The Professor Says...

Magazine carried an exceedingly well-written article entitled, "How We Drive Teachers to Quit." The story is directed at teachers, administrators, school boards, taxpayers, parents and children. It strives to show how each may be a little at fault for the large percentage of "dropouts" from the teaching profession - a percentage equal to the dropout of students from high school to-

Of course there are the usual debatable accounts, according to how one views the situation, but all in all, the article does give a fairly good description of the American educational system. It tells how the classroom teacher is affected by the many "outside" influences that prove detrimental to good classroom teaching

A survey of a recent graduation class in education from the University of Illinois found that 30 per cent of the graduates quit teaching after two years in the field and 40 per cent never entered teaching at all even though they were certified as teachers. It also showed that the average teachers going into the profession teaches for a period of only five years.

Something must be radically wrong somewhere. Many of the teachers who dropout are the very ones who should stay in the classroom.

ORDINANCE NO. 289



AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AND KNOWN AS "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE PLANTING, PRESER-VATION AND CARE OF ALL TREES, PLANTS, AND SHRUBS GROWING NOW OR HEREAFTER IN THE STREETS, PARKS, CEMETERY AND BOULEVARDS OR OTHER PLACES IN THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, AND PREVENTION OF PLANTING CERTAIN TREES WITHIN THE CITY

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. Section 3 of Ordinance No. 103, "An Ordinance to Regulate the Planting, Preservation and Care of All Frees, Plants, and Shrubs Growing Now or Hereafter in the Streets, Parks, Cemetery and Boulevards or Other Places in the City of Plymouth, and Prevention of Planting Certain Trees Within the City Limits", is hereby amended to read as

Section 3. No shade or ornamental tree, plant or shrub shall be planted in any street or public place of the City of Plymouth until the City Manager shall have approved the kind, size and variety of the same, designated the location thereof, and granted a permit for the planting of the same. Such planting shall be in accord with the Regulations for Tree Planting as adopted. by the City Commission. No trees designated in Section 3.1 of this ordinance as trees constituting a public nuisance or constituting a hazard to life and property shall be planted within a public right-of-way. Section 2. There is hereby added to said ordinance a

to be known as Section 3.1 to read as follows: Section 3.1 Trees planted on private property shall be restricted to the extent that no tree listed in the following list of trees shall henceforth be planted thin the corporate limits of the City of Plymouth. Such trees constitute a public nuisance and are a hazard to life and property. All of the listed trees are short-lived soft woods and as such are brittle and subject to sform damage. All of the listed trees have shallow roots which cause damage to public works and all are prolific seed bearers with the resultant nuisance.

Box Elder Chinese or Siberian Elm

Silver Maple Ailanthus (tree of heaven) Poplar (cottonwood, aspen)

European White and River Birches.

Section to be known as Section 4.1 to read as follows:

Section 4.1 The City shall issue a permit to plant trees in a public right-of-way; and the application for permit shall set forth the name and address of the property owner, the name and address of the landscape contractor, if any, performing the work, a description of the location of the proposed plant, and such other information as may be required by the City Commission. Permits shall be issued by the City Manager. A fee may be established by the City Commission for the issuance of such permits. ance of such permits.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall become operative and affective on the 11th day of December, 1962. Made, passed and adopted by the City Commission of the City of Plymouth, Michigan, this 19th day of November, 1962.
