Incumbent Niemi Heads Plymouth List

Seven File For School Board Posts

Prospect of the most interesting Plymouth Community School Board of Education race in years was seen when seven filed petitions before the 4 p.m. deadline Saturday for the two posts for four-year terms.

It was the largest number of candidates since 1958 and finds the seven seeking the posts now held by Harold Niemi and Peter Zylstra. The balloting is scheduled for Monday, June 10.

Actually there is only one vacancy since the petitions for the nomination of Niemi were the first received by Board Secretary Mrs. Esther Hulsing Friday afternoon.

Zylstra, who is reported planning on moving to the Saginaw-Bay City area where he is now employed, announced some time ago that he would not seek re-election.

There was considerable conjecture as to whether Niemi would seek another term or not. Unlike the election rules in the City of Plymouth, where a candidate must announce his intention at the time he takes out a petition and registers, the school board petitions are available to anyone without making the name of the candidate known.

Thus the Niemi petitions came as more or less of a surprise to all except the circulators and the voters who signed them.

Niemi, a former president of the Board and currently winding up a four-year term, is an executive of the Ford Motor Co. and resides at 47566 Joy Road.

Other petitions were returned in behalf of George Conover, 279 Blunk; Patrick Gannon, 165 Burroughs; John McLaren, 1008 Roosevelt; Carl Schultheiss, 11705 Amherst Court; James Garber, 42269 Hammill Lane; and Glenn Schroeder, 1330 Beech Court.

Seek \$60,000 Trim In City Hall Costs

The meeting started on a peaceful note as the Plymouth City Commission Monday jovially approved the lilac as the official municipal flower on recommendation of the Garden Club represented by Sid Strong

—then the group rolled up its collective sleeves and attacked the problem of getting the costs of the new City Hall within reason and the haggling was still going strong when the special session adjourned some three hours later.

Disgruntled with the news that the estimated cost of the new municipal building was set at \$519,000, some \$60,000 over the original figure of \$460,000, the Commissioners sharpened their knives for a whittling job.

The only difference between the Board and a whittler was that it was trimming costs where an expert with a knife carves figures out of wood.

Four members of the Municipal Authority including Chairman Harold Guenther, Secretary Joseph Near and members Everett Burmester and Louis Borgard sat in with the Commission in the lengthy session.

From the discussion came charges that there was too much wasted space, many needless items that ran up the cost and a definite need for a study of the plans for possible revisions.

FACTS and OPINIONS

Perhaps flushed by the success of others in wringing a rate readjustment from the phone company, the august Councilmen of Livonia recently attempted to mount an assault against Consumers Power over gas rates.

The argument was that Consumers charges somewhat more for gas than does Michigan Consolidated. Consumers serves Plymouth, Livonia and a host of out-state cities. Michigan Consolidated provides gas for Redford Township and the basic Detroit area.

Our research on this one indicates that the councilmen are off on a bad tack, and might better turn their minds to other subjects... Detroit's water rates are one suggestion.

The rule of thumb for regulation of public utilities is that they are entitled to a six per cent profit, above all their costs. Consumers has been yielding 5.6 return on its gross plant and 6.5 percent on its capital. Comparable figures for Michigan Consolidated are 6.0 and 7.9.

Consumers rates are slightly higher for residential users than those of Michigan Consolidated—an "average" comparison between a Livonia-Plymouth home and a Detroit-Redford home would be \$4.98 per month (for Consumers) and \$4.12 per month (for Michigan Consolidated).

The reason for the difference is that Consumers' actual costs are higher. Working out in the suburbs, they have fewer customers per line, because of the lower population density. Consumers bears higher storage costs. Consumers has an investment per customer figure of \$605; for Michigan Consolidated it is \$469.

Livonia this week witnesses the opening of its first "supermarket" for the sale of electrical appliances.

The "Home Appliance Mart" opened its doors today in a large building on the north side of Plymouth road, at Wayne road. (The big, brilliant building formerly occupied by Star Nursery). Home Appliance Mart has another store in Ann Arbor which has the reputation of having been something of a merchandise sensation. President George Simon opened the "supermarket" in a small building in downtown Ann Arbor and attracted so much business that he quickly expanded into a 16,000 square feet on the western suburbs.

"We don't forget the customer the minute the cash register rings up the sale," said Davis.

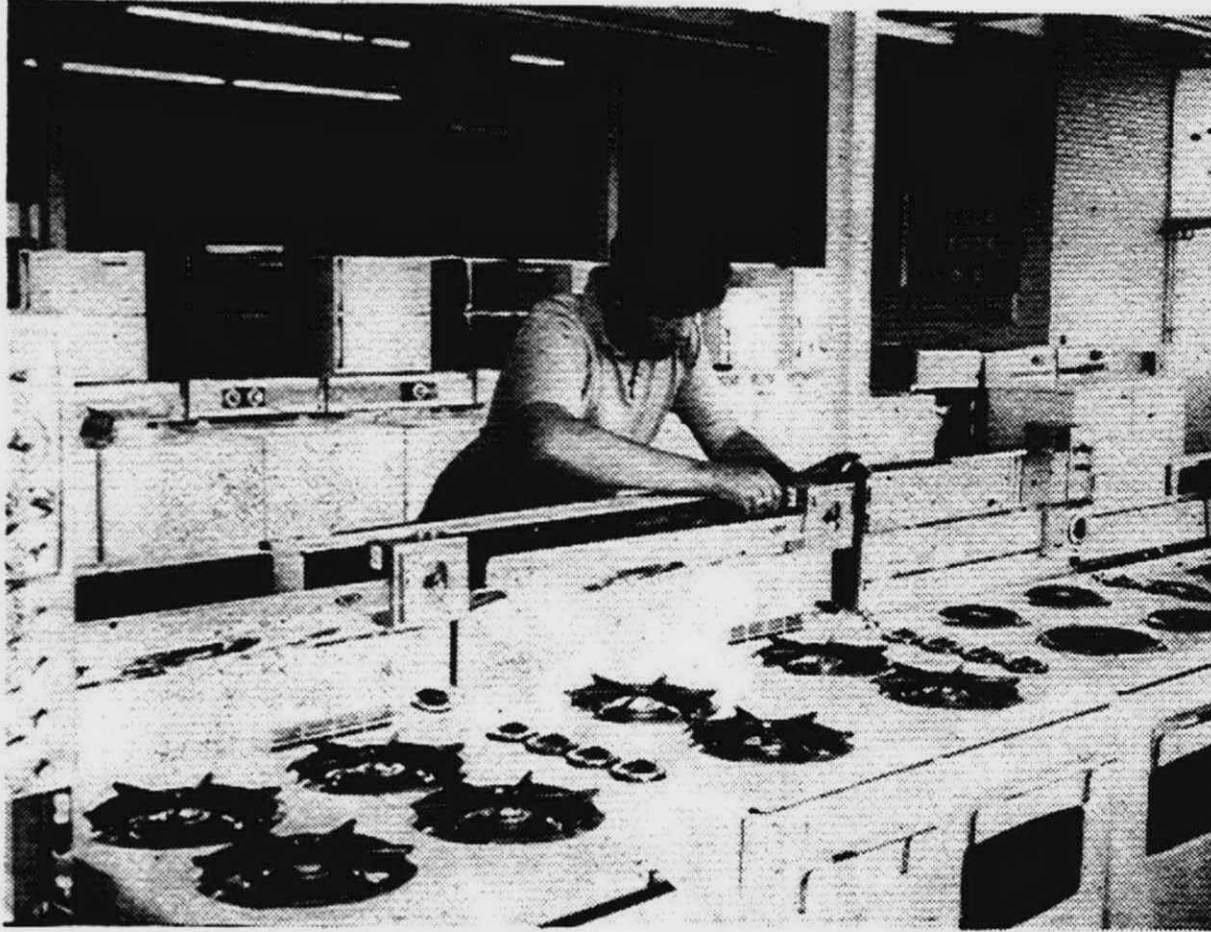
"Right in the store we have a headquarters for a staff of trained repair technicians. They always are available to service and install appliances purchased from the Mart.

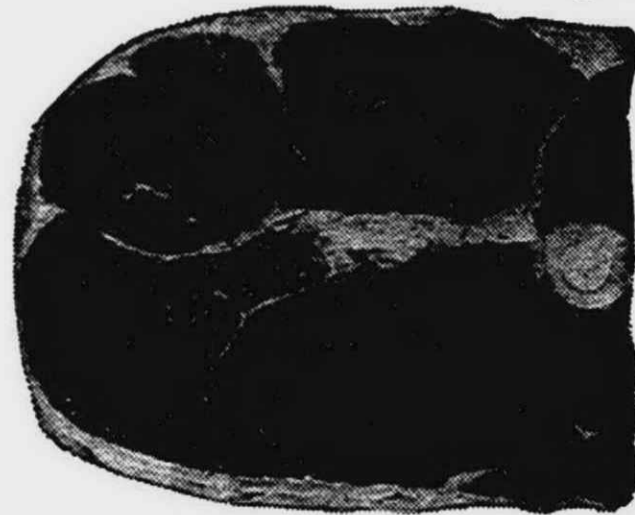

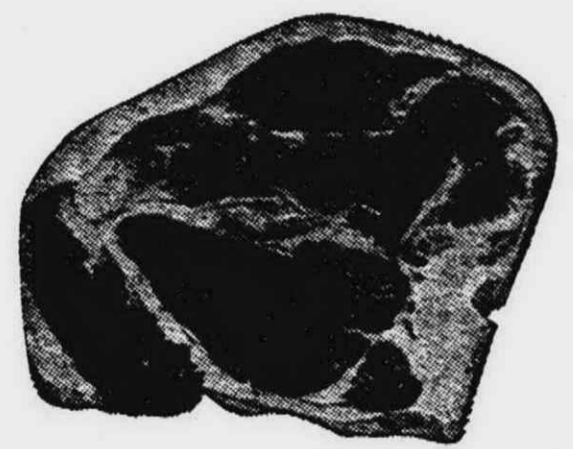

The participant for one year will serve on active duty for 24 months.

Four months prior to graduation the Army-assisted student will be given the opportunity to list three Army Hospitals in the United States where he or she would like to be assigned.

Application for overseas duty may be submitted after arrival at his or her first duty assignment, following a basic orientation course at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

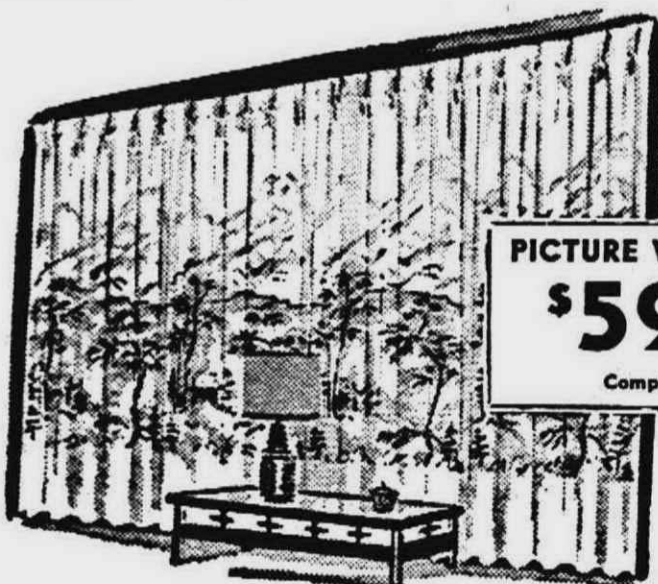

more power and freedom in attracting industry. One of the bills is downright revolutionary in that it permits a local legislative body, by its own vote, to issue revenue bonds, the money from which can be used to buy and develop industrial land . . . sometimes called "parks." Then when the developed land is sold or leased, the income would be used to retire the bonds.

At the meeting next Wednesday evening, a speaker will be Rep. Gilbert Bursley of Ann Arbor. He sponsored the "package" of bills on Gov. Romney's behalf, knows more about the subject than anyone else in the legislature, and will be able to tell local officials just how they might be utilized hereabouts.

As all know, the only way we'll ever be able to stifle residential taxes is by increasing the ratio of industry within our communities.

These bills were signed by the Governor only 10 days ago and are so new that most local officials aren't aware of their existence.

Simply because the J. L. Hudson Company is involved, some residents hold the mistaken belief that the next major shopping center in this area will be "Westland" at Wayne and Warren roads.

That project may or may not materialize, but in any event the next major center won't be Westland. Instead, it will be a huge development at Seven Mile and Middlebelt roads.

Sears Roebuck will be the major tenant, with Crowley's another department store. Just this week, the developers obtained City Council permission to expand the center's land area.

Sears has decided to enlarge its original store plans and will wind up with a unit bigger even than the Ward store in Livonia. The total center will be somewhat larger than the thriving Wonderland at Plymouth and Middlebelt.

The new one will open in the autumn of next year, 1964.

Judge Rules Warning Sign Isn't Enough

A warning sign at a trampoline center does not automatically spare its owners from liability for injuries sustained there. That was the ruling of Common Pleas Judge Harry J. Dingeman Jr., as he approved a \$300 consent judgment for an injured 12-year-old boy.

The youth, David R. Shoptaw, of 32337 Glenn, Wayne, was using a trampoline at a center at 28722 W. Warren, Garden City, last June 21. In his jumping, he was thrown against a metal trampoline support frame. He suffered facial injuries and needed extensive dental work.

A defense attorney argued in vain that the center displayed a "jump at your own risk" sign.

But Judge Dingeman stressed that since the majority of the center users were children, they could not be expected to be governed by such a sign. All possible precaution to ensure safety at these trampoline centers should be taken, he urged.

It is regretful you didn't have the courage to sign your name. We are certain many of the workers in our school would be more than willing to take you

by the hand and inform you of the many goodnesses derived from our school.

I feel that it is a cowardly and underhanded way of attack in an individual and his position by berating him in the press and then not having the courage to sign one's name.
However I should like to tell you of the dealings that I have had with the principal. While we are not always in agreement, I have found him open minded, fair and extremely helpful with any of the problems that I have had with my three children who have attended that school since 1956. He is always willing to listen to our problems but are we always willing to listen and understand his? Co-operation is a two sided venture and you generally receive cooperation when you are willing to cooperate in return.

It has been observation that the Jackson School principal is devoted to the interest of every child and to the challenge of their education. He is a dedicated educator working for the benefit of each child in the school. I feel sure that he recognizes the problems of the school (and all schools) have them) but sometimes these problems take a while to correct. Also what might be a problem to your child is not always a problem to someone else's child. There are over 900 children in Jackson School to be considered. Policies must be made for the good of the group and not for an individual in that group. I feel that he would be less than capable if he did not support his staff and school board.

Because of his interest in safety, the school has been awarded the AAA Safety Plaque and The Detroit News Green Flag for their outstanding safety record. Mr. Kellogg holds a position on several safety committees. I'm quite sure if he feels the playground supervision is adequate that we have no cause for concern.

The teachers donate their rest periods to supervise the playground. They days they have playground duty, they must work their full day without a rest period. They must also take turns donating their lunch periods to supervise the halls and lunchroom. This seems unfair when the majority of Jackson children are within walking distance of home. But we mothers do like our days out, don't we? Perhaps if we would be willing to vote for more millage the school board could pay for more supervision in these areas and let the staff have the rest periods and lunch hours to which they are entitled.

Generally children from the time they are school age are permitted outdoors without close supervision for longer than 15 minutes at a time. With this experience and adequate home training they should be able to get through the recess periods without constant scrapes.

Your child needs the security of your support of the school. He cannot do his best without it. While you might not agree with all of the rules and regulations of the school, it is better you support it as it is than undermine and weaken it in its relationship with your child. He will suffer most in the long run.

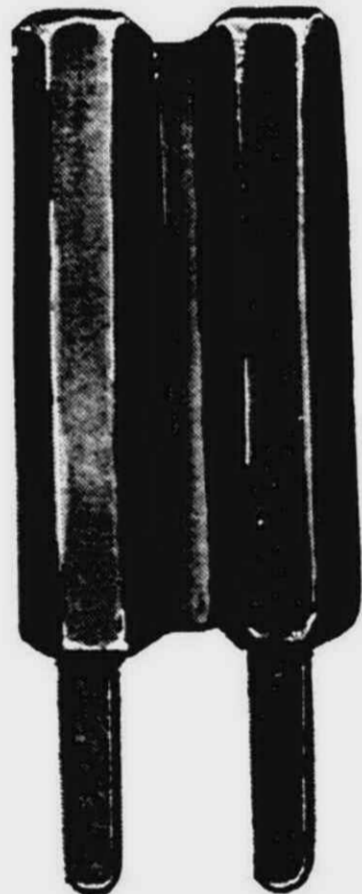

However, unless you are a trained educator (and your letter does not indicate this) it would be much better to accept the guidance of people who have studied so many years in this field. If you took your child to a physician or dentist, I don't believe that you would tell them what was wrong or what to do. Why do you feel more competent in the field of education?

The school does not expect the parent to contribute anything for the Jamboree. They only cooperate in sending home notices from the PTA which is a separate organization with its own leaders. I feel badly that your child will be hurt by your bitterness toward the school. He will miss the fun of the Jamboree which is really for the kids. Then you are not helping to purchase some of the necessities that the school board is not able to provide such as books, science equipment, etc. Your child benefits from the books that the PTA purchased for the library, the television, the tape recorder, the record players, the science equipment, etc. The more of us who contribute our time and effort and money to the Jamboree will provide that many more benefits for our children. The PTA also organized and ran the recent bicycle safety inspection to protect your child as well as our own. I hope you will think of these things when you don't contribute your cake or when you don't attend the Jamboree.

Enjoy Garden Living - Plan Your Landscaping

Landscape your house and yard with definite ideas in mind. Plant with a purpose: trees for shade, screens, or accents of color and form; shrubs and evergreens to enhance the architectural lines of the house.

Gardens and shrub borders should be planned and not scattered hit or miss about the property. Notice other houses you pass by. Some will have a quiet charm, others stand out disturbingly. The architecture may be equally good, but plants and the manner in which they are used make the difference.

It is more difficult to plant the contemporary house with its long low lines, than the conventional house. Do not destroy the lines your architect has created, or chop up the house into bits and sections by overuse of conical evergreens.

Keep planting under long picture windows low, and conform to the lines of the house by using low material such as ground covers.

To add height and softness place a flowering tree a few feet from the house, not against it. Large windowless areas may need to be broken up by an individual plant or grouping of plants.

The first step in planning and planting your home is to locate a source of first class plant material. Buy at reputable nurseries where you know plants are properly dug, correctly labeled, and free from disease. Train d nurseries know the facts concerning season and type of bloom, and the hardiness and fitness of their plant material.

From them, and from catalogs and books, learn all you can about the plants which appeal to you. Ultimate size, hardiness, and growth habits are of the utmost importance.

Don't spend all your time and money along the front of the house. Carry your plan to the sides and rear. These plantings should also fit into your overall design.

Budget your planting by putting in shade and flowering trees first, followed by other slower growing material.

Trees, more than any other part of your planting, will make your house look as though it belonged. Start out with at least ten to 15-foot shade trees, for even these will give you little enough shade. Purchase flowering trees in smaller sizes, if desired, but for immediate

effect they should be six to eight feet tall.

Nurseries will recommend and demonstrate plants to fit the geometric outlines you have selected. Take care with your design and come out with very attractive landscaping for your home.

'Fun in Own Backyard' Stirs Gardening Interest

A great new era of robust indoor-outdoor living will contribute more physical fitness and family pleasure through gardening, is predicted by the American Association of Nurserymen.

The indoor-outdoor living concept has grown steadily in the past decade, but it is expected to grow far more rapidly in the next few years. Total sales of trees and shrubs have hit a new peak every year for the past 15 years and still are increasing. More indoor-outdoor living today is getting more people outdoors with healthful results.

"This new indoor-outdoor living will make home life so rich and attractive that people will spend much more of their incomes on their home per-

ties rather than spending on things that take them away from home, often without any lasting benefits," the nursery group states.

"To maintain housing values, to prevent the ruinous waste of some housing developments which degenerate into slums in 10 or 20 years, housing must be planned so the whole residential area, including the land, will remain beautiful and well-preserved for the longest possible time. When the land is not improved for living by proper planning and planting, home values depreciate at much faster rates. The indoor-outdoor concept conserves the land as well as the house and uses both for wholesome living.

"It is, however more than increasing property values," the association adds, "it is full realization that we cannot continue to move to new housing developments forever—there is not enough land available. Now is the time when we must conserve all lands, especially in and surrounding urban areas.

"Much can be accomplished by planning housing for more permanent values and better living," it is stated. "The indoor-outdoor idea helps greatly in accomplishing this. Moreover, it is the most satisfying and healthful way to live for practically everyone, with more wholesome family fun, as well as more physical fitness through the gardening effort, which, the association concludes, "does more for the gardener than it does for the plants."

Build Barbecue for More Fun In Your Outdoor Living Room

Although charcoal cooking has been employed since man first rubbed two sticks together, it has enjoyed 'unprecedented popularity in recent years with the fast rise in backyard barbecues.

The present popularity of outdoor cooking originated in California, which generally is conceded to be the source of the simple but mouth-watering

dinner of chrecol broiled steak, garlic or cheese sourdough bread, and a mixed greens salad topped with bleu cheese or oil-and-wine-vinegar dressing.

Slowly this truly American meal has spread eastward during the past quarter-century until today, almost every hamlet has a steakhouse that serves up a reasonable facsimile.

Rose Fence Is Garden Fashion Note

If you'd like to add a fashionable touch to your home property, plant an everblooming rose fence. Everblooming roses have two heavy blooming periods, one in spring or early summer and the other in the fall, usually with many flowers and lavish color in between these seasons.

The modern rose blooms for an extraordinary long period every year, longer than almost any flower that can be named.

The rose fence can be particularly lovely and fashionable and it requires only a moderate amount of care. One can have red, orange, white, pink, yellow, lavender and in-between shades. Roses of different colors may be mixed, or the fence may be solid with one color.

In planting your rose fence, select varieties wisely. Climbing red roses along a white fence can afford a brilliant contrast. Other colors may also be used.

Climbing roses may be pre-support as a masonry wall or wood or wire fence. Thick-growing rose plants such as Rosa Multiflora are not suitable as a rose fence for small homes.

Floribunda and grandiflora roses will grow into a living fence of striking color without support. Plant them close together, about two feet apart, using approximately 50 plants for a hundred foot fence. Your nurseryman can recommend varieties to grow to any desired height.

A fence of roses growing on a trellis also can form a lovely background for the family swimming pool, at the same time giving privacy. The rose blooms are reflected in the water of the pool, making it even more inviting.

According to the American Association of Nurserymen, some interesting effects are created with rose fences by planting them in short lengths, 10 to 12 feet, at several locations around the property. If correctly done this can give the effect of greater depth to the back yard, or garden living area, even though the latter may, in fact, be quite small. Your nurseryman can advise how to achieve this effect.

A home barbecue can either be contracted for or it can be built as a home handyman project. It can be plain and simple or big and costly — ranging from a portable table-top model available in any housewares store to a "bomb shelter" type that weighs several tons and has warming ovens and other types of conveniences for luscious cookery.

Building a barbecue will vary to some extent depending on the size of the desired structure, but the basic construction remains the same.

An outline of the barbecue should be marked out on the ground, and this should be dug 10 or 12 inches deep. Eight to 10 inches of sand or sand-and-gravel mix is tamped well, and this is topped with concrete between four and six inches deep, depending on the size and weight of the barbecue. This will bring the base two or three inches above ground level, for which forms are needed.

A level or plumb bob should be used in laying the base and all courses of brick to insure a perfect level.

The second step is the chimney, built with the level or plumb bob to be sure it is perfectly vertical, for no one wants a miniature "Tower of Pisa" confronting them whenever they barbecue. A hole should be left in the firebox side of the chimney to draw smoke from the fire and up the chimney.

The firebox or ashpit can be constructed of block or brick or rock, or a prefabricated unit can be bought at a building supply outlet.

Two or three courses of block are laid (again, make sure each course is level) and then side-

walls are built up on the two sides, with an iron grate built into the concrete joint about a foot above the ashpit. Although a bit more difficult to install but much more satisfactory than the built-in permanent grate is a series of two or three steel tracks on which a grate can be inserted at varying levels for different types of cookery.

An excellent accessory for every barbecue is an LP-gas torch that will save 15 or 20 minutes of preparation each time you build a fire. This is the same liquefied petroleum gas familiar to all who live on farms or in country homes, in small towns or other rural areas to provide all the comforts of modern gas appliances far beyond city gas mains.

A small LP-gas hand torch can be used, or a larger refillable tank can be installed for multi-purpose use. The small hand torch will light charcoal in brief minutes. Not only does the larger LP-gas unit serve this same purpose, but it also can be used for gas cooking, if desired, such as grilling hamburgers or broiling hot dogs for youngsters.

And if the evening turns a bit cool, the gas fire can be turned on to bring warmth and cheer to the group gathered under a starry sky.

Trees Give Beauty; Add Value

When the sun beats down in the hot weather months, everyone longs for cooling shade. Shade trees provide the difference between comfort and solar broiling.

Trees, according to the American Association of Nurserymen are natural air-conditioners. They transfer the layer of greatest heat from near the surface of the ground to the tree tops. There may be a difference of five to 15 degrees between a full-sun and a shaded area, depending on the density of the shade.

In residential areas, with good stands of trees, temperatures are up to 10 degrees lower than in areas without trees in hot weather.

There are many species of trees. In order to get adequate shade, one usually needs large trees, which can be planted at some distance from the house

and still shade it during the hottest part of the day, usually in the afternoon.

Smaller trees of course give shade but one needs more of them to achieve the same degree of coolness as the larger trees. If the trees shade the side of the home facing the sun as it moves downward in the western sky, even the inside of the home will be considerably cooler.

Where an east bedroom is stifling hot in the morning for example, a tree planted on the east can make all the difference in comfort.

For comfort in garden living and entertainment shade trees are a necessity. Nurserymen will advise on trees that are "clean" i.e. they do not drop seeds, pods, flowers, stems, etc., that tend to make the garden living room messy.

Usually when most home owners think of shade trees, they think of the maples, lindens, planes, magnolias, elms, and similar trees. There are many other species, less well-known but which have interest for many reasons, such as foliage color, bark color, structure of limbs and twigs or flowering beauty.

More than 850 different varieties of trees grow within the United States. Most can be planted at little cost. If you are willing to wait for a small tree to grow, you can buy one for as little as \$2. Even one that gives immediate shade may not cost more than \$25.

The planting of new trees often pay for themselves within a few years by cutting the costs

of heating or cooling your home.

Most trees will last as long as your house, and as they grow they increase in value. Large trees in good condition, properly placed on a lot, often have a value of \$1,000.

Income tax officials regard the planting of trees as a permanent improvement to your property. Even if you recover their costs many times over in lowered fuel bills, you can still deduct the price you paid for them when you sell your house at a profit.

Real estate brokers agree that by increasing the attractiveness of your home, trees will make it easier to sell at a higher price than one that stands on a barren lot.

The American Association of Nurserymen say that evergreen trees planted on the north and west borders of your property will block the prevailing cold winds of winter and thus make your home easier to heat.

A study by the U.S. Department of Agriculture of two houses in the north—one sheltered by such a tree windbreak and the other unprotected—showed that over 22 per cent of fuel was saved in the protected house.

Trees planted on the south and west can shade your home from the hot summer sun and keep it cooler. Trees also prevent solar heat from penetrating the ground, thereby keeping air around the house more comfortable.

Resistance to the more serious diseases or insect damage also is desirable in shade trees. Best talk it over with neighbors who have lovely shade trees, and with nurserymen. Nursery catalogues usually list more outstanding shade trees that have been developed in recent years.

5 Errors Costly To Franklin

Proper Heat System Is Big Help to Housekeeping

You may postpone some of the home fix-up jobs this spring, but getting rid of the accumulation of winter's dust and dirt can't be avoided.

One often-overlooked source of grime in the average home is the heating system, and there's really no need for such troubles. Modern heating units can aid materially in keeping your home and its furnishings free of tell-tale smudges, streaks and dust.

If you have the old-fashioned, cast iron radiators in your home, you know what a chore it is to clean them thoroughly. Even if you have a modern attachment for your vacuum cleaner, it's practically impossible to get all the collected dust and dirt out of the hidden recesses of the radiator.

For this reason, as well as for good looks, new, smooth-surfaced units such as convectors are being installed in new homes. Most remodeling jobs today also involve the replacement of the old-fashioned heating unit with a

newer, more attractive unit such as the popular convector-radiator. Convectors ease the cleaning problem greatly, in addition to providing more comfortable, more economical heat. The convector cabinet is easily dusted with a flick of the wrist, and the front panel can easily be removed once a year if a thorough dusting of the interior is desired.

Convectors are noteworthy for the clean heat they deliver, since no dirt or dust-laden air is circulated from other rooms. The convector circulates only air from within one room, and does it in a manner that leaves no wall smudges or streaks. Convectors work on steam or hot water systems, which in themselves are quite clean.

Take a look around your house now. How much of the dust and discoloration is lodged in or can be traced to the heating units? Solve this problem and you've materially reduced your cleaning chores the year 'round.

Water Conditioning Is Economical Installation

Homeowners in "hard water" areas are more and more making installations of water softeners high on their "must do" improvement list.

The Water Conditioning Research Council reports that homeowners can count the savings in dollars and cents when they use water softeners. The Council says:

"The average amount of hardness of water throughout the United States is ten grains and just seven grains of hardness incosts the average family of four

\$24 more a year in soap." Hard water also builds up scale on the inside of water pipes faster than soft water ever does. Over a period of time, a quarter-inch of scale could reduce the flow of water. Water pipes encrusted with scale become insulated and don't deliver heat efficiently. A water softener will help save your fuel bill.

Softened water is a better cleaner than hard water and is easier on your clothes. For example, softening ten grain water makes a thirty-five per cent increase in longevity for linens.

Loans for Hothouse Can Be Valuable

When built-in appliances are planned as part of a kitchen modernization project, the Federal Housing Administration encourages families to take advantage of a low-cost, FHA-insured Title I loan to finance the job.

FHA officials point out that this is because new, built-in appliances in a modernized kitchen add permanent value to a house and increase the general welfare of the family occupying it.

An FHA-insured loan for kitchen improvement offers the advantage of five years to repay. For example, \$3,500 can be repaid in monthly installments of \$71.89. There are some loans of interest to any family.

Loans Insured
● FHA does not lend money. Instead, it insures loans made by banks, savings and loan associations and other authorized lending institutions.

● Maximum amount that may be borrowed under Title I is \$3,500.

● FHA does not inspect the job or guarantee materials or workmanship under Title I. It's up to the home owner to protect his own interests.

● Application for a Title I home improvement loan may be made to an authorized lending institution by either the borrower or the contractor assigned to do the work.

Sign Certificate
To guard against a small but active group of unethical remodeling contractors, FHA urges families to deal only with established, reputable firms. If in doubt, check with the Better Business Bureau, bank or Chamber of Commerce.
"Sign the completion certificate," FHA warns, "only when the job has been completed in accordance with your contract or sales agreement."

11 To Vie For Single Seat On College Board

With only one trustee-at-large post open for the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees, 11 candidates will bid for the vacancy in the June 10 election, including nine from Livonia and one each from Garden City and Plymouth.

That was the official total certified to College President Dr. Eric Bradner, acting for the Board, when reports were filed by secretaries of the local school boards.

The vacancy was created by the failure of James O'Neil of Livonia to run, inasmuch as he will become a member of the

State Board of Education on July 1. The latter post made him ineligible although O'Neil will serve with the College Board until the end of his term on June 30.

The local school secretaries also informed Bradner that annexation petitions had been filed and were certified for South Redford and Northville. A third petition had been taken out in Wayne but circulators failed to secure the necessary two percent total of eligible voters—missing by a scant 18.

Thus voters in Livonia, Plymouth, Clarenceville and Garden City will select the seven members of the board on June 10

while electors in South Redford and Northville will vote for their individual board member from their respective districts and also on the question of annexation.

Of the six incumbent Board members, only Erwin Brown, of Livonia, faces a battle for the post. Brown, 31081 West-

field, who was named to fill the unexpired term of the late Ward McCain, will be opposed by Ray Francis, 34051 N. Hampshire, for the two-year-term as Livonia representative.

Incumbent Paul Mutnick, 19822 Weyher, Livonia, has no opposition for the four-year term as Clarenceville representative and board members

Clarke Oldenburg, 29780 Rush, Garden City, and Harold Fischer, 40875 Plymouth Road, Plymouth, are automatically re-elected for two-year terms, unopposed.

Candidates for the vacant four-year "at-large" post include: Leroy Bennett, 18809 Nola Drive; Darrel Berry, 30919 Robert Drive; Donald Deremo, 33829 Oakdale; Arnold Fisher, 32031 Bretton; Irving King, 19728 Parker; George Shirley, 37552 Howell; Lyman Slawson, 16256 Alpine Drive; Robert Thompson, 15482 Foch; and Theodore Wolson, 34419 Munger, all of Livonia.

Also Gerald Cox, 32761 Maplewood, Garden City, and Victor Wenzell, 141 S. Holbrook, Plymouth.

Dr. Gordon Forrer, 46995 Main, Northville, has filed as the candidate to represent

that district, if voters approve annexation to the college district. Jess Paul Santo, 25611 Lyndon, Redford

Township, will be the South Redford representative if the annexation meets with voter approval there.

Library Creates Problem On New College Building

With bids soaring more than 13 per cent over the \$1,938,000 allocated for construction of the first four buildings, the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees voted to reject all offerings and readvertise for bids on the project.

The vote came after Eberly Smith Co., architects for the campus to be located at the intersection of Haggerty and Seven Mile Roads in Livonia, recommended that the architectural, electrical and plumbing bids be readvertised but

that the library building be omitted from the plans.

The Board has allocated an estimated \$1,400,000 for the three buildings which include Administration, Forum and Maintenance.

The decision to omit the library came after Board members voted to change the design from a two-story to a one-story building with slightly less space.

The architects recommended that the readvertising program start at once so that bids may be opened on May 27. This will assure the college of having the building ready for occupancy by the target date of September 1964.

A delay of any length at this time could mean that classes couldn't start until 1965 and create numerous problems in securing a satisfactory faculty staff.

The Board already has commitments for the faculty with professors and instructors to start in the mid-summer and late summer of 1964 and a year's delay would mean that all such contracts would be void and force the persons involved to start searching for new positions.

The decision to change the design of the library brought a mild hassle among Board members and finally resulted in two conflicting resolutions which will be resolved in a meeting this week with the architects.

Vice President Mrs. Jane Moehle, of Plymouth, objected to withdrawing the library from the new bidding on the basis that it is an absolute necessity for a new campus. She asked the Board to restudy all phases of financing before making a final decision.

After considerable discussion, Secretary Paul Mutnick, of Clarenceville, made a motion that the architects be ordered to submit plans for one-half of the Academic building to house eight classrooms and a temporary library.

The motion passed by a 5-2 vote but Erwin Brown, of Livonia, objected on the grounds that it was a needless waste of money to have a temporary library and then spend a considerable amount at some future date to change the building into the original plans for classrooms.

Brown bitterly condemned a piece meal construction of two buildings and the resultant destroying of the compact concept of the campus as designed by the architects.

He proposed a resolution ordering the architects to draw plans for a permanent one-story library building with eight classrooms at an estimated cost of \$440,000 to be erected on the site originally specified in the campus planning.

His motion passed by a 7-0 vote.

Thus the Board will study plans for both buildings when the drawings are ready for submission from the architects—expected some time this week.

Family Counseling Service Opens Branch In Livonia

Family Service of Metropolitan Detroit, a family counseling service and a Torch Fund agency, is opening a new district office in western Wayne County, it was announced today by Howard Hush, Executive Director. The Out-County District Office, as it will be known, opened for service on April 15 at 15223 Farmington

Service will be available to families living in Northville, Northville Township, Livonia, Garden City and the area in Nankin and Canton Townships north of Cherry Hill Road. The boundary lines are temporary but the objective, as financing permits, is to build up the services in the western Wayne County area—north to Oakland County, west to Washtenaw County, except for Plymouth and Plymouth Township, which are not a part of the United Foundation area, and south to Van Born Road.

This extension of service was made possible by Torch Drive funds through the United Community Services. It followed an intensive citizens' study and report completed late in 1962, which indicated a dearth of family counseling service in the area. Mrs. Thurston Jahr of Belleville served as Chairman of a special study committee. Serving with Mrs. Jahr were the following: Joseph Anderson, Dearborn Township; Harry E. Bagley, M.D., Dearborn; Mrs. William Carter, Livonia; Philip Dingley, Canton Township; Leonard James, Garden City; Mrs. Doris Thorburn Keys, Romulus Township; Miss Marjorie Lingenfelter, Livonia; Mrs. William Mast, Wayne and Benton Yates, Livonia.

The U.C.S. staff leadership was given by George C. Williston of the Western Wayne Planning Division.

The initial allocation of funds makes it possible to have two qualified professional caseworkers and a secretary. Acting as District Director, until the position can be filled permanently, is Arne A. Erickson, Administra-

tive Assistant in the metropolitan agency's general administrative office, 51 West Warren Avenue.

Agency officials acknowledged that the funds available do not provide enough personnel to meet the current needs of the area. It is assumed, however, that staff additions can be made in 1964, depending upon the full success of the Torch Drive.

Family Service of Metropolitan Detroit, which has four other District Offices throughout the metropolitan area, offers a counseling service for individuals and families in which there is a crisis or extreme misunderstanding, and a need for competent professional counseling from outside the family group.

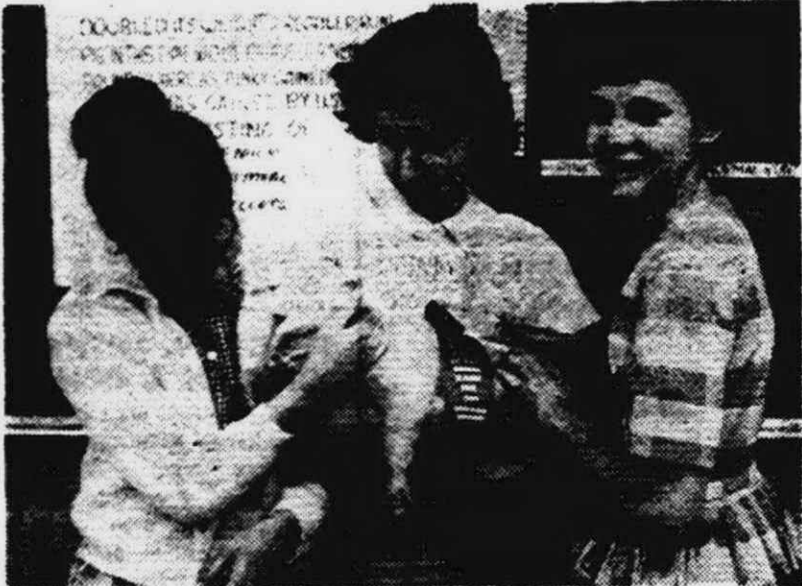

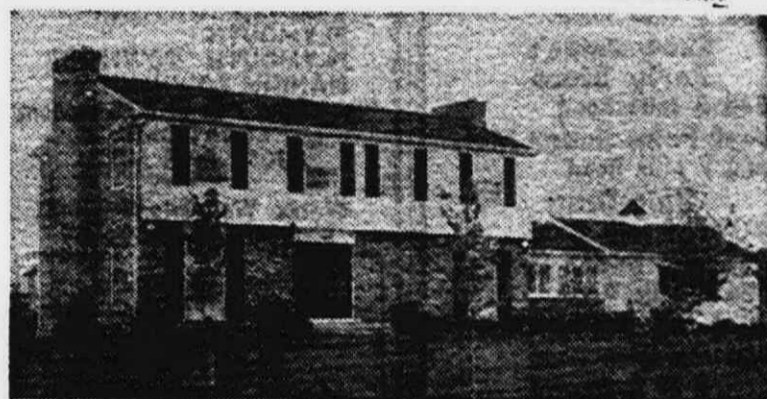

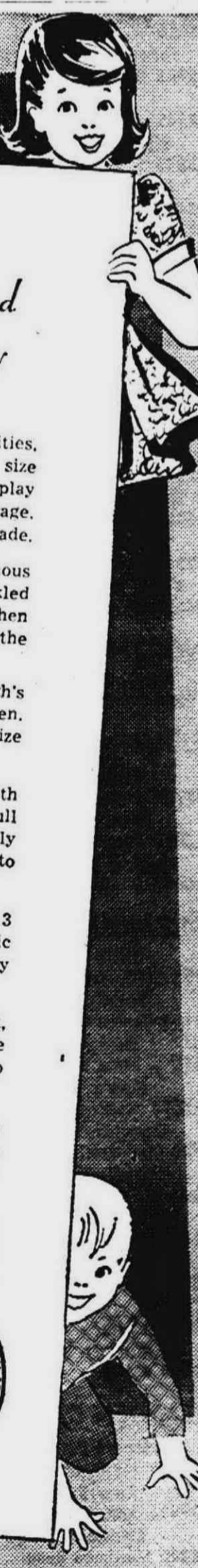

Accidents Increase, Stop at Crossings!

Recently the Police Department has noticed an increase in near accidents and violations by motorists at railroad crossings in this area. To avert any tragedies, the following rules and practices are called to your attention.

- At all railroad crossings, without flashers or gates, the motorists must stop, look and listen, making sure the way is clear before crossing.
- The stop must be made within fifty feet of the tracks, but not closer than ten feet to the nearest rail.
- After the stop has been made and the driver has made sure the way is clear to cross, he or she may proceed to cross.
- Commercial and School buses, vehicles carrying explosives, or trucks weighing over 10,000 pounds, regardless of cargo, must stop and proceed only when it is safe to do so. They must not shift gears while crossing the tracks.
- Where crossing gates are used, under no circumstances may the driver go around the gates. It is also a violation to go under the gates when they are being raised or lowered.
- When stopping your car, stop where you can plainly see the flashing signal.
- Before driving onto the tracks, look both ways to be sure there are no trains coming. Slow down if necessary.
- If you are a passenger, make sure you do not interfere with the vision of the driver, but assist him by making sure the way is safe and clear.
- Do not park within fifty feet of the nearest railroad.

Follow these few simple rules and you may save your life and prevent a tragedy.
