

Addition Fulfills Long Need


Dreams of present and former Starkweather Elementary School pupils and parents were fulfilled this week when the new multi-purpose room w a s opened for its first public gathering.

In the City, the Biennial Primary will find a race among four candidates seeking nominations to the Board of Supervisors. The field of four must be narrowed to two at the primary.


