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

"Mention was made in the report that (additional) storage would be required even if an outside source was obtained. The fact that the City of Detroit has offered water in the near future, if Plymouth (City) wants it, does not alter the fact that (new) storage facilities are necessary.

"We therefore recommend that the City proceed with plans for the construction of the storage tank.

Said Vallier:

"I want it clearly explained in writing that the City recommended virtually the same action. As far back as going ahead with its reservoir, regardless."



It could conceivably render a dangerous situation here, in the event of a breakdown at any point in Detroit's trans-mission lines before water reaached the City.

Industrial users here consume more than one-half of the total water used. It is this fact that assures residential users of receiving a "favorable" water rate when compared to prices of residentially-consumed water elsewhere.

Consequently, City Commissioners plan to set up a joint meeting between representatives of local industry here to discuss the Detroit proposal. Among the industrial representatives will be men from Burroughs, Evans Products and even the Mayflower Hotel, which is also considered a

In all, there are 29 major users of City water, most of them industrial consumers.

Present City water rates are based on approximately 750 million gallons total pumpage during the 12-month period starting with June 1961. Of this amount, Burroughs Corp. consumed approximately half.

Later, after the special meeting had been adjourned, Mayor Robert Sincock issued a statement:
"Our main concern," he said, "is having a water supply system that quarantees adequate pressure at all times with prices that are in line with today's rates.

"We simply have too much money invested in our present water system to turn it over to somebody else without taking a cold, hard look at the circumstances.

"We're not fighting anybody on this matter, and patricularly not Detroit," he said. "Instead, we have only the best interests of the community in mind."
