



These are new laws, all signed by Governor Romney by now, most of which never made big headlines but some of which could help solve particular local problems. We're using our newspaper space today as a sort of public letter to report to those who should be interested in the legislation.

Another of the area's top high school coaches is calling it quits.

He's John McDonald, who has turned out a succession of track powers at Bentley High School during the past 11 years. Four of his teams, including the 1963 edition, captured Suburban Six League championships. Three others placed second.

"I hate to step out of coaching," McDonald declared. "But I'll be a senior counsellor at Bentley High starting in September and it would simply be too much for me to try and handle that job and also stick with coaching the track team." McDonald explained that coach-

in track no longer is a threemonth proposition during the spring months.

"You have to start working with the kids early in the school year," he said. "There's a lot to conditioning a boy so that when the spring rolls around he will be ready to run or jump or throw a weight."



McDonald at one time assisted with the coaching of football and basketball at Bentley, the only school at which he has handled prep athletes during his career.

Looking back, McDonald called "my 1963 team the best I've had at Bentley." The '63 Bentley squad established no less than nine new school records.

Such ex-performers as Dick Horie, Bob Flager, Darrell Middlewood, Soug Schailor and the Snarey Brothers, Dennis and Tim; drew special praises from McDonald for their track achievements at Bentley.

McDonald talked with pride about the Claude Snarey relays, which he helped to establish at Bentley.





One provision states that any "pool or container" which can hold water to a depth of 36 inches shall be required to have a fence around it.

The new language about fencing of pools follows:

"(a) Home Owner's Pool. A home owner's swimming pool shall be completely enclosed by a fence not less than four (4) feet in height of the chain link type or other type approved by the Bureau of Inspection. A fence which encloses the yard as a whole may be considered as complying with this requirement. All fence gates must be

locked when the residents are the pool is not in use.


provision of this ordinance. the above requirements regarding fences contained with-

in this subsection shall also apply to any portable swimming pool or container capable of being used for swimming, wading, or bathing and designed to hold water to a depth of thirty-six inches (36") or more at any point when filled to capacity. In those cases where the fence

does not enclose the yard as a whole, the fence required to be constructed shall not be closer than five (5) feet nor further than fifteen (15) feet from the edge of the water.

"(b) Club Pool. The entire premises on which a club pool is situated shall be completely enclosed by a chain link fence away from the home or when at least six (6) feet in height topped by three strand v-span "Notwithstanding any other barbed wire. Entry to and de-

parture from the premises shall be regulated by a controlled gate or turnstile."
