The ruling has two categories, awards and amateur

Under the awards provision, high school students cannot accept anything other than a trophy for participation in athletics if they are to retain eligibility for further high

A trophy is defined as a medal, ribbon, badge, plaque, cup, banner, picture or ring. The value of such an award may not exceed \$3, excluding engraving.

This also applies to acceptance of merchandise, clothing, sports equipment or services. A prep athlete may not accept any offering exceeding the \$3 ceiling, regardless if he pays part or all of the purchase price.

While prep athletes may attend banquets, luncheons, dinners and may go on trips or accept admission to athletic events, they may not accept membership, privileges or special services in clubs or similar organizations as awards were announced last or payment for sports participation.





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
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
