Townsbip was served by two supervisors during the decade. Veteran Supervisor Charles Rathburn served until 1953 when he died. He was succeeded by Roy Lindsay who still holds office.

The city has had several mayors in the 10 year period — Perry Richwine, Cass Hough, Floyd Tibbitts, Russell Deane and the present mayor, Harold Guenther.

One of the major new stories of the decade came in November 1957 when Daisy Manufacturing announced that it was moving to Arkansas. In the announcement, Executive Vice President Cass Hough cited the state's industrial climate as one of its reasons for moving. This brought about state and nationwide publicity that involved the governor's office.

> Gaylord Container became a new industrial resident after Wall Wire moved to Tennessee in May 1956. The National Bank of Detroit also arrived in Plymouth following a merger with the First National Bank and Plymouth United Savings Bank in 1952.

Plymouth suffered its share of tragedies during the decade. An average of a dozen local people died in highway accidents each year. In 1956 a man murdered his wife's landlady and this year a housewife took the lives of two of her children and then her own.

In 1954 a \$100,000 fire heavily damaged three stores, Capitol Shirt Shop, Papes' and Fashion Shoes. The largest fire loss in City history took place in 1958 as Daisy was about to move. A warehouse burned with a \$200,000 loss and seriously injuring a fireman. In 1953, Plymouth city and township

Death claimed the lives of many prominent people. Ruth Huston Whipple, the city's only woman mayor, died in 1955. Charles Bennett, Daisy Manufacturing president and nationally known, passed away in September 1956. Equally prominent Edward C. Hough, also a Daisy president, died last January.

Churches made big gains. Nearly every church body in Plymouth expanded or built new churches during the 1950's.

The school system took some giant strides. Formerly called the Plymouth Township School District, it changed its name in 1955 to the Plymouth Community School District. The George A. Smith elementary school was started in February 1950 and the Nellie Bird School that June.

to a parking authority as the only vehicle of influencing and implementing a Central Business District," the mayor predicted.

"We will begin soon to study and formulate long-range water plans. This involves considerations other than our new water policy making water available outside the city.'

Mayor Guenther stressed that the city must relate its water situation to Detroit's plans for this area, including Northville, Plymouth and Canton Townships, both from the standpoint of what immediate help it can be to industrial growth and what part the city can logically play in the overall longrange area plan so that the community can develop without burdensome and unnecessary water expen-

"We will soon in 1960 begin construction of our water main and sewer to our new industrial park on Plymouth Rd., across from Burroughs," the Mayor continued. The new year will see a new plant of the Wheel Trueing Co. on 12 acres. If sewer tap restrictions are lifted by the state, other industries are expected in the park in 1960.

"It is my hope the school board will decide again to place the matter of an auditorium on the ballot in 1960," the mayor continued. "It is my conviction that a large sum of money could be privately raised to augment the amount required for school purposes. This additional private grant would allow us as a community to build a more complete plant that could be used to the full by everyone living in the school district.

"It seems shameful this community with its Symphony, Theatre Guild, numerous ladies organizations, Historical Society, youth programs, Scouts, etc., has no decent physical identity for their activities and contributions they make to this community.

"The commission stands ready to cooperate fully with the land the city owns in the high school area.

# Your Name Is Marjorie

#### By ANN REYNOLDS

Some names have numerous offsprings. "Margaret" is one of these, and among its descendants, now independent, are "Mar-gery" and "Marjorie." From "Margaret," meaning "a pearl," whose most remote home is believed to have been Persia, the French formed the endearing form "Margerie." This came to be used also among the English. "Marjorie" is just a different spelling of it, one that took root mainly among the Scots.

To one Margery belongs the honor of having authored the first autobiography in English. She could neither read nor write, and so she dictated the fascinating story of her adventurous life to a cleric. She was Margery Kempe, a native of Lynn, Norfolk in England. Always concerned with matters of the spirit only, she failed at her trade as a miller and a brewer.

Her highly unusual personality always involved her in trouble. Because she took it upon herself to expound the Bible, she was accused of heresy, and even her habit of wearing white clothes marked her out as one who could not abide by rules. White clothes were, in her time, the privilege of virgins, and Margery was a married wom-


