tion whose current project is to help establish Distribution Services, Inc. (D.S.I.) in the former Daisy Manufacturing Co. plant. It was the Plymouth Community Industrial Development Corp. that was

instrumental in bringing the Detroit firm here to fill the long-empty Daisy plant. And after commitments are fulfilled with D.S.I., the non-profit corporation wants to turn its sights on other projects.

300 people in this corporation, making it a real community effort," Harold Guenther, chairman of the campaign said this week.

The Development Corp. has made a commitment of \$30,000 to loan D.S.I. for making capital improvements in the old air rifle plant. The Development Corp. has already obtained substantial loans from 20 individuals and businesses, larger than the \$25

D.S.I. is purchasing the property from Daisy, now located in Rogers, Ark. It was a similar development corporation in Arkansas which three years ago lured Daisy away from

Wherever the issue comes up these days, there is bitterness, name calling, smears, hate campaigns, wild charges and counter charges, distortions and outright lies. Before it is all over, there is likely to be rancor between friends and neighbors, division within civic and social clubs, professional organizations, even scientific groups.

No matter who starts the movement, the deluge is soon No matter who starts the movement, the deluge is soon on. Any local opposition is instantly reinforced by help from outside the city. The governing body is pressured to kill the whole idea. If that maneuver fails, it is practically forced to put the issue to a vote of the people although most city governments have the power to decide public health matters just as they have the power to establish fire departments. When an election is called, an acrimonious campaign is bound to ensue, and through a combination of factors the opposition all too often wins.

Plymouth City **Commission Minutes**

A regular meeting of the City Commission was held in the Commission Chamber of the City Hall on Monday, August 7, 1961 at 7:30 P.M., PRESENT: Comms. Beyer, Houk, Shear and Mayor Sincock. ABSENT: Comms. Hartmann, Terry and Wernette. Since Comms. Hartmann, Terry and Wernette were out of town, their absences were excused by the Commission.

Moved by Comm. Shear and supported by Comm. Houk that the minutes of the regular meeting of July 17 and the special meeting of July 24, 1961 be approved as written.

Since Supervisor Vallier was out of town, no report was made. The Clerk presented a communication from the U.S. Department of Interior offering to cooperatively maintain a recording station with the City of Plymouth for the continuous collection of basic hydrologic data for the city's water supply, at a cost of \$600 for the first year and \$400 per year thereafter, with 50 per cent of the cost to be borne by the U.S. Geological Survey.

Moved by Comm. Houk and supported by Comm. Beyer that the city avail itself of the services of the U.S. Department of Interior for the collection of basic hydrologic data, as recommended by the City Manager and D.P.W. Supt.

Carried unanimously. The Clerk presented a communication from the Rotary Club of Plymouth requesting permission to use Kellogg Park on Sunday, September 10, 1961 from noon to six p.m. for its Fall Festival, and to place a banner in the park previous to the festival.

Moved by Comm. Houk and supported by Comm. Beyer that permission be given the Rotary Club of Plymouth to use kellogg Park and Penniman Avenue from S. Main Street to Union Street and to place a banner in the park advertising the festival to be held on Sunday, September 10, 1961.

The Clerk presented a communication from McNamee, Porter & Seeley recommending the use of a small booster pump to activate the Byron Street emergency water tower, in order to keep the water turned over periodically. The communication was ordered accepted and filed and the matter referred to the City Manager for further study

The Clerk presented a communication from Dunbar Davis, representing property owners involved in the Central Parking Lot Assessment Project requesting a survey to be made of the number of parking spaces needed by each of the existing businesses for comparison with the number of existing spaces as well as the number of planned spaces. Moved by Comm. Shear and supported by Comm. Beyer that the communication be received and filed for consideration.

Carried unanimously The Clerk presented a communication from the Police Department sion recommending the vacating of two alleys in the block bounded by S. Holbrook Avenue, Park Drive, George Street and Union Street. Moved by Comm. Shear and supported by Comm. Beyer that the commission deems it advisable to vacate said two alleys in the block bounded by S. Holbrook Avenue, Park Drive, George Street and Union Street and set a hearing for September 5, 1961 at 8:00 P.M. for hearing objections to the vacating of said alleys.

Carried unanimously. The Clerk presented a communication from the Plymouth Rotary Foundation requesting a contribution to the Park Fund to be used for beautifying Kellogg Park. Moved by Comm. Beyer and supported by Comm. Houk that the City contribute \$100.00 to the Plymouth Rotary Foundation Park Fund, said funds to be appropriated from Unappropriated Reserve.

The Clerk presented a communication from the Plymouth Vending Company requesting permission to obtain a building permit for his building on Davis Street, providing the building ban is not lifted by the State Health Department.
