ANNUAL REPORT

Revenues for the General Fund fell \$43,900 below the anticipated level. The reduction was due to a decrease from the previous year of \$3,983,253 in state equalized valuation placed upon all properties within the School District upon which the allocated and voted millages were applied. The loss of revenue forced the Board of Education to cut budget allocations for maintenance of buildings and grounds, capital improvements and

Revenues from the Building and Site Sinking Fund (pay-as-you-go plan) were pri-used to finance the alteration and modernization program at the High School com-in the summer of 1961 and the first phase of the new Junior High School-West pleted in the summer of 1962.

You will note in the Annual Financial Report that all of the outstanding bentle Commission, the balance in this account will be transferred to the 1955 Debt Ruthum. Account. Bonds in the amount of \$310,000 issued in 1955 were also retired this year.
