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Cagers Upset Redford Union

Redford Union, presumably the second-best team in the Suburban Six basketball conference despite the standings, came away second best to Plymouth last Friday night as the regular season ended here.

The Rocks overcame a seven-point shortcoming in the third period and surged on to a 51-48 victory over visiting Redford Union, which at one time seemed an odds-on favorite to claim the league championship.

But as a result of its loss to Plymouth last weekend, Redford Union closed out the league's basketball activities this winter with a mediocre 5-5 record, far below title-winner Allen Park's 8-2 mark.

Redford Union, after an impressive early season display, faded so badly that it finished the campaign only one notch

above fifth-place Plymouth. The Rocks fashioned a 4-6 conference mark, closing with three straight league victories.

Plymouth wanted to win Friday night. Trailing by seven (40-33) late in the third period, the Rocks put on a strong finishing performance to earn their sixth victory this season out of 15 games.

Plymouth splurged with 18 points in the final

quarter to pull ahead of the visiting Panthers. The Rocks dominated both boards in the second half and then hit on 11 of 30 field goal tries to upstage the Panthers.

Even Redford Union's spindly-legged center Len LaPla couldn't save the day. He wound up with only eight points for the evening after sitting on the bench for much of the game.

And when he was in the game, LaPla was closely collared by Plymouth's Dan Stremick or Dave Jensen.

It was as much Stremick's work as anyone that Plymouth scored this time. But the victory was also a team affair, as cage coach Charlie Ketterer was quick to point out after the game.

Ketterer two-platooned with the Rocks once again and it seemed to keep Plymouth sharp and alert.

Stremick's platoon engineered the second-half break-through that turned the tide. Eloy Menchaca and Mike Kisabeth eased Stremick's load considerably in the first platoon line-up and it was Dick Schryer once again who sparked the second platoon.

The victory, Plymouth's ninth out of 11 meets, was almost a perfect one. The Junior Rocks scored first and second in all but one of the individual events and capped the victory with wins in both relay events.

Only in the 100-yard breast-stroke did Plymouth fail to gain the maximum number of points. There, the Rocks claimed first place but Redford Union swept second and third.

(Since only two swimmers from each school compete in the individual events, the maximum points in each such event is eight, five for first place and three for second.)

"It was our best showing of the year," Workman remarked later. "We had the best individual improvement yet and we showed the desire-to-win that's so necessary."

Doug Breed and Bob Knapp were first and second, respectively, in the 400-yard freestyle, and Dick Berry and Bob Meyer added first and second in the 50-yard free.

Mike Drennan was first and Mike Britcher second in the 400-yard butterfly, and then Bob Williams was first in the 100-yard breast-stroke. (Gerry Scott was fourth in exhibition for Plymouth.)

Placing 1-2 in the 100-yard back-stroke for the Rocks were Dan Olsen and Mark Keith. Dan Cook was first in the 100-yard free with Bob Murdock second.

John Herter and Chuck Ruge swept the diving competition.

In the 200-yard individual medley, John Bowsman was first and Drennan was second. Berry won the 200-yard freestyle and Jeff Hoffman was second.

Not Many Horses on Salem Farms, But This One Has 22

While one can drive for many miles now a days through Salem Township's farmland without catching sight of a horse, there's a 44 acre farm on Seven Mile Rd. where 22 horses are found.

Charles Vaughn, who operates Vaughn's Acres at 10434 W. Seven Mile, doesn't exactly collect horses as a hobby. He trains, boards and breeds horses and right now feeds 22 of the animals, nine of which are his own.

Right now, Mr. Vaughn has three horses that he's training for harness races. Arriving every morning, except Sunday, at the Northville Downs track, he runs the horses 10 to 12 miles. He receives his horses when they are yearlings and begins by "ground driving" them with just a harness. After a few days of this, it is possible to hitch on the sulky.

Mr. Vaughn is busy from morning until night with the horses and he has two men working for him. Two of his own best race horses are in training this winter in Batavia, N.Y. Bob Whitlow, formerly of Plymouth, is keeping the two in shape.

One of them, Sunny Bird, won eight out of 15 races last year which is good enough to cause some attractive offers. Vaughn was offered \$30,000 for Sunny Bird, but decided to keep the horse.

A brother of Sunny Bird brought heartache to the Vaughn household last year for some reason he ran into a wire fence and was killed. The owner had been offered \$2,000 for this horse when it was only six months old.

But despite some attractive offers of big money once in a while, the job is not an easy one. "I hardly see him from morning until night, especially in the summer," Mrs. Vaughn declared.

The Vaughns have two sons, Charles, 6, and Leonard, 4, who love riding. "They both influence your final choice. Texture also affects wearing ability. A tight loop stands up best under heavy traffic. The combination loop and cut pile is least likely to mat down and variegated colors are the most practical as they do not show soil easily."

Buying Points For Carpets And Rugs

Many homemakers shopping for a new carpet or rug find themselves in a quandary. Have you ever wondered which rug fiber is best or how much you need to pay to receive good wearing qualities?

The first sign of good quality is the density of the pile the height and closeness of the yarns. The more yarn a carpet uses, the more it will cost and the longer it will wear. The yarns must be attached firmly to the base material.

Rachel Martens, home furnishings editor of the Farm Journal, gives these suggestions when buying carpeting. Cost per square yard is more important than the fiber content of the carpet. A \$10-a-square-yard wool carpet will give about the same wear as a man-made fiber costing the same price.

Before deciding on the price and fiber content of your next carpet, consider the amount of traffic the room encounters. For a room that gets very little traffic, such as a bedroom, carpeting costing under \$10 a square yard would be satisfactory.
