WE FAVOR VOLUNTARY PROGRAMS:

We believe that all our elderly should receive all the health care they need when they need it. We favor programs sensibly designed to help those who need help. Such programs are available now and tax payers already are paying for them. These programs include private health insurance, and Blue Cross - Blue Shield, for those able to purchase these policies, and the Kerr-Mills Law (Michigan Aid for the Aged) and other local and state programs for helping those who need help in paying for medical care. WE OPPOSE COMPULSORY PLANS:

The King-Anderson Bill, now before Congress, would provide certain health care benefits for those over 65 who are eligible for social security. However, you are entitled to know what appears in the "fine print" of the bill.

It would force every worker to pay 17% more payroll taxes to provide benefits for millions of the wealthy and self-reliant who can well afford to take care of themselves.

It would not provide any benefits to the 3,500,000 not covered by social security - the group most in need.

It would cover less than 25% of the health care costs of those eligible for the benefits.

It would not provide for physicians services outside of hospitals.

It would lower the quality of medical care with Federal Government controlling standards of practice and limiting free choice of Hospital and physician.

It would not provide nursing home care unless the patient first was admitted to a hospital.

It is not an "insurance" program. It is a tax and welfare plan.

Even those eligible for benefits would have to pay \$10 a day for the first nine days of each hospitalization, and \$20 for each complete diagnostic study.

It would permit doctors to prescribe only 20% of the drugs ordinarily used by physicians in their practice.
