Maxmilian's featured a swooping cape sleeve coat, Larry Kaye showed a feminine bolero with rolled elbow sleeves and Olli's displayed no less than eight variations of the 'precious fur for the precious few,' Empress Chinchilla. It was from these breath-taking New York showings that Mrs. Edward Trapp of Meadowbrook Rd., Northville, recently returned more enthusiastic than ever about the small South American rodent that gives his shirt, or pelt if you will, to make the lovely fur garments women the world over consider the zenith of fur fashion elegance.

The round, amazingly soft, black shoe-buttoned-eyed little animal was first introduced in this country 1923 when Mathias F. Chapman explored the possibilities of raising the little fur-bearers in captivity. With patient care and experimenting the American Chinchilla herd gradually increased and today is raised from one end of the United States to the other including Alaska and Hawaii.

The gentle little animal puzzles the onlooker who tries to categorize him in his similarities to the rabbit, the chipmunk and the squirrel. Of course he is none of these. In fact, his nearest North American relative is the porcupine.

Chinchilla ranchers are beset by a variety of problems that belies the common notion that raising 'Chins' is a short-cut to a quick fortune. Not only does the docile animal require much care but constant vigilance is the watchword to guard against ill health. A constant temperature not in excess of 80 degrees is the ideal climate. The rancher also must be watchful for the many and various diseases to which this small rodent might fall prey. One of the most common is his susceptibility to colds and ensuing pneumonia. Quite probably the temperament of the rancher must be considered a prime factor in the fur producing industry, too, for without patience and a certain affection for animals and their needs the whole project might be doomed.

For a full-length coat of the highly desirable bluish-grey fur, a vast amount of pelts are used. The lavish look for Autumn 1961 of the opulet Empress Chinchilla coat pictured here, designed by Christie Brothers, retails in the elite neighborhood of \$12,000. While the jacket, 'Chinchilla Crescent', created from Lawrence Kaye's design, could be purchased for a mere \$5,000.

Farmers who are participating in one or more of the national farm programs administered locally by Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation farmer-committeemen were reminded today that community elections are now taking place.

Such participation is required in order to be eligible to cast a ballot for the men a farmer wants to represent him on the committee. Eligible voters must also (1) have an interest in a farm as owner, tenant, or sharecropper if they are of legal voting age, or (2) be in charge of the supervision and conduct of the farming operations on an entire farm if they are not of legal voting age.

Programs administered by the ASC county and community committees include acreage allotments, marketing quotas, commodity loans, the feed grain program, the Sugar Act program, the National Wool program, the Agricultural Conservation program, the Conservation Reserve program, farm storage facility loans, and others as assigned by the Secretary of Agriculture.

 but he was asked by the circulator if he didn't believe in democracy.

Commissioner Marvin Terry declared that he would do everything in his power to keep the question from getting on the ballot. He then cited a newspaper article quoting the surgeon general of the U.S. telling how opponents of fluoridation have

been effectively defeating such ballot proposals in most communities with "scare tactics."

"If we could get 100 per cent of the voters out, I would say 'yes' to a vote," Terry said. "But you people (opponents) will get out all of your people and pour money into the campaign while those in favor of it will sit at home."

Dr. Ashton maintained that "no matter what the question or subject, the people have a right to say what they want to reject or accept. This is democracy."

City Attorney Edward Draugelis noted that "democracy is a form of representative government, and as elected representatives, the Commission has the right to do what they feel is best for the people."

Dr. Ashton countered that as a chiropractic physician, he would be prosecuted if he wrote a prescription, for this would be practicing medicine. "Certainly this commission, with the exception of Commissioner Boyer (a druggist), isn't qualified to administer medicine but yet, that is precisely what you are doing by placing fluorides into the water."



**The Mail Attitude**

BY PAUL CHANDLER

When the Community College proposal last was on the ballot, a considerable amount of counterfeit "information" was circulated by professional poisoners in the Redford Township area. This bogus material can be blamed partly for the plan losing at the polls in the two Redford school districts, whereas at the same time it was heavily supported by voters in four other school districts, including Livonia and Plymouth.

One of the canards tossed about in Redford was that Wayne State University (and possibly others) would be eager to come out and establish freshman and sophomore classes of their own in our local area.

With the matter now coming to the ballot again in October, formal answers were sought from Wayne and the U. of M. Dearborn branch as to what they might be prepared to offer in the Livonia-Plymouth-Redford area in the way of early college instruction.

The answers, in writing from top officials of both institutions, are that they can offer nothing here.

Here are parts of two letters. The first is from Wayne, the second from U. of M. Dearborn branch: Dr. Eric Bradner, Coordinator Proposed Northwest Wayne County Community College

Dear Dr. Bradner: "I regret that there is any misunderstanding or misconception concerning Wayne State University's position regarding the growing need for opportunities in higher education in Livonia and neighboring communities. I believe that Dean Bright and his colleagues explained this position clearly in the conference with the group of interested citizens and school officials who met here on Aug. 9, 1961.

"Neither for this year, nor next year, nor perhaps for years to come will the College of Liberal Arts be in a position to conduct credit courses in the suburban areas. The College's limited human and financial resources can be used more effectively here in our campus facilities, and we feel a public responsibility to use them as efficiently as possible. Many students from Livonia and other suburban communities now come to Wayne and we hope that this will continue to be the pattern.

"As you know, Wayne State University has taken a leadership role in studying and supporting the development of community colleges at appropriate locations within the Six County area, and our long-range educational planning (established at the time Wayne became a state university) is based upon the assumption that community colleges or junior colleges will be established in this area during the next few years.

"Even if Wayne State had the resources for such off-campus courses, our long established selective admissions policy would not enable us to meet the full educational needs of Livonia and neighboring communities."

Winfred A. Harbison Vice President for Academic Administration Wayne State University

Dear Mr. Bradner:

"As you know, I was most disappointed when the initial planning for the establishment of a community college in northwest Wayne County did not achieve support from the six original planning communities. I am, however, most gratified to know that this initial setback has not deterred you as is evidenced by the significant support that is evolving for the concept of a community college in northwest Wayne County, based now on the participation of four communities.

"The operational pattern of the University of Michigan has been to offer every aid, comfort and in the State.

"In every instance where the University of Michigan has had occasion to extend its instructional programs through facilities outside the Ann Arbor campus, we have established such programs on the premise that the local communities would, through the support of the community college, provide the first two years of collegiate instruction.

"I hope very much that there will be a community college established in northwest Wayne County and I would be very pleased if the demonstration of support and cooperation which the University of Michigan has exhibited here at the Dearborn Center would be helpful in achieving the establishment of a community college in northwest Wayne County.

"I hope you will feel very free to indicate this position. I do not hesitate to take advantage of every opportunity to add our encouragement and endorsement to your undertaking.

Another of the falsehoods which traveled around Redford was that the Community College campus somehow was destined to be located as part of a "Livonia civic center" development, ostensibly as part of the City Hall complex there.

That might or might not be a bad idea.

But the simple truth is that it never was, is not now, and never will be located there. The private citizens who have worked for years on this project never once had such a plan suggested to them. It never even has been discussed at a formal meeting.

The technique of the "Big Lie" rarely has been as crudely used as it was in Redford Township during that recent College election.

The plan now proceeds with both Redford districts left out. The losers are the thousands of youngsters who will be graduating from Thurston and Redford Union High Schools in subsequent years.
