



He also has published a book which has found stall room in Doubledays and elsewhere, and maybe it'll help repay a favor to call attention to it. Doc probably makes a few cents whenever a copy is sold, though this is no cinch. The Internal Revenues 24 HOU could be holding the franchise. When a writer discards the obvious, he begins looking for the unusual. Greene has been poking into the corners of existence ever since I knew him, which means he's been out on the streets a lot after midnight, and that he rides quite a few airplanes to curious places.

From this emerges a book full of strange and wonderful stories, about two-thirds of them true ... such as the one about a crapshooter who cheated on a ship and wound up missing the next morning ... or the men who bet on fighting fish out of Hamilton Ave. . . . or the bull-fighters who take their moment of truth as it comes . . . or the horse-players who have learned to face their sorrow with bemused wonderment.

As with so many things, the book is much better than watching television.





ORDINANCE NO. 275



AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PREVENTION OF FIRES AND THE PROTECTION OF PERSONS AND PROPERTY;
TO PROVIDE FOR A FIRE MARSHAL; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS; TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS
HEREOF AND TO REPEAL ANY ORDINANCE OR PART THERE-OF IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. There is hereby created the office of Fire Marshal, and the Director of Public Safety shall be, ex officio, the Fire Marshal. The Fire Marshal and any of the officers or members of the Department of Public Safety shall have the authority to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2. The Fire Marshal and his assistants shall enforce this ordinance and all other laws or ordinances covering fires, the storage and use of flammables and explosives, the installation and maintenance of fire alarm systems, the maintenance and regulation of fire exits and all other matters and conditions affecting the prevention of fires, the preserva-tion of property and the safety of persons within the City of Plymouth.

Section 3. The Fire Marshal or any of his assistants, may at all reasonable hours enter any building or premises within the City of Plymouth for the purpose of making any inspection which may be deemed necessary under the provisions of this ordinance, without incurring any liability for trespass by reason

Section 4. The Fire Marshal shall cause periodic inspections to be made of all buildings or properties within the City of Plymouth, other than interiors of private dwellings, and upon a written and signed complaint of any person or whenever the Fire Marshal shall deem it necessary, shall inspect or cause to be inspected all buildings and properties, including the interior of private dwellings, for the purpose of ascertaining the existence of conditions liable to cause fire, or any violation of the provisions or intent of this or any other ordinance of the City of Plymouth affecting fire hazards, and for the purpose of causing such conditions to be corrected.

Section 5. Whenever any assistant of the Fire Mar-shal shall find in any building or upon any premises combustible or explosive matter, or dangerous accumulations or rubbish or unnecessary accumulations of waste paper, boxes, shavings or other flammable materials, which are so situated so as to endanger life or property, or shall find obstructions to or on any fire escapes, stairs, passageways, doors or windows, liable to interfere with the operations of the Fire Department, or egress of occupants in case of fire, or shall find any building or structure which, for want of repair, lack of sufficient fire escapes, approved fire alarm apparatus or fire extinguishing equipment, or which by reason of age or dilapidated condition, or from any other cause is especially liable to create a fire hazard, and which is so situated as to endanger other property or the occupants thereof, or the persons occupying such buildings, such findings shall forthwith be reported to the Fire Marshal. Said Fire Marshal shall make such further inspections as he may deem advisable or necessary, and shall prepare written notice stating the faulty conditions which exist, requiring said faulty conditions to be fully corrected, remedied or removed, and setting a time limit of not less than twenty-four (24) hours for compliance there-

Section 6. Where any written notice is prepared in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance, or where there is any violation of any provision of this ordinance with a corresponding notice or order for correction of the same, said notice shall be made in the following manner:

(a) By personally delivering a copy of said order or notice to the person or persons to whom it is di-rected anywhere within the State of Michigan, or

(b) By delivering a copy of said order or notice by certified or registered mail, addressed to the last known post office address of the addressee, and deliverable to the addressee only, with return receipt de-manded, which service by certified or registered mail shall be deemed personal and not substituted service,

(c) If any person to whom said order or notice is directed cannot be found or has no known post office address or is not a resident of the State of Michigan, then service of said order or notice may be made by publication in a newspaper published or circulating in the county in which the property or premises des-cribed in said order or notice are situated, once in each week for three successive weeks, the last publication to be made at least ten days prior to the date of performance specified in said order or notice. A copy of said order or notice shall be posted upon the premises described in such order or notice.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of any occupant or owner of any building or premises to comply with any order or notice given by the Fire Marshal within twenty-four (24) hours after service of such order or notice, as herein provided, unless additional time is applied for and is granted by the Fire Marshal, or unless additional time for compliance is provided for in such order or notice.

Section 8. Any owner or occupant of a building or premises, who shall feel aggrieved by any order or notice given by the Fire Marshal, may within twentyfour (24) hours after service thereof, as herein provided, appeal to the City Commission, which shall within five (5) days thereafter grant such person a hearing upon his objections, which shall be in writing. Said commission may modify or revoke such order or notice, and if the same shall be upheld in any respect shall have authority to order compliance therewith within such time as the commission shall specify.

Section 9. Whenever in the opinion of the Fire Marshal or his duly authorized representative any dangerous condition involving explosives or flammable vapors exists, or whenever the Fire Marshal or his duly authorized representative shall find such an emergency condition dangerous to persons or property, said Fire Marshal or his duly authorized representative shall have the power to take all necessary steps and to prescribe all necessary restrictions and requirements to protect persons and property until said dangerous condition is abated.

Section 10. Applications for permits required by this ordinance shall be obtained from the Fire Marshall and be in such form and contain such information as he may require.

Section 11. A written permit shall be obtained by all persons, firms or corporations before engaging in the following activities in the City of Plymouth, said permit to expire three (3) months after the date of issuance, except that permits for the use of explosives and pyrotechnic displays shall be for the period of one day only unless otherwise noted in the permit:

(a) Erecting any tent or other shelter or other enclosure capable of sheltering more than twenty-five (25) persons at one time.

(b) Installing tanks for the storage of flammable (c) Installing liquified gas systems.

(d) Installing dry cleaning or dry dyeing equip-

(e) Staging of pyrotechnic displays.

(f) Use of explosives.

(g) Installing metal awnings on any building other than a private dwelling.

Section 12. For each permit issued hereunder a fee of \$5.00 shall be collected.

Section 13. No person shall carelessly, recklessly, negligently, or in any manner set fire to any hotel,

rooming house, lodging house or any place of public abode, or to any bedding, furniture, curtains, drapes or other furnishings therein so as to endanger life or

In each sleeping room of all hotels, rooming houses, lodging houses and other places of public abode, a plainly written notice shall be posted in a conspicuous place as notice of the provisions of this section of this ordinance.

Section 14. Any person who shall offer for sale, expose for sale, or sell at retail, have in possession, give, furnish, transport, use, explode, or cause to explode, any blank cartridge, toy pistol, toy cannon, toy cane or toy gun in which explosives are used, except toy pistols, toy cannon, toy canes and toy guns of a type approved by the commissioner of the Michigan state police in which paper caps containing 1/4 grain, or less, of explosive compound are used and which are so constructed that the hand cannot come in contact with the cap when in place for the explosion or any products of combustion resulting therefrom; the type of balloon which requires fire underneath to propel the same; fire-crackers, torpedoes, skyrockets, Roman Candles, Daygo bombs or other fireworks of like construction, or any fireworks containing any explo-sive or inflammable compound or any tablets or other device commonly used and sold as fireworks containing nitrates, chlorates, oxalates, sulphides of lead, berium, antimony, arsenic, mercury, nitroglycerine, phosphorus or any compound containing any of the same or other modern explosives, except toy pistol paper caps which contain 1/4 grain, or less, of explosive mixture, and except sparklers containing not more than .0125 pounds of burning portions per sparkler, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor; Provided that the City Commission may, upon application in writing, authorize the Fire Marshal to grant a permit for the public display of fireworks, by fair associations, public display of fireworks, by fair associations, amusement parks or other organizations or groups of individuals approved by the City Commission, when handled by a competent operator. After such permit shall have been granted, sales, possession or transportation of fireworks for such display may be made for that purpose only: Provided further, That nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit any wholesale resident, dealer or jobber to have in possession, transport or sell at wholesale such fireworks as are not herein prohibited: or the possession, transportanot herein prohibited; or the possession, transporta-tion or sale of any kind of fireworks when the same are to be shipped directly out of the state; or the possession, transportation or sale or use of blank cartridges for a show or theatre or for signal purposes in athletic sports or by railroads for signal purposes or for the use by the militia or any organization of war

Section 15. Every person dealing at wholesale or retail in gasoline, benzine or naphtha shall deliver the same from tank wagons, tanks, casks, barrels, pumps or other receptacles to the purchaser only in barrels. casks, jugs, packages, pumps or cans painted ver-milion bright red, and having the word "gasoline." "benzine' or 'naphtha' plainly lettered in English thereon, and all tank wagons and wholesale receptacles shall likewise be labeled with the word "gasoline," "benzine" or "naphtha" as the use of such tank wagon or receptacle would indicate. These provisions shall not be deemed to apply to any stationary pump erected for the sale or distribution of gasoline at retail; nor to any vehicle designed for bulk delivery; nor to any tank permanently affixed to a motor vehicle, tractor or aeroplane, as a part thereof, and containing gasoline used for the purpose of propelling such motor vehicle, tractor or aeroplane. No such dealer shall deliver kerosene in a barrel, cask, jug, package or can painted and lettered as hereinbefore provided. Every person purchasing gasoline, benzine or naphtha for use or sale at retail shall procure and keep the same only in barrels, casks, jugs, packages or cans painted and lettered as hereinbefore provided. No person keeping for use or using kerosene shall put or keep the same in any tank wagon, barrel, cask, jug, package or can painted and lettered as hereinbefore provided: Provided, however, That in case of gasoline, benzine and naphtha being sold in bottles of not more than 1 quart for cleaning and similar purposes it shall be deemed sufficient if the contents of such bottles are so designated by a label securely pasted or attached thereto with the words 'gasoline,' "benzine" or "naphtha" printed in bright red ink in letters not less than ¼ inch in size. Any person violating any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty

Section 16. Any condition existing on any property, or in any building in the City of Plymouth determined by the Fire Marshal to be a hazardous condition, and a hazard to adjacent properties or to lives, and any building which constitutes a hazard to adjoining properties or to lives, shall be deemed a public nuisance, and shall be abated in accordance with the provisions of the law pertaining to abatement of nuisances. Whenever the Fire Marshal shall find any such hazard existing, and when action is not taken within the time limit in any order or notice for the abatement of such nuisance by the owner or occupant of said premises, the Fire Marshal may, upon approval of the City Commission of the City of Plymouth, bring or cause to be brought in the Circuit Court of the County of Wayne, an action in chancery in the name of the City of Plymouth, for the purpose of abating, removing, correcting or discontinuing such nuisance and related fire hazard.

Section 17. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 3 of Act 279 P.A. 1909 as amended by Act 14 P.A. 1960 (Sec. 5,2073 M.S.A.), the latest fire prevention code of 1960 of the National Board of Fire Underwriters is hereby adopted by reference; provided, however, that in case any provision of said code shall differ from any requirement of this ordinance or any other ordinance or code imposing the highest standards of safety shall be followed and enforced, and; provided, further, that "Chief of the Fire Department" or "Chief of the Bureau of Fire Prevention" or the "Bureau of Fire Prevention" as used in said code shall mean the Director of Public Safety or the Fire Marshal or office of Fire of Public Safety or the Fire Marshal or office of Fire Marshal, as the case may be.

Section 18. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provision of this ordinance, or who shall fail to comply therewith, or with any lawful order or notice of the Fire Marshal in relation to the matters and this section. ters and things therein contained, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before any court of competent jurisdiction shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or by imprisonment for a period of not to exceed ninety (90) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court. Each and every day on which any violation continues shall constitute a separate offense. Provided, however, that action for enforcement of this ordinance by way of imposition of a penalty as hereinbefore provided shall not in any way impair or affect the powers hereinbefore granted to apply to the Circuit Court for abatement of a nuisance, or the removal of the court for abatement of a nuisance, or the removal of any hazardous conditions.

Section 19. Any ordinance, or part of any ordinance, which may be in conflict herewith, is hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 20. In the event any phrase, clause, sentence, or section of this ordinance is declared illegal or invalid in any final adjudication by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining parts of this ordinance shall be deemed to have been adopted and shall continue in full force and effect without such illegal or invalid provision.

Section 21. This ordinance, for brevity, may be cited, pleaded and referred to and may be amended by the short title of 'Ordinance No. 275, Fire Prevention Ordinance of the City of Plymouth, Michigan."

Section 22. This ordinance shall become operative and effective on the 14th day of March A.D., 1961.

double duct for the whiskey set ...



¼ Italian (sweet) vermouth • ¾ bourbon or rye dash Angostura bitters Stir with cracked ice, strain. Serve with cherry.

WHISKEY SOUR

14 jigger lemon juice • 1 tsp. powdered sugar jigger (1½ oz.) bourbon or rye

Shake well with cracked ice, and strain into glass. Serve with an orange slice and cherry.

Dour faces will smile when you serve a sour made with Southern Comfort, $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp powdered sugar, and less lemon.

TODDY

1 lump sugar • dash Angostura bitters 1 oz. water • 2 oz. bourbon, scotch or rye





PRETZEL PICK-UPS


Slice stuffed green olives in half crosswise. Place on top of tangy cheese or luncheon meat cubes and spear together with thin pretzel sticks.



MARGARITA

1 oz. Cuervo tequila • ¼ oz. Triple Sec 1 oz. lime or lemon juice

Shake with cracked ice. Moisten glass rim with fruit rind, spin rim in salt. Sip over the salted edge.

DAIQUIRI ®

juice of ½ lime or lemon • 1 tsp. powdered sugar jigger (1½ oz.) light rum

Shake with cracked ice 'til shaker frosts, and strain.
