That's Prediction Of Commission

New City Hall, No Cost To Taxpayers

The City of Plymouth will have a new City Hall within a year at a cost of \$550,000 and no additional cost to the taxpavers.

That's the prediction of Mayor Robert Sincock and members of the City Commission after learning that \$90,000,000 in federal funds is available to the State of Michigan and particularly to distressed areas-provided the community involved enters into a contract within 120 days of the day of applica-

The money is Michigan's share of the \$90,000,000 public works capital improvement act which became official with the signature of President Kennedy two weeks ago.

The act provides that allocations will be made to any type of project representing public needs for state and local governments, such as City Halls, jails, water facilities, sewer facilities, police stations, fire stations, streets, parks and libraries-the latter if not connected with schools.

The object of the act is to accelerate immediate employment and support the general economy. Thus the project must contribute to local unemployment—100 men employed for one



The grants-in-aid for any local project cannot exceed 50 percent of the cost of construction, not including land costs, or 75 percent if the local government does not have the money with which to finance its share.

Mayor Sincock pointed out to the Commission that Plymouth is eligible for the city hall, water facilities, streets and parks sections of the act.

But after due consideration, the Commission decided to place all of its eggs in one basket and hurry plans for the new City Hall which will cost an estimated \$500,000 with an additional \$50,000 for the land.

The plans call for the new building to be constructed adjacent to the Dunning-Hough Library on Main Street, the present structure to be razed to make room for the extension of Church Street to Union and Dodge Street closed off for the new City Hall.

Although plans are still under consideration, the commission instructed City Manager Albert Glassford to contact several architect firms as to their availability and to begin work at once on specifications so that the City can make its bid for a share of the federal money.

Glassford and his associates have been working feverishly ever since the bombshell struck in a special session of city and village leaders in Lansing where Gov. John B. Swainson explained the act. It is believed a firm of architects will be hired

within another week and instructed to go over previous plans for the proposed new City Hall for recommendations and any changes they think necessary. The proposed City Hall would include space for

all branches of the city government. It would bring the Police and Fire departments under a single roof, provide space for civic meetings and give all departments much needed space for their operations. The City's share of the cost will be handled by

a City Hall Bonding Authority which will sell bonds to cover the \$300,000 needed for the land and build-This will be amortized by rental charges to the

various departments over a period of 10 to 15 years and the City will have a new City Hall at no additional expense to the taxpayers.

Another one, the Mai-Kai at Plymouth and Farmington Roads, will open in a few weeks.

Since there is risk, and since the Terrace is the first indoor house to be erected in almost a generation, the loction was of paramount significance. We can all soak up some confidence in the economic future of this general district from the fact that this brisk trading area was the one chosen.





Is football-high school and collegiate-really in such terrible shape?

Fritz Crisler, the athletic director at the University of Michigan and a member of the National Collegiate Association's football rules committee, says something has to be done . . . because football is in danger.

State High School Director Charles E. Forsythe and his assistant, Al Bush, speak in the same tone as does

Crisler declares that between the modern-day equipment and "illegal" tactics, football injuries are mounting and the sport is receiving great amounts of bad

Forsythe and Bush claim that national high school authorities, who have been paying extra close attention to

football of late, can see nothing wrong with the equipment. "But," says Forsythe, "schoolboy football has received -and will continue to receive-sharp attacks from the newspapers, fans, parents and administrators unless the rough stuff is eliminated."

In fact, according to Forsythe, if the present trend is maintained, the day of high school football in Michigan and elsewhere may be no more.

Obviously, judging by what Forsythe and Bush had to say had the state high school rules meetings held throughout Michigan in recent weeks, too many coaches of prep teams have resorted to cheating on the rules to achieve victories. And, the referees, also are to blame because they (meaning the whistleblowers) have ignored the elbows,

blows to the face, piling on, etc.

Never before that this writer can remember . . . and we have attended rules meetings in Michigan for almost 20 years . . . have the coaches and officials drawn the vocal

"To listen to some (the newspapers chiefly), the football injuries and deaths are the result of bad equip-ment," Bush said. "Not so. National school authorities have found that the real trouble is that too many coaches of high school teams try to copy pros and collegiates, The results: injuries upon injuries.

"Our rules haven't changed over the years when its come to illegal use of the hands, elbows, etc. The wording today is virtually identical with the wording of 20 years

"The trouble is that the coaches see the pros get away with something on television, so they put the same stuff into high school games. Some of the tactics started to get so common, that the referees just began to accept it.

"All of this has to stop. And at once. We must stress the safety element of football more than ever before Unless the coaches clean house and the referees do their parts, we're going to reach a situation from which we'll never be able to straighten up."

On the safety point, the high schools have made it mandatory every player wear a tooth protector.

The referees also have been instructed to make certain that every team warm up for three minutes before the start of the second half. It's been discovered that many injuries have occurred just after the third period began because the players "had cooled off."

"If a team doesn't warm up, so the officials can see them for three minutes," said Bush "the referee then must order the coach to follow the rule and at the same time slap on a 15-yard penalty for delaying the start of
