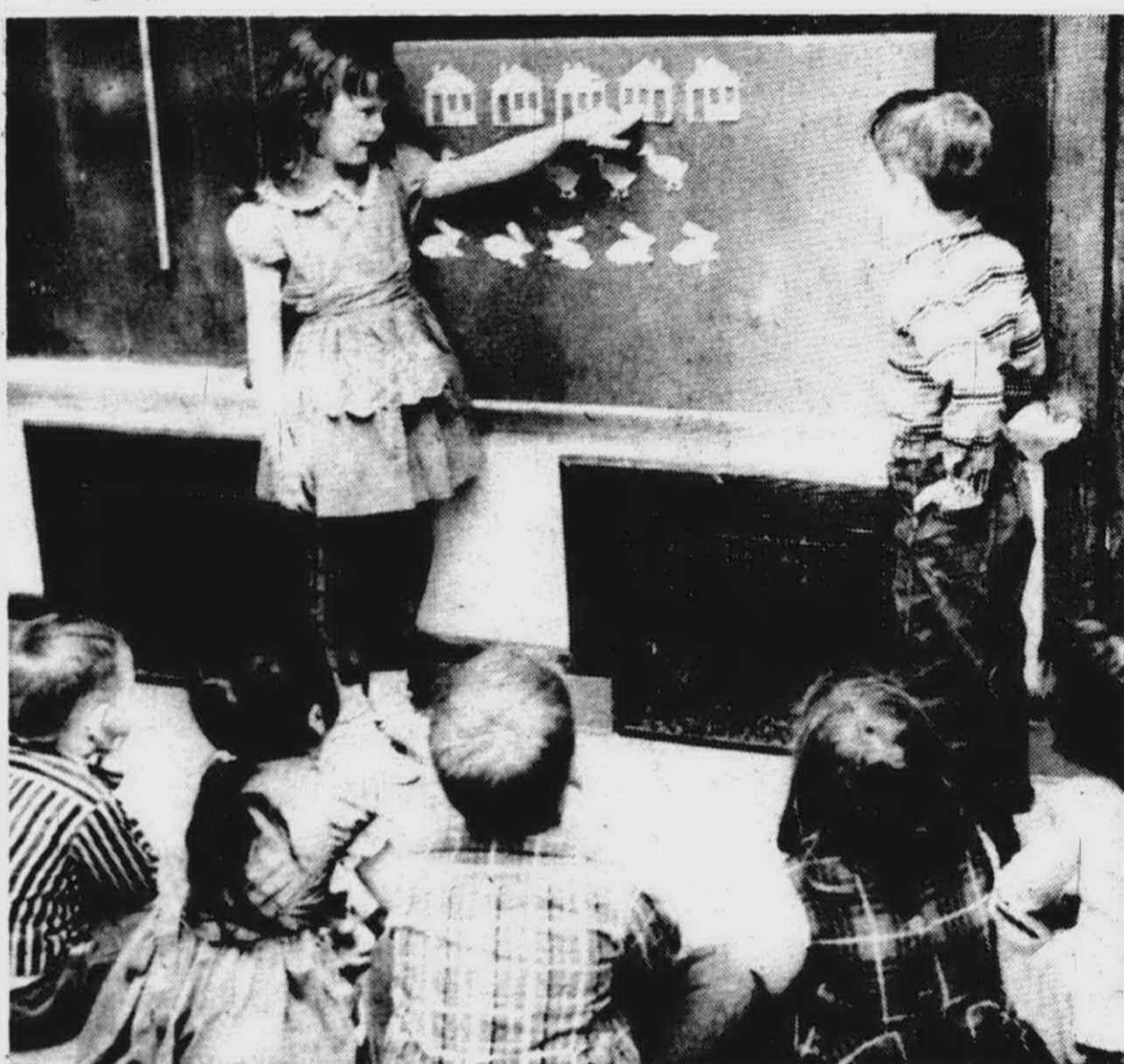

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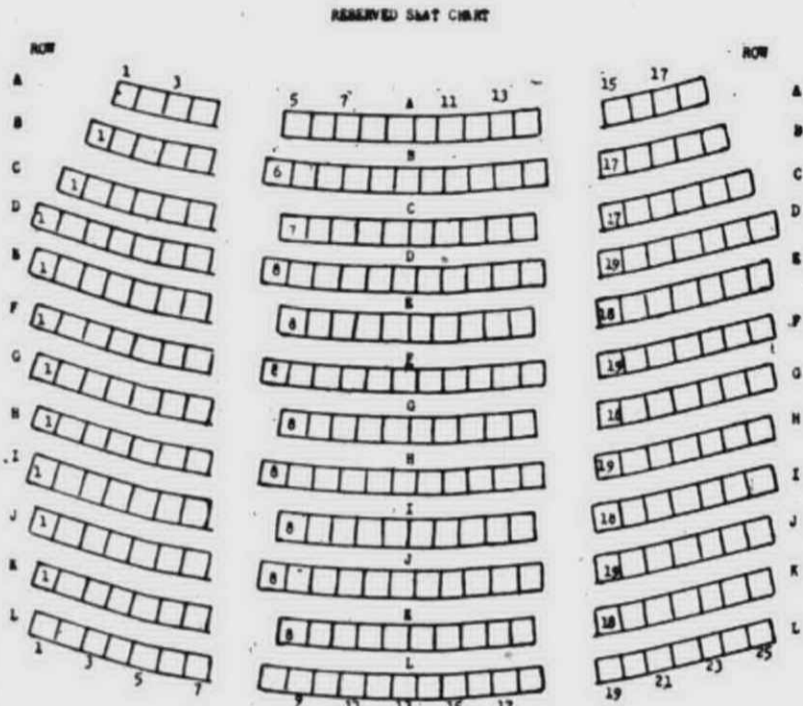
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Can Now Reserve Seats For Next Guild Play

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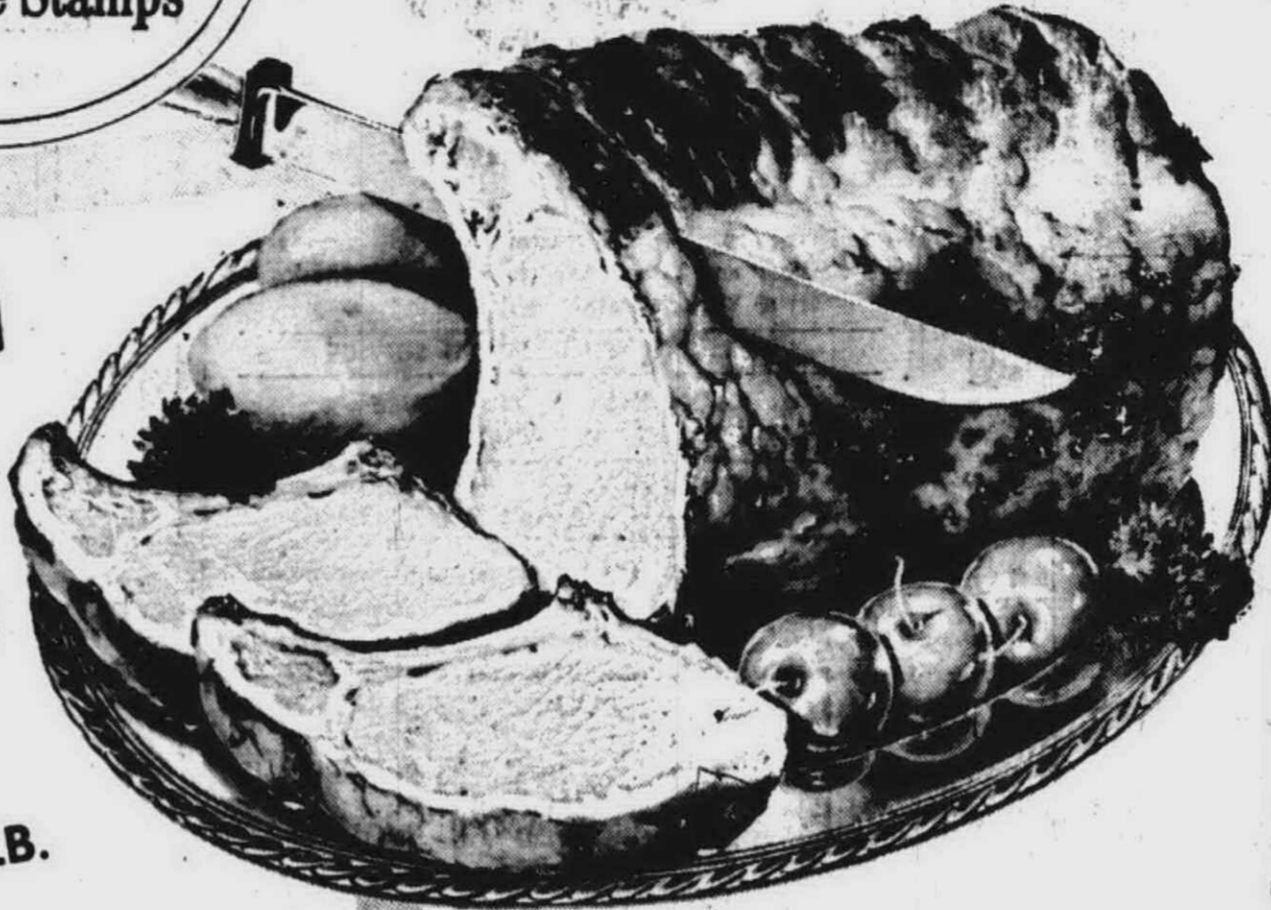

## Plymouth Finds Favorite "Port"

Trenton will be remembered as Plymouth's favorite "port in the storm" long after the 1961-62 Suburban Six basketball race has ended.

Once again, the Rocks found Trenton to be a particularly friendly opponent. It was as true last Friday evening as it was in mid-January.

Friday Plymouth defeated Trenton, 71-54, behind a 20-point fourth quarter explosion. Five weeks ago, the Rocks measured the league's cellar-dwelling team by a 54-42 margin.

The Rocks, who have won only five games this winter out of 14 attempts, have claimed two victories over Trenton and these two decisions have kept Plymouth out of the league's basement.

Plymouth also reached its largest point total of the winter Friday night. With 71 points, the Rocks climbed above the 70 mark for the first time. Previous best game performance was 63 in a loss to Allen Park.

The game with Trenton started slowly. Plymouth forged a 13-11 first period edge but Trenton's rally just before intermission tied it at 29-29.

The lead changed hands several times in the third quarter until Plymouth started its move. At the beginning of the fourth period, the Rocks led 51-46.

A 20-point outburst in the closing quarter sewed it up for the Plymouth cagers. It was the Rocks second victory in a row and the second time this winter the Rocks have tied two wins together.

Dan Stremick, who played cautiously throughout the second half after collecting three personal fouls in the first half, paced Plymouth with 20 points. Mike Kisabeth added 17 points to the winners' cause.

Dick Schryer and Tom Lock each had nine more for the Rocks.

Trenton was hurt badly in the third period when Dick Helmling and Jim Hart both fouled out. They had been strong for Trenton under both boards and had kept the score as close as it was.

Their absence made matters easier for the Rocks.

It was much the result of free throws that Plymouth captured its first victory. The Rocks scored 21 of 35 charity tosses, whereas Trenton managed only 10 of 20. High scorer for the losers was Dave Henegar with 15 points.

Charlie Ketterer, Plymouth coach, was pleased with the victory and commended his cagers.

"We've been close all winter long," he said, "and it's good for the

boys to win a couple like this."

(Arch-rival Bentley High had bowed 43-33 a week previous.)

here Friday night at 8 p.m. Redford Union, a one-time title hopeful this winter, lost all chance of any part of the cage crown as Allen Park last Friday trimmed the Panthers by 20 points.

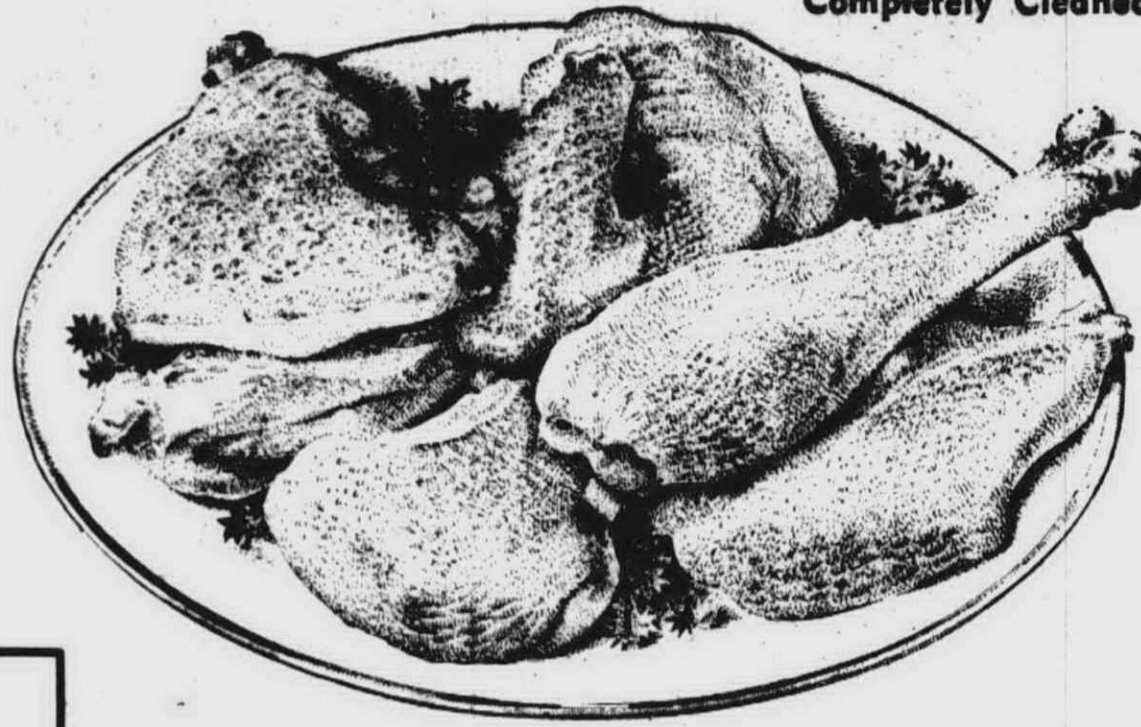

# Swimmers Gain Revenge, 55-46

While the outcome of the Suburban Six league swimming meet (March 2 and 3) has been a question mark most of the season, it took on further mystery last week. The occasion was Plymouth's 55-46 defeat of Trenton.

The significance of Plymouth's victory was found only in the fact that it was Trenton six weeks ago that upset the Rocks by a narrow 53-52 margin.

For some time this winter, Trenton has held a slender edge as far as being favored to win the league meet is concerned. But no more.

Plymouth's victory — it's 10th in 44 dual-meet outings this season — evaporated much of Trenton's heir-apparent title. Never — the — less, Ply-

mouth cannot claim the favorite's role despite having beaten Trenton with comparative ease in the recent re-match.

We'll have to wait and see," remarked Coach John McFall as he looked only as far ahead as Redford Union, final dual-meet opponent on Plymouth's 1961-62 schedule. Redford Union hosts Plymouth on Thursday.

To make matters more complicated, Bentley High will have something to say about the league meet, too, even though the Rocks have dumped the Bulldogs twice this season.

Against Trenton last Thursday, Plymouth was not thinking so much about the league meet as about gaining revenge for the earlier defeat.

The Rocks gained only five firsts in the individual events, pointing out exactly how close the meet was. The two schools shared relay honors, as Trenton claimed the 200-yard medley and Plymouth won the 200-yard free.

## Bounty Fees Total \$238,500

A record \$238,500 in hunting and fishing license money was used to pay fox, coyote and bobcat bounties in Michigan last year, the Conservation Department reports.

The Department's 1961 bounty payment was nearly \$12,000 above the previous all-time high set the year before.

Accounting for the increase were payments on foxes which hit a new high as 34,255 of these animals were bountied for \$171,275. In 1960, trappers and hunters collected \$146,205 on foxes.

The bounty bill for 3,638 coyotes was \$63,460; payments on 753 bobcats totaled \$3,765. These figures are down from 1960 when 4,328 coyotes were bountied for \$75,445 and payments on 1,016 bobcats amounted to \$5,080. Bobcats are bountied only in the upper peninsula.

## Where's The Ice Machine?

Recreation hockey officials were befuddled this week at the disappearance of their ice re-surfacing machine, used to renew the ice on the rink behind the high school.

Jim McKindies, who was instrumental in obtaining the rink and the re-surfacing machine, said that he first noticed it missing last Wednesday, Feb. 14.

He and other officials called around the city, hoping to locate the machine. But they were unable to do so and have turned the matter over to the authorities.

The machine's disappearance prompted the cancellation of two regularly scheduled games last Sunday.

## Favorite Recipes from Plymouth Kitchens



WAITING FOR A taste of their great grandmother's rhubarb cream pie are David, 12, Tom, 11, and Mary Kay, 5, children of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Ellis of Birmingham. Mrs. Nellie Bird's recipe is the combination of several rhubarb pie recipes.

This may not be the rhubarb season, but that doesn't bother people who love it well enough to store away a supply in the freezer during the summer. Mrs. Nellie Bird, 217 Ann St., happens to be a rhubarb lover and keeps a frozen supply on hand. And one of the most delicious uses to which rhubarb can be put is the following recipe:

**Rhubarb Cream Pie**  
 1 1/2 cups sugar  
 3 tbs. flour  
 1/2 tsp. nutmeg  
 1/2 tsp. grated orange rind  
 1 tbs. butter (melted)  
 3 beaten egg yolks  
 3 cups cut rhubarb  
 1/2 tsp. salt

Blend all above ingredients together, then add rhubarb. Put in pastry lined pan. Bake 10 minutes at 450 degrees.

Then turn heat to 325 degrees and bake 30 minutes.

Cover with beaten egg whites, sweetened, and bake 15 minutes.

There's only one thing wrong with this pie, Mrs. Bird finds. It doesn't last long when her great grandchildren are around. Mrs. Bird, whose recipe is the combination of several recipes, was visited by her great grandchildren, David, Tom and Mary Kay Ellis of Birmingham the day she baked this pie last week.

Mrs. Bird would naturally like having children around, since she spent a great share of her life as a school teacher and principal.

She began teaching in a two room school at Frains Lake (west of Plymouth) and then came to Plymouth. Twenty-seven years were as principal of the Central Grade School, and six years as a teacher.

She is a member of Phi Lambda Theta honorary society. Mrs. Bird received her bachelor's degree at Eastern Michigan and master's degree at the University of Michigan. One of the finest tributes that could be paid an educator happened when they named a school in her honor — the Nellie E. Bird Elementary School.

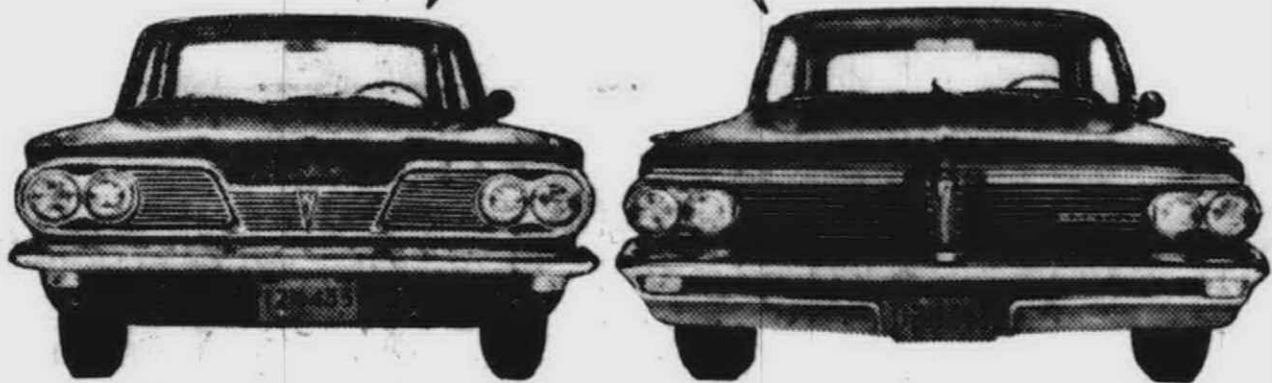

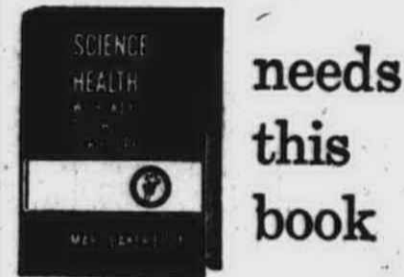
He will speak on the topic, "Are the Christian Churches United?"

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# Local Junior Achievement Fund Campaign Still Lags

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# Plymouth Cab Quits As Checker Cab Co. Begins

The Checker Cab Co. of Livonia and Detroit began its operations in Plymouth last Thursday and at noon the Plymouth Cab Co. ceased operations.

Checker Cab, operated by Richard Pittman, had obtained four taxi permits two weeks ago from the City Commission. At that time, Commissioners read a report from the Police Department detailing the deficiencies of the Plymouth Cab Company's vehicles.

Plymouth Cab, which has been in operation here many years under a chain of ownerships, had moved from a downtown location last year to a Main St. service station. Checker Cab obtained permission for temporary use of

part of the Chamber of Commerce office as their headquarters and brought in four new cabs. Business was reported "booming" during the first day and at noon the Plymouth Cab Co. announced that it was ceasing operations.

The condition of the Plymouth Cab vehicles brought about the City Commission's decision to allow another taxi firm to begin business here. Public Safety Director Kenneth Fisher told Commissioners that the only reason that

the police department allowed the taxis to remain on the streets here was because of the many residents who absolutely depended upon them for transportation. Typical of the reports made on the three taxis in operation

was this one on Cab No. 2. It listed these 13 defects: "Front end is very bad — wheels out of line. Speedometer does not work. Rear of front seat torn loose. No tail-pipe — car smokes badly — fumes enter car. Brakes need

adjusting. Tires — fair. Tail lights both need red lens. Tail lights stay on all the time. Stoplights do not work. Turn indicators do not work. Horn does not work. Emergency brake does not work. Clutch needs adjusting."

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**AMENDMENT NO. 4  
DOG ORDINANCE  
AS AMENDED  
TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE**

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE POSSESSING, HARBORING, OWNERSHIP AND RUNNING AT LARGE OF DOGS; TO PROVIDE FOR THEIR VACCINATION AND FOR THE DESTRUCTION OF VICIOUS AND DISEASED DOGS IN THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE; TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

The Township of Northville ordains:

**SECTION 1.** That the Dog Ordinance of the Township of Northville is hereby amended by amending Section 2, thereof, to read as follows:

**SECTION 2.**

(a) Upon application filed with the Township Clerk on or before the 1st day of June, 1962 and the 1st day of June in each calendar year thereafter, giving the full name and residence of the applicant and the name, breed, age, sex, and color and markings of the dog, accompanied by a statement or certificate of a licensed veterinary surgeon showing that the dog has been vaccinated and immunized against rabies within six (6) months preceding the date of application, there shall be issued to each applicant a license to own or harbor the dog described in the application within the Township for the term commencing from the 1st day of June and terminating the last day of May following, excepting as herein otherwise provided.

(b) When the dog is vaccinated with modified live rabies virus of chick embryo origin, proof of vaccination within two years preceding the date of the application for license shall be deemed compliance with Section 2 (a) of this Ordinance, as amended.

**SECTION II.** All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

**SECTION III.** Should any section, clause or provision of this Ordinance be declared to be invalid, or shall certain applications of any part of this Ordinance be deemed invalid or unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole, or any part thereof other than the part or applications so held to be invalid or unconstitutional.

**SECTION IV.** The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect upon the expiration of thirty (30) days after publication in the manner prescribed by law.
