

Commission Urges Phone Users Study Rates Before Voting

Tax Hike Rejected; Budget OK'd

Plymouth's City Commission officially adopted a budget for 1963-64 that will keep the tax rate at \$14.65 with a total amount of \$615,551.

The total is slightly less than the \$618,010 budget for 1962-63 and almost \$1,500 less than that proposed by City Manager Albert Glassford.

Glassford proposed an in-

crease in the tax rate of five cents to \$14.70 but this was eliminated by the Commission in the numerous hearings with department heads and Glassford on the various segments.

As adopted by the Commission, the budget provides that the monies be pro-rated under the various funds as follows:

General government, \$84,246; buildings and structure, \$39,735; public works, \$180,610; public safety, \$176,345; health and welfare, \$7,925; library, \$32,765; Christmas decorations, \$3,300; parks and recreation, \$12,500; debt retirement, \$32,517; sanitary sewer fund contribution, \$14,000; retirement and social

security, city share, \$16,000; civil defense, \$500; appeal board, \$100; unappropriated reserve, \$20,008.

Other appropriations included: cemetery fund, \$23,100; parking fund, \$12,080; equipment fund, \$49,500; water fund, \$175,860; sewer fund, \$113,020; and urban renewal fund, \$147,905. Each of these is self-

supporting.

The Commission estimates it will receive \$415,091 for the general fund from the tax rate of \$14.65 and the balance in non-tax revenues which include: beer tax, intangible, operator licenses, gas and weight tax, sales tax and permit fees for a total of \$185,460. The Commission delayed ac-

tion on a salary increase for city employees as recommended by the City Manager until further study but did set aside a sum to make such adjustments when the study is completed and if the hikes have the approval of the Commission.

After a lengthy debate between several Commissioners, the Board passed a resolu-

tion urging all Plymouth telephone users to study the proposed rate increases carefully before making a decision on the ballots which are now in the mail from the utility.

The telephone rate matter developed into a heated discussion between Commissioners Arch Vallier and George Lawton in which the former termed

the presentation of Michigan Bell as "very vague and failing to present a true picture to telephone users."

"I feel the City Commission should pass a resolution opposing the proposed rate changes of Michigan Bell since a private line user has no choice and his rate will

Jabara Is Happy He Made Move To Community

Born and raised in a small Michigan town, it followed as a natural thing that James "Jim" Jabara would try to settle in a small bustling city in his native state. That he did four years ago when he joined with his brother in the purchase of a small plant just outside the city limits of Plymouth and he has never regretted the move to this community.

That's part of the story of the 34-year-old newly-elected member of the City Commission who resides with his petite wife, Jean, and sons, Mike and Marty, at 231 Irvin St.

The remainder of the story can't be told now for Jim and his brother, Kal, are owners of the Plymouth Tank and Fabricating Co. which is gradually developing into a coming thing along Ann Arbor Rd.

At the moment they have plans to construct a new plant and hope to grow from the present total of eight employees into one of the area's better small plants.

Jim was born on Jan. 13, 1929 in Mancelona, a son of Grocer and Mrs. S. A. Jabara. He was one of the seven children of the small town grocery store operator who was in business in Mancelona for 35 years until his untimely death in an auto accident a few years back.

The other Jabara children include: Kal, of Plymouth, a partner with Jim in the Plymouth Tank operation; Nayfe, who has a drug store in Ludington; Dean, a student in the Wayne State University law school; Mrs. Essie Pringle of

Grand Rapids; Mrs. Selma Hegazi and Mrs. Frieda Rice, both of Plymouth.

Jim received his elementary and high school training in Mancelona where he was graduated in 1946. He enrolled in Michigan Tech at Houghton and received a degree in Civil Engineering in 1950.

It was during the summer of 1948 during the vacation time that Jim was first introduced to a tiny, pretty brunet from Sioux Falls, S.D. She was Jean Swiden who was visiting an uncle in Mancelona and Jim became one of her acquaintances during that visit.

Neither will admit it but from that chance meeting developed a romance that was strictly in the letter writing stage for a couple of

U-M Honors Plymouth Trio For Scholarship

South Redford, Northville, Wayne Seek Annexation to College

Pending a favorable vote by electors from Wayne, South Redford and Northville school districts, the boundaries of the Northwest Wayne County Community College may be increased to annex the three districts.

The College Board approved annexation of the three districts after petitions were presented at last week's meetings by representative groups.

The petitions and a copy of the Board's resolution were presented to Supt. of Public Instruction Lynn Bartlett in Lansing last Thursday morning and approved for presentation to the voters by Bartlett Monday afternoon.

However, there is considerable work ahead for workers in each of the three school districts. First petitions, bearing the names of two per cent of the eligible voters, must be in the hands of the secretary of the local school board no later than midnight Friday (May 10). These petitions were given to the committees earlier in the week by college officials who also gave the local workers petitions for candidates for the College Board.

Each of the new districts is entitled to a board member but the petitions must be filed before midnight, May 10 and must have the signatures of at least 50 eligible voters and no more than 200. The new Board members will serve four-year terms.

The two per cent petitions ask the local school board to place the issues on the June 10 ballot. The voters will be asked to approve annexation to the College district, okay a one mill levy and guarantee that the district will assume its part of the bonds.

It will be the second time it has been presented to South Redford voters—but the first for the district alone. South Redford and Redford Union districts voted on annexation to the college district four years ago and it was defeated by opposition from the RU section.

This time it will be strictly South Redford and backers believe the issue has better than an even chance of gaining approval of the electorate.

South Redford's petition, which carried 60 names and was certified by the Board secretary, was presented by Charles Barnett acting as spokesman for a delegation of four.

Howard Ward, a teacher in the Livonia system but a resident of Wayne, made the presentation for the district. He gave the Board petitions bearing the names of 78 eligible voters.

Mrs. E. K. Cook served as the spokesman for the Northville representatives and presented petitions with the names of 96 voters.

The College Board was cold to the petitions and annexation at first when a motion to accept all three was made by James O'Neil, Livonia at-large Board member. His motion died for lack of support.

This opened the matter for discussion during which Vice

Revise Time Schedule For New City Hall

Ground breaking ceremonies for Plymouth's new City Hall will probably take place during the latter part of August under a revised time schedule made possible after the Municipal Building Authority officially received a contract for the federal grant from the Home and Housing Finance Agency in Chicago last week.

The contract was signed on April 30 and the MBA now has 120 days from that date—specifically Aug. 27—to break ground to start construction.

The MBA authorized Chairman Harold Guenther and Secretary Joseph Near to sign the contract in a meeting Friday and things are expected to develop rapidly from this time on.

The Board concurred with the action of the City Com-

mission, which approved razing of the old City Hall last week, and affirmed plans to demolish the ancient structure as soon as the new building is completed.

The Board approved a plan to hold a joint meeting with the City Commission and all department heads within a week to study and examine the latest plans.

Members voted unanimously for the final study and approval before Architect By Becker completes the formal plans.

Becker will act on all recommendations from the joint session and make any changes and hopes to be able to present the formal plans for the HHFA approval within three or four weeks.

Inasmuch as the government contract provides that all bills must be paid monthly, the Authority voted to meet on the second Tuesday of each month at 8 p.m. during the actual construction period.

Secretary Near informed the Authority that condemnation action for the two sites on Main Street will start in Circuit Court on June 5.

He also announced receipt of a letter from the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission that approval of the application to issue revenue bonds for the Municipal Building will probably be made by May 14.

The MBA has 60 days from the receipt of the HHFA contract to present its financing plans back to the Chicago Agency for approval.

Forum Ponders Future

Group leaders of the recent Plymouth Community Forum, from which came recommendations for consolidation of the community through the efforts of a joint planning committee, plan a meeting this week to discuss ways and future steps to develop the findings.

"We are carefully studying future actions before making any announcement of plans," explained School Supt. Russell Isbister, who chaired the forum and was one of the leaders in calling the meeting.

"This is a matter which can't be furthered without a great deal of study. The big question before the group leaders is 'How to proceed without creating many problems?'"

"We feel there is a definite readiness for further action but how and in what manner is something that presents a real puzzle. We hope to have some sort of a solution soon but know that it will involve more meetings by the 11 group leaders."

Isbister indicated that there is a feeling from all who participated that another such discussion should be arranged and the current thinking is of planning another forum in early fall.

Plymouth URA Gets 3 Lots In Court Suit

Acquisition of three parcels in the Urban Renewal Project on Mill St. through condemnation action by Circuit Court Judge George Bowles was completed last week according to URA Director Joseph Near.

Near announced acquisition of the Rachel Reiman, Earl Cook and Ackerman Estate properties by a favorable decision by Judge Bowles and a condemnation jury.

The court placed a price on the properties that was close to what had been offered originally, according to Director Near.

Still remaining on the docket is the condemnation suit for the Clyde Glass acreage.

Somehow the deadlines for the 1963 school elections have sneaked up silently this year.

Despite the absence of sound on the subject, the final day for filing to run for the school board or the community college board is this very Friday, May 10. Petitions are available at the respective board offices.

Just a reminder . . . for any who might be toying with the idea of joining the race.

A number of wondering residents have called to ask about the status of the new "parochial bus bill" in Lansing.

This is Senate bill 1144 and it has passed both the Senate and the House. Now it awaits the Governor's signature and there have been no indications from his office that he won't sign.

However, few realize that the bill wouldn't become effective until 1964—not until then would it be mandatory for local public districts to furnish transportation to non-public students. (Even today, under existing law, they can furnish it on a voluntary basis.)

Unless one has read the bill, he couldn't realize how massively complicated it is. The philosophical issue may be relatively simple to understand, but the details of execution are strictly gristle for lawyers.

The aim of the bill was to set up rules for transporting non-public school students which would be identical, down to the last comma, to those which prevail for public students. It isn't easy.

Example: In many districts today, no bus service is provided those who live within 1 1/2 miles of a school. The bill would have the same restriction apply to a parochial student. But what if the latter lives less than 1 1/2 miles from a public school, but more than that distance from his own, non-public school? Does the bus stop for him, and where? Does it stop and pick up only the non-public student, though he might be standing on a corner right next to a public school student?

The bill attempts to solve the problem but there are many transportation experts who confess to total confusion.

If the bill is signed, a special legislative committee will tour the State this summer, trying to inventory particular local situations and make recommendations as to how to make SB 1144 work in each case.

Since schools seem to have become the central subject today, we wonder if our local Boards of Education have done much thinking about automatic kitchen and lunchroom facilities.

In Holland, Mich., the educators insist they saved \$100,000 through the installation of one such system in a new school building . . . a series of food vending machines keep food at any temperature, hot or cold, carry up to 300 items, operate around the clock if necessary (without over time pay), and which takes schools out of the food-preparation business and turns it over to the caterers.

Approval of Plymouth Township's \$165,000 project for construction of a sewer line extension along Joy Road was announced to Township Supervisor Roy Lindsay in a wire from Congresswoman Mrs. Martha Griffiths in Washington.

The wire stated that the Community Facilities Administration has awarded an \$82,500 grant for the construction of the proposed sewer line.

The approval came after Supervisor Lindsay and Township Attorney Earl Demel made a special trip to Washington to confer with Mrs. Griffiths and Senators Philip Hart, Neil Staebler and Patrick McNamara to learn if the request could be speeded.

The Board is expected to approve the grant and start work on plans for the project at its monthly meeting next Tuesday.

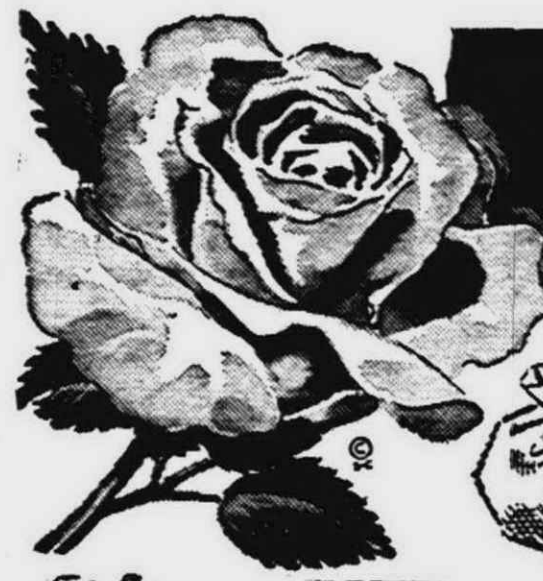
Peter Zylstra and

Will Not Peel

The least expensive furniture, veneered or solid, may prove unsatisfactory for various reasons. Even budget priced veneered pieces, however, will not chip, peel or crack. All cabinet grade plywood is made by the same method. The hardwoods selected for the exterior surfaces may be more or less costly depending upon the species of the wood, the figure pattern it shows, the finish applied to it, and the thickness.

You can make and enjoy a garden that's a beautiful frame for your home with a little patience, a lot of enthusiasm and these few pointers.

seeding bare patches in your lawn, loosen two inches of soil fertilizer and sow.

Safety Hints for Home Gardeners

Whether you are first-time gardener or an old hand at the game, it's never too early — or too late — to learn basic rules of garden safety.

Insecticides, power mowers and other tools are intended to lessen work. But if these are not handled properly, they can be harmful. So protect your family and pets by following these tips from Anne Whitfield, first-aid expert for Dial Research Laboratories:

- Stepping on the upturned teeth of a rake or the edge of a hoe is one of the most common garden-type accidents. These tools should be turned downward when laid aside even momentarily, and stored away properly when not in use.
- Though most insecticides may be harmless, consider all of them dangerous until you have read the labels and discover otherwise. Store where children and pets cannot get into them.
- A power mower can throw stones faster than a slingshot. Before mowing, clear the area of rocks, nails and other debris. Keep people, especially small children, out of the way. Don't use electric-powered mowers when the grass is wet, unless you want to be shocked.
- Unknowing children will taste anything. But it's best not to let them chew plants or flowers. Many common varieties — including tulip bulbs, sweet peas, peach tree leaves, rhododendron, and elephant ears — are poisonous.
- When possible, wear protective gloves to avoid scratches, contact with poison ivy or noxious sprays. But if you do get a scratch or thorn prick, wash immediately with germi-

When you hear of someone winning the Irish sweepstakes, finding oil in their back yard or climbing up and over the highest mountains in the world, they are usually from some place else, remote and unreal.

Well, belonging to this "believe it or not" group are a family that have been written on in national magazines and newspapers from coast to coast and they live right in our own area.

In fact the mama was such a completely charming and fun person she felt like a friend after one interview. Mama, being Helen Nixon, wife of Curt, mother of seven, first-mate on the trim ship "Trade Wind," chief cook on land or at sea, log keeper and teacher at sea.

The Nixons now live on Louisiana in Livonia but for one year they lived aboard the boat they built themselves and traveled the high (like 30 feet at one point) seas traveling 6,000 miles across the Gulf Stream to the Bahamas — up the Atlantic coast to New York and back to home base. Curt, Helen, six little self-taught sailors and a mascot Ginger, their faithful collie.

It was no spur of the moment trip — it was a dream of 13 years. When Curt was courting his wife their dreams didn't center about a vine-covered cottage, but instead around Curt's dream of building a boat and adventuring together. After he "sold" the

dream to Helen they were married and settled down to talk more of their dream and be blessed with babies — three of them.

Now, right here, is where we separate the "pioneer" from the "plain jane" in women — instead of just letting Curt talk his dream to death Helen encouraged him to get started on their plans for a 30-foot ketch to sleep four of them comfortably and their baby.

With imported Burmese teakwood, mahogany planking and stout oak beams, they built their tidy ketch, Trade Wind. It took them four years in their own backyard. It boasted a 7x7 foot forward cabin, 12x10 foot main cabin, a score of hidden spaces for storage. Curt followed the plans of John Hanna's Tahiti, designed and built for safety and comfort in all kinds of weather. By the time they were ready to "cast off their crew was increased by three more, Cindy 4, Gary 3, and Sheryl seven months.

"Curt and I figured we had better get started right then if we were ever going" and Mrs. Nixon crammed baby food jars and diapers and children into every cranny of their tiny and tidy cabins. She drilled their crew of six endlessly in the need of wearing life-jackets (and many times her dining paid off in "fishing" one out of the brink); there were strict orders in staying "below" during inclement weather. In fact the baby — Sheryl was nicknamed "Bunker" because of spending a great deal of time in this particular area. She planned a disciplined school-work schedule for the older children and planned balanced menus to cook for eight on her one-burner range.

Through all their adventuresome journey, and a few incidents were indeed hair-raising, the Nixons discovered their children watched out for one another more closely on board ship than most kinds do at home.

Philosophically Mrs. Nixon explained a fact too few of us realize. We worry too darn much about steady jobs, more money, more cars, T.V.s in every room and all in working order at once — and many meaningless whirl-a-wind activities children do not benefit from. The Nixons felt as close to nature as they were bound to live (and did,) their children would benefit.

I'm sure this is true. Just to hear Helen Nixon tell about their fun, enlightening and exciting experiences was rewarding to me.

The Nixons made a 90-minute film of their adventure and are cooperating with the Franklin High School Music Boosters in Livonia, (who are a group of parents doing their best to raise money for band uniforms). Thursday, May 16, at 8 p.m. at Franklin High Curt Nixon assisted by his wife Helen, will narrate their color film. Tickets will be sold at the door and are one dollar for adults and 50 cents for children. Who know what dreams it might renew afresh in your life after seeing what one family managed to do and their adventures.

As for the Nixons, they have one more to add to their crew. Arlene, three years old — and although Mr. Nixon is back at work for an Engineering firm, and their ship snugly tied up to Grosse Ile they occasionally get a look in their eye for their next "dream" — a trip around the world. An Association of 40 Lutheran congregations of the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod, Michigan District, will be erecting a home for the aged—to be called the Martin Luther Memorial Home—in South Lyon, Michigan. Plans for building this home were revealed by the Martin Luther Memorial Home Publicity Committee.

The home, to be located on three acres of land, will cost \$450,000, of which \$411,000 will be for the building itself, the remaining for furnishings and site development. Pierce from Redford; Edmonson, Willow Run; Marshall, South Redford; Pearson, Redford Union; Marshall, Wayne; Plymouth Junior High West; Charles Brake, Taylor Center; Riley and Lola Valley from Redford Township.

The Commission finally approved a resolution to the effect that it felt Plymouth users should study the rate proposals carefully before filling out the ballot since a study indicates that private line users will not have the option of retaining private lines with meter calls to Detroit and that the rate for the small user of a one-party line will find his rate boosted from \$4.95 to \$8.55 with no choice.

Hazen Wilson, district manager of Michigan Bell, told the Commission that the proposed changes wouldn't have an immediate effect in Plymouth regardless of whether the vote was 100 per cent for.
"Our company must study the results of the poll carefully and take a second look at the entire picture," he said. "We are perfectly willing to give the reports of the Plymouth poll to this Commission. But I reiterate, Plymouth won't feel the effects of the vote immediately regardless of the outcome."

City Attorney Edward Draugelis pointed out to the Board that there is still a long haul ahead before the rates can be changed. He indicated that the proposed rate schedule would have to go before the Public Service Commission for a hearing and that all interested parties could put in their objections at that time.

In other actions, the Commission approved:
National Bank of Detroit, Plymouth branch, as the official depository for the city.

Gave the American Legion permission for the traditional Memorial Day Parade.

Gave the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce permission to install two fringe searchlights in Kellogg Park and approved a band concert in the park as part of the Mid-Night Madness sales promotion on Wednesday, May 15.

Action for the City Manager to make a study and report on costs of blacktopping W. Ann Arbor Trail from S. Main to Hamilton, and the paving of W. Ann Arbor Trail from Hamilton to the east city limits.

whether the facilities could adequately fill the needs then and sought answers before voting on the annexation.

Fischer pointed out that annexation of the three districts, particularly Wayne, could create a problem in that it would form a pocket around Inkster and exclude that area from a college district.

College President Dr. Bradner with the aid of Business Manager Kenneth Lindner answered all questions to the satisfaction of the Board and a second motion for annexation was made by O'Neil.

This time he received a second from Brown and the Board voted by a split 5-2 vote for annexation. Opposing the motion were Charles Kirkpatrick, at-large member from Livonia, and Fischer.

On the basis of 1962 evaluations for taxes, the college would gain \$28,014 from Northville, \$130,238 from South Redford and \$135,675 from Wayne.

The Wayne Community School District is expected to soar to a much higher evaluation in the next few years since the area includes the proposed \$24 million Westland Shopping Center, the proposed \$35 million expansion by Ford Motor Co.; and a \$16 million Urban Renewal project.

Wayne has the highest tax base at the moment with an evaluation of \$135,576,329 followed by South Redford with \$130,238,946 and Northville with \$28,014,369.

The Board informed delegations from the three petitioning districts that each must finance its own promotion for annexation and the petitions must be secured from the College Board but returned to the secretary of the local school board.

However, the college administration will furnish such booklets and materials as are available and the Board members expressed a willingness to furnish speakers for any public meetings.

For information in regard to the rubbish and garbage pickup, street maintenance, sewer problems, water pressure, rusty water or any other queries that may pertain to the Department of Public Works, please call GL 3-1556 Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Fire hydrants are being flushed on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evenings. It is impossible for the DPW to give information as to the locations and times since it may take longer to flush some hydrants than planned and thus throw the entire schedule off.

Hot water should be flushed completely every week (not just some water drawn from the bottom of the tank) if there is a tendency for rusty water in the hot water line. Upon request a leaflet will be mailed to any customer giving complete instructions for flushing hot water tanks.

Several inquiries have been made to the department as to what can be used to remove rust spots from white clothing. One tablespoon of Oxalic Acid per 14 gallons of water, mixed well before the clothing is put into the washer is recommended. This is for white materials only. Oxalic acid may be purchased at any drug store.

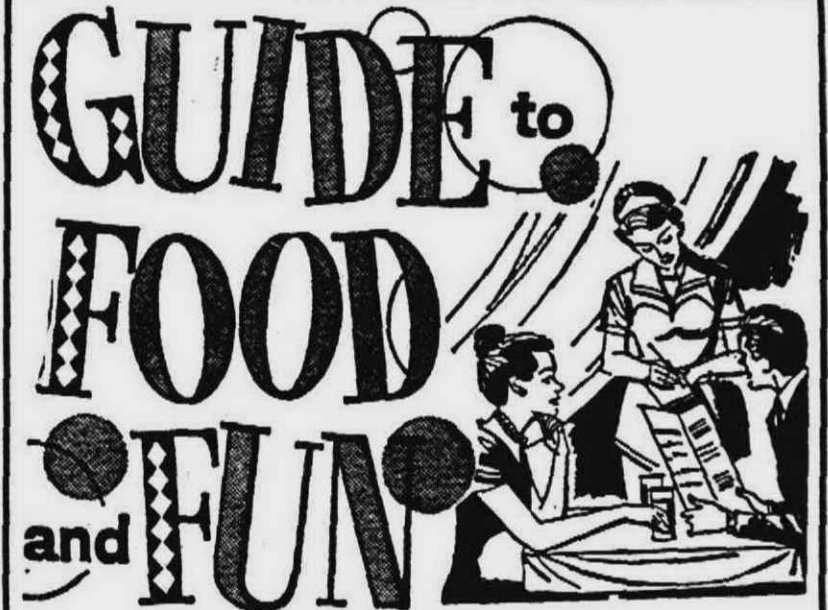

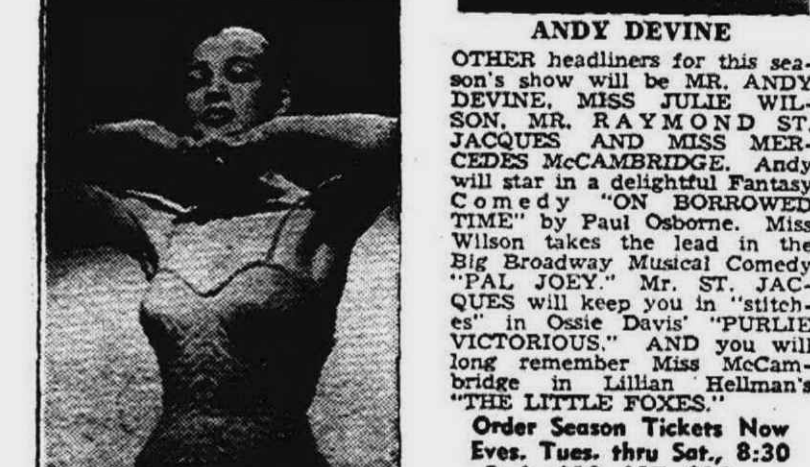

SCHOOL BUSINESS IS YOUR BUSINESS

Question: I read in one of your columns that you predict our enrollment will increase by something like 3,000 pupils next year. How can you be so sure? Aren't you guessing at this?

Answer: Of course we aren't absolutely sure our enrollment projections are exact, because there are so many things that can affect any population estimates in a rapidly growing district like ours. For the most part, however, our projections for the past five years have been within one per cent of our actual enrollments. These accurate enrollment predictions have enabled us to keep pace with our growth by acquainting the public with the exact needs of their schools.

The method we use to get our enrollment projections is quite simple. In a recent column we indicated our September, 1963 enrollment would be 25,200. This projection was based on, among other things, our present enrollments which are listed below:

From these figures we subtracted the 685 twelfth graders and moved all the other grades up one, which left a question mark for kindergarten.

To determine our potential kindergarten enrollment we used information gained from the school census, which is taken each year around the end of May. The census workers try to call on every home in the District to get, along with other information, the names and ages of all children. From this census we can estimate fairly accurately next year's kindergarten enrollment.

There were several other factors which had to be figured into the projection. For example, we usually lose students from kindergarten to first grade because some children attend public school kindergarten, but they transfer to parochial or private schools for

the first grade. We also had to subtract a certain number of students who will drop out of school by next fall. These two factors were relatively easy to estimate because our drop-out and transfer student percentages remain fairly constant from year to year. Our drop-out rate, incidentally, is one of the lowest in the metropolitan area.

Another consideration we had to take into account was the number of families moving into our community during the months between the completion of the school census and the opening of school. We are growing so rapidly some of our census information is out of date before it is a week old.

Finally, to arrive at our enrollment projection for September of 1963, we added our census figure on potential kindergartners to our present enrollment figure minus the 12th grade. Then we subtracted the usual percentage of transfer and drop-out students. This gave us an estimation of 24,800; a figure which did not allow for any population increase between the census and the beginning of school. To compensate for this, we added a minimum of 400 students to give us a conservative estimate of 25,200 students for next year.

This means we will increase our enrollment by approximately 3,000 students. Our enrollment increase for one year is almost as great as the total enrollments of such districts as Ecorse, Melvindale, Plymouth, Riverview, and River Rouge.

Kiwanians To Hear Plymouth Official

"Plymouth City Government" will be discussed by a panel of City Commissioners before members of the Plymouth Kiwanis Club in the May 14 meeting at Lofy's Arbor-Lill.

The club numbers three commissioners: Arch Vallier, George Lawton and James Jabara, among its members along with City Clerk Joseph Near, City Treasurer Kenneth Way and City Attorney Edward Draugelis. More than 90 members and guests heard Prof. Abraham

Thomas, of the Detroit College of Law, talk about "Law Day, May 1, 1963" in last week's meeting.

Prof. Thomas pointed out that law is a living, moving thing that has an important effect on everyday lives.

"Law, as we know it, is not new," he said, "it has its beginning in Egyptian law almost 5,000 years ago. All countries have laws, some more than others. It is the opinion of many that the more laws a country has, the greater the weakness of that country."

Prof. Thomas stressed that in American government the law is different because the people are important.

"In the recently adopted State Constitution," he cited, "all political power is inherent in the people. The enumeration of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people."

He was critical of criticism of persons using the Fifth Amendment of the United States Constitution.

"In our own state constitution," he said, "it is written that no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law."

"This amendment is for the protection of all and gives a clear illustration of how we, as citizens, need this protection in court. We must never forget that incriminated is not the same as guilty."

CANDIDATES APPEAR SCARCE

Friday Is Deadline Day To File for College Seats

Voters in the Livonia, Clarenceville, Garden City and Plymouth school districts will be called on to elect members of the Northwest Wayne County Community College Board of Trustees in the June 10 election.

Provision for the election was made by Gov. George Romney this week when he signed House Act 758 which provides for the poll. Until that moment there was nothing in the statutes covering the Community College election.

At the moment there definitely will be one vacancy in the at-large representation on the Board, James O'Neil, of Livonia, will step down from the College Board on June 30 and then be sworn in as a member of the State Board of Education on the following day.

O'Neil was elected to the State Board in the April 1 poll. Inasmuch as the two terms didn't overlap, he was permitted to remain a member of the College Board to fill out the term and then move to his newly elected post.

Petitions were handed to all incumbent board members earlier in the week and each must have the petitions with the names of at least 50 eligible

voters but not more than 200 in the hands of the school board secretary of the district in which the petitions are circulated no later than midnight on Friday (May 10).

The election code provided that petitions for the at-large posts must be signed in such a manner that all names on any one petition are from the same school district, and each must be returned to the school board secretary of that district.

In the June 10 poll, voters will select two at-large candidates for six-year terms and one at-large candidate for four along with the candidate from the Clarenceville district.

Name Two to Zoning Board

Two new members were appointed to the Redford Township Zoning Board Monday night by Township officials.

Anthony Livorine, 14317 Lenore, and John Casley, 9982 Appoline, were named on the recommendations of Trustees Rhys Lewis and Clerk Dawn Rice, respectively.

They replace Carl Bernath and Fred Dzendzel, whose terms have expired.

Candidates from Livonia, Garden City and Plymouth will be seeking two-year terms.

College Board Secretary Paul Muthick, of Clarenceville, urged all candidates for any of the posts to pick up petitions at once.

"If no candidates file petitions for any one of the seven Board jobs," he said, "then that position will be filled by write-in action at the June 10 election."

Mutnick was particularly disturbed that no petitions had been taken out for a candidate to fill the O'Neil vacancy as late as Tuesday afternoon.

The current board includes: Harold Fischer of Plymouth; Mutnick of Clarenceville; Erwin Brown of Livonia; and Clarke Oldenburg of Garden City and the three at-large members, Charles Kirkpatrick and O'Neil of Livonia and Mrs. Jane Moehle of Plymouth.

They're off and running at the Detroit Race Course over on the Middlebelt Road and every indication points to the greatest campaign yet for the fans, the owners, and horses and everybody else concerned.

Crowd and wagering interests are up at race tracks all around the country. For example, State Racing Commissioner Eddie Hayes tells us the trotters over at Hazel Park show an eleven-percent hike over a year ago at the gate and in money bet.

The gentlemen connected with the Detroit Race Course continually are striving to make their oval one of the finest in the United States. With each season they are luring finer stables of horses to show their wares for Detroit area fans.

It takes bigger purses, of course, to bring in the better horses. And to increase the pot for the horse owners, it's necessary first for the track's revenues at the betting windows to swell. This is a gradual process, but the DRC keeps making headway.

We also might add that you won't find a more attractive horse park in the country than the one over on Middlebelt and Schoolcraft. Catering to the wishes of the fans comes first, as far as the track's headmen are concerned.

They'll do anything for the customer except tell them who's going to win the various races!

Incidentally, racing starts daily this year at 2 o'clock with a nine-race program booked Monday through Saturday. The twilight programs of the past have passed into history.

One wonders if the days will come when the horses (not the trotters) will run under the lights at the DRC.

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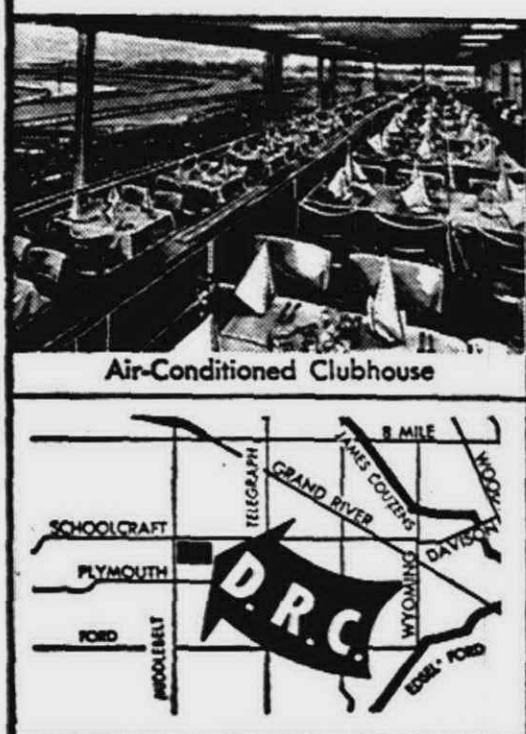

Laundry Room Design Cued to Senior Citizens

As a married couple approaches the retirement years, comfort and convenience in the home become increasingly important. Whether remodeling the house where your children were raised or a smaller one where space is at a premium, one new addition that will ease the homemaker's work load is a conveniently placed laundry center.

An ideal plan for older couples has been designed for the Maytag Home Laundry Idea Center by Florida architect Theodore Andrew, A.I.A. Everything is compactly arranged to lighten laundry chores so that mother also can enjoy dad's new-found free hours.

The central feature of this design is a combination washer-dryer raised 18 inches above the floor—high enough to reduce stooping, yet low enough so controls are within easy reach. A washer-dryer combination was selected to eliminate the necessity of lifting heavy wet loads from washer to dryer.

Shelves overhead are handy for storing detergents, bleaches and other laundry aids so they are out-of-reach of inquisitive small grandchildren. Space below the washer can be used for out-of-season clothes or other things not used frequently.

Homemakers who have undergone the common struggle of attempting to rearrange a room with a number of traffic doorways are most enthusiastic about folding doors. They no longer have to be concerned about which way the door swings.

And, anyone who loves the space-saving features of sliding doors, but has been bothered by the doors sticking, will certainly appreciate these smoothly moving folding doors.

But if you think of it as a remodeling job, the adding of needed space as important to you as the finishing off of an attic or the addition of an extra bedroom, it becomes a worthwhile undertaking. 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French Court Artists Set Kings' Taste

French furniture styles of the four Kings named Louis were actually the work of court artists, designers and craftsmen. From Louis XIII to the death of Louis XVI, nearly 300 years later, men from Italy, Holland and Germany influenced kingly tastes. Often granted royal title and rank, they were arbiters of fashions in palace and chateau furnishings.

Louis XIII's cabinet maker, Laurent Stubre was described as a joiner and carpenter in ebony. French cabinet makers today are known as "ebenistes." Ebony was royal and rare. It came from Macassar. It was used as a veneer, inlaid with ivory.

During the first years of Louis XV's reign, the Duke of Orleans was regent. He too had his retinue of artists. The style naturally, is known as Regency-Ebony was abandoned as a cabinet veneer. Walnut, mahogany and rosewood veneers became popular.

In 1725 blocks of mahogany from Haiti and Honduras began to arrive in France. The most valued blocks were those whose veining was "thorny," "flaming," "watered," "speckled"—the same glowing figures we admire today!

With mahogany came purple amaranth from Mexico, golden toned satinwood from the West Indies and many other "new" woods. Designers quickly made them into veneers for colorful inlaid patterns.
