Vallier said at another point that Remus, the manager of the Detroit water board, had stated publicly he would "do everything in his power to block City of Plymouth in its efforts to build a second water reservoir. The Board of Supervisors must pass on the City's request for two acres of land at the training school site. Said Commissioner Wernette: "I personally think there is a strong likelihood that we (City) won't get the Wayne County Training School land." This alone, however, will not halt the City's plans to build a second reservoir - a 3-million gallon structure - on Beck Rd. Commissioners earlier had picked up an option on three acres of land practically adjacent to the training school property. It is land that is almost as desirable from a stand-point of altitude as the training school site. Later, Vallier said:

Vallier said that at the present there "is no meeting of the minds over the reservoir between the Detroit Water Board and City of Plymouth officials.

He said that Remus claims City of Plymouth has "no need" for another reservoir, since Detroit water, according to Remus, will fill this gap. On the other hand, the City's consulting engineers have recommended a new reservoir to improve the City's water storage facilities.

Interestingly, Commissioner Marvin Terry told that a previous consulting engineer firm — some seven years ago — had recommended at that time the City build another reservoir.

"Common sense tells us that we want another water reservoir," said Commissioner Carl Shear. DPW director Joseph Bida has come out fully in favor of a new reservoir, too.


The furniture not only 'expresses, the open graceful ines of a comedy, but accents the crisp lines of the gray walls and huge eleven foot high window with inlay motif.

Goodwill Rep. Special Guest Of Kiwanians

Bert Bates was a guest at the Plymouth Kiwanis Club's r e g u l a r meeting Tuesday, Nov. 27 and Kenneth Way, program chairman for the evening, presented g u e s t speaker Paul Field to the 71 Kiwanians present.

Field is associated with Goodwill Industries of Detroit. He spoke to the group on the subject. "The Dollars and \$ense of Goodwill Industries."

Field first became acquainted with Goodwill activities when, as a program director for WWJ-TV, a sponsor requested that he prepare a 28 minute film on Goodwill Industries for television. In the preparation of this film, he became thoroughly familiar with the organization.

Goodwill Industries is a non-profit organization that helps people through the repairing of discarded objects. The five main goals are Evaluation, Counseling, Training, Employment and Placement of handicapped persons.

In 1961 this organization employed on the average of 400 persons who would conceivably have been unemployable elsewhere. In 1961 this organization paid wages in the amount of \$1,073,000.00 of which \$145,000.00 was deducted for various payroll taxes.

There are eight retail stores in the Detroit area to sell the products that these people produce. The model colonial home in the Parklane Estates Subdivision, just north of Ann Arbor Road and just west of Sheldon Road has been furnished by G o o d w i 11 Industries.

There are 126 Goodwill Industries in the United States. Field closed by stressing the motto of Goodwill and its employees: "Not a Charity. But A Chance."
