And Mr. Thomas Should Know It's True-Winter Most Frigid in 45 Years

It will take more than the first Robin to make residents of Southeastern Michigan forget the winter of 1962-63, says James P. Thomas, Jm, of Consumers Power Company.

So far, this winter has been about 15 per cent colder than normal, according to Thomas. Manager of the Company's West Wayne Division which is headquarters in Livonia.

And the winter's not over yet, he adds. March and even April may well provide some biting cold spells before storm windows can safely come down and screens go up in the Detroit suburban area.

"To date, there have been 31 days when the temperature has been at zero or lower, compared with a half a

dozen or so in the average year." says Thomas. "This has certainly put the test to home heating plants as well as to the Consumers gas system."

The company has been able to meet all the demands of its customers for service, but the bitter and prolonged cold weather has required a maximum effort by Consumers gas personnel and facilities.

Records show it has been 45 years since this part of the country had it so cold. Only two other winters since the turn of the century brought lower overall temperatures to the Great Lakes Region than the one now reluctantly drawing to a close. Those were the winters of 1904-05 and 1917-18.

"The early weeks of this heating season were not so bad," says Thomas, "But December turned out quite a bit worse than last year, and January and February were fierce. They averaged 15 per cent to 20 per cent colder than the year before.'

As a result, Consumers reports its customers have had a corresponding increase in their bills during this period.

Now that one of the worst winters in Michigan history is nearing its end, what about next year? Can we expect a return to the "Good old days" with the accent on the sunny side of zero?

"We'll have to wait and see," says Mr. Thomas, "But we

can't assume next year will be better. Actually, there has been a slight downward trend in winter temperatures in Consumers' service area for the last ten years.'

In view of this and the fact that the Company expects to add 24,000 new gas customers facilities will be expanded substantially this year. The severe cold since the first of the year, in fact, caused the Company to recently revise its original plans for gas system expansion and improvement upwards by some \$3,000,000.

The Company serves almost 600,000 gas customers in 32 Michigan counties, including over 52,000 in the area served by the West Wayne Division.

> "Plymouth Township officials are willing to sit down with anybody or any group to iron out the current water problems of this community," said Supervisor Roy Lindsay to more than 25 members of the Industrial division of the Plymouth Community Cham-

ber of Commerce. That was Lindsay's answer to the question of whether the Township would be willing to discuss the possibility of a water authority for the entire community.

The suggestion was first proposed by Industry leaders at a meeting a week ago with Plymouth Mayor Robert Sincock at which he presented the City Commission's thinking on the Detroit water issue

"The Township has a bonded indebtedness hanging over the water system of \$1.1 million," pointed out Lindsay, "I understand the City owes something like \$335,000. However, we in the Township are ready and willing to discuss a joint water authority at any time."

Lindsay, a staunch supporter of Detroit water since it is now being supplied to the Township, told the industry representatives that in his opinion Detroit water is vital to the growth of western Wayne County.

"Regardless of what projections are made." he said. "We feel that a well supply of water is no good since a community can't depend on it "

He told of the Township's experience in tests for wells during which it spent several rhousand dollars and had no iuck. Only two were developed from the experiment, one at McAllister and the Lakepointe subdivision.

Lindsay reiterated that the Detroit Water Board, through its General Manager Gerald Remus, was under contract to complete the loop by 1970 but had projected completion no later than 1965.

Present Non-Partisan Views

New Constitution Topic Of Town Hall Friday

Residents of Plymouth community, including the City, Township and surrounding areas, will have a chance to get non-partisan views on the old and proposed new constitutions in a Town Hall meeting at Junior High East Friday (March 15) at 7:30 p.m.

The meeting, sponsored by the Plymouth Junior Chamber of Commerce, will be in charge of the Citizens Research Committee, an organization which has made a lengthy study of constitutions.

Dr. Robert Evans, chairman of the sponsoring Jaycee committee, indicated there will not be any pro and con discussions and no recommendations made by the Council.

Several bills are kicking around in Lansing pertaining to a favorite Plymouth area subject, annexation:

Two of them would deny any annexation unless one-sixth of the boundary of the piece to be annexed lies adjacent to the borders of the annexing territory. They would prohibit slim "strip" annexations and other devices which have been annoying to lightly populated areas for years.

Another proposal will appear as the fruits of many veeks of study by a special Governor's commission, of which Supervisor Roy Lindsay was one member. This report urges a "Commission" approach to annexation, where a special body of experts would consider each case, submitting it to a vote when required and justified, in the commission's opinion.

For any whose curiosity might have been aroused by a short news item on the rezoning of the southwest corner of Plymouth and Eckles road-the plan is to build a "Swiss Chalet" restaurant there. Seating capacity would be for 90 people, the exterior brick, and the owner hopes to have a cocktail lounge, too.

We see by a story in The Detroit News that the various illustrious newspaper's sports department plans to select an All-State swimming team.

Quite an idea, we say . . . it prompts us to wonder why didn't we think of such a promotion in our days of selecting All-This and All-That teams for the late Detroit Times.

We note that Sports Writer Jim Higginbottom, who will supervise the selections, plans to select a swimmer only for one event, unless the prep happens to be a member of the honored relay team.

All of which should pose a problem to Higginbottom when he tackles the name of Ken Wiebeck, the All America at Thurston High School and certainly the greatest schoolboy swimmer in the midwest today.

Taking a peep at the most recent weekly ratings printed in The News, the name of Wiebeck tops three categories. He has the best time for any Michigan tanker in the 50-yard free style (22.6 seconds), the 100-yard free style (50.1 seconds) and 100-yard back stroke (56.3 seconds).

In the 100 free and the 100 back stroke his clockings are under the existing staate records which stand at 50.4 and 57.3 seconds, respectively. In the 50 free, the state mark is 22:6.

Wiebeck ranks second in the 200-yard individual, sixth in the 100-yard butterfly and tied for twelfth in the 100yard breaststroke. He also has helped Thurston's free style relay to make the top ten list in the state.
