Niemi Loses School Board Seat

Schultheiss, McLaren Win Posts

John D. McLaren, prominent Plymouth business man, and Carl Schultheiss, manager of engineering services for Burroughs Corp., who resides at 11705 Amherst Court in Plymouth Township, are the new members of the Plymouth Community School Board.

They won election Monday in one of the lightest votes in years—a poll that saw a scant 997 electors go to the booths in the four precincts.

McLaren and Schultheiss won out in a hot four-man race that found incumbent Harold Niemi unseated and James Garber,

winding up fourth only 39 votes back on the leading Schultheiss. Schultheiss, who ran third in the school board vote last summer, took an early lead and

held it all the way, totalling 383. McLaren, with considerable backing in the Senior High and Township Hall precincts, was second with 368 while

Niemi was 13 votes back in third place with 355.

It was strictly a four-man race from the start and the other three candidates finished

far back in the totals.

McLaren, a native-born Plymouthite, is in the lumber, coal, fuel oil and cement business with his father. It was his first

bid for a public office although he has been a member of the Plymouth City Board of Review.

He and his wife, Jane, are the parents of two children, John D. McLaren IV, at the University of Michigan; and Cynthia, a member of the Plymouth High graduating class.

Schultheiss and his wife, Jean, are the parents of three children, Wade at Michigan State; Mark, a member of the Plymouth High graduating class; and Gail in Bird School.

The vote for the other three candidates was: George Conover, 175; Glenn Schroeder, 144; and Patrick Gannon, 31.

Study \$100 Pay Boost For School Employes

Although the budget won't be approved until later in the month, the Plymouth Community School Board revealed Monday night that it is thinking in terms of a \$100 across-the-board cost of living increase for employes for the 1963-64 school year.

The proposed budget would grant contract teachers a \$100

hike along with all members of the clerical staff. Maintenance-custodial workers would receive a five cents per hour boost which averages to \$100.

The Board agreed tentatively to grant a \$100 increase plus the \$100 cost of living boost to elementary school principals, assistant principals at the junior

highs and high school, the director of music, director of library and director of adult education and recreation.

It also approved pay boosts for the administrative staff as follows: Supt. Russell Isbister, \$500 to a total of \$17,500; Assistant Supt. in charge of business Melvin Blunk, \$350 to \$12,200; Principal Carvel Bentley, of the Senior High, \$250 to \$12,100; and Principal William Harding of the Junior High, \$350 to \$11,600.

The announcement of the state equalized valuation for 1963 was good news for the Board since it boosted the tax base from \$101 million a year ago to \$106.7 millions for an increase of \$5.7 million.

Fischer pointed out this will add \$121,000 to the estimated receipts including an increase in state aid.

The Board estimates it will have receipts of \$2,663 millions for the new school term against \$2,542 this year.

The proposed budget lists estimated expenditures of \$2,661 million contrasted to \$2,470 million in 1962-63, a boost of \$191,000.

The increases in the 1963-64 budget are based on the following items:

Required cost increase (\$56,026); salary schedule increments, \$45,200; additional credit hours (\$10 per hour to teachers for each hour allowed), \$6,000; employee insurance, \$4,800.

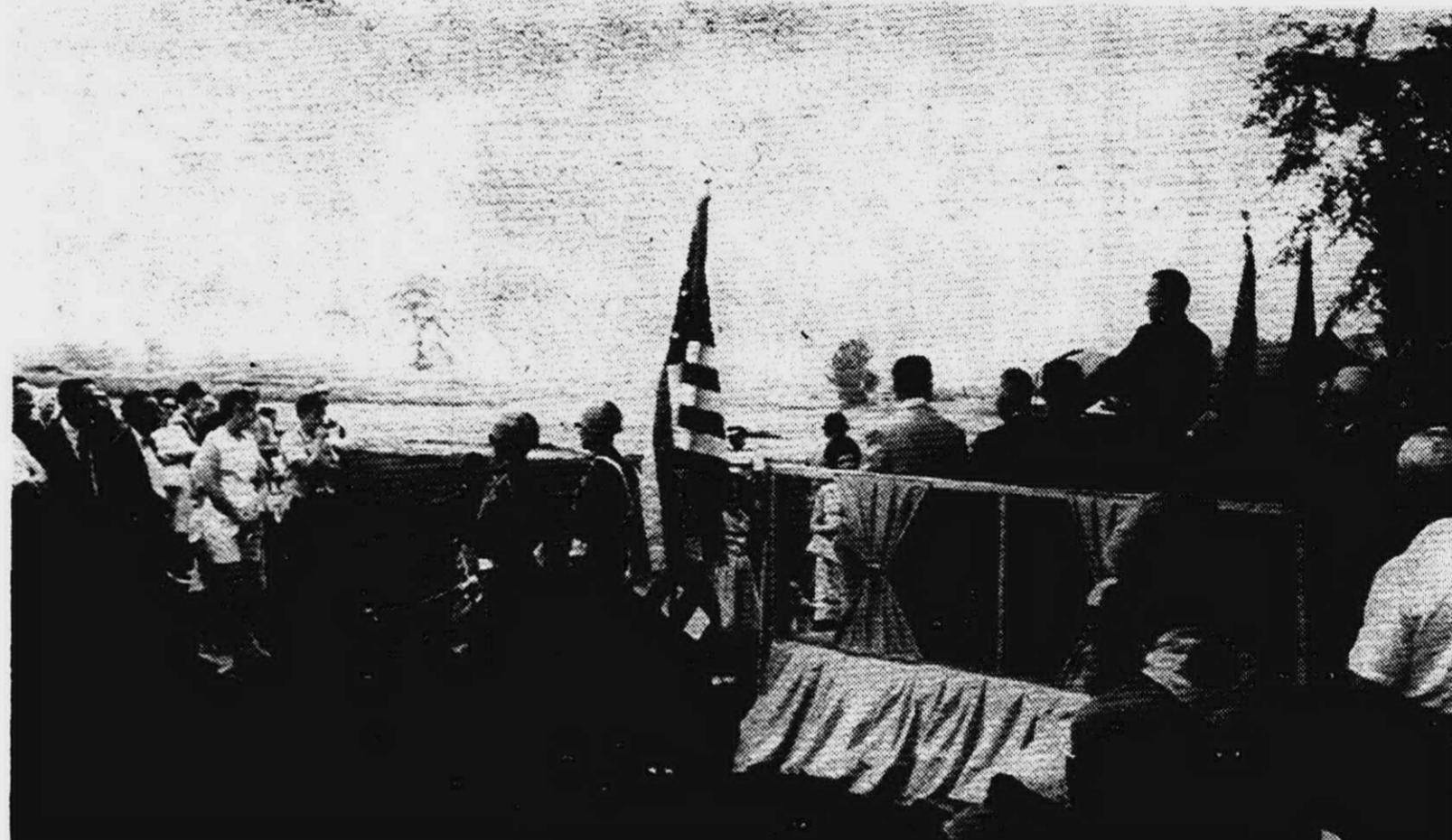
Costs resulting from an increase of 280 students in enrollment (\$64,000)—nine additional teachers, \$49,500; textbooks, \$1,740; instructional supplies, \$2,084; additional clerical personnel, \$4,600 for part-time clerk in the administrative office and a full time clerk in the counseling department at the senior high.

Program improvements (\$49,050)—additional teachers, \$27,250; increase in pupil allotment for textbooks, \$7,980; increase in per pupil allotment for instructional supplies, \$11,168; increase per pupil allotment for library expenses, \$2,625.

Salary adjustments and fringe benefits (\$38,834)—salary adjustments, professional staff, \$26,000; classified personnel, \$9,000.

In explaining the salary hikes, Fischer pointed out that the Board deemed them necessary as "cost of living and to remain competitive with other school systems."

The proposed new schedule will affect bus drivers and the cafeteria employes but the increases are worked out on the basis of seniority in conformance with an agreement reached last fall.

FACTS and OPINIONS by Paul Chandler

LANSING—With the current session of the State Legislature having concluded only four days ago, today seems a good time for your local State Representative to report to all the Councils, Township Boards, School Boards, and Commissions in the area about bills which might help them with their work.

These are new laws, all signed by Governor Romney by now, most of which never made big headlines but some of which could help solve particular local problems. We're using our newspaper space today as a sort of public letter to report to those who should be interested in the legislation.

P.A. 23 (S. B. 1343)—EDUCATION—SCHOOL DISTRICTS—PRE-FAB BUILDINGS—Permits school districts to procure portable pre-fabricated construction for classrooms, school buildings or bus storage space.

P.A. 24 (S. B. 1273) I.E.—TOWNSHIPS—"OVER-HEAD" WALKS—Authorizes townships to purchase highway "overhead walks" on title-retaining contracts.

P.A. 31 (S. B. 1283) I.E.—SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS—BANKERS—Permits school fund deposits in bank of which school board member is officer or director.

P.A. 39 (S. B. 1267)—TOWNSHIPS—ORDINANCE AUTHORITY—Authorizes Township Boards to enact ordinances and regulations to secure the public health, safety and general welfare.

P.A. 47 (H. B. 257)—SCHOOL BOOKS—RIGHT TO CHANGE—School textbooks, once adopted, shall not be changed within 5 years without the consent of a majority of the Board of Education of the district.

P.A. 51 (H. B. 71) I.E.—TOWNSHIP FIRE PROTECTION—SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS—Township Board may provide for payment of special assessments for fire protection in not to exceed 15 equal, annual installments.

P.A. 62 (H. B. 346) I.E.—MUNICIPALITIES—INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT—REVENUE BONDS—"Industrial Development Revenue Bond Act of 1963"—to permit municipalities to acquire sites and buildings for industrial development and finance same by issuance of revenue bonds.

P.A. 67 (H. B. 280)—ELECTIONS—Requires one unlocked door to polls while canvass is in process.

P.A. 77 (H. B. 668) I.E.—EDUCATION—SCHOOL DISTRICTS—STATE AID—Provides one year's delay for small school districts to combine as a prerequisite for state aid.

P.A. 83 (H. B. 386) I.E.—FIREMEN—TORTS—DEFENSE AND PAYMENT—Political subdivisions are authorized to defend and pay any judgments against firemen for tortious acts performed within scope of employment.

P.A. 85 (H. B. 219)—ELECTION—VOTERS' RIGHTS—CLERKS—Authorizes cancellation of voter registration where person has not voted for 2 years unless application for continuation is filed.

P.A. 91 (S. B. 1098)—TOWNSHIP—PLANNING COMMISSIONS—Authorizes creation or continuation of Township Planning Commissions established under Municipal Planning Act.

P.A. 93 (S. B. 1096)—TOWNSHIPS—LIBRARIES—Authorizes township boards to have charge of township libraries.

P.A. 98 (H. B. 758) I.E.—ELECTION—COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICTS—Establishes uniform election times for Community College District Board members.

P.A. 133 (H. B. 126)—TOWNSHIPS—MEETINGS—NOTICES—Notice of township meetings may be given by publication only.

Schools Reap Benefits Of State Tax Figures

Reflecting increases in the assessed valuations of the various governmental units included in the Plymouth Community School District, the school system will receive an estimated additional \$66,000 for operating expenses from taxes.

Board Hires 11 Teachers In Plymouth

Acting to fill some of the 13 teaching posts created by increased enrollment and expansion of the programming, the Plymouth School Board Monday approved 11 contracts for new instructors and approved a leave of absence request.

The actions were recommended by Supt. Russell Isbister. He told the Board nine of the additions to the teaching staff were due to increased enrollment and four because of the program expansion.

The leave was granted Mrs. Florence Slocum, Business Education teacher at the Senior High.

The new appointments included:

Senior High—Richard Egner, Business Education; and Carolyn Enari, Art, Spanish.

Junior Highs—John Bacon, English—Social Studies; and Marie-Claire Hopkins, Spanish-French.

Elementary Grades—Beverly Graham, Art; and Barry Campbell, Physical Education.

Farrand School—Irene Grathwohl, Early Elementary; and Mary Snitgen, Intermediate Elementary.

Gallimore School—Joan Liang, Kindergarten (half-day); Raymond O'Toole, Sixth Grade; and Lois Parker, Early Elementary.

ness Manager Melvin Blunk after receipt of the unofficial state equalized valuation for five units in the school districts.

The state equalized total of \$106,681,694 for 1963 against \$101,036,579 a year ago or an unofficial increase of \$5,645,394.

Most of the hike comes from Plymouth Township where the state increased the equalized valuation from \$56,179,669 in 1962 to \$60,847,446 in 1963.

However, Supervisor Roy Lindsay points out that the assessed valuation was boosted by almost the same amount by increases in personal taxes, new buildings and new homes in the several subdivisions that have been developed during the past year.

Lindsay indicated that the Township will realize an estimated \$4,500 more for operations are financed by a one mill tax based on the state figures.

He feels certain that little if any of the boost will be reflected in additional taxes to the Township homeowners, citing that the increased valuation is due entirely to the boost in the assessed valuation for the reasons cited earlier.

The City of Plymouth state equalized valuation increased only \$424,022 in the new figures from \$34,274,842 in 1962 to \$34,698,860 in 1963.

City Manager Albert Glassford quickly stressed that this will not have any material effect on the school taxes for city residents.

"We boosted our assessed valuation from \$27,716,770 to \$28,333,880 strictly on the basis of improvements and new building," he said. "We trimmed almost a million off our tax rolls in depreciation but more than made it up."

"Our county equalized valuation is down slightly from 1962 and we show only a minor in-

P.A. 139 (H. B. 417) I.E.—SUPERVISORS—TAX ROLL PREPARATION—CITIES & VILLAGES—Supervisor may authorize county tax department to prepare tax rolls for counties and cities at expense of either.

P.A. 140 (H. B. 434) I.E.—TOWNSHIPS — POOL HALL REGULATION—Township may regulate billiard and pool rooms by ordinances.

P.A. 148 (H. B. 89) — TAXATION — VETERANS' HOMESTEAD—EXEMPTIONS—Changes eligibility for Veterans' Homestead Tax exemption.

P.A. 149 (H. B. 91)—SCHOOL BUSES—SAFETY REQUIREMENTS—Requires mirrors on school buses; sets stopping distances, etc.

P.A. 155 (H. B. 358) ELECTIONS—CANDIDATES—INCUMBENTS—Penalty for candidates for public office who misrepresents self as an incumbent.

P.A. 157 (H. B. 400)—ELECTION—SCHOOL DISTRICT—FOURTH CLASS—Fourth class school districts require at least 5% of election to call special election.

P.A. 193 (H. B. 365)—ELECTIONS—NOMINATING PETITIONS—CITY CLERKS—Authorizes City Clerks to determine sufficiency or insufficiency of nominating petitions, and provides for timely appeal to Secretary of State.

P.A. 215 (H. B. 189) I.E.—DRAINS—BONDING, ETC.—Drains and drainage districts; apportionment of benefits; contracts for maintenance and operation; installment payments; bonding, etc.

P.A. 216 (H. B. 338)—TOWNSHIPS—BONDS—LIBRARIES—Authorizes bond issues for township libraries.

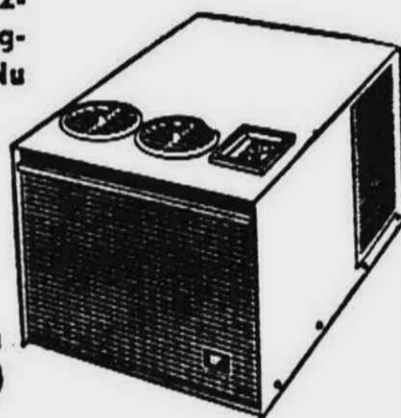

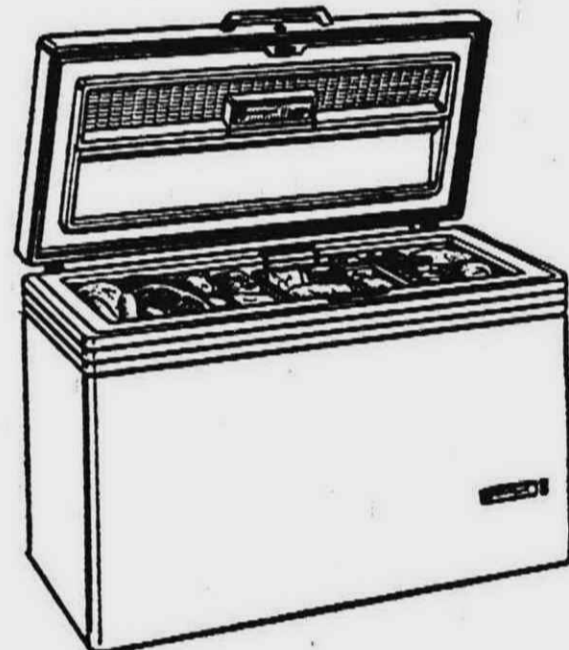

Kiwanis Hear U-M Mentor

The story of the athletic program at the University of Michigan was explained to members of the Plymouth Kiwanis Club by Hockey Coach Al Renfrew in last week's meeting.

Renfrew said that U-M presents a well-balanced sports program in 11 fields and supports each with scholarship assistance for deserving athletes.

He emphasized that many

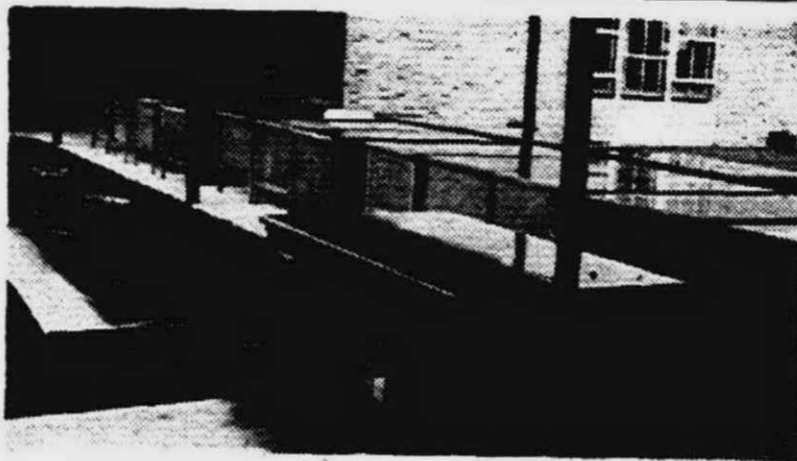
Michigan universities and colleges concentrate on one or two sports and do not have the complete program offered by U-M. This lack of programs has had a detrimental effect on the United States teams in the Olympic Games.

Renfrew mentioned hockey as an example and told of instances in some countries where amateur players re-

He pointed out that this kind of support clearly shows why some nations are able to win more gold medals than others in the Games.

Renfrew presented a movie, "Football Weekend in Ann Arbor," showing the marching bands, views of football games, the Saturday night campfire and some of the U-M buildings.

'The Readers Speak Up'

Editor:

Last week, Ron Linford issued a press release as a representative of the fifth district of Little League in which he raised the question of whether there was an "intimidation" that the canister drive held door to door in Redford Township was on behalf of the Little League.

Eugene Simescu, president of the Redford Township Athletic Association states that the canister drive, held door to door last week, was done on behalf of the youth of Redford Township. The Redford Township Junior Athletic Association, an organization that is devoted to the moral and physical betterment of the youth in Redford, sponsored the drive.

The RTJAA coordinates athletic programs for boys from 8 years old to 16 years old. More than 1,100 youths from the entire township, north, south, east and west are benefiting from the program. The RTJAA, last

year, spent over \$20,000 on the youth of the township and not one cent was paid for salaries. It is a volunteer program in which hundreds of moms and dads donate their time, energy, work and money for the boys.

The well rounded program of the RTJAA includes junior age baseball for boys 8 to 12, Pony League baseball for boys 13 to 14 and Colt baseball for boys 16 to 17. Basketball for boys aged 9 to 16 and Jack Lother League football. They also have a program of cheer leading for the girls.

Up until this year, the RTJAA paid dues to Little League in Williamsport, Pennsylvania to sponsor three leagues. This year, the RTJAA decided to sponsor the same three leagues comprising over 600 boys on 40 teams from the ages of 8 to 12, but the RTJAA did not enter its leagues in Little League by paying the required dues to Williamsport, Pennsylvania. Their decision not to pay dues was not based upon the fact that they did not support the Williamsport Little League group, but rather because they felt a responsibility toward the teen agers of Redford Township.

The plain facts are that it is very difficult to raise money for organized teen-age baseball. Most teenagers feel awkward donning their uniforms to sell candy, pass canisters and solicit funds. For boys of Little League age, it just seems to be duck soup. The Board of Directors of RTJAA thus found it necessary to borrow from the funds raised by the 8 to 12 year old boys in order to support the teenage program. For after all, the 8 to 12 year old boys of today will benefit as they move into the teenage program in a few years. Williamsport objects to using Little League funds for any purpose other than Little League (boys 8 to 12 years).

The RTJAA for three years has been called upon to support the teenagers coming out of the three Little Leagues in the north end. This year, for instance, all the uniforms and equipment for the teenagers in the north end had to be replaced at a cost of over \$2,000. It was thus apparent to the Board of Directors of the Junior Athletic Association that all of the youth in Redford Township must come first. The boys of today are our leaders of tomorrow. The Redford Township Junior Athletic Association has a sports program 12 months a year, baseball, football and basketball. The monies contributed through the canister drive are being used in a well rounded program for all age boys in every corner of the township.

In connection with the press

release from Ron Linford, because the north end Little League serves only a segment of the township and only boys aged 8 to 12, the Redford Township Junior Athletic Association was careful to send the canisters in that area only with boys from the pony and colt program which serves all the township. The RTJAA urges support for the Little League candy sale in the north end for the aim of all of us in the township should be to better our youth.

'Curtain Going Up'

Canada occupies my attention this week as the curtains part on the straw hat theater season. At Stratford, Ontario, the eleventh annual Shakespeare festival is about to unfurl its banners. In Windsor, a new summer theater will take over the stage of the Cleary Auditorium. Wayne Martens, a local Detroit, has charge of the venture. Some of you might remember Wayne from the days of the World Stage when it was struggling on Livernois and Six Mile. Old Wally still recalls a wonderful production of "Ulysses in Nighttown" that the World Stage did.

The summer line-up is interesting and different. "Invitation To A March" (July 6-13) opens the bill with "A View From The Bridge" following (July 15-20). Third show of the season is Terrence Rattigan's "O Mistress Mine" (July 22-27). Plays by Paddy Chayevsky, Eugene O'Neill, and a musical by Rodgers and Hart follow in quick order. Mr. Martens is placing emphasis on summer fare a bit more substantial than the frothy, light comedies usually associated with straw hat theater. He feels our Detroit folks and those in Windsor like to wear our thinking caps in the heat of the summer as well as during the winter. Such philosophy bears support.

Up in Stratford there has been little doubt in anyone's mind that "heavy" dramatic fare draws crowds. Last season over a million dollars worth of tickets was purchased for some mighty meaty Shakespearean plays at the Stratford Festival. The 1963 season will be no exception. Folks from all the country will drive hundreds and thousands of miles to see the brilliant Canadian company enact the following difficult plays: "Comedy of Errors," "Timon of Athens," "Cyrano De Bergerac," "Troilus and Cressida." As always capacity audiences will thrill to the sweep and grandeur of acting that takes one's breath away from them. For a short space of three hours you are transported out of this mundane world and into the moving, exciting world of ideas as set forth by Will Shakespeare and other classic authors. Remember you must have your tickets ordered well in advance to enjoy this world famous Shakespearean Festival. Don't count on picking up tickets that might be cancelled or unsold. Such tickets do not exist. Last season there were only 3 or 4 performances during the entire 15 weeks when an empty seat or two could be seen.

The Stables Coffeehouse theater can't boast of such an attendance record as yet, but old Wally predicts the day isn't too far off that such conditions will exist for this hard-working, competent group of Detroit thespians. Their latest offering, "An Evening of Edward Albee," is provocative drama replete with thought-provoking comic situations. The Stables acting company gives Mr. Albee's one act plays a polished, professional presentation. You have until June 30 to enjoy an evening of unique entertainment.

In the years to come the Stables Theater group has been asked to be the official drama company in the International Village that will be rising from the rubble of what was Detroit's old Skid Row. That's why I predict that more and more people will get to know the "worth" of this fine theatrical company.

Cameron Hudson, a former Plymouthite, has directed the evening of Albee plays with a keen sense of understanding. His movement of the players for the best dramatic moments pleased old Wally. Albee is not easy to direct since his plays waver between realism and symbolism constantly. Long speeches so reminiscent of Tennessee Williams crowd the pages of his scripts. Actors need volumes of assistance to make these soliloquies come alive. At no time in the Stables production did I feel the production lagged. Your attention is riveted on the action as Albee drills home his point with his rapier-like dialogue. Henrietta Hermelin and Council Cargle steal the acting honors in "Death of Bessie Smith."

Ed Goodwin is doing his second show with the Stables group. Ed has been an active member of the Livonia-Redford Players Guild for a number of years. His part in "Death of Bessie Smith" calls for great dramatic intensity. In his many roles with the local thespians Ed went in for comedy characterizations. As the cantankerous father in "Death of Bessie Smith," Ed has an opportunity to develop a character that leaves you breathless.

The Stables Coffeehouse Theater is completing its second year of operation with this excellent presentation of the short Albee plays. They plan to open up in September with "Big Fish, Little Fish" by Hugh Wheeler. I'd suggest you pay a visit to the basement of the Earle Hotel at 22 Charlotte Street and see this evening of Edward Albee plays. You'll find plenty of conversation fodder in this evening of dramatic fireworks, especially Mr. Albee's view, on our potent racial situation.

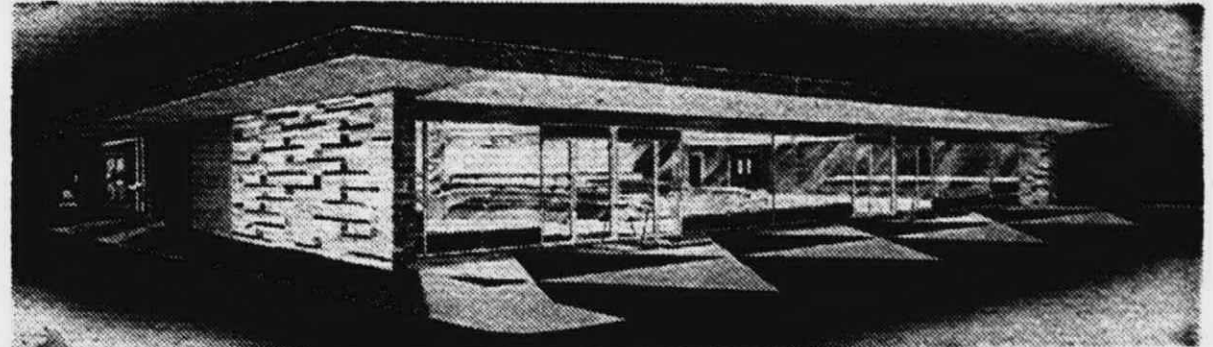

Peter Salmen's Crimson Satan, the best two-year-old colt in the nation in 1961 and the subject of considerable contro-

Another of the area's top high school coaches is calling it quits.

"You have to start working with the kids early in the school year," he said. "There's a lot to conditioning a boy so that when the spring rolls around he will be ready to run or jump or throw a weight."

McDonald at one time assisted with the coaching of football and basketball at Bentley, the only school at which he has handled prep athletes during his career.

Looking back, McDonald called "my 1963 team the best I've had at Bentley." The '63 Bentley squad established no less than nine new school records.

Such ex-performers as Dick Horey, Bob Flager, Darrell Middlewood, Song Schallor and the Snarey Brothers, Dennis and Tim; drew special praise from McDonald for their track achievements at Bentley.

McDonald talked with pride about the Claude Snarey relays, which he helped to establish at Bentley.

The Snarey relays have been held for two years now," he said, "and have proved a smash hit. I'm sure they'll become a permanent part of the track schedules of the schools involved."

The fact that Bentley has hosted a track regional in each of the four years since the school built its fine oval naturally pleased McDonald.

"Not many schools can match our record here in that department," he added.

McDonald is the second coach of an area track champ this year who won't be on the firing line next spring.

Jerry Kratz, who produced a Mid-Wayne League kingpin at Thurston, also is departing. As reported herewith a couple of weeks ago Kratz has been awarded a scholarship at Columbia University in New York.

He is taking a one-year leave of absence from Thurston, but says he won't be coaching the trackmen over on middlebelt Road when he returns to the school in 1964.

They have no all-sports trophy for the year's top school, athletically speaking, in the Suburban Six League.

If they did, Bentley High probably would have carried off the prize, for Bentley came up with league champs in three sports during 1962-63—basketball, track and cross country.

Plymouth plucked a pair of titles—in swimming and golf, while Redford Union shared the football prize with Allen Park and finished second to Bentley in basketball. Trenton triumphed in wrestling and tennis. The baseball flag went to Belleville, which beat out Bentley and Plymouth, which tied for second.

Livonia Council Tightens Fence Rules For Pools

Regulations about fences around swimming pools were spelled out more precisely in a new ordinance passed by the Livonia City Council.

One provision states that any "pool or container" which can hold water to a depth of 36 inches shall be required to have a fence around it.

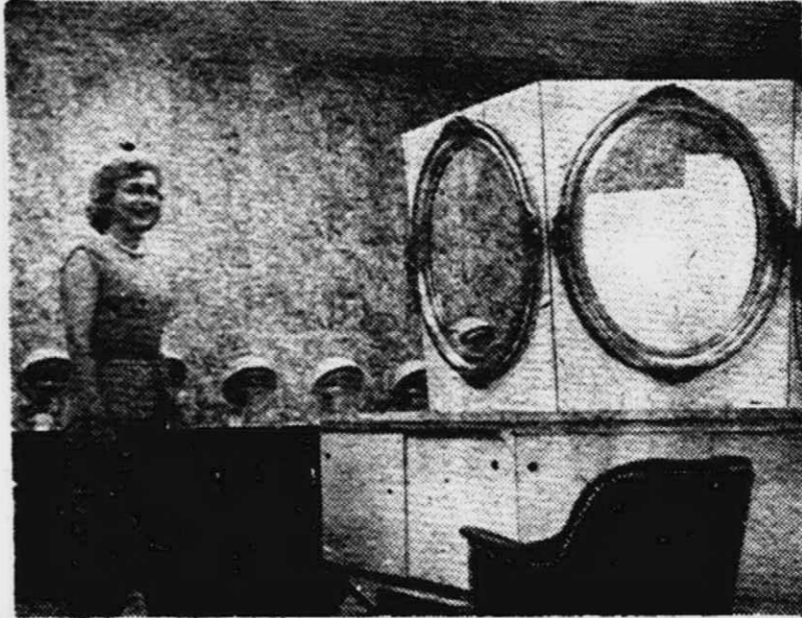
The new language about fencing of pools follows:

"(a) Home Owner's Pool. A home owner's swimming pool shall be completely enclosed by a fence not less than four (4) feet in height of the chain link type or other type approved by the Bureau of Inspection. A fence which encloses the yard as a whole may be considered as complying with this requirement. All fence gates must be locked when the residents are away from the home or when the pool is not in use.

"Notwithstanding any other provision of this ordinance, the above requirements regarding fences contained with-

in this subsection shall also apply to any portable swimming pool or container capable of being used for swimming, wading, or bathing and designed to hold water to a depth of thirty-six inches (36") or more at any point when filled to capacity. In those cases where the fence does not enclose the yard as a whole, the fence required to be constructed shall not be closer than five (5) feet nor further than fifteen (15) feet from the edge of the water.

"(b) Club Pool. The entire premises on which a club pool is situated shall be completely enclosed by a chain link fence at least six (6) feet in height topped by three strand v-span barbed wire. Entry to and departure from the premises shall be regulated by a controlled gate or turnstile."

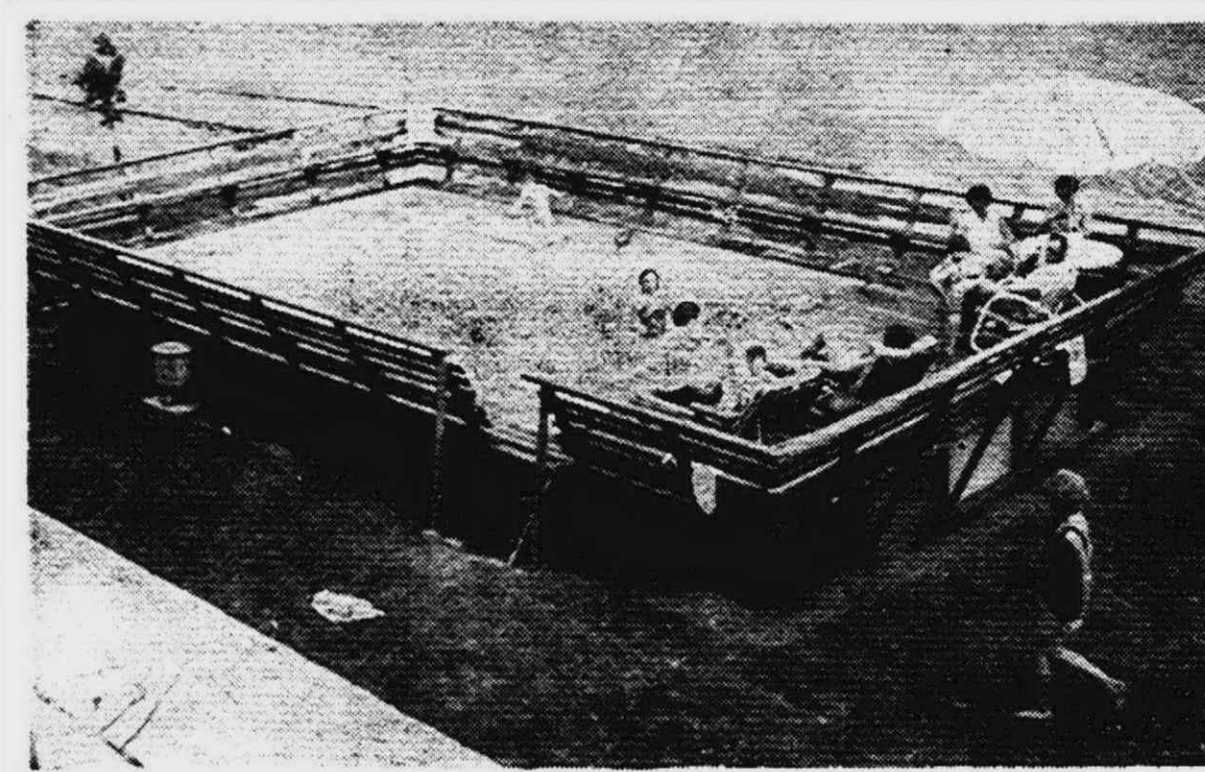

bined vote of all four participating districts.) Closest to Thompson in the Clarenceville voting was Gerald Cox with 37, with the other nine candidates registering smaller totals.

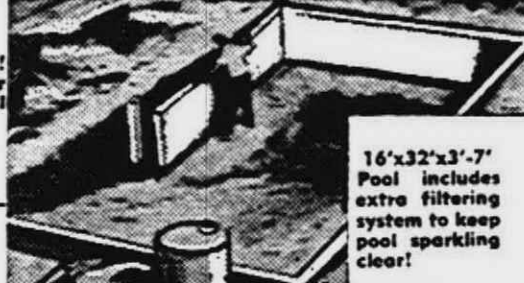

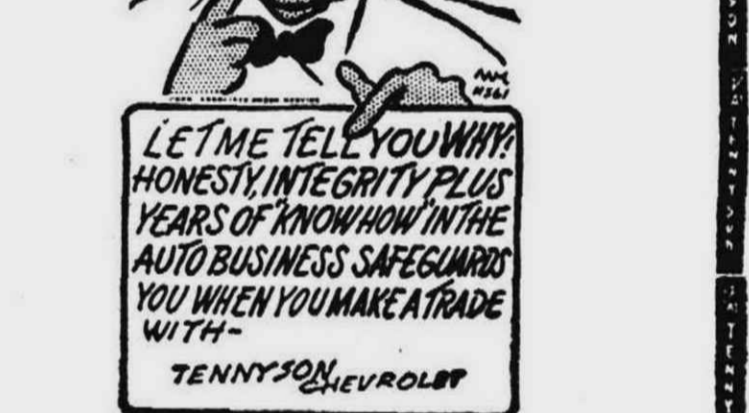
