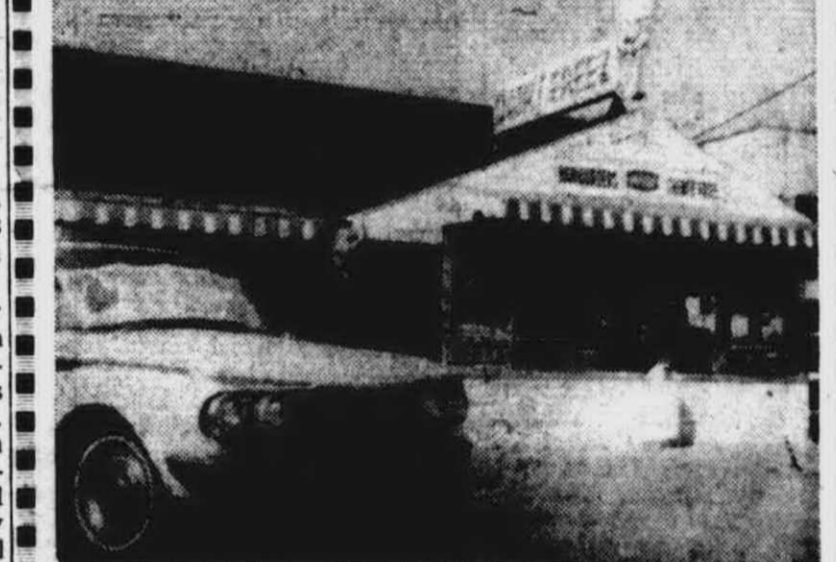

# PHS French Class Gets Real Taste of Language

A way to a man's heart is through his stomach, says the old cliché.

So it may not be too far wrong to surmise that the way to help students learn French is to feed them French food.

A complete menu of French food was served last week in the second year French class of teacher John Hopkins.

"Not only was it to teach them some French," Hopkins declared, "but it also had

another purpose. Some of the students have stereotyped ideas about foreign people, how they dress, what they eat and their habits. I thought maybe I could show them that foreign dishes could be just as good as American hot dogs and hamburgers."

The students voluntarily turned over their lunch money for the purchase of French food. All the products were made in France or in French-speaking countries, except two. These two, the bûche au rhum and salade cuite, were prepared by Mr. Hopkins' wife, Marie-Claire, a native of French Algeria.

A hot plate was brought into the room and the food heated up. But because the hot plate went dead, the meal was spread out over a period of several days.

"For the most part, they seemed to enjoy the food,"

Hopkins observed. The only exception seemed to be the pate d'anchois (anchovy paste) which has an appearance that is not too appetizing.

Here was the menu: Pate d'anchois (anchovy paste); Pate de foie gras aux truffes (goose liver paste with truffles); Vichyssoise (vichyssoise); Soup aux champignons (mushroom soup); Salade cuite a l'algerienne (Algerian cooked tomatoes with peppers).

Also, Filet de sole a la Newburgh (sole with Newburgh sauce); Fromage de Roquefort (Roquefort cheese); Riz au champagne (rice with champagne sauce); Sandwiches au fromage (cheese pretzels); Buche au rhum (log cake with rum flavor); Halvah (Arab candy).

There are 27 students in the class composed of sophomores, freshmen and seniors.

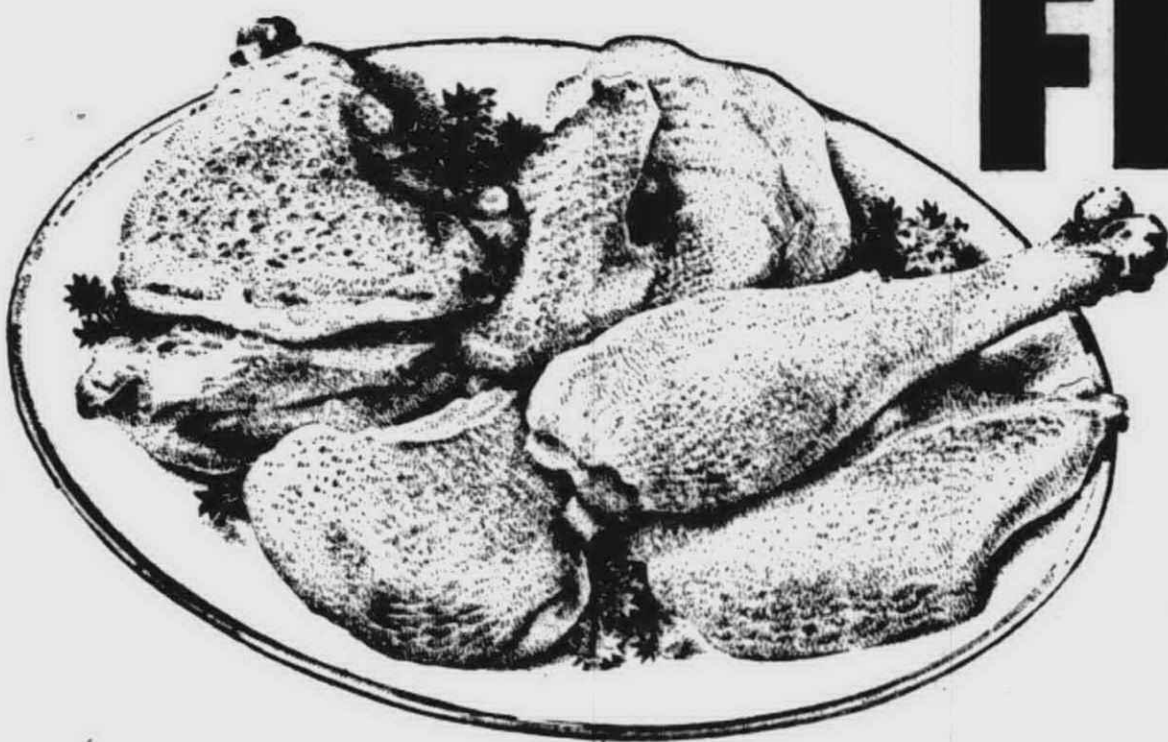

### Favorite Recipes from Plymouth Kitchens



Hildur Carlsson

Along with the memories she brought home from her recent trip to Sweden, Hildur Carlsson also carried several choice Swedish recipes. Finding it difficult to select one from the three she gave us, we decided to depart from the usual course and pass all of them along to you.

The two coffee breads need no introduction, for their appeal is universal. But the third recipe for Beet Relish is frequently used as a part of the traditional smorgasbord that habitually accompanies a Swedish meal. Says Miss Carlsson, "While most American cooks don't serve hors d'oeuvres with the average dinner, this tangy Beet Relish would harmonize nicely with most main course meat dishes."

**Pepparkaka**  
(Swedish Spice Cake)  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup melted butter  
2 eggs - separated  
1 cup sour cream  
2 cups flour  
1/2 tsp. soda

2 tbsp. cream  
1 cup flour  
1 tsp. baking powder  
3 or 4 cups apple pieces  
1/2 cup sugar sprinkled over the apples

Cream the sugar and butter thoroughly, add beaten eggs and cream, and sifted flour with baking powder. Place in a lightly greased round cake tin.  
"I find," said Miss Carlsson, "that juicy apples are best for the topping, and these should be cut in approximately 1 inch pieces and pressed into the torte batter. Sprinkle this with 1/2 cup sugar and bake in a 350 degree oven for 30 or 40 minutes."

**Rodbets Sallad (Beet Relish)**  
3 medium sized cooked beets  
2 medium sized sweet cucumber pickles  
2 medium sized peeled apples, raw

Finely chop all above ingredients and mix with mayonnaise. Mayonnaise may be thinned with thick cream, if desired.

The Swedish people serve this as a spread for the delicious dark, thinly-sliced bread served with the smorgasbord.

Miss Carlsson, a member of St. Peter's Lutheran Church, is active in several of the church societies. She is also a charter member of the Plymouth Business and Professional Women's Club and was the organization's first corresponding secretary.  
She was the personal secretary of Edward Hough and Charles Bennett from 1921 until Daisy left Plymouth in 1958.  
Currently Miss Carlsson is assisting the finance committee of the Business and Professional Women's Club boosting ticket sales for the May 1st and A Theatre Party. Proceeds will go toward the club's scholarship fund.

"The distinctive flavor of this cake is due to the cardamom seed, which is a popular spice with the Swedish cooks and used in many of their coffee breads," explained Miss Carlsson.  
**Fyrestarta (Apple Torte)**  
1/2 cup butter  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 eggs, beaten

### Warns Flooding May Cause Contamination, Hepatitis

The upsurge of hepatitis in the metropolitan area has caused Dr. Joseph G. Molner, City-County Health Commissioner to warn Plymouth area residents against the use of water from wells which may have become contaminated due to recent flooded conditions.

Flooding of yards and surrounding land areas brought on by the rapid melting of snow has motivated many Wayne County residents to call the Health Department for information about possible health precautions. In some communities where flooding has occurred, water could become contaminated with sewage from septic tanks in the area.

Dr. Molner says that water from any well which has been flooded or submerged should be considered contaminated until proven safe by bacteriological tests. He urges residents not to use for any drinking or domestic purpose water from wells that may be flooded without following proper disinfection procedures.

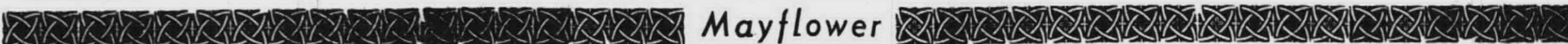
Residents are urged to consult their city or county health department for instructions on how to make the supply safe and for obtaining a sterilized bottle to submit a sample to the laboratory for testing. In the meantime use a water supply from a source of known safety. If such a supply is not available it is possible to use water from the contaminated well if the precautions listed below are carefully followed:

1. Pump out well until the water is clear and clean.
2. Either boil or disinfect with chlorine.
  - a. Boil the water for two minutes to make it safe.
  - b. To remove the "flat" taste from boiled water, cool the water and then pour it back and forth between two clean receptacles several times.
3. Continue these precautionary measures until the well water is proven safe by laboratory test.

Dr. Molner also urges that where septic tanks and wells exist in Wayne County, residents should make every effort to have their communities connected to a public sewer system and a public water supply as a permanent solution to the health hazards caused by flooded conditions.

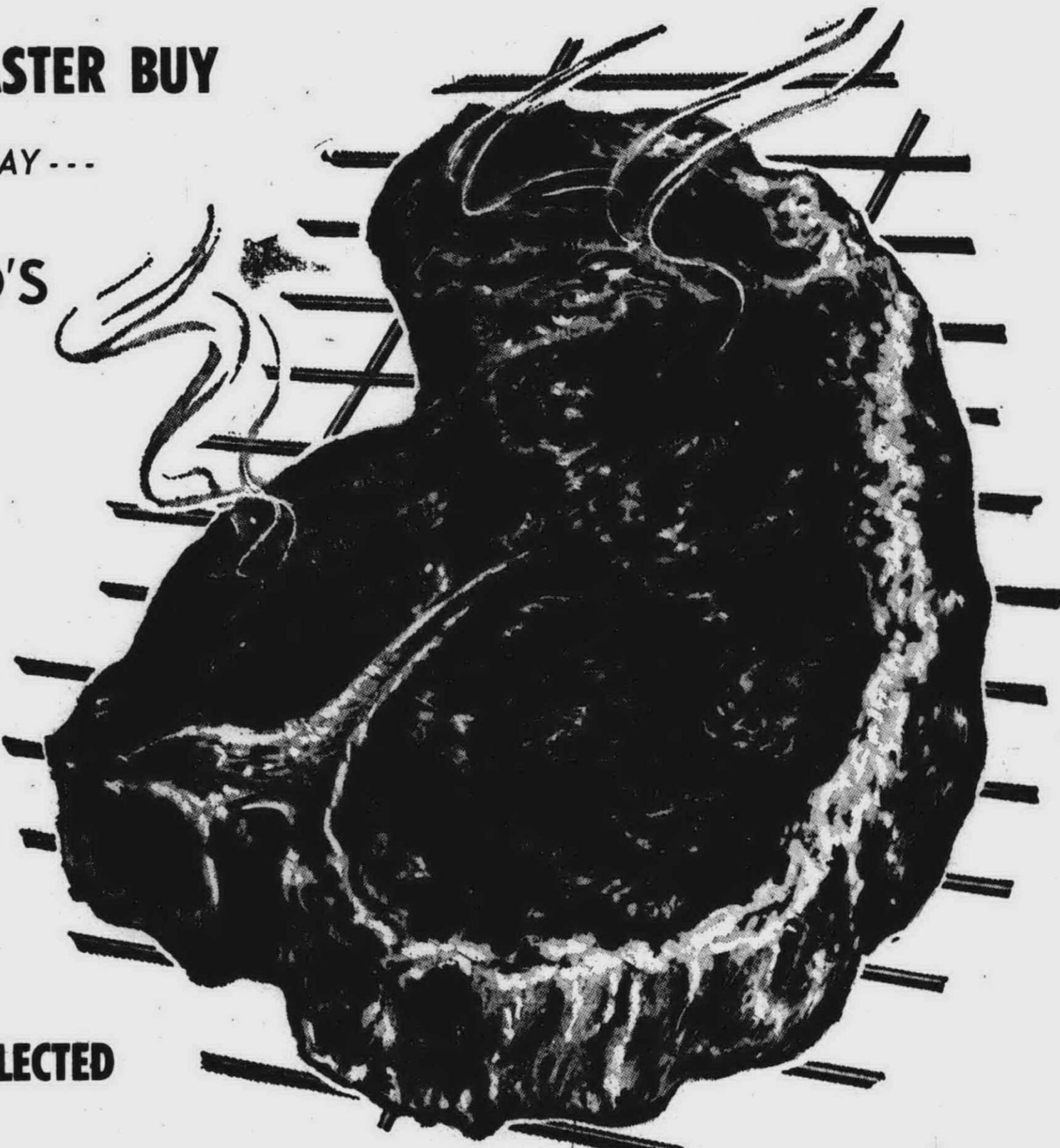
