# Family Of 6 Routed **By Fire**

It was around 2:28 a.m. last Wednesday morning when something aroused Mrs. Gerald Gondek. She smelled smoke and she woke her husband.

Mr. Gondek rushed through the smoke-choked upstairs hallway at the 1158 S. Main St. home and opened the attic door. The attic was filled with flames and he wisely slammed the door.

Arousing their four children, the couple fled the house as Mr. Gondek called the Fire Department.

Outside, they were greeted by the bitter winter cold. Local thermometers registered 11 degrees below zero!

Fire broke through the roof soon after firemen arrived. Ventilating the upstairs by opening windows, firemen
