### 'Doc' Retires In Plymouth

Gerrit Kramer, popular Plymouth High history teacher, ended an illustrious teaching career that extended over 35 years when he retired at the end of the current school year. Affectionately known as "Doc" by 17 school students during his 17 years at Plymouth High, Kramer carries with him the best wishes of all as he prepares to "retire" to his nearby ranch where he has 10,000 Christmas trees and 20 acres of orchard to keep him busy. "Doc" was born in Holland, Mich. where he attended elementary school and was graduated from Holland High. His studies were interrupted for service in the medical corps during World War I. After receiving his honorable discharge, "Doc" resumed studies at Hope College from where he was graduated. He also took additional work at Western State University and Wayne State University. He started his teaching career in one of the rural one-room schools that were so much a part of the Michigan school system at that time. He advanced rapidly and served as principal at three high schools and superintendent of two others before taking a position with the Plymouth system in the high school—he remained there for 17 years until his recent retirement.

# Madonna College To Start \$4 Million Building Program July 2

Approval of a federal loan of \$900,000, to defray cost of construction of a new dormitory - cafeteria building, has brought an announcement from Madonna College officials that ground will be broken for a \$4,000,000 building program on Monday, July 2.

The program, which includes the cafeteria-dormitory, new quarters for the faculty and a new college building that will have additional classrooms, a library, chapel, gymnasium and swimming pool, will be completed in time for the start of the 1963 school term.

The buildings will be erected on a site adjacent to the present quarters at the intersection of Schoolcraft and Levan roads in Livonia. The present building erected some 15 years ago, will be used by the Felician Sisters as the mother home.

Madonna College is sponsored by the Detroit province of the religious group and includes orders in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana under the supervision of Provincial Superior Mother Mary Laudine, CSSF, who also is president of the Board of Trustees of the College.

The Felician Sisters also operate Ladywood High and St. Mary's Hospital, both situated on the same plot in the area between Schoolcraft and Five Mile Roads, bounded by Live

on the east and Newburgh road on the west.

Mother Superior Mary Laudine and Sister Mary Raynelda, Ph.D., CSSF, president of Madonna College, were notified of the federal loan by Senator Philip Hart and Rep. Martha Griffiths shortly after the Housing and Home Finance Agency approved it last week.

The \$900,000 loan will cover part of the \$1,500,000 dormitory-cafeteria building construction. The balance will be paid by the Felician Sisters from funds raised in a building campaign.

The Community of Felician Sisters will raise the remainder of the two and a half million dollars by a private loan and contributions from friends and benefactors of the community and the college. The order is assuming all financial responsibility for the \$4,000,000 program.

The new facilities will enable the four-year liberal arts college to increase its enrollment from 400 to 1,000; hike the dormitory capacity from 110 resident students to 254; and boost the cafeteria to a total of 450 students and faculty in contrast to slightly more than 200 this year.

Sister Mary Raynelda indicated the faculty building will cost \$500,000; the dormitory-cafeteria, \$1,500,000; and the new college quarters another \$200,000.

"We have been making plans for this program for several years," she said in

telling of the construction. "We started a building fund campaign a year ago and have enough on hand to make up the difference between

the federal loan and the cost of the new dormitory. "We still have a long way to go but felt we should start the program now so that we

can expand and take care of an anticipated increased enrollment in the next few years. "For one thing we are adding a school of nursing, a four-

year course to our curriculum next fall, and already have felt the impact of that announcement. We feel that the new buildings will bring more

attention to the college and draw students from all parts of the United States." Sister Mary Raynelda indicated the College has had a

record number of requests for entrance information thus far and the present trend is toward the largest freshman class in history next September.

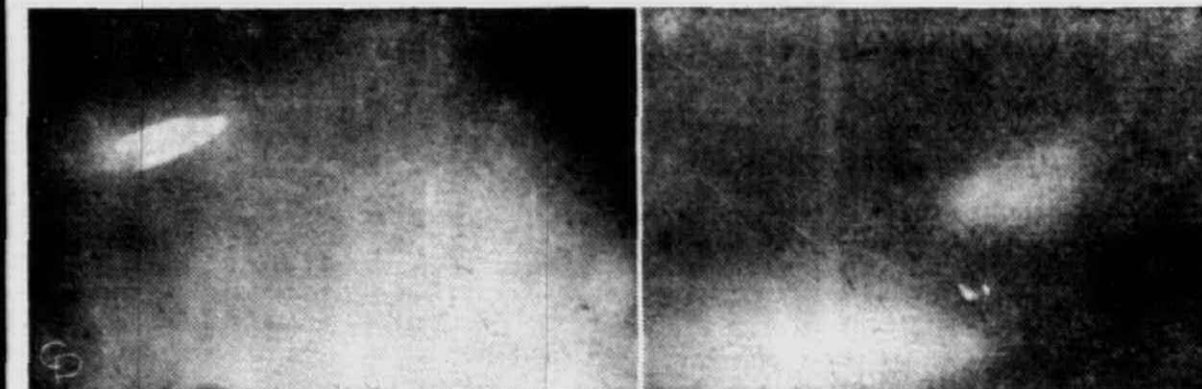

18 Minute CD Mobilization

It took just 18 minutes for 172 workers to gather and prove the effectiveness of the Plymouth Community Civil Defense unit in a disaster test last Wednesday.

City Manager Alfred Glassford, who doubles as Director of Civil Defense, and Public Safety Chief Ken Fisher, who serves as deputy director, staged a mock tornado disaster exercise to test the efficiency of their group.

Both were amazed and pleased when the volunteers from the Nurses' Society, Medical Aid, Stu Rocafellow Amateur Radio Society, Volunteer Firemen, along with members of the City Commission and city

employees deployed to the area in the short time of 18 minutes. The disaster area was designated to be Penniman Ave. to Farmer, from Evergreen to Blunk Ave.

The call went out at 6 p.m. and in four minutes three of the 13 intersections were in charge of traffic control personnel. The area was completely controlled by 6:18 p.m.

Assisting police in this maneuver were 15 ham radio operators, who provided eight mobile radio units, six working with police officers and two held in reserve for emergency use if needed.

Glassford reported that all of the City Hall staff was on duty by 6:16 p.m. and all DPW workers were on hand by 6:20 p.m. Dr. Lee Feldkamp, in charge of the medical and nurse units, indicated 50 nurses would have been available and on duty within 36 minutes and 43 medical aid volunteers had reported by 6:30 p.m.

Thirteen physicians responded to calls and would have been ready to handle the stricken

## Voters Choose Wood and Kagen; Hartom Is Loser

An upset in Clarenceville School District pushed two new members onto the Board of Education and re-elected a veteran Board member in Monday's elections.

Richard Wood and Herbert P. Kagen captured the two spots on the Board from a field of five candidates, while long-time Board member and former Livonia mayor, Elbert Hartom, ran third.

The voting pattern looked like this—

Richard Wood, 601; Herb Kagen, 522; Elbert Hartom, 390; Margaret Herndon, 295; Gilbert Jacobs, 219.

Wood, 26, 20279 Gillman, and father of two children, had called for "improvement" through "more classes for students who do not plan on going to college" and "co-op training" in the district.

Dr. Kagen, who lives at 20361 Weyher with his wife and three children, called for better communication between the public and the Board of Education. "Few people are really aware of what actions the board is either considering or has taken," he said.

A proposal to provide free textbooks to Clarenceville pupils was defeated by two votes, 581-579, but two other propositions passed 866 to 332 (proposition one) and 806-386 (proposition two).

Much interest centered around the three millage issues, since similar ones had been defeated March 27.

The first will renew four-mill assessment for operating which expired in 1961 and the second provides an additional one mill for operating. The free textbook proposition, which was defeated, would have been used to purchase books for elementary students, kindergarten to grade six, with any excess funds to be turned over to the general operating fund.

Including seven children up to nine years old, 48 persons have drowned in 74 water accidents reported in Michigan up to June 5 this year and another 21 were injured, according to State Police figures.

The accident total covers 45 fatalities, 15 involving personal injury and 14 involving property damage. The deaths included 14 who drowned in falls from bridges, banks, docks or piers.

Through June 12 last year, there were 74 accidents resulting in 50 deaths and 29 injured, which indicates that this current year's water accident toll is running a little ahead of the 1961 rate.
