

Perhaps flushed by the success of others in wringing a rate readjustment from the phone company, the august Councilmen of Livonia recently attempted to mount an assault against Consumers Power over gas rates.

The argument was that Consumers charges somewhat more for gas than does Michigan Consolidated. Consumers serves Plymouth, Livonia and a host of outstate cities. Michigan Consolidated provides gas for Redford Township and the basic Detroit area. Our research on this one indicates that the councilmen are off on a bad tack, and might better turn their minds to other subjects . . . Detroit's water rates are one suggestion. The rule of thumb for regulation of public utilities is that they are entitled to a six per cent profit, above all their costs. Consumers has been yielding 5.6 return on its gross plant and 6.5 percent on its capital. Comparable figures for Michigan Consolidated are 6.0 and 7.9. Consumers rates are slightly higher for residential users than those of Michigan Consolidated—an "average" comparison between a Livonia-Plymouth home and a Detroit-Redford home would be \$4.98 per month (for Consumers) and \$4.12 per month (for Michigan Consolidated.) The reason for the difference is that Consumers' actual costs are higher. Working out in the suburbs, they have fewer customers per line, because of the lower population density. Consumers bears higher storage costs. Consumers has an investment per customer figure of \$605; for Michigan Consolidated it is \$469. These rates were examined in Lansing just last year, incidentally. The chances for any kind of a successful protest this year are nil. As said earlier; we'd be more interested in an explanation of why the cost of Detroit water should be so much lower in Redford Township and Detroit than it is in Plymouth Township and Livonia. Detroit has a different water rate for every community it supplies. Which, incidentally, is something which Consumers Power does not have-it has a single rate for every customer, wherever he resides in Michigan. All share equally the total cost of operating the whole system.
