High and head of the counseling staff, polled a fat 466 to wind up third in the unofficial standings.

Another comparative youngster to politics, James Jabara, popular engineer and manufacturer, took down the fourth spot with 440 followed by George Hudson, a General Motors supervisor who has long followed the activities of the Commission and the Plymouth School Board, with 396.

The others nominated to make up the field of eight for the April 1 poll in which four will be named Commissioners, include: Neil Davidson 368. Russ Cutler 337 and Leon Merriman 334.


The three fading out of competition were Eldon Martin 320. William Silvis 300 and Harry Hunter 264.

Lawton was the early favorite of the city's political experts to head the voting but there was considerable conjecture as to who would wind up in the top four. Vallier, who has campaigned before as a candidate in a successful race for Supervisor, and newcomers Smith, Jabara and Hudson were rated as next in line and that's the way the vote came out.

Perhaps the biggest surprise came in the rather poor showing of Cutler, a former Commissioner, who was reported to have the backing of some members of the Commission, including at least two of the four who will bow out in April.

# Plymouth Solons Eye Fire Truck

If the price is right, the City of Plymouth Fire Department may have the services of a new aerial ladder truck in the not too distant future.

The City Commission Monday instructed City Manager Albert Glassford and Public Safety Director Kenneth Fisher to make a thorough study of the situation by visiting metropolitan fire departments and manufacturers of the equipment to learn if there is any chance of purchasing a rebuilt truck.

Fisher and Glassford told the Commission that a new 85-foot truck would cost \$44,000 and one with a 100-foot ladder would go as high as \$45,000. But they pointed out that a rebuilt truck could be purchased for much less, if one could be found.



From a teaching (and parent) point of view, the objective is that tenuous thing known as "preparing a youngster to face life." A prissy, circumspect view will give him the worst possible shock when he runs into reality. But an exaggerated concentration on the morbid, lurid, sordid and demented can ruin a young man's sense of values before he even starts into maturity.

There is a middle ground - teaching reality instead of pretend and instead of neurotic obsession.

This minute we're glad we are neither teacher nor a school administrator.

POLITICS: From the newspapers we garnered an impression of the Democratic State Convention, and from a personal visit a view of the Republican Conclave.

The major conclusion is that Michigan Democrats have just sponged up one of the swiftest jobs of political hara-kiri ever seen. They will receive the stiffest clobbering in the April elections they've absorbed in at least a generation.

There is this argument on the new Constitution. Politically, there is no possible way to persuade the public that the group of 140-odd men and women who sat in Lansing through the heat of last summer were fools and knaves who rendered a new document just to cheat the public. It was embroidered together paragraph by paragraph, by Republicans and Democrats alike-and the general public knows it.

The Solidarity House position is roughly, "we were against the convention before it was held, we're against the product, and don't bother us with particular details."

This is an attitude that will sell only to the Democrat rank and file, namely: the rank of uneducated, the helpless, poor, and the union automatons.


It will not sell to genuine free-thinking liberals -such as school teachers — who have been voting with the Democrats in recent years. 

There are moments, when for strictly personal reasons, this pounder of words finds himself getting mad at Ralph Owen, who directs the huge Catholic High School League for Metropolitan Detroit.

But the bitterness never lasts more than a few seconds. Even if it were a more continuing and persistent matter, there'd be no stopping us from taking off our hat-if we wore one - and tossing a block of bouquets in Owen's direction today.

Those of you who read our remarks fairly often no doubt recall that less than a month ago we harped on the fact that high school football practice in Michigan was too short; that schools don't have three full weeks to prepare for their first contests.

We noted that more than one coach, faced with a time shortage, has pushed his charges almost to the boiling point in double workouts under the hit August sun; that the state was lucky that no grid fatalities arose to register a black mark last fall or the year before.

We suggested that something should be done to expand the pre-season workouts, either by starting them a week earlier or delaying the start of the season by a week. If the colleges require four weeks to get ready for opening day, certainly the high schools should, too.

Our concern was - and still is - for the boys who play. One death or one serious injury could knock the stuffings out of an entire season for a team, a community, ar even the state - especially when said casualty might have been avoided by giving the coaches extra time.

All of which gets us back to Mr. Ralph Owen. He has taken a step with the members of his directors' board and coaches that merits consideration by Michigan's Representative Council and everyone else connected with prep football. Parochial teams, which include Redford Township's

St. Agatha, will start drills in late August on the same day as Bentley, Plymouth, Franklin, Redford Union, Thurston and Clarenceville.

But instead of playing its first game on Sept. 13 or that weekend, St. Agatha and the other Catholic teams will have one more full week of drills before beginning play.

"We had some complaints about coaches holding double drills in the hot August sun in the past." explained Owen. "We knew what their problem was . . . . they couldn't afford to waste any time. Getting a football team ready in three weeks is no simple chore.


"So our league discussed the matter and decided why not hold off opening games one week. True we may run into some bad weather in the late stages. But we'd rather buck cold or snow than feel that we were responsible for a football tragedy."

Owen admits that the later start may complicate matters with basketball. For exxample, the school team playing in the Goodfellow game will have only a one week break before basketball action commences. Other schools will have from two to three weeks.

"This doesn't strike us as serious," added Owen. Our coaches should be able to adjust. Besides many of the basketball players don't perform in football and they'll be practicing before the football season ends."

Owen is hopeful that the delayed start will become a regular procedure in the future.

We hope so. We also hope that every other school in the state follows suit.







LANSING - When one considers the number of laws which already rest on the books, it is astounding to consider how many new ones, and amendments, are proposed in a single session of the Legislature.

Thus far .almost 400 bills have been introduced in the House. Before the deadline Friday, the total will have reached 700. Another big batch will appear in the Senate.

Traditionally, all will disappear permanently from sight within the committees to which they are referred, except for about 20 percent. The Committees provide a tough, tight filter, being dominated in most cases by chairmen who have been in Lansing several years and aren't easily impressed by new ideas or change just for change's sake. Possibly 150 bills will escape from Committee in the House this Spring.

Yet every bill which appears has special importance and vital meaning to the introducer and to somebody or some group with special problems which to them are urgent.

Once out of Committee, the bills still must receive the approval of the House, the Senate and the Governor before they can become law. \* \* \*

Receiving the cold gaze of the Committees right now are a dozen bills of my own. Much of my own time at this point. therefore, is spent in lobbying their merits to the various members of the Committees who hold their fate. This is an old-fashioned "selling" job which is done formally, informally, at the desk, at lunch, in the lobby, and whenever.

The last two of my own bills to be introduced and get an official House number were:

1. One which would abolish the office of Drain Commissioner in Wayne County and give his duties to the Road Commission. Both Belleville and Plymouth have passed formal resolutions urging this change, and the bill is in response to their desires.

2. One which would permit Townships, by vote of the people, to adopt complete employe civil service systems. Today the law provides only for Fire and Police to be under civil service in Townships. Some communities

(Redford is one) desire to put DPW, Water, Office and other employes under the merit plan and rid themselves of patronage contests.
