

When you travel abroad you must take some health precautions which are not necessary if you stay at home, Dr. Joseph G. Molner, City-County Health Commissioner, says. If you follow a few health precautions, your travel can be pleasant and healthful.

Some diseases which are little known to most Americans are common in other parts of the world, particularly in the tropical and subtropical countries. These diseases include yellow fever, cholera, smallpox and typhus. Vaccination helps to keep travelers from catching these diseases and bringing them back to others in this coun-

Smallpox vaccination is required by the United States government for everyone who wishes to return to this country and many other countries require smallpox vaccination before you visit them. Requirements for vaccination against other diseases differ according to the country visited. It is extremely impor-tant that you follow immunization requirements and recommendations. These measures protect you, people in the countries you visit and the American people after you return. By meeting these requirements early, you may avoid delays and interruptions in your travel.

Make sure that you start your vaccinations well in advance of your travel date so that they can be spaced correctly and allow time for your body to build up resistance. Immunizations required by governments must be recorded in the "International Certificates of Vaccinational Certi tion" form, because this is the only way they will be accepted. You will be given one of these forms with your pass-port application and many travel agents and transportation companies furnish this certificate form also.

See your physician for your immunizations and have a physical examination. Ask him for medicines you may need in an emergency for motion sickness or for dysentery. If you are taking medicine for some physical condition, ask your doctor about an extra supply or a prescrip-

Departments of Health do not give immunizations for foreign travel, but your own physician does this. The De-partment of Health does verify vaccinations with the approved stamp of the Health Department.

If babies must travel abroad, the pediatrician should be consulted to see if he wishes to change the formula for one more adaptable to traveling.

If you are traveling in a hot climate or where the humidity or altitudes are high, be moderate in your activi-

Water and food contamination by insanitary handling can expose you to such infections as dysentery, so be careful about using unboiled drinking water, ice, raw fruit and vegetables, raw milk and dairy products. Do not take their safety for granted. It is wise to check with travel agencies, consular officers and local health officers for particular information. When you are in doubt, follow this rule: "Eat no raw fruit or vegetable if its skin is broken, or if you yourself have not washed and peeled it just

In 1955 I compiled an anthology called Max Shulman's Guided Tour of Campus Humor. Then, in 1956, after many alarums and false starts, I finally buckled down to write the book that had been gnawing at the base of my skull for years. It was Rally Round The Flag, Boys, and I still like it. Whatever its faults-and it has plenty-it is the only book I ever wrote that came out exactly as I planned it.

In October, 1959, I made my maiden voyage into television with my old friend Dobie Gillis. I am pleased to report that the show is still around every Tuesday on CBS.

Beat egg-yolk mixture until very thick and of same consistency as the creamed butter. Cool completely. Beat egg-yolk mixture, about 2 table-spoonfuls at a time, into butter until just blended. Adding gradually, beat in chocolate and hazelnuts. Set in refrigerator to chill until 3 cups frosting ready to use.


