Now, after Commencement, the lads must creep out into

the arena where often "bad" guys strive, and are honored . . . providing they produce wanted products or services. And where "good" guys are tossed into the gutter, no matter how sweet and pure their private thoughts if they don't work and produce something. A graduate either joints the game, or becomes a mystic de-

mendation of Supervisor Roy Lindsay, the Plymouth Township Board approved installation of six new street lights in front of the Burroughs plant on Plymouth Road, across the street from the City of Plymouth's Industrial Park.

The installation had been approved on Jan. 8 but was delayed until Burroughs officials indicated where they would like to have the lights.

By a split vote of 4-3, the Board granted permission for the installation of street lights at three intersections following an appeal from the Plymouth Community Association headed by President Raymond Arnold.

The intersections are: Beck Road at Five Mile, Beck Road at the C&O Railroad and Ridge Road at the C&O Railroad.

Trustees Dick Lauterbach and Louis Norman asked for additional study on the request on the grounds it could put the Township beyond the budget. However, Super-

Plymouth City Hall Plans OK'd

The Municipal Building Authority has authorized Architect By Becker to finalize plans for Plymouth's new City Hall after receiving sets of floor plan sketches that incorporated all changes suggested and approved by the Authority on May 28.

Becker presented estimate No. three which totaled \$448,966. including the engineering fee of \$29,197 plus the additional \$2,764 for revising the draw-

This figure is \$12,000 over the \$436,600 established by the Authority on May 20.

However, Becker quickly pointed out that estimate No. three had not deleted any of proposed atternates such as omission of the cooling cycle from the heating and air conditioning equipment, elimination of second floor lavatories, conference room. janitor's closet and storage room, nor the police garage.

Becker told the Authority that the building now contains 20,804 equare feet of floor area. He indicated his office expects to have the prints ready for presentation to federal authorities in Chicago well in advance of July 9.

Commissioner Arch Vallier. Mayor Wernette's liaison committee, and Mayor Pro Tem James Houk agreed that Becker had succeeded in submitting a set of prints that were acceptable in respect to estimated costs and to efficient city operation.

'Curtain Going Up'

"Purlie Victorious" closed the Ann Arbor Drama Season on a joyful, thoughtful note. This 1962 Broadway success leaves you limp from laughing, but hours later you discover you are thinking and talking seriously about the problems of the Negro in America. "Purlie Victorious" written by Ossie Davis, an excellent Negro actor, has a meaningful message for every American. The message: stop making a problem of the racial situation in ance. the United States and start letting them live a normal, everyday existence.

The current attraction at the Stables Coffeehouse Theater, 'Death of Bessie Smith" by Albee, treats the volatile racial situation in a more violent manner. Old Wally much prefers the comic treatment to the fiery approach. Of course, regardless of the approach, the problem of segregation, integration, and desegregation remains with us until each of us study it, understand it, and support our stand.

Ossie Davis in his biting satire has a character named Gitlow. Mel Stuart played this role to perfection. His line "You is the boss, boss" brought waves of laughter. Marge Johnson seen most often behind the Vanguard Theater wicket selling tickets had the part of lovely Lutebelle. Her long scene wih the Cap'n had the elements of professional polish. Marge was out at Northland last year with Raymond Burr in "Critic's Choice" playing the part of Essie. This gal really gets around.

Might be a good idea for the Vanguard folks to do "Purlie Victorious" next summer, especially since they have Lutiebelle right in their own backyard. This excellent, brilliant piece of dramatic irony deserves more exposure in the Detroit area. "Purlie Victorious" is the type of show that should be playing all the time to remind us about our sad state of affairs when it comes to racial relations.

Howard Green played the 25-year-old son of Cap'n with a directness and an underlying power that made his part symbolic of the new generation willing to suffer and work long hours to set the situation in order. Howard always attacks a role no matter how small with great intensity. He explores all the nuances until the part becomes his. Only until he possesses the role can he communicate to the other actors what the part is supposed to say. Old Wally has followed Howard Green's acting career all during the days of his early U. of M. beginnings. His excellent Jimmy Porter role in "Look Back in Anger" remains the high point of his U. of M. stay. Howard studied to be a lawyer while at the University. Towards the end of his academic career he shifted his interest to acting. He has been out in New York City now for the past two years studying with Uta Hagen and getting small roles on TV. You've seen his seven or eight times on "The Defenders" in small parts. Keep watching for Howard Green for one of these days you'll see his name up in the big lights. He's a young man with a burning desire to train himself to be every inch an actor. We hope to see Howard Green back again in next year's Ann Arbor Drama Season or on Broadway.



Murphy, used to say, falls in the category of a prestige and class production.

When these events come up in sports, you always want to be there." Murphy frequently would write in The Detroit Times, which followed Murphy in death. Then Bob would add:
