

Vandals Have \$380 Spree At New School


Building and Grounds Su-pervisor Thomas Kelly answered that initial cost plus breakage makes it an economically unsound investment.




The judge and a group of followers drove to various locations in the area, including the trailer park and the homes of plaintiffs. Ten minutes was allowed between stops.



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

After a while this dirt, instead of being removed by brushing, is pressed further into the material and causes it to become hard. This transition, however, is gradual and people do not notice the cloth becoming slightly sticky. The dirt must be coaxed out at regular intervals by drycleaning. Without this maintenance a suit is not being treated properly and it is unfair to both your tailor and the cloth manufacturer."
