





In the early 1950's it became clear that by 1965 our colleges would be in

the middle of a crisis. At that time it seemed impossible that within a few years twice as many people would be seeking higher education.

The predictions, if anything, were on the low side. All colleges began to tighten their educational admission policies several years ago. This tightening has progressed to the point where in some of our largest public universities students with lower than a B plus average are not given consideration. This, of course, excludes the student who could have succeeded a few years ago if given a chance, and could succeed now with the same chance.

. . . .

The fact is that several things have happened: Twice as many babies are born yearly now as were born in 1940, and,

Twice the percentage of youth of college are are actually enrolling in college compared with 1940.

We have added facilities to care for a growth of only 25 percent when twice the students means a doubling of facilities.

To the careful observer it is obvious that if our society is to survive, (which means if you and I are to survive) the only answer is to provide the education we need to do what our

society needs. It is obvious that we must husband our resources, not spend money for education without getting value received. We must not hinder the development of our most valuable natural resource - our young people.

If this job is to be done, we must do it at the local level. That is why the community college is a timely solution to our difficulties. We must not close the college door in Northwest Wayne County. We must vote for the establishment of a community college on June 12.

When your spine tingles or the heart palpitates a bit, you know you're in the presence of a great actress. Miss Kelly does all of that to you. Too bad the Maxwell Anderson play couldn't have said a bit more. At times the play seemed as loosely constructed as an amateurish first attempt.

Nevertheless, the Drama Season in Ann Arbor proved that a capable actress with the able assistance of six other professionals can do wonders for a weak play.
