motors and schemes operating in other sections. In addition, we have access to the Bureau's files and are entitled to special reports on any inquiry we make.
 "While this program is not a cure-all and will not stop all abuses practiced by a minority who operate on the fringe of business, it will give the community greater control over them and provide it with a channel through which investigation and correction can be made."
 Chamber officials emphasize the fact that this program can best serve the community only if the community makes use of it. They urge the buying public to be especially cautious of any proposition which promises "something for nothing."
 "A check with the Chamber of Commerce may save time, money and worry. It pays to 'investigate before you invest,'" they said.

There is a storm brewing in Livonia which, if it blows to full force, could cause destruction of some good will all around this area.

For quite some time there has been unrest among active "Y" women in Livonia in regard to being "associated" with the Dearborn YWCA.

A Committee was formed. Because the original six were termed "rabble rousers" they thought it best for their cause to go somewhere "underground."

Still the Committee had no difficulty in securing support. Many hundreds have signed agreeing with the five main points behind their request.

1. They are closer to the Northwest YWCA, the traffic problem is easier driving there.

2. There are presently over 200 members at Northwest.

5. The potential membership has doubled since 1955 when Livonia was assigned to Dearborn.

"Y" offers a tremendous service to women, young ones, older women, potential leaders, followers, women who want to learn, who want to play, who just enjoy being with other women—and to all of their children.

Their young program is growing yearly.

If there isn't a feeling of belonging and good will—isn't it all wasted? In 10 years geography has changed boundaries. Livonia women feel it, even if they are not aware of it in Dearborn or "downtown." Redford feels akin to Livonia and welcomes them—they already have them in spirit—but alas and this is where the rub comes—U. F. they do not get one penny of financial assistance from U. F. (where the money comes from).

Dearborn gets the cash and Northwest gives the service, is the way it stacks up. U. F. or Dearborn cannot force these women out of their natural pattern—and who but the entire "YWCA" program will suffer?

And then there is the interesting question on just who gives the money to U. F. in the first place.

The whole subject is presently being investigated by a committee at the United Foundation level—and Livonia as well as Redford ladies are "hoping for the best."

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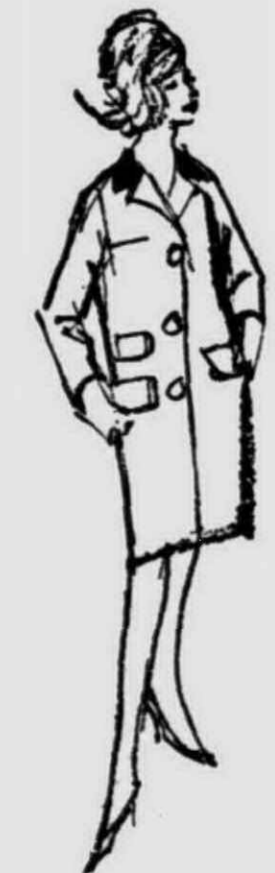

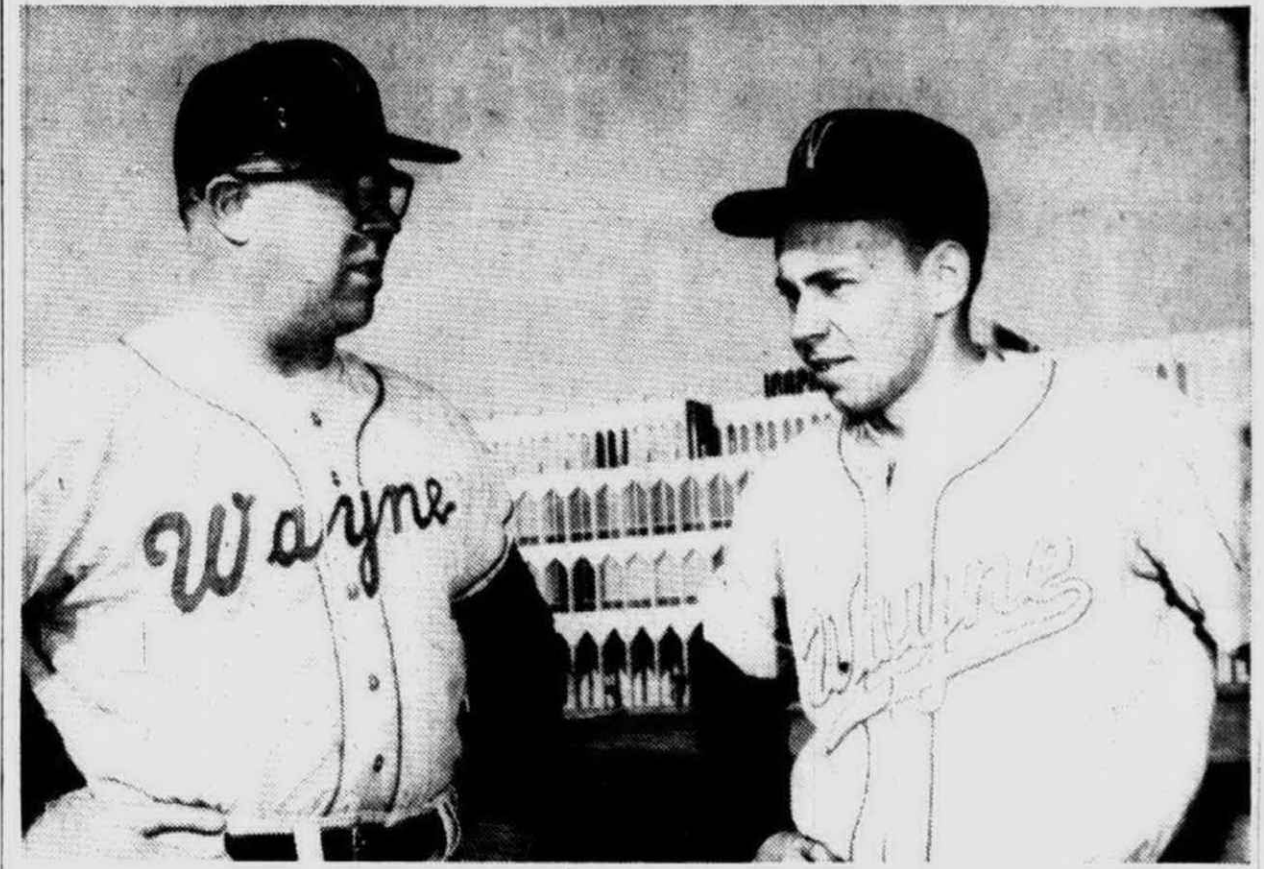

SPORTS OBSERVER

There must be moments when coaches who handle high school athletic teams during the spring months must ask themselves:

"Why am I involved in this business?"

At best, coaching preps is not easy. It requires long hours, often well into the night after one has spent many hours in the classroom teaching history or math or English or watching over hundreds of teenagers in gym classes.

What complicates the spring sports schedule is the weatherman. And the calendar.

It's happened in more years than one cares to note that a high school baseball team has jumped into its opening game with no more than a day or two of outdoor practice under its belts.

Track teams frequently spring from the warmth of their gyms or school hallways to the chilly, damp air in order to get their season started on schedule.

Baseball teams consider themselves extremely lucky if they can get through a campaign without four or five postponements. Non-league games, which are washed out, generally are never made up.

When a league encounter gives way to the weather, it has to be jammed into an already tight schedule with the result most prep squads have to play four and five times a week in late May with pitching staffs geared for only twice-a-week production.

And, then, there's the calendar!

Easter vacation, for example, can play serious havoc with spring sports. Take this year.

With the holiday so late, many teams in the area started their schedules, then had to stop this week. They'll resume Monday. Coaches will tell you this is a very bad situation.

In other instances, such as with baseball at Bentley and track at Plymouth, the varsities are yet to compete for the first time. Their opens won't take place until schools resume activity on Monday.

Senior trips and the like also tend to interfere with spring schoolboy sports.

No coach wants to prevent a star twelfth-grader from touring with his fellow graduates. The result: Many a team has performed minus all of its seniors. And, sometimes, it's meant the difference of a championship or second-place performance.

Spring sports are also a jammed up proposition. In track and golf the state regionals are held in mid-May with the state championships no later than the third Saturday of the month.

Coaches argue that this is too soon. In the cases of Bentley and Plymouth, among others, neither will get a chance to vie in more than four meets before swinging into the regionals.

Why is the state meet held so early? State Director Charles Forsythe notes that (1) there are numerous schools which close in Michigan by the end of May; hence the meet can't be delayed; (2) because of senior-class activities, commencing late in May, administrators at most schools prefer to have sports out of the way by Memorial Day.

The sports advocates tend to disagree. Class A schools, be they in Detroit, Livonia, Plymouth or Grand Rapids, operate through the second week of June at the earliest.

"Therefore it's not necessary to hold the state track meet in the middle of May," coaches insist. "Why do we have to break our necks and not be ready and yet the State Association doesn't hold its tennis championships until the weekend following Memorial Day?"

The coaches naturally have a point. But they can't win with their bosses.

One other point: Spring sports are the weak-sisters of schoolboy sports. They get kicked around in some instances for the simple reason they produce no revenue, such as in the case with football, basketball and swimming.

Facilities often aren't the best; in fact, sometimes there aren't any.

We didn't know until the other day that Thurston High sponsors a tennis team, which does right well under Coach John White; yet the South Redford school district provides no courts for the team or any of the other students who'd like to swish a racket.

Redford Union likewise has no tennis team. RU hasn't any net courts either.

Revenge On Track Sought by Thurston

Revenge . . . revenge . . . That's what the Thurston high school track team will have in mind next Tuesday when it resumes operations after a two-week Eastern break with a dual meet against Garden City on the Thurston oval.

Why the revenge motive? It was Garden City which handed Thurston its only dual meet loss of the season in 1961. The margin of victory—or defeat—was one-third of a point.

Judging by the results of Thurston meets before the holiday pause, the Townshippers should get even against Garden City. Thurston has had three dual meets this season, plus one triangular affair. Thurston has won 'em all and also placed third in the Huron Relays.

In its last action before the holiday vacation from compe-

dition, Thurston literally ran over Riverview, 90-19. The Township team won 11 events and tied for first in another. The only Riverview victory came in the high jump.

The meet produced a rare finish—a dead heat—in the 220-yard dash when Randy Bogus and Craig Knudson of (Continued on Page 17)

Gearhart and Freels accounted for the only Clarenceville hits of the game.

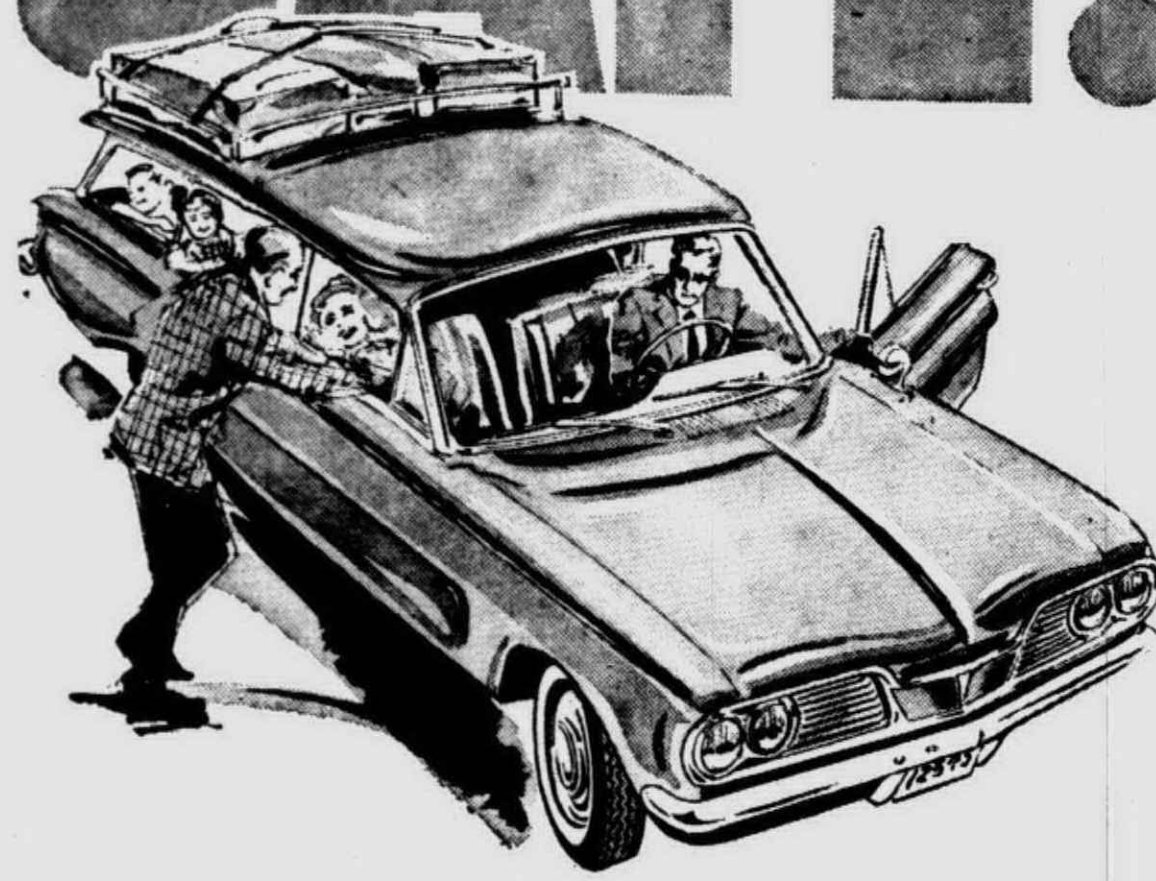
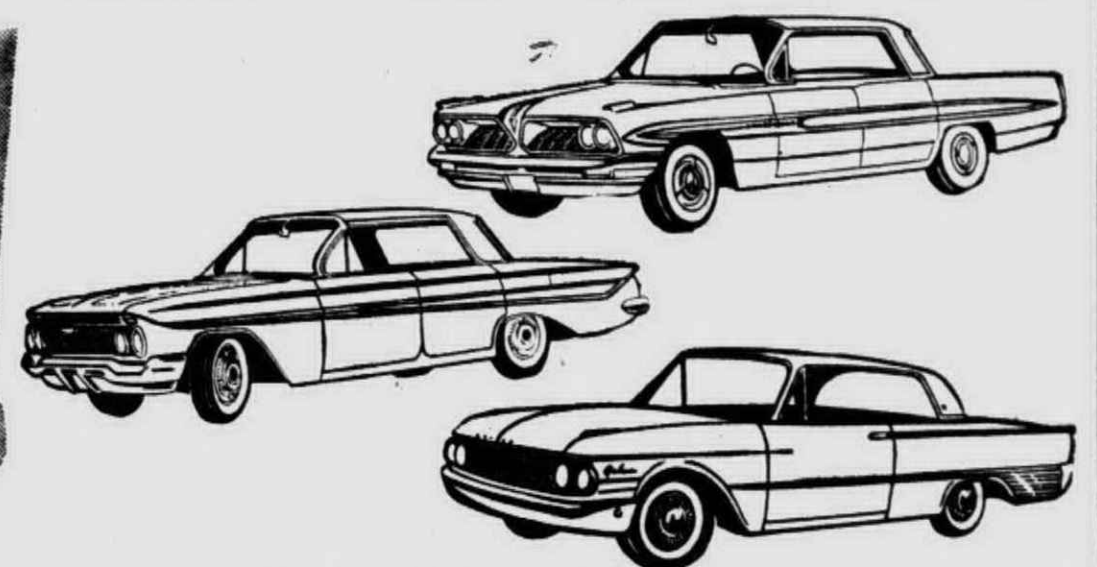
