The Korean Veterans and the increased birth rate of the '40's convinced educators that a real problem was in the making. Projections indicated that by 1965 colleges would be swamped with students.

All Michigan colleges nearly doubled and the 16 community colleges nearly tripled their enrollments from 1953 to 1960. This growth caused State and local groups to become concerned. The Michigan Legislature authorized a study which recommended, among other things, the establishment of at least three more community colleges in Wayne County -one to be in our area. When several studies, conducted locally, appeared to verify these conclusions, it was decided to request the school boards to look further into the matter.



Perennials, however, do not

last forever, though some are practically indestructible. Peonies, for instance, have been known to grow in one place for over 100 years, still producing flowers every year. Columbines, on the other h a n d, particularly the new hybrid sorts, last two or three years in the garden, then die out. But they are so beautiful that their short life is forgiven.

There are innumerable perennials for your garden, as you'll find out if you visit your local member of the Michigan Association of Nurservmen.

People who already have groupings of these sturdy plants know which they want to add this year. But for new gardeners, the choice is so wide that some advice is needed.

A perennial border or bed is best when built around certain perennials which have either extra good foliage, or an exceptionally long flowering time, plus ease of growth. These "backbone" peren-nials are generally considered
