Lawton, Vallier Top Commission Race

The City of Plymouth's first primary election for City Commission since the late 1940s was anything but a success as far as total vote was concerned, but it did select a field of eight to run for the four vacancies in the general election on April 1.

Only 839 of the city's 4600 registered voters marched to the voting machines, representing slightly more than 18 per cent of the total eligibles, and that was just about the smallest turnout in recent years. At that it bettered the pre-

dictions of City Clerk Joseph Near who indicated he would be satisfied with a 15 per cent vote. Only a scant 300 had cast their votes in late afternoon but the action picked up in the evening to bring the total above the 15 per cent level.

George Lawton, the soft-spoken executive manager of the Plymouth Community Federal Credit Union who was named "Man of the Year" by the Plymouth Jaycees three weeks ago, led the balloting with a total of 559.

He was followed closely by Archie Vallier, the City's Supervisor on the Wayne County Board of Supervisors and a Ford Motor Co. engineer, with 518. Then came a surprise when Robert Smith, assistant principal of Plymouth Senior

High and head of the counseling staff, polled a fat 466 to wind up third in the unofficial standings.

Another comparative youngster to politics, James Jabara, popular engineer and manufacturer, took down the fourth spot with 440 followed by George Hudson, a General Motors supervisor who has long followed the activities of the Commission and the Plymouth School Board, with 396.

The others nominated to make up the field of eight for the April 1 poll in which four will be named Commissioners, include: Neil Davidson 368, Russ Cutler 337 and Leon Merriman 334.

The three fading out of competition were Eldon Martin 320, William Silvis 300 and Harry Hunter 264.

Lawton was the early favorite of the city's political experts to head the voting but there was considerable conjecture as to who would wind up in the top four. Vallier, who has campaigned before as a candidate in a successful race for Supervisor, and newcomers Smith, Jabara and Hudson were rated as next in line and that's the way the vote came out.

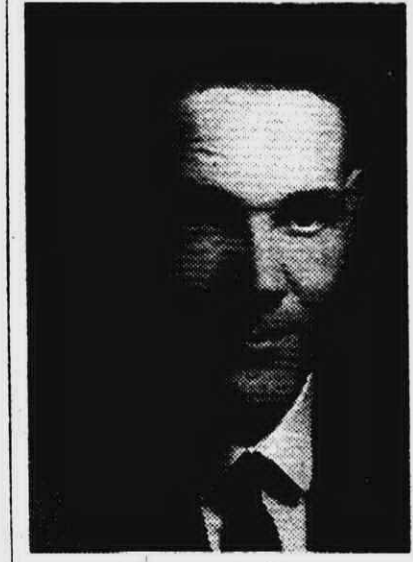
Perhaps the biggest surprise came in the former poor showing of Cutler, a rather poor Commissioner, who was reported to have the backing of some members of the Commission, including at least two of the four who will bow out in April.

All of which makes the battle down to the April 1 wire loom as one of the most bitter in recent Plymouth history. There is talk in some circles of a coalition being formed in an effort to get four of the most promising nominees on the Commission.

And then there are rumors in other sections of the retiring commissioners throwing their strength behind Vallier and Cutler to get a couple of political wise veterans on the Board.

With the Detroit water issue, the new reservoir and now the prospects of a scrap with Michigan Bell over telephone toll rates, the fur is expected to fly between now and the April 1 election. And that should keep things humming for the next few weeks at least.

Sparks, Garber Lauterbach Win Township Posts

Two veterans of the political wars—incumbent C. Veach Sparks and Ralph Garber—and a novice to politics—teacher Dick Lauterbach—will become members of the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees come April 1.

Their selection was assured on Monday's primary when they topped a field of seven candidates and no Democrats drew enough write-in votes to qualify for a place on the ballots in the April 1 general election.

Although the vote was the lightest in years with only 13 per cent of the 3864 registered electors going to the polls, the Republicans managed to make a sweep of all offices due to a lack of interest by the Dems in the traditional GOP stronghold.

Only Maurice Breen, who ran for the Dem nomination for Justice of Peace, will have his name on the April ballot. He drew a total of 33 votes in the four precincts.

Supervisor Roy Lindsay, Clerk John McEwen and Treasurer Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes ran without opposition and will have the same status on April 1, thus being assured of new terms.

Lindsay totaled 413 votes, McEwen 401 and Mrs. Holmes 420. Garber, a retired lawyer and former assistant Wayne County prosecuting attorney, led the vote for Trustee with a total of 308 followed by Sparks with 277 and Lauterbach with 191.

Frank Millington, former Township Highway Commissioner who gave up the post to run for Trustee, was fourth with 147 followed by Frederick Berry 146, David Katke 85 and Martin Fleming 72.

Lawrence Schendel won the nomination for Justice of Peace from W. Lee Butler with a total of 264 against 149.

Walter Summers polled 382 votes for Board of Review with no opposition.

In the Constable race, the final tally for the four Republicans was Louis Schomberger 342, Phil Truesdell 318, Donald King 313 and Robert Burns 303.

Plymouth Solons Eye Fire Truck

If the price is right, the City of Plymouth Fire Department may have the services of a new aerial ladder truck in the not too distant future.

The City Commission Monday instructed City Manager Albert Glassford and Public Safety Director Kenneth Fisher to make a thorough study of the situation by visiting metropolitan fire departments and manufacturers of the equipment to learn if there is any chance of purchasing a rebuilt truck.

Fisher and Glassford told the Commission that a new 85-foot truck would cost \$44,000 and one with a 100-foot ladder would go as high as \$45,000. But they pointed out that a rebuilt truck could be purchased for much less, if one could be found.

Need for such equipment was brought out by the two fires on Main St. in December.

The Commission approved purchase of eight new smoke masks for the firefighters on recommendation of Fisher.

In other actions, the Commission:

Awarded a contract for paving Industrial Dr. to the Banchemo Cement Co., of Detroit, on a low bid of \$17,361.

Awarded a contract for extension of the sanitary sewer to Crestwood Apartments to Zephire LeDuc, of Dearborn, on a low bid of \$4,823.

Congratulated City Manager Glassford upon his election to first vice president of the International City Managers Association.

Passed a resolution asking Michigan Bell to make a study and re-evaluation of the toll rates between Plymouth and Detroit with a view of reducing rates.

Appointed Byron Becker, Thomas Kelly, Stewart Oldford, Robert Gilles and Harold Stevens to the Building Board of Appeals.

Burroughs Plant Is Busy, 'Here to Stay'

Burroughs Corp. plant on Plymouth road is bustling with orders, it is permanently "here to stay," the employment cut-back has been relatively modest, and "the wild rumors flying around simply are not true," a company spokesman told The Observer today.

Rumors swirling by word of mouth in this area recently have hinted at "cutbacks of 2,000 men," and of "mergers with some other company," probably Ford's, and of "maybe the Plymouth plant will be shut down altogether."

Employment at the Burroughs plant on Plymouth road was 4,700 men in September and stands at 4,200 today—a decline of 500, the spokesman said.

The cutback in the plant in Plymouth has counterparts throughout the Burroughs system. It is described as a "continuous effort for more efficient manufacturing. There has been, and will continue to be, consolidation and tightening, with the aim of an improved profit picture."

A letter, directly answering the "rumors" is being drafted this week and will be distributed to Burroughs employees shortly.

Burroughs Corporation in recent months has been chalking up high, record-level gross sales but its profit margin has been receding. "And that is the sole reason for the consolidation and tightening," said the spokesman.

Ford Motor Company, which usually doesn't comment at all (so as to simply not recognize rumors) this time made the unusual gesture of "flatly denying" the talk about a Ford-Burroughs merger.

Plymouth-Livonia area has been the ground for many of the more frightening recent rumors. One report passed around what "Burroughs and Ford people have been seen eating together at the hotel in Plymouth."

Some observers read mean-

ing into a change in the Burroughs advertising budget.

The Burroughs spokesman told The Observer: "There has been a cut in the advertising budget, but with other operations. As advertising hasn't been eliminated, or cut in half, or the other wild conclusions contained in the rumors. We are reducing display advertising and shifting some of that budget into other forms of direct mail and similar advertising for our data processing equipment."

The company has a backlog of orders for its data processing equipment, which forms the principal part of the Plymouth plant's output.

Whenever rumors about Burroughs circulate, officials of Plymouth Township and the City of Plymouth react sensitively. Burroughs pays 48 percent of the Township's total tax — approximately \$945,000 of \$2,000,000. And Burroughs buys 30 percent of the water produced by the City's system.

Burroughs stock has been rising in price on the market recently. Merger rumors and reports of big new contracts about to be awarded Burroughs have spurred the rise, analysts said.

Builder Seeks Water Line To Wood Lore

The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees has been asked to consider extending its water lines to include the Stewart Olford & Sons' Wood Lore subdivision at Beck and Ann Arbor Roads.

The builders and developers pointed out that the water main has been extended to McClumpha Rd. and requested the additional expansion of slightly more than a quarter of a mile to their new section. They plan on erecting 50 homes in the \$25,000 to \$35,000 class and stressed that the presence of sewers and water lines would make the home sites more desirable.

A spokesman told the Board that they already have 18 deposits but are prohibited from making sales until water and sewers are definitely committed to the subdivision.

"We can start construction at once if we have a commitment," the spokesman said, "but our hands are tied until then. That's why we're pressing the Board for action as soon as possible."

Supervisor Lindsay told the representative the Trustees were just as interested as any in extending sewer and water lines.

"But," he said, "we have a sewer and water project before the Public Works Acceleration Act authorities and all we can learn is that the papers are in order and on file."

"If we receive approval, then we can do a lot of things that need to be done. But as of this moment, I'd have to say that it looks as if pickings in the PWAA pork barrel are a bit skimpy."

FACTS and OPINIONS by Paul Chandler

MORALS: It has become Plymouth High School's turn to have a go-around on the subject of "what kind of stuff is this they're teaching our kids?"

At least one parent; maybe more; has registered a protest over the books suggested for reading in a Plymouth High School class. "Too sexy," is the general criticism, we are told. Authors John Steinbeck and Henry Lawrence reputedly are among those involved.

We're necessarily vague on the subject, because it has been well muffled so far.

Every school board in this area has had a dose of similar quizzing in recent years. South Redford's board has had at least a triple dose.

It's a tough subject because the values and the judgments vary among every teacher and every student, according to their individual stability and their approach to the subject. If the people involved have that general quality known as "proper perspective," there is no possible danger. If they have "ob-session" instead of "perspective" there is every possible danger.

From a teaching (and parent) point of view, the objective is that tenuous thing known as "preparing a youngster to face life." A prissy, circumspect view will give him the worst possible shock when he runs into reality. But an exaggerated concentration on the morbid, lurid, sordid and demented can ruin a young man's sense of values before he even starts into maturity.

There is a middle ground — teaching reality instead of pretend and instead of neurotic obsession.

This minute we're glad we are neither teacher nor a school administrator.

POLITICS: From the newspapers we garnered an impression of the Democratic State Convention, and from a personal visit a view of the Republican Conclave.

The major conclusion is that Michigan Democrats have just sprung up one of the swiftest jobs of political hara-kiri ever seen. They will receive the stiffest clobbering in the April elections they've absorbed in at least a generation.

There is this argument on the new Constitution. Politically, there is no possible way to persuade the public that the group of 140-odd men and women who sat in Lansing through the heat of last summer were fools and knaves who rendered a new document just to cheat the public. It was embroidered together paragraph by paragraph, by Republicans and Democrats alike—and the general public knows it.

The Solidarity House position is roughly, "we were against the convention before it was held, we're against the product, and don't bother us with particular details." This is an attitude that will sell only to the Democrat rank and file, namely: the rank of uneducated, the helpless, poor, and the union automatons.

It will not sell to genuine free-thinking liberals — such as school teachers — who have been voting with the Democrats in recent years. They are the "marginal" part of the recent Democratic vote and by a dogmatic, unreasonable stand on the Constitution the labor Czars are going to drive them right out of the party ranks altogether, if they don't stop.

At the same time, at their convention the Solidarity Caesars repudiated every last official of their party who has shown the personal glamour and appeal to be elected — Staebler, Hare, Lesinski, McNamara, Hart, and others. They were left sitting at the other hotel when the defeated Gov. Swainson exposed the CIO power move. The choice of the voters in other words, can be the Baron's bums.

This maneuver will not escape the gaze of free thinking liberals at the margin of the Democratic party.

For intellectually honest liberals two choices are available in the Con-Con election. Get out and vote for the Constitution; or stay home and neither help it or hurt it. Rank and file Democrats, including the automatic labor vote, and the uneducated, couldn't be less interested than they are in that complicated document, the Constitution.

From their side, the Republicans have staved off open arguments and slyly encouraged the opposition to wrangle.

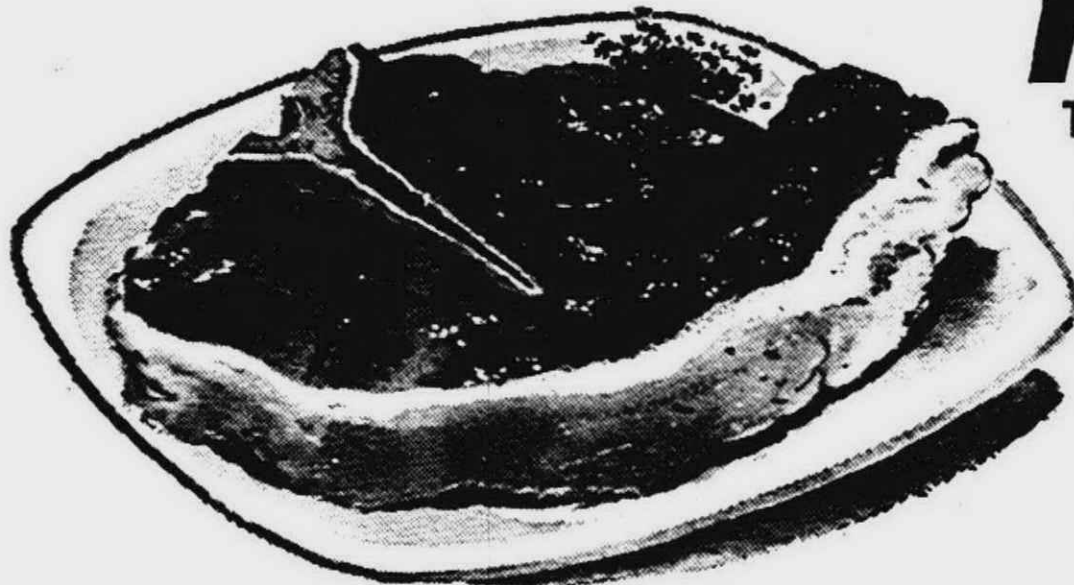

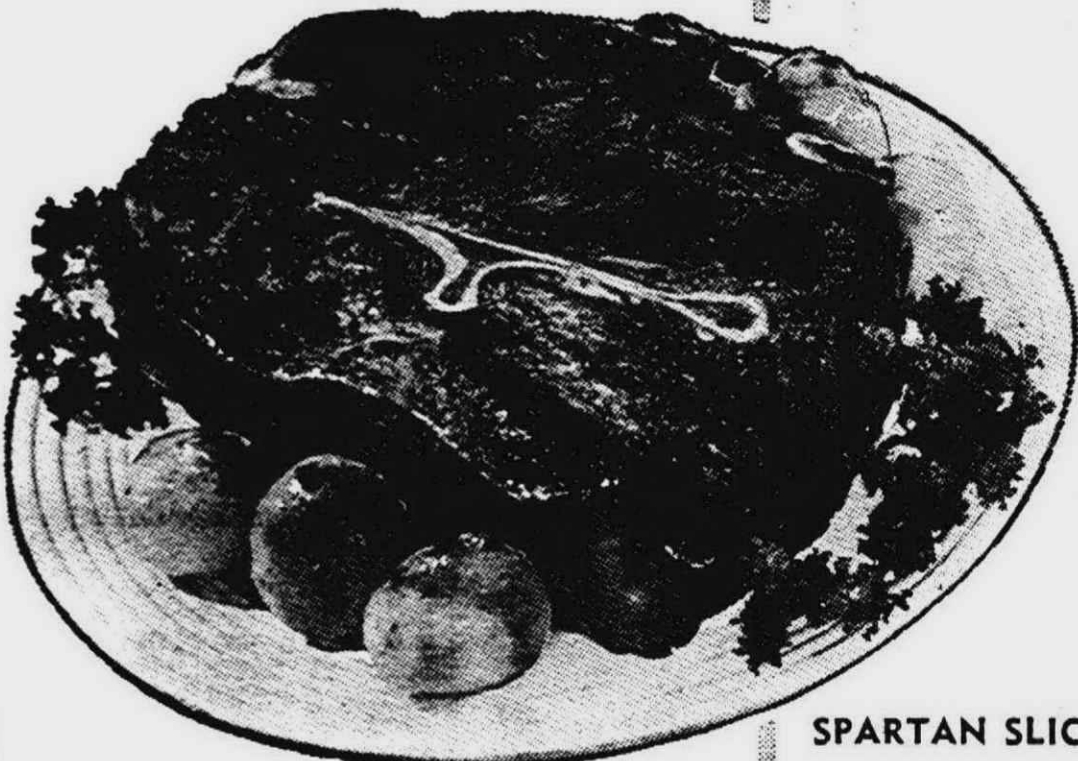

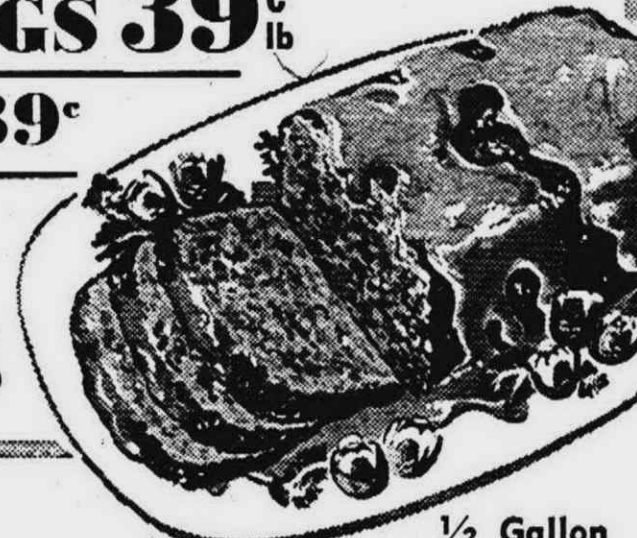

College Sets \$165 Fee for Non-Resident

Non-resident students of Schoolcraft College, which is scheduled to open doors to classes in September 1964 on the campus at the intersection of Haggerty and Seven Mile Roads in Livonia, will pay a maximum tuition fee of \$165 per semester.

Students residing in the Northwest Wayne County Community College District will pay \$105 according to the schedule announced earlier by the Board of Trustees.

The fee schedule calls for non-residents enrolling in fewer than 13 credit hours to pay at the rate of \$14 per hour contrasted to \$8 for residents.

The matriculation fee, paid at the time of filing application, is \$10 for all applicants. The student services fee is 50 cents per credit hour with a maximum of \$7.50 per semester.

The Department of Public Works had three broken water lines last week, two frozen lines and one service line break which couldn't be located quickly since the water came up in one location. It was finally found and the line repaired although there was extensive damage to Sheridan Ave.

It might be interesting to know that within the two square mile area of the City of Plymouth, there are more than 3.5 miles of water mains of various sizes, about 3.5 miles of sanitary storm sewers and 260 fire hydrants.

All sewers are checked frequently. Some that are flat are flushed out. Last week the DPW cleaned 3,000 feet of sanitary sewers in the north end.

The department spread 222 tons of salt for various snow falls during the week.

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Lighting Effects Can Prove Highly Functional

Not all fixture lighting is intended specifically to provide illumination for clear, quick, comfortable seeing. Some lighting is used primarily to create an emotionally satisfying environment, according to the American Home Lighting Institute.

Decorative, or non-task lighting can also be highly functional. Used correctly, it helps repair the two most common mistakes in home lighting: Glaring concentrations of light surrounded by drabness or extreme, flat, even lighting.

Avoid High Contrast
Undesirable high contrast—difference in brightness—is often created, for example, by using portable lamps without

general light from ceiling or wall fixtures. The picture is one of pools of light surrounded by extensive unlighted areas. This type of harsh lighting is hard on the eyes and contributes to discomfort and irritability.

Contrasts are normally reduced by lighting a vertical surface, such as a wall or drapery, in the normal field of vision. Such lighting adds to the over-all illumination of a room and softens the lighting. Lighting experts employ hanging or surface-mounted fixtures, valances, cornices, wall brackets, coves, soffits or custom architectural lighting for this purpose.

This type of lighting also accentuates the color and texture of wall or window treatments and contributes to the over-all interior design.

Just as undesirable in the home is flat, even lighting. It does not jangle the nerves like sharp concentrations of light but it produces boredom and monotony.

This is best offset with pin-

points of light in key areas and on decorative accents to stimulate interest, excitement and alertness.

Highlighting of art objects like paintings, murals, sculptures or planters can be done with recessed or surface-mounted directional lights or hanging fixtures. Many have focusing mechanisms for precise light control.

Similar techniques can be used to add emotional impact and visual excitement over a coffee or end table or a room divider, creating the theatrical effect of spotlighting key areas.

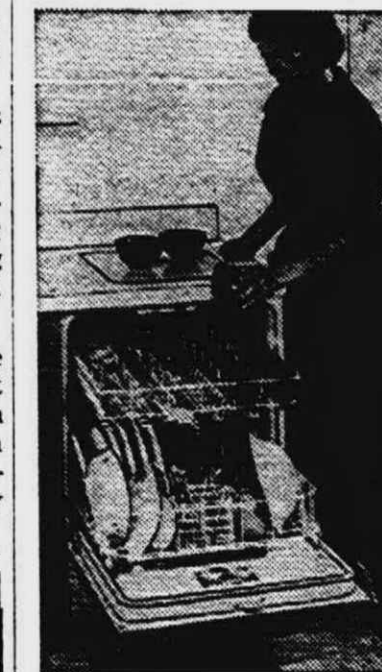

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What Paint to Use Where

Here's a quick run-down on the proper paint to use for any interior surface you may be beautifying:

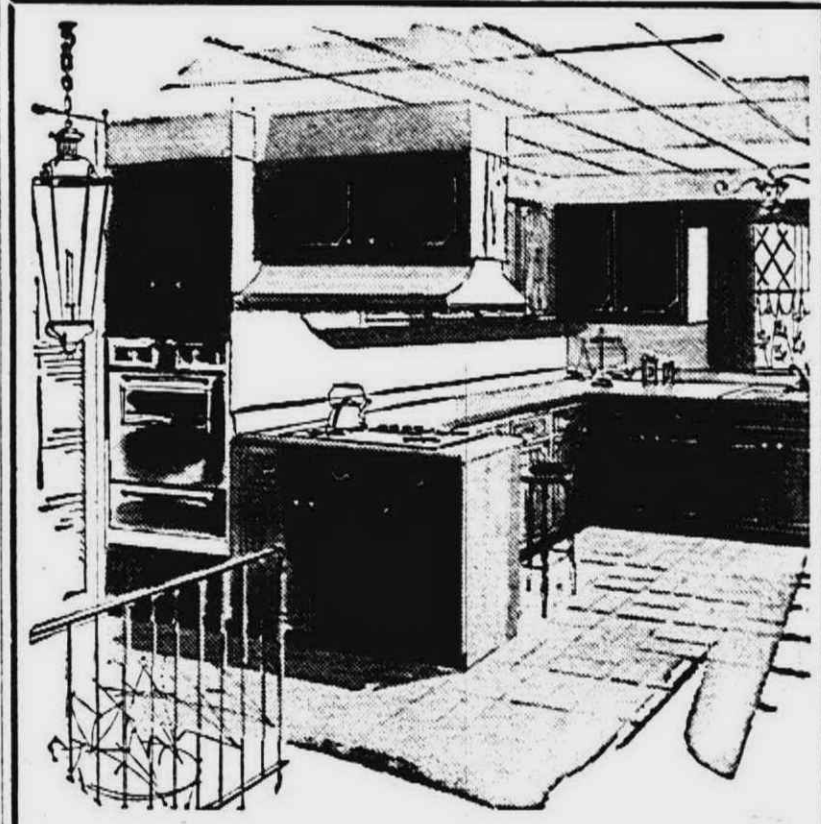
Plaster walls and ceilings—any high quality interior flat paint, oil, alkyd or latex paint. For bathrooms and kitchens, use semi-gloss or gloss enamel paint for greater washability.

Wall board—seal with primer sealer and then follow with any high quality wall paint.

Hardboard—seal with latex paint, primer sealer, shellac or enamel undercoat. Use any desired topcoat.

Plywood—for an opaque top coat, seal with penetrating resin sealer, flat oil or alkyd paint or enamel undercoat. When dry, apply a second coat. For a natural finish which shows the grain use a clear penetrating resin sealer, followed by varnish.

Woodwork—semi-gloss enamel in same color as walls. Full gloss is often used in kitchens and bathrooms.

Our concern was — and still is — for the boys who play. One death or one serious injury could knock the stuffings out of an entire season for a team, a community, or even the state — especially when said casualty might have been avoided by giving the coaches extra time.

All of which gets us back to Mr. Ralph Owen. He has taken a step with the members of his directors' board and coaches that merits consideration by Michigan's Representative Council and everyone else connected with prep football.

Parochial teams, which include Redford Township's St. Agatha, will start drills in late August on the same day as Bentley, Plymouth, Franklin, Redford Union, Thurston and Clarenceville.

But instead of playing its first game on Sept. 13 or that weekend, St. Agatha and the other Catholic teams will have one more full week of drills before beginning play.

"We had some complaints about coaches holding double drills in the hot August sun in the past," explained Owen. "We knew what their problem was . . . they couldn't afford to waste any time. Getting a football team ready in three weeks is no simple chore.

"So our league discussed the matter and decided why not hold our opening games one week. True we may run into some bad weather in the late stages. But we'd rather buck cold or snow than feel that we were responsible for a football tragedy."

Owen admits that the later start may complicate matters with basketball. For example, the school team playing in the Goodfellow game will have only a one week break before basketball action commences. Other schools will have from two to three weeks.

"This shouldn't strike us as absurd," added Owen. "Our coaches should be able to adjust. Besides many of the basketball players don't perform in football and they'll be practicing before the football season ends."



REPORT from LANSING

LANSING — When one considers the number of laws which already rest on the books, it is astounding to consider how many new ones, and amendments, are proposed in a single session of the Legislature.

Thus far almost 400 bills have been introduced in the House. Before the deadline Friday, the total will have reached 700. Another big batch will appear in the Senate.

Traditionally, all will disappear permanently from sight within the committees to which they are referred, except for about 20 percent. The Committees provide a tough, tight filter, being dominated in most cases by chairmen who have been in Lansing several years and aren't easily impressed by new ideas or change just for change's sake. Possibly 150 bills will escape from Committee in the House this Spring.

Yet every bill which appears has special importance and vital meaning to the introducer and to somebody or some group with special problems which to them are urgent.

Once out of Committee, the bills still must receive the approval of the House, the Senate and the Governor before they can become law.

Receiving the cold gaze of the Committees right now are a dozen bills of my own. Much of my own time at this point, therefore, is spent in lobbying their merits to the various members of the Committees who hold their fate. This is an old-fashioned "selling" job which is done formally, informally, at the desk, at lunch, in the lobby, and whenever.

The last two of my own bills to be introduced and get an official House number were:

1. One which would abolish the office of Drain Commissioner in Wayne County and give his duties to the Road Commission. Both Belleville and Plymouth have passed formal resolutions urging this change, and the bill is in response to their desires.

2. One which would permit Townships, by vote of the people, to adopt complete employe civil service systems. Today the law provides only for Fire and Police to be under civil service in Townships. Deadline Nears for Dog Tags

Livonians have only 10 more days to purchase dog licenses without penalty. That was the warning issued this week by Marie M. Clark, City Clerk.
