Early this year YWCA members in Livonia sought to have Livonia served by the Northwest branch. Growing dissatisfaction with the service offered by the Dearborn Area Y precipitated the desire to change. The "Area of Service" boundaries were established in 1955 based upon studies made by the UCS for the purpose of allocating United Foundation monies. Livonia feels that changes have occurred since 1955 that give credence to their desire to have these boundaries changed. The population growth in Livonia makes it no longer an "appendage" to be tossed wherever UCS decides. Furthermore—the completion of the Northwest Branch 3 years ago makes it more convenient for Livonia Y people to travel.

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Social Activities At College Are Discussed By Trustees

While voters of the community are deciding to provide a community college for the area, the young people are asking some questions. They are interested in the curriculum, but they also want to know: "What kind of student activities will our Community College have?"

The trustees and administration said today that they cannot answer this query in detail, because the students themselves will help plan their program. "But obviously there must be responsible student government with leadership workshops to train for wide participation in government of

student affairs. "Publications will evolve, including a yearbook, newspaper and a creative writing magazine, giving students particularly interested in journalism many opportunities. "College clubs will be formed as student groups. It is expected that those with common interests will be forming organizations in everything from chess to geology, from teaching to electronics, from art to business. The student body may desire some type of organizations such as a Men's Union and Women's League.

of the curriculum will require months of study, residents may look forward to one and two-year programs in such fields as electrical, electronic and industrial technology, in drafting, commercial art, X-ray technology, accounting, general business, secretarial work, retailing, sales and advertising.

"An excellent academic program will make it possible to transfer without loss of credit to four year colleges and universities. Included will be the first two years of such programs as business administration, engineering, teaching, library science, social work, medical technology, occupational and physical therapy and mortuary science. Students planning to enter medicine, dentistry, law and pharmacy will be able to complete two years of study on the local campus.

These are programs in which the high school students of this community have indicated interest. The college will work closely with the high faculties in the next two years when the college opens, in 1964, the curriculum will fill the needs of its students.

The bidding is normal and most players should arrive at the six spade contract which is unbeatable.

At the above hand in Livonia's duplicate game while most players arrived at the six spade contract it was only made by two pair namely Ralph Schaar playing with Jos. La Rue and Barbee Elbie playing with L. B. Barbee.

The diamond jack should be the normal lead taken by the declarers ace. From here the play varied usually ending with a club finesse which lost and the diamond was cashed setting contract one trick.

The correct play is again the often mentioned end play. This play must be made by eliminating suits. The diamond jack should be taken by the ace and a small heart to ace and heart ruff.

Ace of spades, small spade to queen eliminating spade. King of hearts led and diamond discarded, small heart then ruffed and the diamond led throwing either opponent into the lead. With diamonds and hearts eliminated the defender must now lead a club because any other lead would give declarer ruff and sluff. On the club lead the declarer plays for the honors to be split and so makes six spades. Remember to create an end play you must eliminate suits.

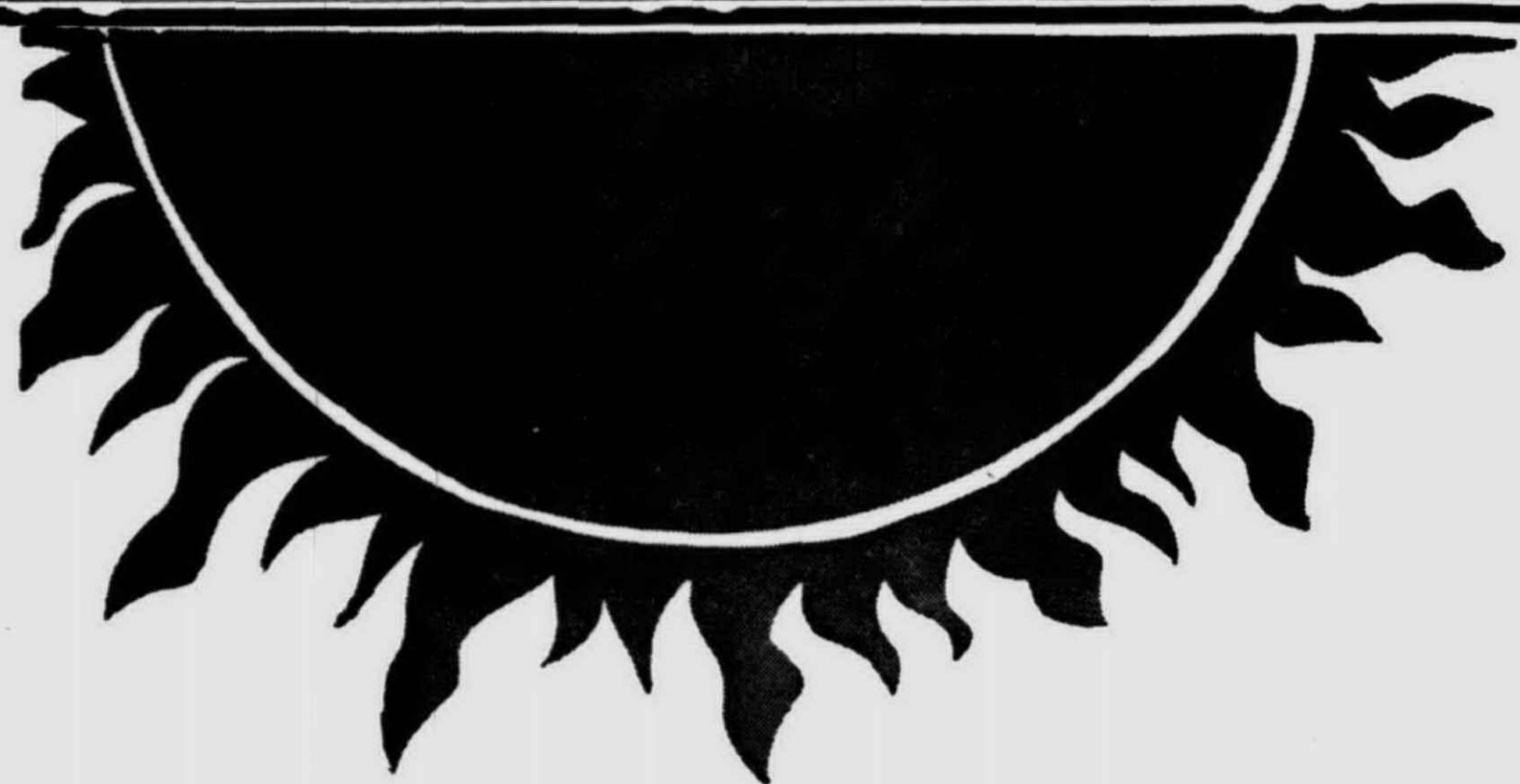

"Getting To Know You"

I've been curious about Grapho-Analysis. Can you pick out my positive and negative points from my writing? I'm most interested in your findings.

Dear Mr. H. A.:
The most outstanding trait in your handwriting is the fact that you get lost in your own thoughts. I'm wondering how often people have had to literally come up and tap you on the shoulder to get your attention. You have the faculty of funneling all your thoughts or efforts into one channel to the exclusion of almost everything that may be going on around you.

Governor Swainson Indorses College

Members of the Citizens Action Committee, of the Northwest Wayne County Community College District, were inspired by an endorsement of community colleges by Governor John B. Swainson. He recognized the importance of education beyond high school, and the problems of meeting this need as the number of young people of college age increases.

He further recognized that our colleges and universities, both public and private, cannot meet the full demand for such additional education.) To the Citizens Action Committee, Northwest Wayne County Community College District:

Education beyond high school is becoming more important each year. The need for higher education has been increased and its importance stressed during the last year during which the United States placed into space two astronauts and one was sent on a successful orbital flight. These great new developments emphasize the need for higher education if our nation is to keep abreast of world progress.

Michigan is proud of its colleges and universities, both public and private. But, those institutions of higher learning cannot meet the full demand for additional education. Nor can all our people have the opportunity of attending colleges and universities for financial or other reasons.

Our 16 Community and Junior Colleges are vital components of our educational system. They offer some 25,000 students the opportunity for continuing their education, opportunities which might not be available if they were unable to enroll in courses at college level in their home communities.

As the number of our young people of college age increases, there is great demand for community college facilities. It is important to each of us to provide the opportunity for our young men and women to continue their education beyond high school if they desire and possess the ability. I urge our people to recognize the importance of this phase of local education and to offer every encouragement to our young people to pursue their search for knowledge so that they may be better equipped to meet the competition they will face in the world of commerce, business and industry, and that they will be enabled to continue Michigan's leadership in these fields.

Community colleges fill one of the great needs of our educational system. It is my earnest hope that those who are unable to attend one of our State or private colleges or universities will have the opportunity to attend a local community college.

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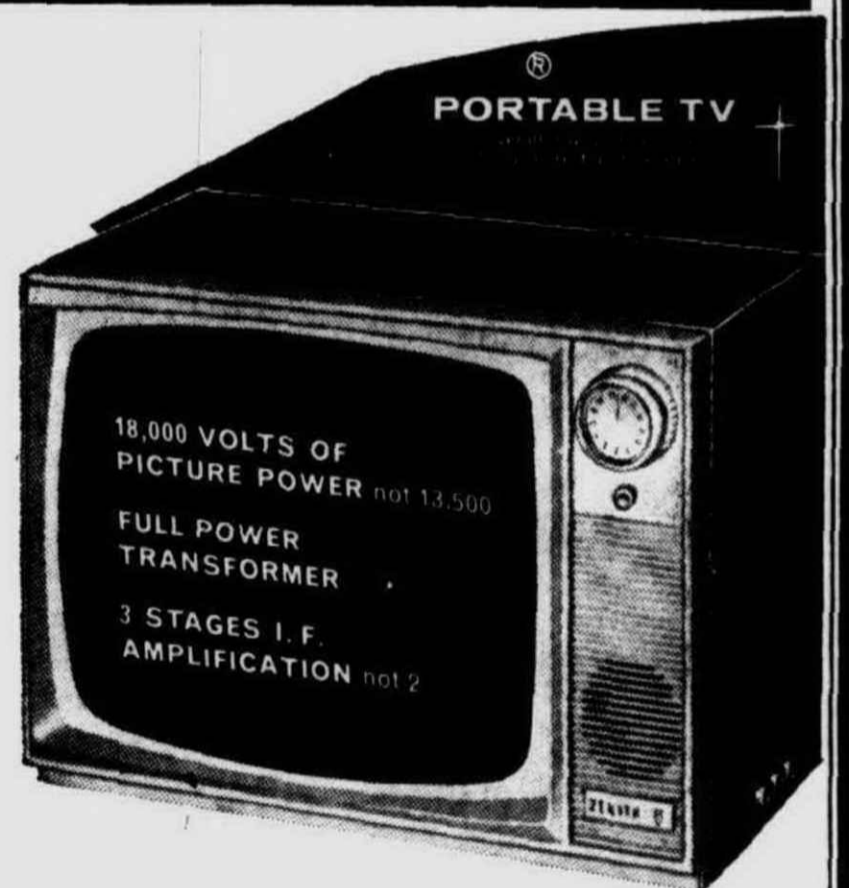
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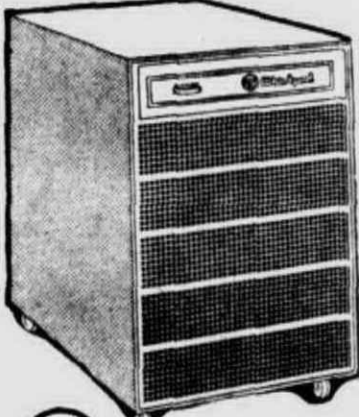
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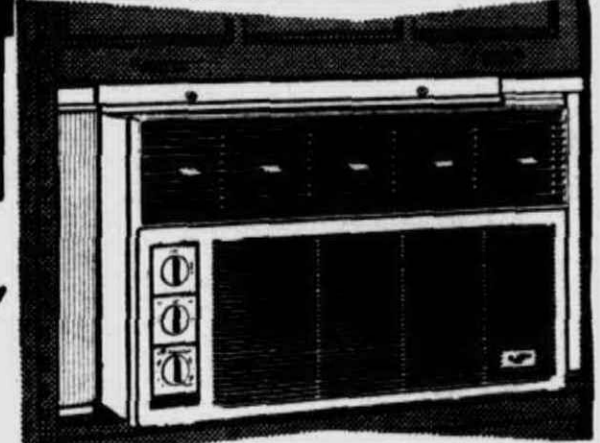
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
