Cuts of \$450,000 Listed Should Millage Issue Fail No Sports, Delay Junior High School Opening

Elimination of sports, cutting the teaching staff, putting some children on half days, eliminating the Adult Education and Recreation Department and not opening the new Junior High School are a few of the things that will happen should the 5-mill levy be defeated July 30 by Plymouth Community School District voters.
