Has School Board Overlooked 'Little Guy?'

Has the Plymouth School Board been negligent in not spelling out its actions and explaining its financial problems in terms that can be understood by the "little guy" who packs just as much impact in the voting booth as collegetrained "big wheel"?

Does the average citizen understand all of the ramifications of the various millage proposals and especially the new one slated for a vote on July 30?

Robert J. Mitchell, 7075 Beck Road, who was graduated grom Plymouth High School in 1949, answered both questions in a lengthy discussion before the Board a week ago.

Receiving an audience in the open meeting, Mitchell, who stated he was talking as one of the "little guys", answered

He told members he thought they were negligent in not getting the message home to the average citizen of the community and said that in his estimation the "little guy" doesn't have the slightest idea of what the ramifications are in regard to the various millage proposals.

"Understand," he said, "I'm not appearing before this Board as one opposed to the millage proposals-matter of fact I'll probably vote in favor come July 30-but I feel that too many persons in my particular level don't know what is going on.'

Mitchell is one of seven brothers and sisters who have been graduated from Plymouth High School over the past 20 years. The family moved to Plymouth from the Walled

"I have five children of school age," he pointed out, "None is attending the Plymouth Community School district schools because I feel they would not get the education there I believe they should have."

His children are attending Our Lady of Good Counsel

"I feel that the schools should teach children to become good citizens and prepare them for their lifetime work, whatever it might be. And I don't think that teachers should continually harp on the subject of going to college-there are a good many of us who can't afford to send our children on to higher education. There are a good many who will go out and get jobs as soon as they finish high school," he said.

"This Board has placed millage proposals before the voters twice and each has been rejected. Perhaps it would be wise for the Board members to try and let us 'little guys' in on exactly what the millage is for.

"In this meeting here, I have heard discussions of an estimated budget of a couple of million dollars and what the schools would receive from taxes on the basis of a renewal of the 3.5 millage and how much more would come in from an additional half mill up to and additional two mills, most of it is over my head.

simple explanation that will be understood by all. Then I'm sure everyone will be able to evaluate the situation and make a decision on whether to vote for or against." Mitchell, who won the attention of every member of the Board with his sincere presentation, hit many of what he termed "unnecessary frills" in the school programs.

Why can't the Board break these figures down to a

"For instance, I have been told that failure to approve the millage proposal will result in a cut in classes now being offered," he said.

"Someone told me that this meant no music teacher for the second and third grades. As far as I'm concerned second and third graders can do without music, that's where stress should be on making good citizens.

"I feel that the 'little guys' and the retirees of which there are a great many in the district, aren't getting the whole story. Once they do I believe the Board will find things will be much smoother. I'm positive that if the need tor millage increases is explained in simple language that it will pass and there's no time like now for the Board to start talking in that language. The sooner the better."

Board members questioned him about points in the talk and there was a discussion but the opinion was that perhaps Mitchell had raised an excellent point-one that the Board should heed in its campaign to get voters to approve the new millage proposal.

There's a story elsewhere on the front page of The Plymouth Observer this week wherein the remarks of one citizen are reported in some detail regarding his view of the state of school affairs here.

His conclusions are offered as those only of the speaker as the saying goes, and do not necessarily reflect the views of this station. But they are reproduced because they are typical of a point of view shared by hosts of people these days.

At one point we do agree entirely with the spokesman. That is in his conclusion that the worst problem in passing a bond or millage proposal is that the schools have lost the intangible thing known as "public confidence."

Our interpretation of the past two elections has been that the "No's" haven't been recorded so much against the specific details of any particular ballot proposal as they have been an automatic protest vote, recorded simply at large and in general, against an image which they regard as "schools."

Put more briefly, it wouldn't have mattered how big was the request in terms of dollars. The vote would have been "No" to most anything.

These thoughts are offered hopefully for consideration by the Board of Education in their difficult hours of deciding "what to do next."

It is quite possible that the exact language (and size of the next request) isn't as improtant as how quickly the Board of Education can re-win public confidence.

Part of this, unfortunately, involves the teachers, many of whom grumbled through the entire last election and by their actions destroyed the faith of others in their school leadership.

It also calls for winning-over hard-pressed business. men, who are inclined to resist anything and everything which would increase their cost of keeping the doors

To create a new public image is not a quick process, it requires skilled direction and imagination, and the effort must be founded on fact.

Nonetheless, we believe the Board of Education has failed heretofore to put its best foot forward; that it has taken public approval for granted, and in so doing has become careless in detail and indifferent to public fears; and that a newly-conceived relations program could reserve a whole trend.

 Plymouth voters do not know what to expect from the Board of Education in the way of millage requests. From day to day, "absolute immediate need" seems to that is one of the highspots of vary by as much as six mills, and it is only human to the annual celebration, the Plywonder, "what do we REALLY need?"

2. Nor does the public know what's coming next. There seems to be no pattern, projected over a period of years, showing pre-planning and a long-range, total picture of EVERYTHING needed. Living in fear of tomorrow's request ("if we approve this, they'll be back with another ballot request in a few months") causes many to vote "No" on whatever is at hand.

3. The Plymouth Board rather generally has kept its light under a bushel. Any businessman or senior citizen would be delighted if he knew that the Plymouth system has one of the smallest debt ratios in the whole metropolitan area. The "sinking fund" approach has saved taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars in interest in recent years, compared to neighbor districts. The savings in debt service dwarf the so-called "extravagances" in a much-blasted "glass" junior high, yet the public is permitted to concentrate its spleen on the latter and seldom is

reminded of the former. 4. Budget preparation today is done with too broad a brush; detailed figures are skipped over lightly and the visitor leaves with a sort of impression of being talked-down to, as if a child were intruding into affairs to obtuse for his mind, to be handled instead only by "educators."



How people vote is their own business. You'll never find this column plugging for one issue or another, one man over another, one party over a second-when there is a political overtone.

But it is happy to note, that as the result of the various school-tax issues which have come up in our area in recent years, nothing has transpired to necessitate a slash in interscholastic

or intramural athletic programs.

Not so in several communities in Michigan. Take Bay City, for example. Central and Handy Highs there will field only football teams during the 1962-63 school years. Basketball, swimming, baseball and other sports are out.

The reason is simple: Financial slashes in the school budget. The same goes in the Holland sector of Michigan and indications are that other school districts will find themselves into similar situations.

Any reduction in athletic participation for students is catastrophic in view of the physical fitness program President Kennedy currently is plugging in every part of the United States. The president's committee, headed by famed Oklahoma Football Coach Bud Wilkinson, has produced some shocking figures. Something less than 50 percent of our school students can meet the minimum requirements for physical fitness in the various tests which determine such matters.

It was no secret, of course, how many young men were turned down, for physical seasons, for duty in the U.S. Army when the draft prevailed during World War II. And, even today, numerous young men, who either volunteer or are called for service, hear the sad news that they aren't fit . . . physically. All of which behooves each of us, individually and col-

lectively, to try and solve this plight and one of the easiest way is for more of us to engage in some phase of athletic endeavour . . . be it the heavily taxing games like football and basketball, or the more relaxing ventures such as bowling. Where better can the program start than in our schools?

Yet, as outlined earlier today, there are places in Michigan where schools are cutting down on athletics instead of taking the step all schools should-namely, making it possible for more boys and more girls to perform on more teams and more We'll grant that there is a place for varsity teams in football

basketball, baseball, etc. But what we'd like to see are more 12th-grade, 11th-

grade, 10th-grade, etc., so that no boy is deprived of a chance to play, if he so wishes.

We also think that the State High School Athletic Association and the various local administrators would do well to take more positive stand in favor of girls sports. Let's have more girls swimming, track and softball teams,

What's wrong with the gals playing on tennis and golf teams which represent their schools?

Les Anders, athletic director of Livonia schools and one of leading individuals in this area when it comes to handling the President's program, passes along some interesting information which school and recreation officials bight do well to heed. The basic elements in health and physical education instruction follow:

1-Full recognition by physical educators, health educators, parents, citiens, school administrators and recreation officials that the attainment and maintenance of physical fitness is a basic responsibility or physical education and health education.

2-A daily class period allotted to physical educations from grades kindergarden through the twelfth. 3-During this period every girl and boy participates in sufficient vigorous activity to insure the benefits which result

from exercise. This is the unique function of physical education. 4 Every physical education class should be conducted to provide proper warmup, sequence of activities, progressive development of strength, endurance and other physical attributes. 5-Teachers must themselves project the image of fit-

nett. They always should endeavour to be examples through personal appearance, enthusiasm and participation. 6-In addition to the period allotted for physical education, sufficient curriculum time should be provided to adequately

teach healthful and safe living, which includes an understanding of the effects of inactivity and the role of exercise in the development and maintenance of good health.

In order of priority, the Council's objectives include: 1-At least four medical examinations for a student during his school career.

2-Use of a screening test to identify the physically underdeveloped child and provision of a development program to meet the individual needs. 3-Use of a comprehensive testing program to evaluate

pupil progress and to motivate improvement.

As you can see our school and recreation officials are doing a good job hereabouts in the matter of physical fitness. But all of us still have a long way to go . . . and unless we all do our job . . . too many of us will continue to live in a sub-par physical fashion.
