Nearly Paid-in-Full, \$817,000 School Ready to Open

When the new Junior High School-West opens its doors for the first time on Sept. 6, most of the \$817,750 unit will be paid for.

And because the structure is being built on a pay-as-you-go basis, interest payments amounting to almost \$200,000 will be saved.

WORKMEN ARE busy this week moving furniture and equipment into the Plymouth School District's newest building located at Sheldon Rd. and Ann Arbor Trail. Because work on the building was ahead of schedule, the school district will have no trouble getting the building ready for the first

There will be around 450 pupils attending school there this year. Of these, 90 will be sixth graders and 360 will be seventh graders.

All seventh graders in the system will attend the Junior High-West, while the sixth graders will be the overflow caused by the closing of the outlying schools in Canton Township.

When the second phase of the building is opened in 1964, both the Junior High-East and West will have comparative programs, both having seventh, eighth and ninth graders.

THE NEW Junior High was built in two phases in order to save taxpayers money. In 1960, the Board of

Education submitted to voters a proposal to establish a Building and Site Sinking Fund. It called for five mills for five years with proceeds to be used to construct buildings as the money came in.

The projection estimated that the Sinking Fund will bring in \$2,600,000 during its five years. If a bond issue for 14 years had

been floated for the same amount, interest would have cost \$600,000. This savings, the Board estimated, would build another elementary school. (In contrast, Livonia sells 29-year

bonds. For every dollar borrowed, \$1 in interest will be paid during the life of the bonds.) Voters approved establishment of

Several times the Board has issued short-term notes to borrow money ahead on anticipated tax collection so that construction work could

With the first phase costing \$817,750 (plus equipment) the interest saving on this building is nearly \$200,000. There was some interest on the shortterm notes, but these were sold at very low rates and the money from these notes is drawing higher interest while deposited in the bank. The last of these notes will be paid by next March — meaning that phase 1 of the Junior High - West will be paid-infull at that time.

built five years ago at a cost of \$1,749,838. While the Junior High-East has 34 teaching stations, Junior High-West will have 36.

Besides the first phase of the new Junior High, revenue from the Building and Site Sinking Fund has been used to rehabilitate the High School and build additions to several elementary schools.





ONE OF THE "luxury" items one might find are the terrazzo floors in all hallways. Classroom floors are vinyl asbestos. Kelly notes that the terrazzo floors are definitely more expensive to lay, but estimates that they will pay for themselves in five years because of maintenance savings. "If they ever get bad, all we have to do is finish grind them and they are like new." The present High School still has its terrazzo floors that were installed when the building was erected 44 years ago.

"We have also used built-in color Phase 1. wherever possible," Kelly asserted. By this he means that material is used where color is part of the material and does not need painting.

There are 20 classrooms in the two-floor level. Some of them are extra-large and will be divided in half when the second phase is finished.


