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ORDINANCE NO. 288

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 13.07 of Ordinance No. 182, Zoning Ordinance of the City of Plymouth is hereby amended to read as Pastor Edgar Hoenecke de- follows:

> Section 13.07. POWERS OF THE BOARD OF APPEALS. The Board of Appeals may reverse or affirm, wholly or partly, or may modify the order, requirement, decision or determin-ation appealed from and shall make such order, requirement, decision or determination as in its opinion ought to be made in the premises, subject to the conditions and limitations of this Section, and to that end shall have all the powers of the officer from whom the appeal is taken. The decision of the Board in these and all other matters heard by it shall be final insofar as it involves discretion or finding of facts.

> The Board of Appeals, acting as such, has no power or authority to change the classification of any property on the Zoning Map or to make any change in the provisions of this Ordinance.

The Board of Appeals may in specific cases and subject to appropriate conditions and safeguards, determine and vary the application of the regulations herein established in harmony with their general purposes and intent as follows

Every decision of the Board shall be subject to review by certiorari as prescribed in Section 10 of Act 207 of the Public Acts of 1921, as amended.

A. ADVISORY OPINIONS. To render an advisory decision or opinion, on any matter referred to it by the Building Inspector, whether or not such matter is expressly or clearly implied by the terms of this Ordinance as being with in the scope of his power and authority to dispose of, when in his judgment, such action would be necessary or helpful in maintaining the spirit and intent of this Ordinance.

B. VARIANCES. The Board of Appeals, as herein created, is a body of limited power. The Board shall have power to vary or adapt the strict application of any of the requirements of this Ordinance in the case of exceptionally irregular, narrow, or shallow lots, or other exceptional physiowner of the reasonable use of the land or building involved, but in no other case, except as specifically described. How ever, no variance in the provisions or requirements of this Ordinance shall be authorized by the Board unless the Board finds evidence that all the following facts and conditions exist.

That there are exceptional or extraordinary circumstances or conditions applying to the property in question to the intended use of the property that do not apply generally to other properties in the same zoning district.

That such variance is necessary for the preservation and enjoyment of a substantial property right similar to that possessed by other properties in the same district and in the same vicinity. The possibility of increased financial return shall not, of itself, be deemed sufficient to warrant a vari-

That the authorizing of such variance will not be of substantial detriment to adjacent property, and will not ma-terially impair the intent and purpose of this Ordinance or

That the condition or situation of the specific piece of property, or the intended use of said property, for which the variance is sought, is not of so general or recurrent a nature as to make reasonably practicable the formulation of a general regulation for such conditions or situation.

1. VARIATIONS IN OUTER COURTS, YARDS, LOT-AREA AND PERCENTAGE OF LOT COVERAGE. To permit vari-ations in the requirements for outer courts in dwellings, and to permit such variation or modification of yard, lot area and percentage of lot coverage requirements of this Ordinance as may be necessary to secure an appropriate improvement of a parcel of land which was of such size, shape or dimension, or which has such peculiar or exceptional geographical or topographical conditions that it cannot be appropriately improved without such variation or modification; provided, that the purpose and spirit of this Ordinance shall be observed, public safety secured and substantial justice done.

2. VARIATION IN LOCATION OF OFF-STREET PARKING FACILITIES. Permit a variation or modification in the required location of off-street parking facilities or in the amount of off-street parking facilities required, or both, if after investigation by the Board, it is found that such variation is necessary to secure an appropriate development of a specific parcel of land which has such peculiar or exceptional geographical conditions, or is of a size, shape, or dimension that it cannot be reasonably developed in accordance with the provisions of Section 3.13, and that any variation will not be inconsistent with the spirit and purpose of this Ordinance, with public safety and with substantial justice.

3. VARIATION IN REGULATIONS OF SECTION 3.14. Permit a variation, modification or exception in the required regulations specified in Section 3.14 of this Ordinance, if after investigation, by the Board, it is found that such variation, modification or exception is necessary because of peculiar existing conditions and that such variation, modification or exception will not be inconsistent with the purpose and spirit of this Ordinance.

4. VARIATION IN THE LOCATION OF BULK STORAGE TANKS ABOVE GROUND. The Board of Appeals, subject to the procedure, provisions and limitations of Section 13.07, may permit a variation in the location of bulk storage tanks above ground, but not less than sixty (60) feet from any property line under the following conditions and safe-

> (a) When tanks are located adjacent to railroad rights-of-way more than sixty-six (66) feet in width, tanks may be permitted within ten (10) feet of the railroad right-of-way line.

> (b) When all buildings adjacent to the pro-perty lines on abutting property are of fireproof construction or a light non-combustible construction.

(c) Where abutting property is vacant or is used for a use of a combustible nature; such as a lumber yard, tanks shall not be less than one hundred (100) feet from such abutting property line.

(d) When Group A Tanks are used and equipped either with (1) an approved permanently attached extinguishing system or (2) an approved

5. VARIATION IN THE LOCATION OF SIGNS. The Board of Appeals, subject to the procedure, provisions and limitations of Section 13.07, may permit a variance from the requirements of Section 9.01 (i) hereto, by granting a temporary permit for a sign to project more than eighteen (18) inches beyond the building line when the building line, as established by the Master Thorofare Plan, forces the sign to be so located that it will be hidden or partially hidden from

> (a) The sign shall not project more than eighteen (18) inches beyond the building line as established by the majority of the buildings in the block.

(b) The temporary permit as to location of the sign shall be effective until the authorization of the street improvement, at which time the City shall notify the owner that the temporary permit shall cease and that the sign shall be removed, or removed and replaced in a position in compliance with the Zoning Ordinance.

(c) The cost of removal or replacement of the sign shall be paid for by the owner or lessee of the building or land upon which the sign is located.

(d) The sign construction shall comply with the requirements of the Building Code. C. EXCEPTIONS. The Board of Appeals shall have

authority to make exceptions as specifically set forth in this Ordinance, subject to the conditions and standards specifically

1. STANDARDS. The types of uses requiring Board of Appeals or City Planning Commission approval shall be deemed to be permitted uses in their respective districts, subject to the requirements and standards set forth in this Section. Each specific use for which a permit is sought should be considered as an individual case and shall conform to the detailed application of the following standards in a manner appropriate to the particular circumstances of such use.

QUIRING BOARD OF APPEALS OR CITY PLANNING COM-MISSION APPROVAL FOR A PERMIT, shall be of such a location, size and character, that in general, it will be in harmony with the appropriate and orderly development of the district in which it is situated and will not be detrimental to the orderly development of adjacent districts. The Board of tion to the following:

> (a) The location and size of the use and the nature and intensity of the operations involved in or conducted in connection with it.

> (b) Its size, layout and its relation to pedes trian and vehicular traffic to and from the use, and taking into account, among other things, convenient routes of pedestrian traffic particularly children.

> (c) The assembly of persons in connection with it will not be hazardous of the neighborhood or be incongruous therewith or conflict with the normal traffic of the neighborhood.

> (d) Vehicular turning movements in relation to routes of traffic flow, relation to street intersections, site distance and the general character and intensity of development of the neighborhood.

(e) In commercial or industrial districts, the nature, location, height, size and site layout shall be such that it will be a harmonious part of the district in which it is situated, taking into account, among other things, prevailing shopping habits, convenience of access by prospective patrons, the physical and economic relationship of one type of use to another, and characteristic groupings of uses in a commercial or industrial district.

(f) The site layout, the location, nature and height of walls, fences and the display of signs in connection with the use shall be such that the use will not hinder the appropriate development and use of adjacent land and buildings or impair the

(g) The location, size, height, intensity and site layout of the use shall be such that its operations will not be objectionable to nearby dwellings, by reason of noise, fumes or flash of lights to a greater degree than is normal with respect to the proximity of commercial to residential uses.

2. THE FOLLOWING ARE LISTED EXCEPTIONS.

(a) BUILDINGS DAMAGED BY FIRE, ETC. Where a building located in a district restricted against its use has been damaged by fire, act of God, or other calamity to the extent of not more than seventy-five (75%) percent of its value, as determined by appraisal, a permit may be granted by the Board of Appeals for its reconstruction, within a period of not to exceed one (1) year from the date of such fire or other calamity.

(b) DISTRICT LINE DIVIDES A LOT OF RECORD. Where a district boundary line divides a lot of record, at the time of passage of this Ordinance, permit the extension of a use permitted on the less restricted portion of such lot to the portion lying in more restricted district, but not for a distance of more than fifty (50) feet beyond the district boundary line, in any case.

(c) LOT HAVING LESS AREA THAN REQUIRED. Grant a permit for the erection of a one or two family dwelling on a lot held under a separate and distinct ownership from the adjacent lots, and of record at the time of the passage of this Ordinance, which has less area than the lot area per family requirements of this Ordinance for the district in which such lot is located. "

(d) BUILDING FOR PUBLIC SERVICE CORPOR-ATION. Permit the erection and use of a building, or an addition to an existing building, of a public service corporation to be used for public utility purposes, in any permitted district to a greater height or of larger area than the district require-ments herein established, and permit the location in any use district of a public utility building, struc-ture, or use; provided, the Board of Appeals shall find such use, height, area, building or structure reasonably necessary for the public convenience and service, and provided, further, that such building, structure, or use is designed, erected and landscaped to conform harmoniously with the general architecture and plan of such district.

(e) LOADING SPACE EXCEPTION. Permit a partial variation or exception to the loading space | tive on the 11th day of September, A.D., 1962. provision of Section 3.04 where, after investigation by the Board, it is found that the volume of vehicular service will not require compliance with said provision, and will not cause undue interference with the public use of the streets or alleys, or im-peril the public safety and where such modification

or exception will not be inconsistent with the purpose and spirit of this Ordinance, and this variation or exception shall apply only to the use for which appeal was taken.

(f) ERECTION OF BUILDING TO ITS FULL HEIGHT. Permit the erection of a building to its full height or use, as originally planned, prior to the adoption date of this Ordinance, when the existing foundations and structural members are designed to carry such buildings higher.

(g) GASOLINE FILLING STATIONS. Gasoline filling stations shall comply with the aforementioned standards and the following conditions:

Shall observe all applicable laws of the State of Michigan and Ordinances of the City of Plymouth.

Is contained in a structure limited in size to three (3) single car service bays, plus restrooms and office and/or supply storage space.

3. The operations shall be limited to the terms of the definition of a gasoline filling station in Section 1.21.

4. Park no vehicles, being serviced or stored for customers, on streets, alleys, public sidewalks or public park strips:

5. Shall provide a barrier of such dimensions (not less than four (4) feet in height) that occupants of adjacent structures are not unreasonably disturbed, either by day or night, by the move-ment of vehicles, and light facilities are so arranged that they neither unreasonably disturb occupants of adjacent residential properties, nor interfere with traffic.

6. No gasoline station shall be located or no property used nearer than two hundred (200) feet, in any direction, as measured from any point on the property line of any church, school, (public or parochial), public playground or park, public library, police station, fire station, post office, hospital, theatre or any place of public assembly where twenty-five (25) or more persons or-dinarily and with some regularity are gathered for lawful purposes

(h) PUBLIC GARAGES. Public garages shall comply with the aforementioned standards and the following conditions:

All cars shall be serviced within the

Wrecked cars must be stored within the building or in a fenced-in yard which shall be screened from view from any street or private abutting

(i) MOTELS. Motels shall comply with the aforementioned standards and the following con-

Each unit of a motel shall provide a lot area of not less than six hundred (600) square feet for the first room of eighty (80) or more square feet and an additional lot area equal to two (2) times the room area for each additional room of eighty (80) square feet or

2. Provide side yards of not less than ten (10) feet each; a front yard of not less than twenty-five (25) feet; and no separate buildings shall be less than ten (10) feet apart.

3. Each unit shall have one (1) room of not less than one hundred fifty (150) square feet of floor area, a bathroom of not less than tweny-five (25) square feet of floor area, exclusive of the tub

4. If the permanent residence of the owner or manager of the motel is to be provided as part of such motel or motor court, one complete dwelling unit of not less than six hundred, seventy-two (672) square feet of floor space shall be incorporated.

Where a motel is adjacent to a residential district, or where a rear yard of a motel is located on the opposite side of a street or alley, zoned for residen-tial use, a six (6) foot masonry wall or chain link fence shall be erected on the rear property line.

(i) EXTENSION OF HOURS OF WORK. Permit the extension of hours of work in the M-1 Districts, when such extension is necessary because of an emergency, and under such conditions and safeguards as will protect the neighboring residential districts from unnecessary disturbances.

(k) REMOVAL OF SOIL, SAND AND OTHER MATERIAL. The Board of Appeals may direct the issuance of a temporary permit for the removal of soil, sand and other material subject to the conditions under Section 3.07 and the Standards under

(1) The Board of Appeals may approve other types of storage, except bulk storage of flammable fluids above ground in an M-1 District, provided such storage complies with the State Rules and Regulations as established by Public Act No. 207, P.A. of 1941, as amended, or by the Fire Prevention Ordinance of the City of Plymouth, whichever is most established. is most stringent.


