



Chinchilla ranchers are beset by a variety of of problems that belies the common notion that raising 'Chins' is a short-cut to a quick fortune. Not only does the docile animal require much care but constant vigilance is the watchword to guard against ill health. A constant temperature not in excess of 80 degrees is the ideal climate. The rancher also must be watchful for the many and various diseases to which this small rodent might fall prey. One of the most common is his susceptibility to colds and ensuing pneumonia. Quite probably the temperament of the rancher must be considered a prime factor in the fur producing industry, too, for without patience and a certain affection for animals

and their needs the whole project might be doomed. For a full-length coat of the highly desirable bluish-grey fur, a vast amount of pelts are used. Ronald Johnstone of Ann Arbor will continue to serve as pastor of the congregation.


Pastor Johnstone states that plans are now being made to purchase property in the southwest section of Plymouth as a site for future location of the congregation.
