He hopes to inaugurate a pilot training program in which the workers will be tested for two weeks of training and schooling after which the employer and Hoben will confer on the future possibilities of the worker.

Our sports community continues to buzz about the firing of Bob Scheffing as manager of the Tigers.

From what we have read and heard, just about everybody except fellows like Nestor Chylak, Jim Honochick, Hank Soar and Ed Hurley (they're American League umpires) are to blame for what's happened to the Tigers this season.

"Scheffing was too lenient with his players," according to one headline on a story authored by Watson Spoestra in the Detroit News.

"Tiger players rap Campbell (the team's general manager," cried another eight-column streamer, this one also in the News.

"Wrong-guys fired," decried Lyall Smith, the Free **Press Sports Editor.**

In the same paper. Joe Falls put the blame on the Tiger scouts who have failed to come up with solid talent over the years.

Then we read what our ol' editor on the Times, John (Jack) Manning had to say. "Absentee ownership," plus making baseball "a business instead of our national pastime," has hurt the Tigers in the opinion of the esteemed Mr. Manning.

Unquestionably all of these factors have had something to do with the fall of the Tigers from their run for the pennant in 1961 (when they challenged the Yanks until the final month), to their fourth-place finish last season and their current struggle to rise out of ninth slot.

But maybe all of us-and this includes the Tiger management, the team itself, the sports writers (this one, too) and the fans-wouldn't find ourselves so stunned over the team's standing had we not perhaps overrated the Tigers from the start.

When the season started, each of us looked optimistically into the Tiger's immediate future.

Still vivid in our memories was the club's great rush of '61 and we were writing off last year's slide on the injuries of Al Kaline and Frank Lary.

What we overlooked as the Tigers plunged into '63 were such salient facts as:

1-Scheffing still was confronted with some serious problems in the infield . . . notably at short, second and third.

2-Could Norm Cash regain his hitting majesty of '61?

3-Could Rocky Colavito deliver with greater regularity in a clutch?

4-Was Gus Triandos the answer to the catching miseries of the past?

5-Could Frank Lary come back? And what about the relief pitching situation . . . would it be stronger?

We took the positive approach to most of these points. As long as Kaline again was healthy, the Tigers appeared mighty again . . . so we thought.

Now with the team mired deep in the standings we all are shocked. Maybe we should expect less from the Tigers. Lions and Pistons and all other teams that interest us. In that way we would cheer anything they accomplished.

While on the subject of the Tigers, we'd like to spell a few words in defense of the players.

We disagree with those who would have you believe that Colavito hasn't hit his hat because he is still angry and sulking over the salary battle he had with G. M. Campbell back in March.

Nor do we think there is a Tiger, or any other pro athlete, who isn't giving everyth gets the call to porform. Just keep in mind that baseball players are paid this year for what they did last season; also that while the game in which they engage is a team affair, the salary negotiations are carried on strictly on an individual basis. Also remember that while many of us can get by with a minimum effort in our regular work and still land a pay hike at the year's close, because our union has negotiated a general salary boost, things don't work that way for the pro athlete. The men who decide what a pro players shall be paid keep very close tab on the efforts of their hired hands. For example the Tiger front office has detailed statistics to throw at any players to show him how many times he failed to deliver with men on base or how many times he erred in a clutch, etc. There's also another factor which behooves the pro athlete to make "hay" as long as he can. At best, the average career of the big leaguer-in any sport-is short; less than seven years. And, when you talk about big money in athletics, it comes only to those in the big leagues!



Takes Michigan Mile in Record Time Satan Wins For The Home Folks

Raced in Livonia with hundreds of Livonians looking on, the Michigan Mile trophy rests in the hands of a Livonia Industrialist for the first time in the 16 year history of the \$50,000 added Detroit Race Course stake.

Three days before the rich event last Saturday, Owner Bill Salmen, who also operates the Dependable Kellering plant on Schoolcraft, told reporters his horse. Crimson Satan, would not only win the Mile but would shatter

the existing stake record of 1:41.4 set by Total Traffic in 1959.

But it didn't appear as if either prediction would come true when the field left the gate with Crimson Satan, a notoriously slow

starter, 10 lengths behind the leader. Matter of fact he was 20 lengths back when the field turned into the backstretch.

Then, Crimson Satan made his owner the most outstanding seer of the age. Jockey Herb Hinojosa took him to the outside and he started to move.

He went by one horse, two horses, a gang together and finally was challenging Decidedly and Greek Money for the lead as all moved into the final turn.

Crimson Satan came out of the turn a head in front and then zoomed ahead by five and a half lengths to win in the amazing time of 1:40.3 more than a second faster than the record.

And none was happier in the large delegation that moved into the winner's circle than Salmen - he and Crimson Satan had just achieved their greatest victory. They had just won the Michigan Mile before the hometown folks and demonstrated that The Satan is one of the great handicap stars of his time.
