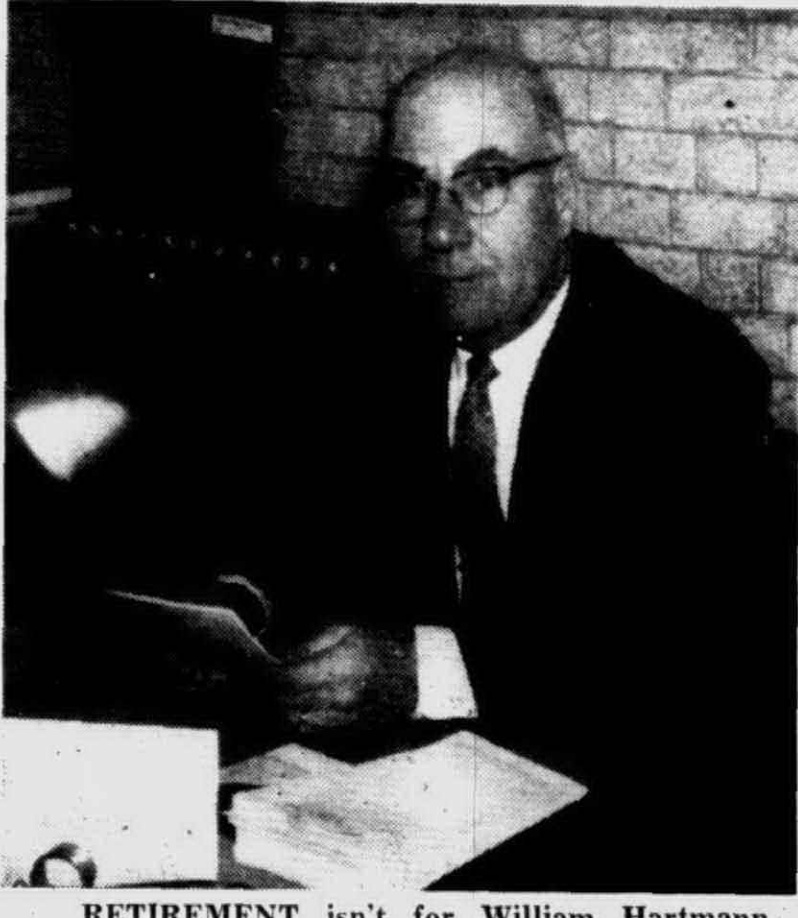

## 11 File For Plymouth Commission Posts

# City Sees First Primary In 15 Years

With a total of 11 candidates for the four vacancies on the City Commission, and more expected before the Dec. 31 deadline, Plymouth will have its first city primary election in 15 years.

That was the announcement by City Clerk Joseph Near after nine had filed for the posts. The Plymouth City charter provides for a primary if the total reaches nine.

It was on Feb. 17, 1947 that the last primary was held and Near indicated interest is greater this year than in any previous election since.

Plymouth's supervisor on the Wayne County Board of Supervisors, Vallier still has two years to serve as Supervisor—his term ends in 1965—but is eligible for the Commission and the Board of Supervisors.

He is an engineer with the Ford Motor Co. and has served

as the City's spokesman and representative in the negotiations with the county and the Detroit Water Board in the much-discussed snarl over land for a site for the proposed new reservoir.

Vallier also has been the spokesman in the discussions with the Water Board over the

proposal to furnish Detroit water to the city at some future date.

Vallier's petition was the 11th issued by Near during a week in which five other applications were processed for city residents.

The others included: Robert Smith, Jr., 700 Pacific, a

teacher and member of the counseling staff at Plymouth Senior High School; Eldon Martin, 850 Fairground, an employee of the Ford Motor Co.; Charles Derr, 1078 Simpson, a well-known Plymouth realtor; Neil Davidson, 1095 Roosevelt, an employee of the Detroit Edison Co.

The list of candidates includes: VALLIER, Davidson, Smith Derr and Martin along with G. GEORGE LAWTON, 1317 Sheridan.

HARRY HUNTER, 234 Maple. JAMES JABARA, 231 Irvin. GEORGE HUDSON, 706 Burroughs.

LEON MERRIMAN, 147 Plymouth Road. WILLIAM SILVIS, 1329 Carol.

Petitions must be in the hands of City Clerk Near on Dec. 31 by 4 p.m. for the candidates to be eligible for the primary.

In the meantime, Near anticipates that perhaps as many as four more names will be added to the list before the end of the week. He indicated he has had that many inquiries but none is considered a candidate until he or she officially takes out a petition.

The primary will determine the eight candidates for the election on April 1 from which the top four will become members of the Commission. The two receiving the highest number of votes qualify for four-year terms and the third and fourth will be elected for two years each.

Latest to file is Archie Vallier, 1338 Penniman.

## See Battle In Township For Three Board Posts

The hottest political battle in years is seen in Plymouth Township for the three posts on the Board of Trustees which come up for grabs in the April election.

To date, at least six petitioners have been taken out by candidates for the three positions.

three in total votes become Trustees. The two with the most ballots receive the four-

year terms and the third in line receives the shorter two-years.

Incumbent C. Veach Sparks, 4493 Joy Road, already has filed and will seek re-election to one of the spots. The other two are additions to the Board created by voters in an election two years ago which authorized increasing the membership to seven members due to a hike in population.

Prior to 1963, the Board had been composed of five members including two trustees, the Supervisor, Township Clerk and Township Treasurer.

Supervisor Roy Lindsay, Treasurer Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes and recently appointed Clerk John McEwen, who was named to fill the unexpired term of the late Fred Miller, will run for re-election.

- Additional candidates are expected to file petitions before 4 p.m. deadline on Dec. 31.

All will be seeking one of three posts, two of which will carry four-year terms and the third for a period of two years.

In addition to the Trustees and the other members of the Board, Township electors will be called upon to vote for Justice of the Peace, four constables, a member of the Board of Review and the Township Highway Commissioner.

The list of candidates will be reduced to three Republicans and three Democrats in the February primary. The six will qualify for the April election at which the top

## Bronx-Born Bill Hartmann Couldn't Stand Retirement

He was born, raised and educated in the Bronx section of New York City but Plymouth City Commissioner William Hartmann, 63, who ends nine years of service as a public official next April, doesn't have a semblance of that accent that goes with native New Yorkers.

Matter of fact Bill has lost all of his eastern traits during his years in the Midwest. He resides at 383 Blunk St. with his wife, Lillian, and is enjoying his retirement from business by serving as credit manager for Davis and Lent, 336 S. Main.

Retirement wasn't meant for Bill who retired from his position as general sales manager of the Sinclair Refining Co. in Detroit in 1960. He managed to take things easy for about two months and then couldn't stand the "life of Riley" and took his present position. He's on the job bright and early every morning.

But Bill has decided that public service is out after nine years and when his present six-year term with the Commission expires in April, he's going to settle back to enjoy his grandchildren and his hobby of collecting the front pages of the Detroit newspapers and all editions of Life Magazine.

Hartmann was graduated from Erasmus High School in New York City and then attended Fordham University. In addition he's an alumnus of the Sales Analysis Institute of New York.

He first came to the area at the age of 21 when he accepted a position with the Bakelite Corp. in Wyandotte, a career that was interrupted by a stint in the Army during World War I when he served in the Motor Transport Unit as a dispatch rider.

While in Wyandotte, he met the girl of his dreams—the daughter of his landlady—and she has been his wife for the past 39 years.

After returning from the wars, Hartmann took a position with the Cadillac Motor Car Co., then located on Cass Avenue in Detroit and remained for three years until the plant was moved to the present location on Clarke Ave.

Bill left Cadillac to open his own hardware store in Trenton in partnership with his wife's uncle. He sold out in 1926 to become a distributor for the Sinclair Refining Co. in Wayne, transferred to Detroit as plant manager of the Lyndon Ave. plant and then shifted to Philadelphia and Trenton, N. J., for two years.

## Yule Eve Fire Routs Plymouth Families

Five families were routed from their apartments in the 80-year-old mansion at 243 N. Main in Plymouth on Christmas Eve when a pesky fire broke out between the walls and joists and kept firemen battling smoke and flames for more than 10 hours.

It was Plymouth's second major blaze in a week and damage this time was estimated at more than \$15,000. The families suffered smoke and water damage to their belongings but no deputy fire chief was gutted by the flames, according to Singley Fire Chief Charles Groth.

The building is owned by Mrs. Cornelia Hoffman, 1986 W. Boston Blvd., Detroit.

Groth reported the fire broke out in one of the rear apartments shortly after 7:30 p.m. Monday night and firemen fought the smoke and flames throughout the night.

The first major blaze broke out a week earlier at 200 N. Main where the flames destroyed a five-apartment building for damage estimated at more than \$30,000.

## Micro-Tech Has 20 Workers

Micro-Tech Corp., newest of Plymouth's additions to the industrial colony, has started operations in the long empty former home of the Kroger store on Forest Ave.

Headed by Edgar Galpin, Commerce Lake industrialist, the new corporation which will manufacture harness for electrical wiring and electrical assembly in addition to electronic components, also is backed by Detroit capitalists.

Galpin indicated the plant, which is operating on a temporary permit granted by the City Commission, plans on using the 12,000-square foot building until such time that it becomes necessary to move into larger quarters. It already has started looking for such a site within the confines of the City.

## Plant Starts Operation In Plymouth

"We have more than 20 employees at the moment," he said. "And have started working on federal government contracts for the ordinance department, manufacturing harness, control panel boxes, rear and front light assemblies and other parts for tanks."

Galpin said the plant is still in the process of setting up machinery and won't be in full production for another two or three weeks.

"We anticipate that orders will come in rapidly once we show that we can meet order deadlines," he stated. "Since we are operating on a temporary permit at our present location, we plan on looking for another site in the industrial area as soon as we feel the need to expand. That should be within six or eight months if everything goes as we anticipate."

## Rapidstan Workers Reject Plant Shift To Plymouth Site

Hopes of Plymouth business, civic and industrial leaders of adding Rapidstan-Keystone Inc., a conveyor systems manufacturer, to the list of plants at the industrial park development on Plymouth Road, sagged late last week when plant officials indicated they had abandoned plans to purchase land in the park for a building.

The company had planned on constructing a 16,800 square foot plant but decided not to go ahead when a vote of employees was against the move.

The plant is located in Detroit and the workers didn't want to approve a shift that would involve so much more traveling to and from work.

## Plymouth Board Awards Contract For Boilers

William Brown, popular Social Studies teacher at Plymouth Senior High School, has tendered his resignation effective at the end of the first semester. The Board of Education voted to release Brown from his contract on the recommendation of Supt. Russell Isbister.

Brown has accepted a position as principal of the Comstock, Mich. High School, a small community located east of Kalamazoo. He was in his seventh year on the senior high faculty.

The Board awarded a contract for the installation of two gas-fired boilers at the senior high school to William A. McKinnon Co., of Detroit, on a bid of \$7,823. The work entails conversion of two oil burners and will be started as soon as the contracts are signed.

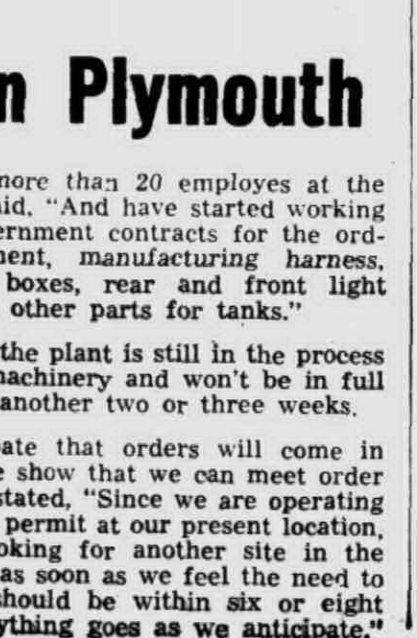
The Detroit firm was low bidder among seven firms including: Radiant Heat Engineering Co., of Dearborn, with bids of \$8,935 using synco-flame burner, \$9,735 using Lori-Blast burner, and \$11,135 using Powermaster burner; Al Holcomb Heating, Plymouth, \$9,990; Keith Heating, Plymouth, \$10,020; Otwell Heating, Plymouth, \$8,790; Comb and Groves, Detroit, \$8,448; ANJ Heating and Air Conditioning Co., Detroit, \$7,900.

The Board's curriculum committee discussed library needs and services in a meeting with Mrs. Bertha Green, chief librarian, and five school librarians.

Mrs. Green, as spokesman for the group, reported on the strength and weaknesses of the library services and recommended improvements.

These included: a central processing room at which all books would be ordered and catalogued for the nine libraries; employment of additional semi-skilled help to aid in cataloging; and additional space in the Allen School for library facilities.

**FACTS and OPINIONS**

(The following letter from The Editor is self-explanatory but one note can be added: the building proposed is modern, handsome and looks more like a big new school than anything else. It would be beautifully landscaped. There is no problem with heavy equipment or other things which sometimes are associated with the word "Armory.")

Commanding General U. S. Army, Sixth Corps Battle Creek, Michigan Attention: Mr. Ralph Manning Dear Mr. Manning:

This is written in connection with the efforts of the Sixth Corps to find a good site for a training armory in the general area of Livonia. I publish newspapers in Livonia, Redford Township and Plymouth and am a new State Representative from this same District. As one citizen, I'm eager to have your facility locate here. Our reporters have covered the meetings in which you have been unable to secure the zoning necessary for certain sites in Redford Township and Livonia.

The thought has occurred that an excellent place for the training facility might be in close proximity to a new Community College which will be built in Livonia starting almost immediately, to be open for students in September, 1964.

This College (similar in purpose to what once was known as "junior college") north a 100 acre site at Seven Mile and Haggerty roads in northwestern Livonia. This is rolling, picturesque land and was carefully selected as a location for educational buildings. In time it will become a cultural center and will be served by transportation and the other public utilities required for a college with 4,000 or 5,000 students.

At the outset, the College has no funds for an athletic building or large assembly hall. Your facility could render a magnificent service in that way.

For the U. S. Army, the advantage is a good location in a wholesome, educational setting; and, possibly, land which might cost nothing or which would be reasonable in price.

To the Community, there would be the benefits of the construction contracts for a \$500,000 training building which I understand are given to local contractors wherever possible. There would be the regular monthly Army payroll. And there would be the presence of a big, modern building for community assemblies, dances, and meetings—a facility which does not exist today.

The Community College is a joint project supported by Plymouth, Livonia and Garden City taxpayers today, and others will join later. Hence, the Army facility on the campus would serve the interests of citizens from several Wayne County communities.

I have discussed the suggestion with Lt. Col. Lloyd Plowman; with Dr. Eric Bradner of the N. W. Wayne Community College; and with a few Livonia City officials. All expressed high enthusiasm for it, pending close analysis, of course.

In any event, please know that I personally want to assist you in any practical way to locate hereabouts.

## College Assured About Sewer

Assurance that sewers will be built by the City of Livonia to the site of the new Community College in Livonia was given in a formal resolution by Council Wednesday night.

Trustees of the College had been advised by their attorneys that the action taken previously by the council was not sufficiently binding to justify the Board exercising its option to purchase the land at Seven Mile and Haggerty roads.

The option expired recently and the Board secured a three month extension.

Previously the Livonia Council had formally made application for federal funds to help build the sewer, under the accelerated public works program. There is no assurance the federal money will be made available, however.

The new resolution, introduced by John Dooley, declares "the intention of the City of Livonia to build the sewer, with or without federal aid."

Will Greer in handling the role for APA put on as fine a display of histrionic hysteria every night when confronted by the ineane actions of his young comely wife yet to be seen in this area. His broad buffoonery brought the part to life. Sir Richardson understood on the safety of underplaying and I'm afraid I'll have to buy the APA version.

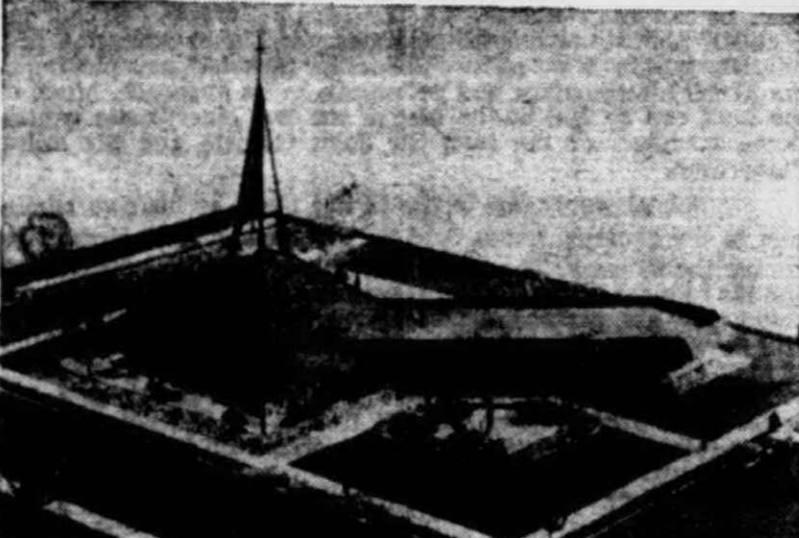

New Lutheran Chapel Anticipated For Michigan State Campus

Students and Lutheran alumni of Michigan State University are carrying the appeal for building fund contributions to Lutherans throughout Michigan. It is hoped that the necessary \$100,000 for the new Chapel-Student Center to serve Michigan State University in East Lansing will be realized for an early spring ground breaking.

The new campus church will rise at 444 Abbott Road, two blocks from the main campus entrance, and will extend a welcome to the entire student body. At present, some 1,500 Synodical Conference Lutherans are on campus at State, including families of married students.

Cost of the completely furnished Chapel and Student Center will be \$350,000. Plans for ground breaking will be completed when \$100,000 has been secured, Pastor Bunden-thal states. Approximately \$75,000 in gifts and pledges have now been received. Martin Luther Chapel is sponsored by the English District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

Charles E. Stade, of Park Ridge, Illinois, is architect. The multiple needs of the campus ministry, projected into the future of a growing university have been incorporated into the plans. The Chapel will seat 350 with overflow area to accommodate 100. "The Chapel

offers five services each week," Pastor Bunden-thal points out. "Four every Sunday and one each Wednesday evening."

A student lounge, dining and recreation area with kitchen, office and counselling rooms, meeting rooms, Sunday School and nursery areas are included in the Center, which will have a full basement. The new building will replace a former fraternity house on the same location. The three-story frame building has served as Chapel and activity center since 1954, but no longer fills the needs of the growing student congregation.

Even so, today, the love of God reaches us in Christ not just at Christmas, but any time.

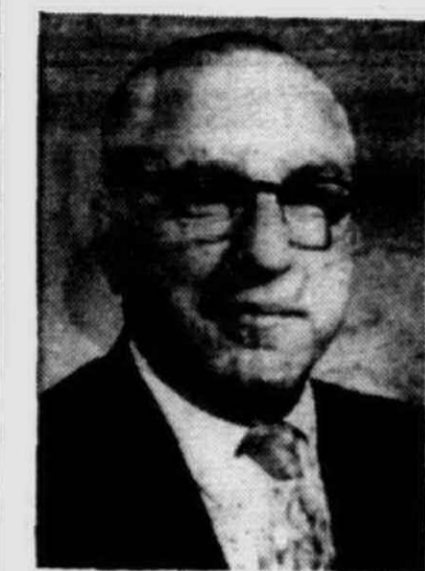

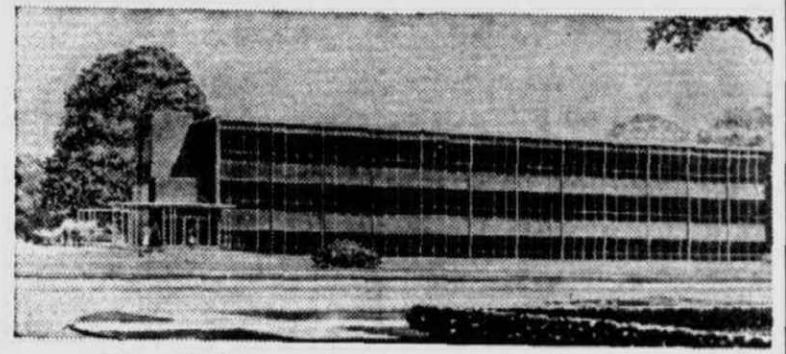

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# GM Spends \$38 Million In Livonia

# Poll In Livonia Favors Community Swim Pools

Swimming pools and artificial ice skating rinks headed the agendas of the recent Parks and Recreation Commission meeting.

Results of the swimming pool questionnaire distributed to school children in October show 1251 residents in favor of community sponsored outdoor swimming pools out of the 1854 replies received so far, announced Thomas Genova, chairman of the commission. This is a favoring ratio of about 2 to 1.

A break-down of the figures reveals more persons in favor of revenue bonds as a means of financing the construction and operation of an outdoor swimming pool. The questionnaire listed three possible ways to finance the pool: 296 replies were in favor of millage increase; 705 checked revenue bonds; 446 persons chose a membership plan.

To the third question, "Do you feel that civic associations, club houses, etc., should have low tax assessments? 931 replies said "yes", 675 replies were not in favor.

Genova said the commission is considering the possibility of eventually constructing four 'smaller' outdoor

swimming pools throughout the city instead of one large swimming center.

They are also looking into the possibility of an artificial ice skating rink.

Genova, 34419 Burton Lane, who has served on the commission since last April, was recently appointed chairman. A resident of Livonia for seven years, he is an active member of the Burton Hollow Civic Association.
