## Addition Fulfills Long Need

Dreams of present and former Starkweather Elementary School pupils and parents were fulfilled this week when the new multi-purpose room was opened for its first public gathering.

The Starkweather Parent-Teacher Association met last night in the gleaming new room and by next Monday it is hoped to start serving meals at the school for the first time this school year.

Starkweather School was opened in 1927, named after George A. Starkweather, founder of Plymouth. The present principal is Miss Mildred Field.

The 40 by 70 multi-purpose room was started last spring. Immediately builders ran into trouble when they learned that ground upon which the foundation was to be laid was evidently a dump at one time. They found old stoves, bathtubs and other debris which was not solid enough to support the structure. So test drillings had to be made and the foundation was laid eight feet deeper.

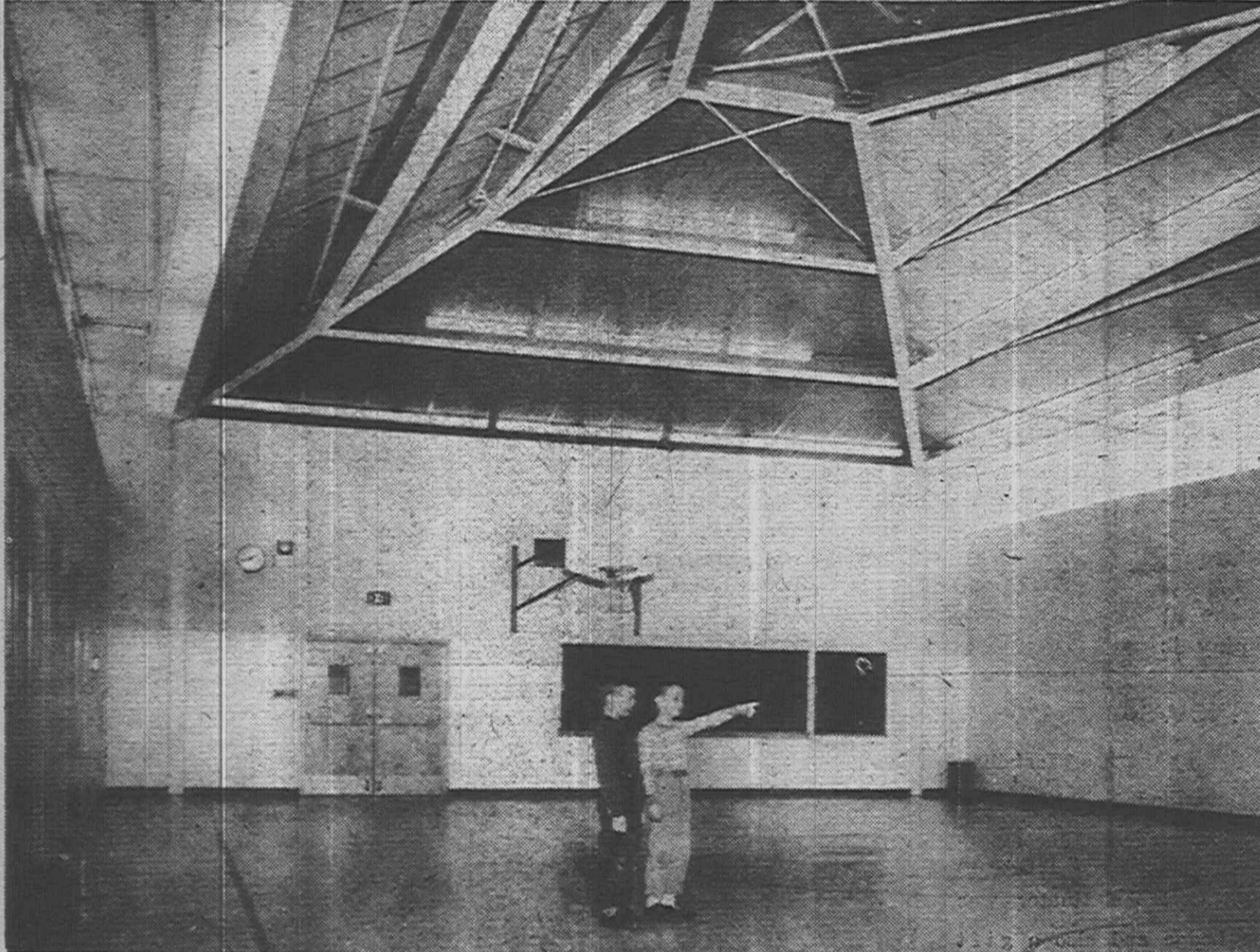
In addition to the multi-purpose room, the new addition also contains a kitchen. Starkweather school, oldest elementary school in the system (except for the one and two-room buildings in Canton Township) had a multi-purpose room of sorts, but it was much too small for basketball and most school functions. For many years, parents have been hoping that a new room could be built.

When voters last June approved the new Building and Site Sinking Fund, they also gave the School Board the green light to move ahead with the multi-purpose room. While the new addition has been under construction, there have been no lunches served at the school. The newly completed room has been used for several weeks by children bringing their sack lunch from home.

Administrative Assistant Melvin Blunk said that it is hoped that the kitchen is completed this week so that the first lunches can be served next Monday. Kitchen equipment is from the old kitchen.

The multi-purpose room differs from those in other schools because of its unusual ceiling. The architect, Miss Jacqueline Joseph of the local firm of Moss, Gould & Joseph, Inc., has employed the "spruce-frame" ceiling in several schools she has designed. The three-dimensional

## Dimes 'March' Yields \$2,164

Donations of \$2,164.15 were made last Sunday afternoon when 175 women trod the snowy streets and sidewalks of Plymouth City and Township for the annual Mothers' March.

The amount was \$300 less than had been contributed during the "March" a year ago. This was the first time that the Mothers' March had ever been held on an afternoon. Previously it took place in the evening. The Sunday afternoon March was tried this year in Wayne County because of the safety feature and because it is usually warmer in the afternoons.

## Voters Face Four Elections in 1961

### Merchants Study New Budget Plan

Plymouth store owners are studying a plan that would offer customers a revolving charge plan with billing coming from one source instead of from individual stores.

For the past two years, the Plymouth Community Charge Plan has been available to shoppers here. Under this program, 7,000 credit cards were issued to Western Wayne County families with good credit ratings.

These cards make it possible for shoppers to buy in any of 21 stores without opening up separate charge accounts. The customer is then billed by each store.

But under the newly-proposed plan, a central agency would send out one bill covering purchases from any of the participating stores.

In addition, the system would offer the "revolving charge" feature, whereby it would be possible to spread payments out over a period of 10 months.

A service charge of one and a half per cent a month would be paid on the unpaid balance only after 30 days. If the amount is paid within 30 days, there would be no charge. This is the same credit plan and charge arrangement that most major department stores now offer.

There are now 21 merchants participating in the Plymouth Community Charge Plan. A meeting was held last week at which details of the plan were discussed.

A committee was appointed to investigate further details. On the committee are Earl Verona of Plymouth Men's Wear, Herbert Chaiken of Minerva's, James Houk of Fisher's Shoes and Durwood Vandervoort of Plymouth Finance Co. Another general meeting will be called at a later date.

A number of merchants have already expressed their enthusiasm for the new plan. "In effect," said one spokesman, "it will make Plymouth one large department store." Plymouth merchants have been faced with ever-increasing competition from large shopping centers east of here, most of which contain large department stores that attract customers with revolving charge plans.

A new, privately-owned agency would be established to administer the charge plan for Plymouth merchants.

Plymouth electors will be asked to go to the polls at least four times during 1961 — and perhaps five times, according to a check of the year's election calendar made this week by The Mail.

While years ending with odd numbers are usually termed as "off years" for elections, 1961 will nevertheless be a busy one for voters who are interested in local affairs.

Most of Plymouth Township voters already have one 1961 election "under the belt." On Tuesday, Jan. 17, they were asked to decide the fate of the Plymouth Heights charter.

The first election for most people in Michigan, however, will be this month. On Monday, Feb. 20, will be the Biennial Spring Primary.

Election No. 2 will come on Monday, April 3 when the Biennial Spring Election takes place across the state.

And two elections dealing with schools will be held during the year. The Annual School Election will be Monday, June 12.

The other election, to be held either this spring or early next fall, will concern the proposed Northwest Wayne County Community College. Planners of the six-district community college had earlier talked about a special election in May. But, ac-

ording to one executive committee officer, the election may now be postponed until early fall.

Those working in behalf of the college want to make sure that the electorate is fully informed about the plan and the need of a community college. Placing it on the ballot too early may leave many voters uninformed.

In any case, the Community College election is almost certain during 1961.

There is also one other election "hanging fire." This one concerns the vote on the Constitutional Convention. A special election sometime in April had been discussed by promoters of the constitution revision. But here too, it was found that time has been running out and that perhaps an election later in the year is better.

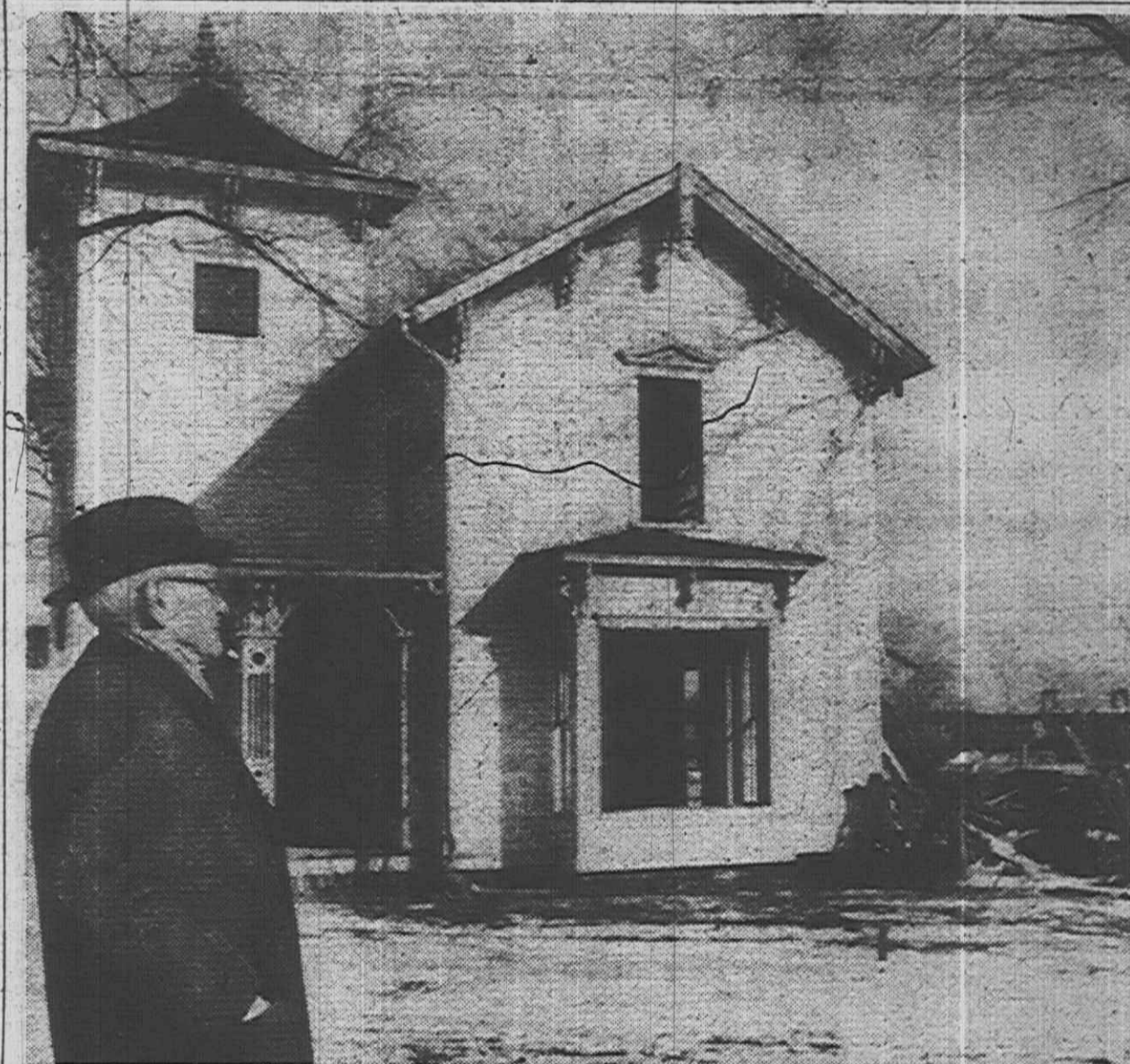
However, there has been no decision to even stage the election this year for sure. The next state-wide regular election after this April is August 1962.

This month's Biennial Spring Primary is not expected to draw too many electors to the polls. Absentee ballots are now available for this election. On a county-wide basis, there is a race among six Democrats for one auditor nomination.

In the City, the Biennial Primary will find a race among four candidates seeking nominations to the Board of Supervisors. The field of four must be narrowed to two at the primary.

In Plymouth Township, names of all candidates will appear although there is just one contest. It will be for the Republican nomination for trustee. Only one Democrat filed for a township office.

tricity came and the wood stove was later replaced by a coal stove. Gas for cooking was installed at one time in later years. Otherwise, the home remained almost the same as the year it was built.

For a while after he grew up and his parents were living, Ernie lived on Harvey St. But after his father died, he bought the house and moved back in. His wife died in 1906, leaving him with three daughters, including twins. Determined to rear his own family, he hired a housekeeper during the time his daughters grew up, went through college and married.

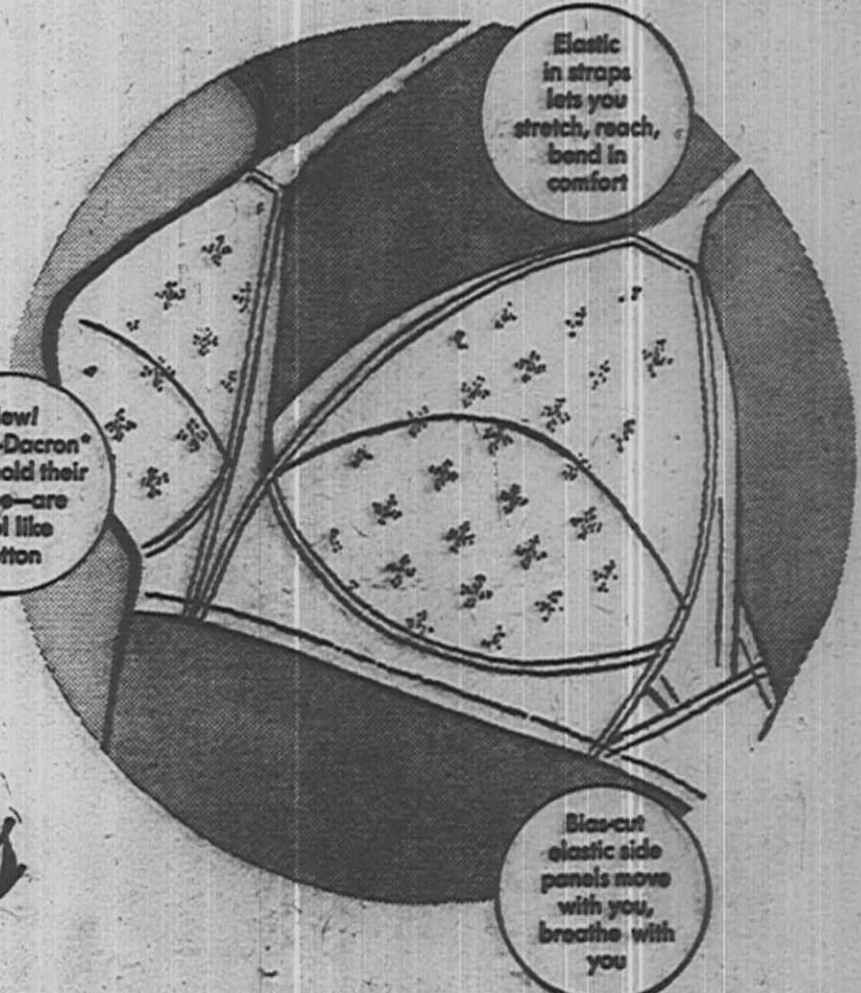

# Canton Twp. Fire Chief Reports Lowest Fire Loss in Five Years

Fire Chief Fred Korte, Jr., reports that his annual fire loss report sent to the state is more than encouraging to him and the department. Canton Township suffered its lowest fire loss in five years. Our report for 1959 listed a loss of \$65,435, while our loss for 1960 was \$19,038, a decrease of \$46,397. The Department answered 84 fire alarms in 1960. Fire loss in buildings accounted for \$14,053, while loss in contents was \$4,000. The department's largest single loss for the year was the Bartlett School, with damages amounting to \$6,888 from a fire started in the furnace room.

The principal cause of fires and alarms were the careless burning of rubbish, which accounted for 18 runs, defective heating equipment accounted for seven calls, juveniles for eight, and careless smoking for three calls. There were 20 other types of fires and 17 rescue runs plus two false alarms. In the past year the department talked to 950 students on fire prevention and upon request of the Sheldon PTA presented a film on "Mouth to Mouth Resuscitation."

The Fire Department and its chief are proud of this reduction in fire losses for this past year, and sincerely wish the citizens of Canton Township will strive for an even greater record for 1961. Fire-conscious residents helped greatly in reducing the fire loss the past year, and Chief Korte sincerely hopes that again this year the residents will assist the fire department in reducing this financial loss.

All Township residents recently received a post card announcing that a veterinarian would be at the Canton Center Fire Hall on Jan. 20 and 21 to vaccinate and license all dogs. No dog can be licensed without vaccination. Four hundred of man's best friend were brought to the hall by their owners to be vaccinated and licensed. Last year the number reached around 900 dogs. According to law, all dogs must be licensed and vaccinated. For those owners who have as yet to have their pet licensed, the half-price rate will be effective through February 31 for males, \$2 for females. After February the price for the license will be \$2 for males and \$4 for females.

males. However, before going to the Township Hall for your license, your dog must be vaccinated and proof of same must be presented when purchasing your tag. The vaccination of your pet cannot get rabies. A record of all animals licensed and vaccinated in the Township is kept on file.

The salaries and purchases

of the Credit Union added another \$32,000. It is estimated that the Credit Union saved its members over \$50,000 in interest paid on its low cost loans. The Credit Union loaned \$748,000 for the purchase of goods and services. The Credit Union carries over \$1,000,000 in life insurance on its members at no direct cost to members. The Credit Union, owned and controlled by Plymouth area residents, has grown seven-fold since 1956 and takes special pride in its democratic control and community service.

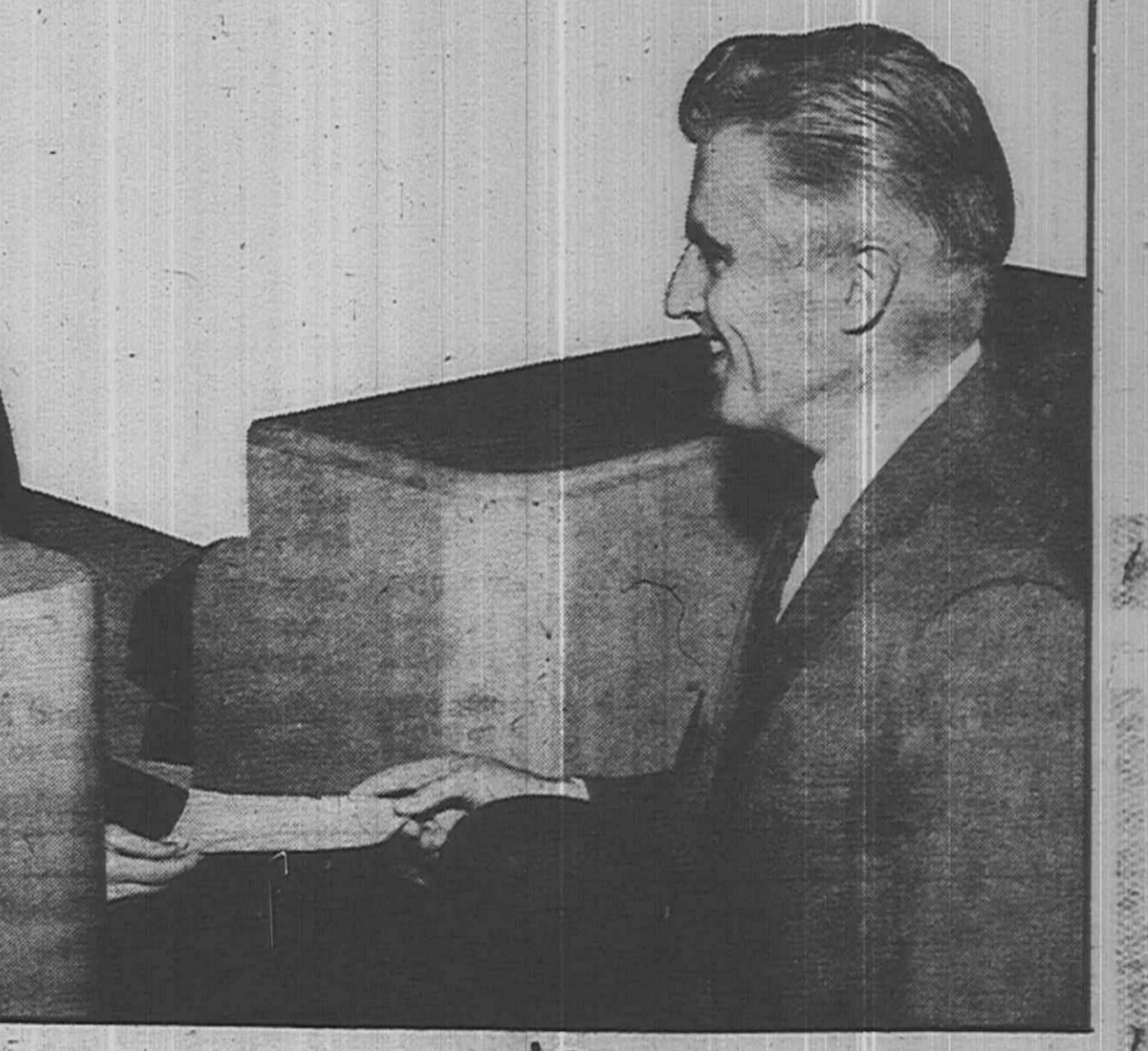
Meetings are held very frequently during the noon hour, and those who enjoy this game may attend one of them on the announced day, and find out more about the club.

(Continued from Page 1) original employees of the Markham Air Rifle Co., first makers of the air rifle in the world. He spent 44 years with the company.

"After 40 years of paying a housekeeper, Ernie decided he had had enough. In 1946 he sold the house to the late Mr. and Mrs. Harry Robinson and he moved into the Mayflower Hotel.

"Some people thought I would get lonesome for the old home," Ernie recalled as he drew on his cigar while he reclined in a large chair in the hotel lobby. "But I never did. I like it here."

The house was later purchased by Rose Hawthorne who vacated it after it was sold for construction of the new store building last year.

Ernie recalls that there

were few homes along the street when he was a boy. Most of the lots were pasture. Three doors from his home, next to the old Bode home (a restaurant today), was a building that was half residence and half saloon.

So as bulldozers and power shovels pushed down walls, filled up excavations and fire consumed unwanted lumber this week, a little more of Plymouth's past history moved into the realm of the invisible.

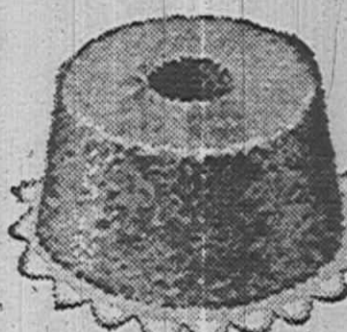

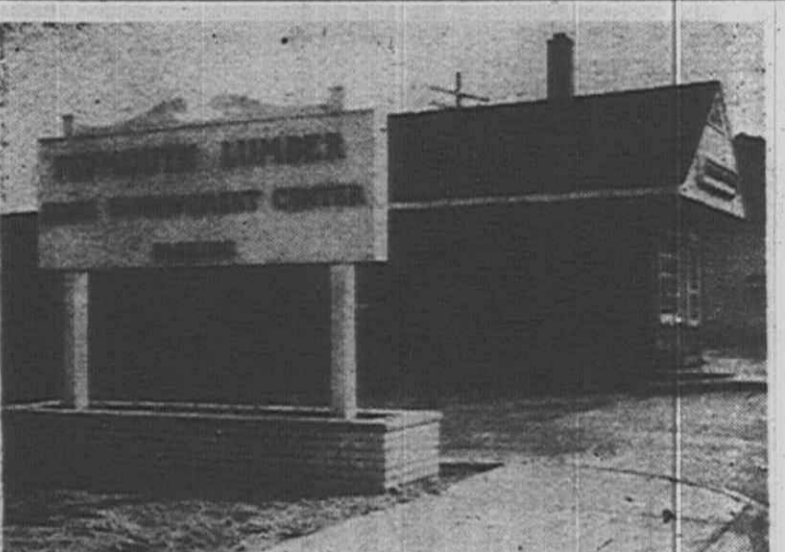

### All About BABIES

By William Kitay National Association of Science Writers Editor, All About Babies Sleep problems are universally common in normal babies during their first two and three years of life. And most authorities are agreed that in this respect the role of habit is most evident.

A review of the medical literature dealing with the management of healthy babies who won't sleep indicates that: Some babies are born bad sleepers. The slightest disturbance wakes them up. Often, they lie awake for hours after being put to bed. In many babies, the habit of sleep refusal, is an attention-getting device. And in many, the insomnia can be traced to one cause or another.

Here are just a few of the more common causes listed by doctors: Teething, fear of the dark, too much light in the room, gastro-intestinal distress, a tight abdominal binder, an unsuitable underwearer, a knotty mattress, poorly-made bed, insufficient bed clothes leading to cold hands and feet and discomfort caused by a wet or soiled diaper.

If your baby won't sleep, consult your doctor for rules out any organic disturbances. Then, look to baby's comfort. A loose sleeping bag will keep baby from becoming uncovered. Most babies prefer flannel pajamas and a hard, smooth mattress covered with a blanket and a flannel sheet. Avoid tight clothing. Make sure baby is freshly diapered. A professional diaper service will see you assure you a ready supply of clean, processed diapers.

If your baby fears the dark, leave a small light in the room. A warm bath at night seems to soothe many babies and promote their sleep. As for handling a difficult baby who has gotten into the habit of refusing sleep, Dr. Morris Witkin, a pediatrician, writes: "To insist on sleep where there is no desire is senseless, for sleep will not be commanded. One cannot stampee a child to sleep. To smack him or use corporal punishment is disastrous. Postpone bedtime an hour or so.

"Then put him to bed, letting him know all further tomfoolery will be ignored. He must read in mother's face and gather from the tone in her voice that she is determined to have her way. Once the child realizes the futility of resistance, the battle is won."

Last year he emphasized Michigan's strategic position on the globe of the world.

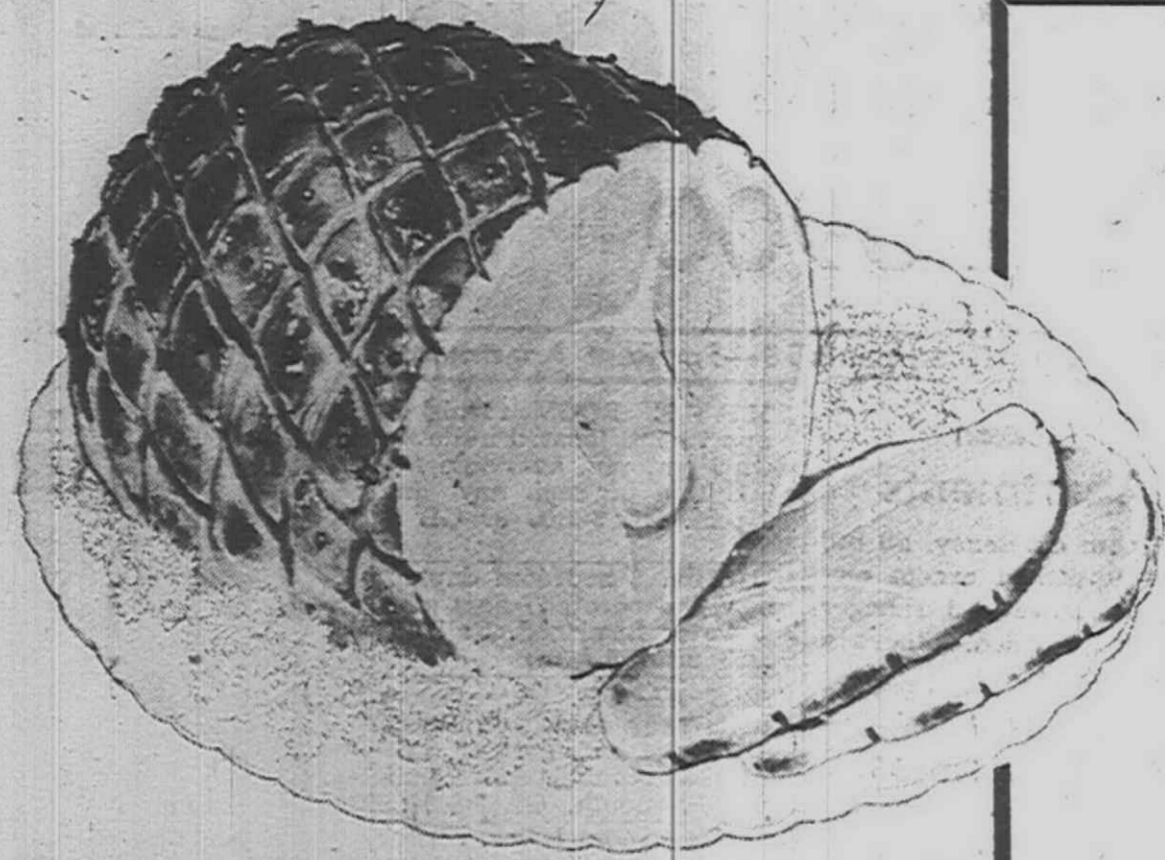
