The revised charter for the City of Plymouth Heights (nee Plymouth Township) has successfully passed the scrutinizing inspection of the Michigan attorney general's office and is understood to be awaiting only Gov. Romney's signature.

This was the anouncement last week of James Garber, chairman of the Plymouth Heights' charter commission. Garber said he had been told by the attorney general's office that a favorable recommendation on the charter had been issued and the document had been submitted to Romney's office for signing.

The attorney general was called in on the matter to determine if the charter conformed to the legal require-ments of Michigan's Home Rufe Act.

Following the governor's signature on the document, charter-adoption election will be held in the township. Although Romney has not yet signed the document. election has been scheduled
