Lack of Funds Forces Delay Of Plan Group

A proposed joint planning authority, which would encompass the entire Plymouth community, appears to have reached at least a temporary standstill.

Money — or better, the lack of it — has forced a delay of the authority's formal organization.

City of Plymouth has allocated \$5,000 as part of an estimated \$20,000 first year budget for the planning group, which would undertake an expansion of the work of the Industrial Development Corp.

Canton Township was the next taxing unit to consider the proposition. Canton was asked last week to help out with a \$2,500 contribution. Canton authorities, lacking the necessary funds at this date, have indicated they will incorporate the \$2,500 allocation in next year's budget.

The Plymouth School Board similarly does not have much in the way of "extra money." It has discussed the merits of the planning authority but has taken no action.

Board President Gerald Fischer is expected to call a committee-of-the-whole meeting within the next two weeks in order to explore the matter further. The School Board is being asked for \$7,500.

Plymouth Township was expected to act on a request Tuesday night. The Township's share of the project is \$5,000.

Struck by Car, Youth Escapes Serious Injury

A nine-year-old boy escaped serious injury when he was struck by a car last Saturday evening as he was crossing Main St. near Ann Arbor Rd.

Charles Phillips, 9, of 44707 Ann Arbor Rd., sustained minor injuries, as treated at Wayne County General Hospital and released.

Driver of the car that struck the youth was Peter Bellanger, 22, of 529 South Main St. He told police he made a turn off Ann Arbor Rd. onto Main St. and struck the boy as he completed the turn.

Bellanger was ticketed for reckless driving and failure to have an operator's license. The incident took place at 5 p.m. Saturday.

3rd Summer Concert Is Friday Evening In Kellogg Park

The third concert of the season by the Plymouth Community Band will be held at 8 p.m. this Friday evening in Kellogg Park.

There is no admission. Officials expect to have on hand a portable band shell, identical to the one that is about to be purchased through the joint financing of the City and numerous organizations.

It is large enough to hold an 80-piece band and will easily accommodate the Community Band.

Two Apartment Projects Planned For Township

Proposed multiple dwellings have taken a portion of the spotlight — at least momentarily — in Plymouth Township. Two multiple dwelling projects are on the drawing boards.

One consists of a 32-acre site east of Haggerty Rd. between Ann Arbor Rd. and Joy Rd. It is being tentatively identified as "Cambridge Village."

Preliminary plans have been presented to the Township planning commission by developer J. A. Bloch, Detroit, but no action has been taken by the planning group until certain changes are made in the project.

The exact number of apartment units has not been definitely established.

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School Board Approves Budget of \$2.6 Million

School Board members Monday night officially approved a new general operating fund budget for the School District for 1963-64.

The new budget, which actually went into effect July 1, amounts to \$2,663,000 in projected expenditures, an increase of \$201,000 over last year.

A gain in receipts plus a cash carry-over of \$77,000 puts the document in balance.

Last year's budget for general operation of the District consisted of \$2,462,000 in expenditures with receipts of \$2,539,000. The difference represents the cash carry-over for this year.

School taxes remain unchanged.

Property owners will continue to pay 23.70 mills based on state equalized valuation. The revenue thus derived will provide the district with its operating monies as well as the finances for the building and site sinking fund and debt retirement.

Included in the new budget are the added costs of 14 new teachers. Nine are to handle a 280-student enrollment increase this fall.

The five others are: one for special education at the Senior High; three for art, music and physical education instruction in the elementary grades; and one as a visiting nurse.

Pay raises incorporated in the budget include a five-cent an hour cost-of-living increase for all hourly employees.

The amount of the hourly increase prompted an appearance by Robert Ross, business manager for Local

522, the custodial worker's union here.

Ross said the five-cent increase "was not adequate." He cited a "need" basis for raises to custodial workers in the Plymouth School System in view of their present wage structure.

Assistant Superintendent Melvin Blunk presented figures on the custodial worker's pay scale. It showed that a

starting day custodian is paid \$1.86 an hour. This goes to \$2.24 an hour after two years.

Highest paid custodial worker — there is only one of these — receives \$3.16 an hour. Of the 41 custodians employed by the Plymouth School System, Ross said that "about 30 per cent" earn \$4,200 a year.

Board members explained that the plan a year ago was

to grant no raises at all for a two-year period. An unexpected increase in receipts since then enabled the five-cent raise to hourly workers as well as other pay raises to teachers and administrators.

Other pay raises include a \$500-a-year boost for Superintendent Ross \$11,850, \$350 for Assistant Superintendent Blunk, and \$100 a year for all teachers.

Ross mentioned that state mediation might be the next step in obtaining more money for the custodial workers here.

He said the matter of wages for custodial workers was being brought to the Board's attention on a basis "of need, not greed."

While many hundreds, if not thousands, of individuals contributed to the ultimate success of Plymouth's Independence Day celebration last Thursday, the JayCees should be at the top of the list for congratulations.

They planned, organized and supervised one of the most outstanding Fourth of July parades ever seen in Plymouth, and by the same token arranged one of the most impressive day-long programs enjoyed by Plymouth in many decades.

Laurels are in order to practically every one of Plymouth's many service clubs, organizations and groups. Without the widespread cooperation provided by these many other groups, the day would unquestionably have fallen short of its goals.

But we suspect had the JayCees not taken the lead in planning Plymouth's July Fourth festivities, the day would have risked going almost unnoticed, by comparison to what actually did happen.

On behalf of a grateful community, we extend sincere thanks to the JayCees and applaud them for their efforts, their initiative and their interest. It was indeed a magnificent job.

Board Approves Eight Teacher Appointments

The appointments of eight teachers to the Plymouth school system were approved Monday night by School Board members, and three resignations were accepted.

James Cook, Edrhe Truesdell and Robert Anderson resigned. Cook, a member of the Senior High faculty, will take a teaching position in the Livonia school system.

Truesdell resigned to become an elementary teacher in the Wayne schools, and Anderson discontinued a year's leave of absence.

Anderson had taken the leave of absence to do doctoral study at the University of Michigan and he received half of his annual salary during the period. By ending his leave of absence, thus indicating he will not return to the Plymouth faculty, Anderson must return the \$3,655 paid him over the past year.

New teachers are: Mrs. Janice Bridges, a Junior High English and social studies teacher, who graduated from Andrews University and taught previously in Niles, Mich.

Mrs. Joan Engel (kindergarten at Smith School), a graduate of Eastern Michigan University, who previously taught in New Jersey.

Mrs. Patricia Geister (second grade, Farrand), a graduate of Western Michigan and a teacher in Manchester, Mich.

Mrs. Theresa Kuzniar (fourth grade, Smith), a Wayne State University graduate, who taught previously in Detroit.

Derald McKinley (sixth grade, Bird), a graduate of Plymouth High and Eastern Michigan and a former teacher in Farmington.

Carrol Nichols (sixth grade), a Western Michigan graduate and a teacher with six years experience.

Warren Vanden Bosch (Senior High), a graduate of Michigan State, and a former teacher in Howell.

Gerald Welch (Senior High), a graduate of Eastern Michigan and a former teacher in the Cherry Hill School District.

Board members also approved a request for maternity leave submitted by Mary L. Ebmeyer.

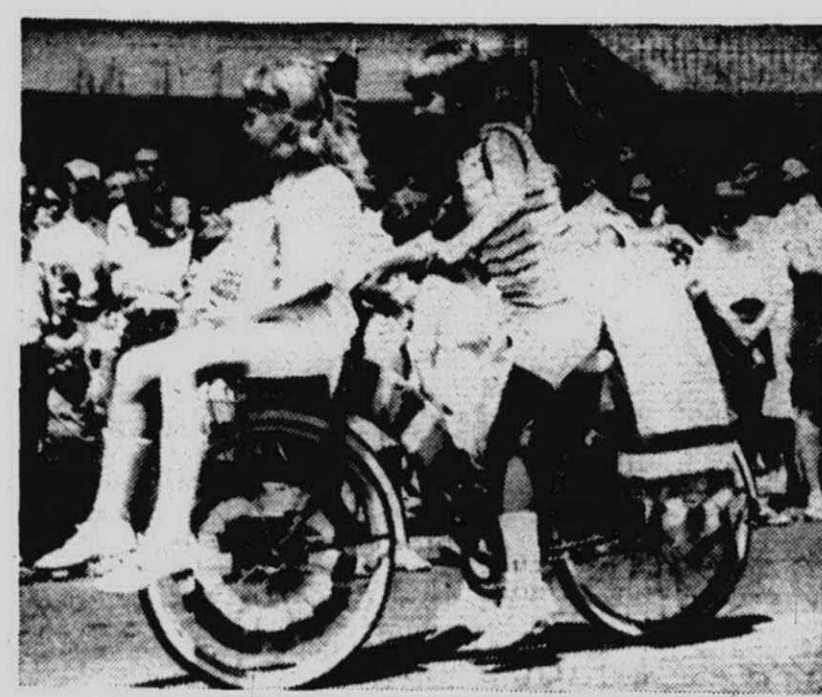

This award requires possession of three waterfront merit badges, knowledge of methods of insuring waterfront safety, and demonstration of considerable swimming and safety skills.

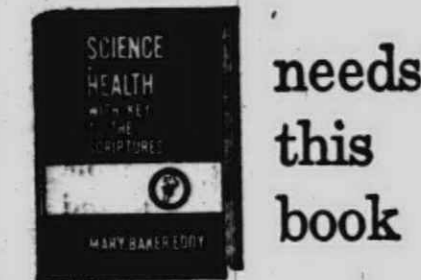

Too much is being said these days about the rights and privileges of the citizen and not enough about his responsibilities. The basic foundation of individual freedom is individual responsibility. The former cannot exist without the latter. Freedom is not self-perpetuating — it is perpetuated through action. It will disintegrate and fade away unless responsible citizens do their part to support it and defend it.

No person can remain free without doing his part to guarantee this same freedom for others. If he wishes to maintain free elections, he must participate in them. He cannot continue to express his opinions without helping to provide opportunities for others to do likewise. He must be willing to fight for the rights of all people to live under equal freedom and protection of the laws. If he violates the laws that he doesn't like or believe in, he must expect his neighbors may do the same.

Responsible action is tantamount to good citizenship. It takes time to vote — it takes time to be informed on public issues and about public officials — it takes time to participate in open forums, to serve on advisory committees and to be active in political parties. It is easier to be critical, to find fault, than to do something about a given situation. How often do we say, "Why don't they do this or why don't they do that?" instead of "Why don't we take this kind of constructive action on a given problem?"

Representative government must not function this way. If the job is going to get done, each citizen must accept his individual responsibility to help do it. It means exercising his voting franchise at all regular and special elections in which choices are made among the candidates for public office. It also means sharing time and ideas in working with planning commissions, political parties, volunteer service groups, neighborhood associations, P.T.A.'s, church groups and other organizations formed for the express purpose of contributing to making the community a better place to live. Yes, it also means that the individual is willing to run for public office at a time when he can make a significant contribution to good government or good schools.

Good public policy and constructive courses of action are difficult to come by. Recently a local engineer said to me, "Isn't it somewhat ironic that we have so much engineering know-how in solving problems through use of soil, wood, concrete, steel, plastic and other materials with which we work, but we have such limited know-how in working with human problems." In fact he says, "The human problems are standing in the way of advanced technology in the engineering fields."

Where does this lead us? It should cause us to appraise realistically the decision-making process arriving at good solutions to our common problems. Each person who in concert with others is engaged in arriving at a group decision brings to this process a background of experiences, understanding and misunderstanding, attitudes and feelings, prejudice and bias, fact and fiction, truth and partial truth, which are unique to him. Each person's actions are controlled by what he is, as well as by what he knows. In general his purposes are best served when his opinion prevails or is accepted by others. For this reason, achievement of a kind of compromise or constructive course of action in a group is extremely slow and difficult.

Considerable research has been done in the field of human relations and communication, but the application of the research to human enterprise is another matter. At any rate, the Plymouth Community is on the verge of breakthroughs in community planning and development. The early success of these efforts will be enhanced when we dedicate ourselves, our time and talent to think critically, plan cooperatively and move steadily forward together toward the achievement of our common goals and purposes.
