





Despite the fact that Governor Swainson vetoed a bill which would have made it impossible for Detroit to levy its income tax against those who live outside the city, a group of suburban officials still are scrapping to stop it in court. This is the "Vigilance Committee".

At the moment the "Committee" is waging legal action to try to get Court relief from the Detroit tax. Mayor Moelke of Livonia has been the most active in the fray off all the officials from this area. His City Council last night appropriated \$200 to go into the Vigilance funds for legal cost.



Two New Mills

A request for a 5<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-mill school tax program will face Plymouth area voters when they go to the polls June 11 for the community annual school election.

A renewal of 31/2 mills of present taxes due to expire and an additional two new mills are included in the Board of Education's new proposal, finalized at a Board session Monday night. The proposed package would be for a five-year period.

Action on the new millage request came following nearly a dozen study sessions held by the Board since voters turned down a 7.5 mill package last month. Board members have slashed \$150,000 from the Board's original request, including \$37,500 in budget decreases. The Board still proposes to

spend \$166,000 more than last half of hospitalization insuryear, chiefly in costs to open ance for full-time employees, School-West.

Biggest item to suffer in the Board's revised proposal is teacher's salaries. Voters turned down the last proposal which would have allocated a hike of \$52,000 for salary adjustments and \$42,000 for regular increments. In the new budget, the figures are down to \$21,000 and \$41,000 respectively. A Board spokesman said raises of around \$100 will still go to teachers

"Instead of a 15 to 18 percent tax increase for Plymouth residents," the Board of Education said. "the new proposal will mean only a hike of nine percent."

The new proposal has met with support from several community sources.


## **Thieves Grab** \$1200 Worth of Equipment


Since none of us are perfect, both positive and negative traits must be mentioned in an analysis-even short ones such as these. You can be certain that both good and bad will show up in our handwriting.

### Footbridges Near Schools Are Approved

Several improvements sought for safety reasons near Livonia schools were considered by the City-Council this week.

One is a footbridge proposal for pedestrians across the Rouge flood plain adjacent to the Botsford School. The Council "determined that the bridge is necessary" and ordered the proper departments to determine what property will be required for the project.

A petition from Riley PTA requesting sidewalk installation adjacent to that school was referred to the engineers to advise whether it would be more practical to install the walk on the north or south side of Five Mile, and to estimate the cost.

To the County road commission went a request for traffic light to service Riley traffic at Five Mile and Henry Ruff.

A letter from Donald Walton discussing ingress and egress walkway on Bennett Avenue in Livonia Meadows was sent to thejoint school-city committee for study and recommendation. And the Mayor was requested to provide cost estimates and a plan for location and construction of a footbridge to provide access to the Lincoln School from the proposed Idyle Hills and Bell Valley subdivisions.


