## Manager "Returns Home" As First Federal Opens

In a way, Perry Richwine "returned home" this week when he completed the move Monday of his Plymouth branch of First Federal Savings to its new financial headquarters at Main St. and Penniman Ave.

Years ago — 1903 to 1922 — Perry's father, the late George Richwine, operated a harness shop on the site where the impressive colonial-styled First Federal building stands today.

Perry, himself, spent 10 of the first 12 years of his life centered around the family quarters on the second floor of the building which until last spring stood at the corner of Main and Penniman.

Later, he and his wife, the former Mary Parrott, had wedding portraits taken in the L. L. Ball photographic studios which also were on the second floor of the previous building.

Today, Richwine, First Federal's long-time Plymouth branch manager and a vice-president of the firm, is justly proud of the company's new financial offices in downtown Plymouth.

The building represents the most auspicious addition to the center of the Plymouth business community in at least a generation.

Richwine's new desk is stationed only yards from the site of his father's harness shop of a half-century ago. Above him, at least in his memory, is the bed where as a youth he slept many nights.

Plans for expansion of the company's Plymouth division include the addition of a manufacturing operation which will turn out machines used in the canning industry.

Evans has also geared itself for government contract work which the firm has been seeking in recent months.

A news release added that the move "will enable Evans' transportation equipment and industrial division to continue its expansion of the remaining products at the Plymouth plant."

## Labor Unrest Leads To Firm's Collapse

A major industrial firm in Plymouth Township died Friday afternoon after a six-month struggle arising out of labor unrest.

Placed in receivership Feb. 11, Worden Specialty & Machine Co., 15169 Northville Rd., was declared closed at 3 p.m. Friday by decree of the receiver.

It dropped a cloud of gloom and a touch of personal tragedy over the families of 190 employees, many of them Plymouth residents.

The voice of Worden president, Morey Abrahms, Tuesday contained undertones of despair, regret, and even wonder at the turn of events that abruptly upset what half a year ago was an eager and prosperous industrial undertaking.

Speaking from the office of receiver Joseph Oldani, a Detroit attorney, Abrahms recounted the events that led to the bleak closing directive that took effect Friday afternoon.

He said that hourly workers in October had requested increases in pay and additional fringe benefits amounting to an estimated \$250,000 annually.

"The difficulty started when our labor contract came up for renewal," Abrahms said. "We felt we were unable to grant the increases or additional benefits because of the financial condition of the company at that time."

Up to that moment, the company was in the midst of a healthy growth situation, he implied. Business volume was arriving at such a rate that the 1961 annual total was destined to double in 1962.

"There was every indication that our 1963 volume would be triple that of 1961," Abrahms said.

The firm earlier had taken out a \$142,000 loan with National Bank of Detroit and the Small Business Administration. Nearly \$1 million worth of the firm's business volume was tied up in Chrysler Corp. contracts.

Labor negotiations dragged out until shortly after the first of the year. According to Abrahms, workers were asking for a 30-cent-an-hour increase. He said that average hourly pay rate was about \$2.20 or \$2.25.


"We already were paying higher rates than many of our competitors," Abrahms asserted in an exclusive telephone interview with The Mail Tuesday morning.

These were the ensuing events that led to Friday's closing decree: Workers voted to strike and formed picket lines beginning at midnight of Tuesday, Jan. 15. Compelled to keep its supply lines intact, Chrysler Corp. cancelled its contracts with the Worden firm and removed special machinery, tooling and inventory that had been loaned in conjunction with the earlier award of the manufacturing contracts.

"Because of the strike," Abrahms continued, "National Bank of Detroit — our agent and participant in the (Continued on page 4)

One of Mrs. Richwine's civic activities through the years has been community service in connection with children's activities. One of her great interests has been in the promotion of child health and welfare.


She is an active member of the Plymouth Rotary and has served as the organization's president for two years.

Plymouth's Senior Citizens held their weekly session last Thursday and 76 members were entertained by Plymouth High's "triple trios," who presented several vocal selections.


Brenda Newberry, a member of the song group, sang a solo of "Somewhere Over the Rainbow." Pamela Barber provided the piano accompaniment.

ACCESS CODE "1" STARTS APRIL 7 FOR LONG DISTANCE CALLS

To prevent accidental misdialing of long distance calls, Glenview (45) customers served by the exchange will begin dialing the numeral "1" to be connected with the long distance dialing network starting 12:01 a.m. April 7.


Without such a safeguard, customers intending to dial a local call sometimes dial a long distance number unknowingly, find they have reached a wrong number, and then are perplexed when a long distance charge shows up on their bill.

After dialing "1" customers will dial the distant phone number exactly as they presently do. Local calls, however, will continue to be made as they are now, just by dialing the telephone number. Page 2 of the new directory (April, 1963) will explain the new procedure.

He told Commissioners a study had revealed it does not look "hopeful" that the City will qualify for an urban renewal grant to re-build the SE Quadrant of the business district. The area lies south and east of the Main St. and Ann Arbor Tr. intersection.

He reported the City had completed its acquisition of three acres of land on Beck Rd. for a site for the proposed 3-million-gallon reservoir. The

the proposed development.

- Authorized in final form a sewer agreement with Plymouth Township. It pertains to mutual use of sewage and flowage lines.
- Authorized the call for bids on one police car.

- Referred a matter pertaining to safety on school buses to the School Board.
- Resolved to favor the weekend Closing Law, now in the state legislature, and authorized A. E. Vallier, the City's supervisor to the county board of supervisors to vote in favor of the matter if it comes before him in his supervisor's capacity.
- Denied permission for Commission candidates to use the City's addressograph facilities.
- Gave permission to the Volunteers of America to solicit for funds in the City during the month of May.
- Approved extension of a sign permit for Birch Estates, following request for same from Stewart Oldford & Sons.
- Passed a resolution endorsing a bill in the state legislature which would abolish the duties of local assessors, retain local boards of review and establish a county tax assessment department.

The first division bands will appear in a Regional Festival to be held in Ypsilanti, Grand Haven and Battle Creek on April 20 and April 27.



We urge you, all of you, to stop in and inspect the beautiful offices of the First Federal Savings and Loan this weekend and to do the same on the event of the opening of the Triple-A offices on the first of next month. That big old Detroit News took a left handed poke at one of Michigan's greatest statesmen last week and for my money I don't think he deserved it. In other words, let me put it this way. If State Representative Lloyd Gibbs calls Tiger Stadium, Navin Field, then it's Navin Field as far as I'm concerned.

As chairman of the legislature's most powerful committee, State Affairs, on which I had the privilege of serving one term under chairman Gibbs, I learned that there were few men alive with his courage and his devotion to those things which were best for the majority of the people of Michigan.

Most people don't realize that the legislative committee takes most of the brunt of any action for or against any newly proposed legislation and a weaker committee chairman than Gibbs, would have and could have, many times in the past, released bills from his committee and let the total legislative membership sweat out the pressures of those pro and con. Not Gibbs, however.

If a bill was good for the people it came out of committee, or if it was bad for the people he saw to it that it died in committee and the full brunt of public pressure was his alone to bear whichever the case.

We admired this hard working farmer who keeps some 600 acres over near Portland producing each year. We were amazed to learn he was called to his lodge on many occasions to provide the well memorized ritual speeches, all of which he knew, when some lodge official couldn't show or was sick. We were just as amazed to learn that behind that farmerish jargon of his was a mind so keenly aware of the laws of our state, and so perceptive of the many cagey, intricate, subterfuges so often incorporated into seemingly simple little bills thrown into the legislative hopper.

Yes, sir, it's the Lloyd Gibbs' in political circles that keep the old ship of state on an even keel though there is little compensation for the effort. We hope the people over in the Portland area appreciate their representative, as they must, returning him to Lansing year after year, as they do, but just in case they don't we'll say to them, that from this corner of Michigan, we appreciate their good judgement.

As an afterthought, I am reminded of one of the first assignments given me by Gibbs when I was brand new on his committee. The bill under consideration was a tough one and the pressure was more than I had ever dreamed of. In fact, it grew so big I became frightened of the responsibility and went to Gibbs and asked if he shouldn't give the study of this bill to some more experienced member of the committee, and that perhaps I should be released from this responsibility particularly at this time.

I can best sum up Lloyd Gibbs for you by quoting his answer to my call for help. "Eaton, the only way I know you can get out of this job is to die".

SBA loan — took over our account.

"This created a situation whereby we couldn't meet the remaining payroll or any of our general accounts payable."

"On Jan. 18, one of our suppliers garnished money due us from Chrysler Corp. for earlier work, and then the bank, called for the remaining payment on the \$142,000 loan."

"We couldn't pay any of the creditors. On Feb. 11 we filed for bankruptcy under the Bankruptcy Act." Abrahms said.

The receiver, Oldan, operated the company from that date until March 15 when he deemed it necessary to close the plant completely. Partial payment to all creditors, the company president said, will be administered by the courts.

The firm specialized in machining auto and truck parts for the automobile industry and also had government contracts for similar work. A total of 190 employees had been on a three-shifts-a-day arrangement up to the point where a breakdown in contract talks took place and the strike was voted.

Abrahms, 59, described the firm as "family-owned." He formerly had been with Allen Industries in Detroit and had risen to secretary-treasurer of that firm when he left in 1951. He joined Worden Specialty in 1953 and two years later purchased a half-interest in the business from its founder, Walter Smith.

When Smith, who once owned Calvacade Inn, was killed in an auto accident about four years ago, Abrahms acquired the remaining half-interest from Smith's estate.

An Allen Industries employee for 25 years, Abrahms lives in Detroit. One of his sons, Bruce, has been vice president of the Worden firm.

The elder Abrahms said he had little indication that what eventually happened would talk place when contract talks began six months ago.

Among the creditors is Plymouth Township. As a governmental taxing unit, the Township will get full payment of 1962 taxes.

The firm owes a total of nearly \$5,600 in 1962 taxes to the Township, county and schools. The local assessment on the real property and building stands at \$50,000 on the Township's tax roll. There is a sizeable personal property tax assessment in addition.

Abrahms had no immediate plans for the future. The destiny of the closed-down manufacturing plant on Northville Rd. was equally unclear.

More significantly, the families of 190 workers are unsure as to their future, too.

Open house ceremonies, beginning this Friday, will mark the formal dedication of the new First Federal financial edifice.

Last Monday, a large number of civic officials and First Federal executives gathered at the building for a traditional ribbon-cutting event.

It marked the unofficial opening of First Federal's new home here. Over the week-end, Richwine had supervised the move — lock, stock and assets — of the branch office from its previous location at 843 Penniman.

The move was accomplished with no interruption in business transactions. The new office at the corner of Main and Penniman opened precisely at 9:30 a.m. Monday, its regular opening hour.

The open house celebration, to which all residents are cordially invited, will last until Friday, April 19. The ceremonies mark the culmination of a year of work at the new site, although First Federal had owned the property for some time prior to the start of actual construction.

Demolition of the old buildings began March 12, 1962, and clearance of the site followed immediately. Construction work with the Burger Construction Co. as general

contractor, got underway in August.

Only minor details remain to be finished before the colonial-styled structure is complete. Shortly, the Automobile Club will move into a portion of the new building. It will be the only other occupant.

The structure comprises nearly 10,000 square feet of floor space and First Federal will use its share to accommodate an increasing business volume, not only from the immediate Plymouth area but from a wide segment of western Wayne County as well.

Among the many aspects of the open house celebration is the offer of the Better Homes and Gardens cookbook free with every savings account that is opened in an amount of \$50 or more.

## An Editorial

# \$25 Worth of Plymouth's Future

One of the most significant advances in the area of local community growth — in our mind, at least — was the establishment 21 months ago of the non-profit Industrial Development Corp.

An outgrowth of the Chamber of Commerce's economic development committee, IDC is comprised of a handful of men who volunteer their time to lure new industry into the Plymouth area.

The word "area" in the eyes of IDC executives, is decidedly more than just City and Township. Instead, it represents the whole of the Plymouth School District, since — in the words of IDC president, Frank Arlen — "the schools unquestionably make the greatest tax impact on any area."

The success of IDC has been considerable. Starting in the summer of 1961 with the arrival of Distribution Service, Inc. in the vacant Daisy Air Rifle plant, IDC has lured eight new industries here, adding significantly to the industrial tax base.

Transport Containers, Inc., R.C.A., Willys, Vincent Plating Co., and more recently Kem-Tek Corp. and Superior Sliding Door Frame Co. have been among the accomplishments of the IDC.

An encouraging number of new industrial inquiries are made to the IDC each month.

The significance of the work of the IDC is that it spreads the School District's tax base as widely as possible. Should residential property owners undertake to support a school system

alone, school taxes would be astronomical. Since industrial tenants of any school district do not send pupils to classrooms, their contributions to the school tax revenue are practically "gravy" in the minds of school administrators.

At any rate, the importance of sustaining the work of the IDC cannot be over-estimated. Each new industry that is brought into the School District defers that much longer the need for additional tax revenue from residential property owners.

Interestingly, one school official points out that the Plymouth district someday could become the second largest in the state in terms of total enrollment. It already numbers approximately 5,300 pupils.

Today, the IDC has reached a crucial turning point. In order to continue its efforts, it must raise a minimum of \$15,000. This amount is necessary simply to close the package concerning Superior Sliding Door Frame Co., which has given every indication that it will move into the long-empty Continental Can Co. plant on Junction St.

Beyond the immediate need for \$15,000, IDC officials have repeatedly stated that they "would welcome" a cash reserve, or a combination of cash and pledges, amounting to \$50,000.

This, of course, will enable IDC to take definite steps on any industrial opportunity that arises and is deemed worthwhile to the district.

The financial need during previous accomplishments of the IDC has been sizeable. A total of \$48,000 was raised locally to assist R.C.A. in its move here. Another \$30,000 was acquired to assure the re-location of D.S.I. in Plymouth. Within the past two months, \$8,000 was raised to enable Kem-Tek Corp. to resolve its plans to move into the former Consumers Power building.

All of these funds were provided locally by individual participation. Teachers have seen the value in the IDC since its earliest days. They hold — as a group — more \$25 shares of stock in the IDC than any other assemblage save local businessmen.

Unfortunately, the person most likely to benefit from the efforts of the IDC has been noticeably absent when financial assistance has been sought. He's the average residential property owner, who bemoans a school tax hike at great length when it is proposed.

With an opportunity to actively participate in Plymouth's future, the "little guy" has thus far seen fit to take a back seat. We can't understand it.

Fewer than two dozen individuals have thus far carried the IDC financially on behalf of an adult population that certainly exceeds 10,000. In other words, less than 24 people have put up \$86,000 to increase the industrial tax base here so as to spread the school tax burden as widely as possible.



### A Penny Saved Is a Penny Earned . . .

Sometimes, it seems, it truly pays to be the "big guy." Burroughs Corp., City of Plymouth's largest water user, exercised this option Monday night in a letter to the Commission.

A recent water bill to Burroughs from the City included a \$524.30 "delinquency charge" after the company had paid its January bill one day late. The industrial firm, in a letter from its corporate accounts payable manager, R. C. Anderson,

asked relief from the delinquent charge. Anderson, in his letter to Commissioners, pleaded that a recent change in the firm's accounts payable system had inadvertently led to the late payment. "We would appreciate your waiving the charge (of \$524.30) for the day delay," Anderson wrote. Recognizing that Burroughs is the City's largest water user and consumes approximately two million gallons annually paying \$30,000 into the City's coffers as a result, Commissioners acted accordingly. They waived the delinquency charge. In other matters, City Manager Albert Glassford reported that Leslie Ferenczi injured himself while observing a fire Dec. 17 which demolished the "Heddon Building" opposite the City Hall. He fell over a barricade. Ferenczi wrote that "as a result of this fall, my left knee cap was removed." The matter was referred to City Attorney Edward Dra-

gels and the City's insurance company for settlement. Glassford also took on the duties of realtor briefly during the Monday night session. He reported that three small strips of City-owned land are available for purchase at \$25 apiece through means of tax sale.

Two of the 15-foot strips of land are located near Pearl and Starkweather. Both adjoin privately-owned property but are of little value by themselves. The third strip of land, measuring five-hundredths of an acre, is near Liberty and Davis streets. It, too, adjoins privately-owned property and is of little use by itself.

Glassford was instructed to inquire if the adjoining property owners would be interested in purchasing the small strips of land.

**Swift Police Work Solves Break-In; Three Await Trial**  
Three teen-agers, one from Redford Twp. and the other two from Livonia, were apprehended by Plymouth Police last week and admitted breaking into Bowling's Garage at 322 Holbrook. They confessed to taking \$165 worth of automobile parts and have been bound over to circuit court on a charge of breaking and entering in the night-time. With a court date yet to be set, the trio are free on \$500 bonds. The three are Richard De Lorey, 19, of Redford, and Craig Rogers and Samuel Root, both 18 and of Livonia. Alert Plymouth policemen solved the case within hours after it was discovered. Lieutenant Roger Vanderveen and patrolman Henry Berghoff, making routine property checks last Tuesday night, discovered that the Bowling garage had been broken into. They followed three sets of footprints in the snow to a point near Five Mile and Marilyn Rd. Along Edward Lines Dr. the two policemen spotted a car parked on Gensolly Dr. and noted the license number. The next day, by tracing the license number, Plymouth police learned that the car belonged to the father of the 19-year-old Redford youth. Confronted with the facts of the case, DeLorey admitted his part in the break-in and implicated the other two. All three were released on bond pending trial.





**Conclude Season**

**Swimmers Finish 9th In State Tournament**

Plymouth strengthened its 1963 standing in Class A high school swim circles last Friday and Saturday as the Rocks gained a ninth-place finish in the state swimming meet at East Lansing.

The local contingent scored 16.75 points to finish ninth in a field of 62 schools entered in the competition.

Birmingham Sea Holm, heavily favored to win the state Class A crown, did exactly that with 98.5 points. Grosse Pointe was second with 41.5. Ann Arbor finished third with 42.5 and Battle Creek Central came in fourth with 31.5.

The Rocks — two years ago — claimed top honors themselves in the very same meet. Last year, Plymouth was 16th.

For the first time, points were awarded to the top 12 finishers in each of the 11 events. Previously, only the top six positions in each event earned points.

The move was designed to test the depth of the teams entered and preclude against any one school walking off with first-place laurels on the

strength of one or two outstanding performers.

Plymouth relied on eight swimmers to accumulate its points. Gary Gould, the team's 1962-63 co-captain, scored 7.25 points as he finished eighth in the 100-yard freestyle and tied for fourth in the 50-yard freestyle and tied for fourth in the 50-yard free.

Gould's time in the 100-yard free was :52.3 and in the 50-yard event he was clocked in :23.5.

The Rocks' two relay teams accounted for another seven points. In the 200-yard medley relay, Jim Beglinger, Dan Olson, Dick Berry and Dave Agnew finished 11th with a time of 1:48.1. It was worth two points.

Berry, Tom Blunk, Pete Gustafson and Dave Beglinger turned in Plymouth's best time this year in the 200-yard freestyle relay and wound up eighth, earning the Rocks another five points. The time was 1:35.2.

Two other Suburban Six member schools also scored well.

Trenton, only challenger 10 days ago when Plymouth won the league championship meet, scored 13.5 points and finished 11th in the state meet. Bentley accumulated 8.5 points and finished several notches behind Trenton.

The Rocks had a highly commendable swimming record this past season. They engineered a 12-4 mark in dual-meet action, rolled decisively to a league championship crown (the Rocks' sixth in seven years) and closed out the winter with their recent ninth-place finish in the state meet.

Plymouth varsity swim coach John McFall, completing his 11th year, will announce letter-winners shortly. Next year's team captain and this season's most valuable player award will be announced at a spring athletic banquet, he said.

**Bentley 1st Dual Opponent April 11**

**Eight Veterans Nucleus of '63 Track Squad**

(Editor's Note— Plymouth High's 1963 spring sports schedule looms just around the corner. As the schedule stacks up at this moment, the five individual varsity or junior varsity teams engaged in spring competition will take part in 70 athletic contests. The following article, the first of a series, outlines the prospects for the varsity track team this season.)

While only eight returning lettermen grace Baughman's track roster, he unquestionably has the makings of a hard core of seasoned tracksters. The ultimate success of the Rocks, however, will depend heavily on the added strength Baughman is able to uncover from within the ranks of his newcomers.

"Should Plymouth 'jell' into a formidable unit as Baughman fielded during 1962, the Rocks will have considerable to crow about when the new season ends with the Suburban Six league championship meet May 29 at Bentley.

A year ago, Plymouth engineered an unbeaten dual-meet record (7-0) and claimed top laurels in the league

meet at Belleville. A little extra icing to the cake came Plymouth's way when the Rocks captured second place in the Class A Regional meet at Bentley, where only Pontiac Northern outranked the local tracksters.

Describing his 1962 contingent, Baughman said it was "one of the best teams that Plymouth has had in recent years." He implied it was perhaps the strongest in at least the past half decade.

Despite only eight returning veterans, Plymouth this spring should display a relative balance of power.

With 55 candidates signed up as of last Thursday, Plymouth's varsity track team opens its 1963 practice this week. Veteran thinclad coach Keith Baughman had planned to hold initial work-outs Monday afternoon.

Baughman, entering his 11th year as head track coach, may not have much further opportunity to reflect on the tremendous success enjoyed by the Rocks on the cinders a season ago. He'll be busy enough with his current edition.

Of the 19 athletes that were awarded varsity track letters at the conclusion of the 1962 campaign, only eight return this spring to Baughman's fold.

Gone — via graduation last June — are such stalwarts as team captain Dave Fey and the 1962 most valuable player, Tony Hunt.

Hunt, a stand-out half-

quarter mile); and Bill West (a sprinter).

Van Ornum is also the 1962 team captain.

Four of the eight who will form the nucleus of Baughman's new team are themselves long-time contributors to Plymouth's thinclad fortunes. Fischer, Park, Sarah and Steele were letter-winners as sophomores, repeated again last year as juniors and appear destined to become award recipients this time around.

As to Plymouth's inherent weaknesses this season, Baughman said concisely: "It's too soon to say." A training roster listing 55 hopeful candidates is being eyed carefully by Baughman, however, with hopes of filling dangerous gaps, created by heavy losses due to last June's graduation ceremonies.

The Rocks will have 12 days for official pre-season practice before Baughman takes his eight lettermen and a select number of other less experienced prospects to the Huron Relays on March 30.

The Huron Relays, an annual event, will serve essentially as a "shakedown cruise" for the Rocks' most promising candidates, as Baughman described the situation. The Relays are held indoors at Eastern Michigan University's Bowen Field House.

The first dual meet for Plymouth comes on April 11 when arch-rival Bentley

will be in charge of the junior varsity track program.

Bearup replaces John McFall, Baughman's right-hand man in recent years. McFall, varsity swim mentor, had declined the offer to continue as an assistant track coach as a result of the possible conflict with his studies toward a law degree at the University of Detroit law school.


